Kevin Colbert Opening Statement:

Kevin Colbert: Thanks to all you folks for being here. I can't say how good it feels to see this happening in a live venue. We've all been kind of looking at monitors and talking and trying to do the same type of work, so I'm sure it's good for you, and it's very appreciated by us to be able to do this in this setting. Speaking of which, the pandemic has challenged us in so many different ways, and it's not unique to our industry, but it was challenging this year to get to this point with this draft process, almost more than last year.

Last year when the pandemic hit we had already gone through the combine; this year we had to do this without a combine. Last year we didn't have pro days; this year we had pro days. So it's been a real different, challenging kind of a road. And again, I want to thank everybody, Coach Tomlin and his staff for the work that they did. I'd also like to congratulate Coach on his extension officially. It's great to know that we'll be working together this year, and see where it goes beyond that, but real excited to have Coach here for this season.

The scouts, the administrative staff, again, it was a different challenge for them. My guys were able to get out, and we probably visited live and watched games for every school for maybe but six where there were prospects. Real challenging. The pro days, they did an awesome job, as did Coach and his group. John Norwig, our doctors, our trainers, our radiologists, everybody involved with that process, again, without a combine physical we had to go about it in a completely different manner, and hopefully -- I know John and our docs did the best they could under the circumstances -- but hopefully we got the information we need.

Bob McCartney and his video staff, taking, again, no combine, but he had to take and condense all the pro day workouts for us. Scott Phelps and his IT staff getting us set up for the draft. We will be live, in person at the draft in our building, in our facility, albeit spaced out according to league guidelines and of course governmental guidelines. Burt and his group accommodating us and trying to keep us up to date with all the media factions that are occurring. Jack Kearney, Bob Jones, our security people. Again, there's just so many people. I just want to make sure we step out and thank for getting us to this point. As we sit here today, our roster is currently at 75 players. It's probably a little higher number than we anticipate or usually have at this time of the year.

I do want to step out first and thank our veteran players who decided to stay with us. First and foremost, Ben Roethlisberger told us from the end of the season that it was his intention to be here, and then for him to follow that up and be willing to adjust his pay to be able to not only keep himself here but give us the opportunity to have some other folks stay is very much appreciated, and I think it started a real positive off-season for us.

We knew going into this free agency period, pre-pandemic we knew this was going to be a real tough year. We knew we had a lot of players, quote, in their senior season, and they were going to be coming to an end. It was going to be challenging. When the pandemic hit and the cap was challenged and reduced, it made it even more difficult. But again, with guys like Vince Williams, Tyson Alualu, JuJu Smith-Schuster, Joshua Dobbs deciding to stay with us, I think they followed Ben's lead, and that's very much appreciated by us.

We did sign more players. The other thing that the -- not the pandemic, but the opt-out of the draft issue that the NCAA allowed this year, it probably cut in half the players that will be available to us to sign as free agents after the draft. It's roughly -- I want to say it went from 800 to 400, with that not being the actual numbers. But anticipating we would have less guys to sign after the draft, we were conscious of that when we were at pro days, and maybe the one-year vet guy that worked out, we signed five or so players from that venue just to try to keep us as current as we could be in anticipation of not being able to sign as many guys after the draft. Currently right now of the 75 that we have in this group, 50 of those are players that have played in NFL games. Like Coach and I, we look at our board, and we talk, we could play a game today if need be. Saying that, going into the draft, we're wide open. We're not going in looking for any one position, any one group of position. We're going to be wide open to anything and see where this thing goes, okay.

There is good depth we believe on the offensive line, the wide receivers, the running backs, the linebackers both inside and outside and the corners. There is okay depth at the tight end, the quarterback, and the safety positions, and I can be very up front and honest, there's very limited depth in this year's draft on the defensive line. It's probably as lean as it's been in recent memory. Again, we always get asked about trade up, trade down. I'm very doubtful that we'll trade up. We really value those eight picks that we have, five of which are in the top 140.

Mike Tomlin: Thank you. It's great to be here today. As Kevin mentioned, with some of the things that we've faced, dealing with the pandemic, it makes you appreciative of these moments, the face-to-face moments, the getting the chance to interact with you guys. The pandemic has also created some challenges through this process of team development here in 2021. We're not complaining about it. You guys know our attitude. The challenges that it has created have been global ones, so from that standpoint, it's been fair. None of us got an opportunity to see a collection of talent at the combine, and so that's created some challenges for us as an organization, scouting department, coaching staff. We've had to be more mobile. We've had to work harder to gather information, working along with Kevin and the scouting department has been a pleasure in that regard. The number of Zoom calls and things that we've had with prospects, when you look back at it is really impressive.

But we formulated a plan to kind of circumvent the challenges of the pandemic early, and I think that aided us in terms of being able to sit here comfortably today. We started the process immediately once we realized some of the challenges, and so it gave us attitude to adjust and to really take our time to get to know the guys as best we could in a remote manner. We hit select pro days, as well. We always do, but it felt a little different this year. It felt like there was more riding on those days because of the lack of exposure that we didn't have in Indy. And so we got a lot done on the road and remotely at pro days and dealing with players via Zoom. As Kevin mentioned, I too am appreciative of our players displaying their want to be here. Free agency was challenging for us. Free agency is probably challenging for everybody in this environment with the cap being what it was.

Our players displaying their desire to be here, taking less, if you will, to be here, the guys that Kevin mentioned, man, it really makes you excited about this group, about the makeup of this group, about the intentions of this group. So we're excited about building. We did what we needed to do in terms of free agency. We're preparing ourselves for the upcoming draft, and those are the two major components in terms of acquiring talent. We've started the process in terms of developing our talent. I've been pleasantly surprised by the participation in the off-season program, given the circumstances that have been well-documented. I just left the facility, and we've got a nice number of guys over there working and working safely and appropriately, and I'm appreciative of that.

I understand the climate that we're in, but more than anything, man, we want to provide an environment that's safe and has expertise, particularly that the young developing or the financially strapped player that can be on your roster this time of year needs. So we're excited about some of those developments. But really, as we lean in on this draft, man, we're just at kind of the beginning stages of our off-season in terms of the development of this group and starting to formulate plans. It's been an exciting process with the coaching staff, working on some schematics and exploring wrinkles in all three phases and making some hard-core decisions about how we're going to go about our business given the players that we have and the ones that we intend to add. And so excited about where all those things are. Last week we met via Zoom with our players, but just hitting on large, broad, sweeping things, some foundational things in terms of culture building. This week we'll continue with remote meetings, but we're probably going to get into some more details, schematics, and start laying a foundation and introducing particularly some of the new guys in terms of some of the things that we do. Obviously the guys that have been here have an understanding of largely how we operate in the three phases, and so that's a snapshot of where we are.

Again, I just wanted to repeat that we're excited about being here with you guys today and moving upward and onward here in '21.

Mike, I'm curious, the extension, you have some guys that you've been with for a long time. When that extension ends they might not be around anymore. What gave you the confidence that things are going to continue on that positive trajectory after some of the guys that you've been close with for so long might not be here anymore? (Will Graves, Associated Press)

Mike Tomlin: You know, in regards to my extension, you guys that know me know I don't ponder a lot about longevity and things of that nature, man. I'm just appreciative of the opportunity to work that's in front of me today. That's largely been my attitude regarding it for 15 years now. I assure you that will remain unchanged. In terms of some of the people who come and go, that's part of the coaching profession and the business of football. I'm excited about the collection of men, the coaching talent, the vocational talent that we have, and our ability to kind of formulate our schematics and our plan as it pertains to these guys that we're working with, and we're excited about doing it.

You talked about improving the running game for a couple of years. What is there from an immediate need standpoint in this draft, maybe not just at running back but other positions that could help you guys? (Jeff Hathhorn, 93.7 the Fan)

Kevin Colbert: Well, when you look at the running game, obviously you've got to start up front, and then you've got to look at the runners themselves. You're never going to leave any part of the offense out, the quarterbacks, the receivers, because it's all a collective effort. You know, we have some challenges up front because we don't have the same offensive line that we had last year, so there will be differences, and that will be up to Coach how we shift people around. As I said, we could play a game today based on what we have, but is that going to be our line? Who knows what we'll end up doing with those positions, be it center, guard, or tackle. And of course the running back position, we have really four veteran guys on this roster. Could we add to it? Sure. How that all breaks down, no one will know. Until we get in and play a game, no one will know if it's better. But as of right now, we know where we can look at help and see what help is available, but again, we could go into this thing, and we are going into it completely wide open.

Mike Tomlin: I'll add to that. And let's be clear, the improvements in the running game go beyond just the acquisition of additional players. We're capable of performing better than we have, players aside. Schematics, formations, the things that we do to give ourselves a strategic advantage need to be improved, and that's some of the things that we're working on.

In the regular season last year, if you didn't have Haden or Nelson, Layne was the sub package guy. In the playoffs it was Pierre. Why the change, and what's with both of those guys? How do they stand if you had to play them? (Mike Prisuta, WDVE)

Mike Tomlin: Yeah, I don't know if the breaking point was that clear, regular season Layne, playoffs, Pierre. We've followed the growth and development of young players on the practice field over the course of the season, and as the season wore on, we just got more comfortable with what we were seeing from Pierre. Now, is it a rise in his level of play? Is it a decline in Lane's level of play? You know, I really can't speak to that. There was a feeling that he was moving in the right direction, and that's why we made the decisions that we made. In terms of what that means for 2021, we will see. How 2020 ended does not define how 2021 is going to work out or even begin for that matter. They're both capable young players. We've got other capable young players. We intend to potentially add to that, so we'll see where the roads lead us.

I was curious, the way things are in today's league, are running backs a risky value do you feel in the first round? And are there enough centers in this draft, at least decent centers, who could come in and play available beyond the first round? (Gerry Dulac, Pittsburgh Post-Gazette)

Kevin Colbert: Yeah, first, I don't think you can ever underestimate the value of a quality player at any position, and running back is no different. I understand that the game has changed. It's a more horizontal game than it is a vertical game and people don't play traditional football as really Coach and I grew up with with two-back sets and power games and so on and so forth. It has changed. But if you have a dynamic player at any position, that player should make a difference. Running back is no different. I think if you look at the Hall of Fame runners, most of those guys were taken in high rounds. I don't ever place that value high or low on a given position. I base it on who the player is and what that player can do to help us. The center position, it is unusually deep this year. Usually the centers, there aren't a lot of centers in a given draft, but we feel good there's quality centers in this draft that we think are starter capable, and it's unusual for that position.

Kevin, over the summer last year, you told us that you would maybe weigh the opt-outs a little differently than you did the guys who actually played football last year. Has your thinking on that changed at all throughout this process, or is that still the case? (Dale Lolley, DK Pittsburgh Sports)

Kevin Colbert: No, no question. As I stated in the summer, if a player chooses to opt out, for whatever reason, that's their decision, and we will respect it. However, if a player played in 2020 and those players are of equal value, one that didn't play and one that played, we'll take the one that played because we don't know what the opt-outs will be like in their first season back in football. We believe it's hard to sit this game out. Sometimes it happens because of injury, but this time it was pandemic related for the most part. But we will take the players -- again, if they're close. It's not to say we're not going to draft somebody that opted out. I couldn't say that. But if I have a choice and we have a choice, we'll take the one that played if their value is close. Part of the problem, the two conferences that got hurt the worst were the Big Ten and the Pac-12 because their seasons were canceled basically, and then some of their players decided they were going to move on and they would put themselves in preparation for the draft, and then when their conferences reinstated football, some of them were too far down the road, be it with an agent or be it with training, that they couldn't get back. So we did run into that a lot where players wanted to come back but they were too far down the road. Each case will be weighed individually, but again, if they're close, we're going to take the player that played.

Kevin, you mentioned about potentially not wanting to trade up. I've got a couple questions about trading back. Are you interested, number one? Does it make it more difficult to trade back because the seven picks, I believe three of them are not within the division behind you? And is there any organizational philosophy of wanting to stay in the first round if you do trade back? (Mark Kaboly, The Athletic)

Kevin Colbert: Again, we're always going to value quality over quantity, but if we're not comfortable with what we're looking at at the 24th pick, we'll trade back. Do we want to do it with a division team? That wouldn't be our preference, but we won't discount that completely because we have to weigh what the potential trade-back will do for us and not worry about where those picks may go. It wouldn't be our preference, but it won't disgualify us from trading back with a division team.

Do you want to stay in the first round? (Mark Kaboly, The Athletic)

Kevin Colbert: I mean, again, what are we getting? How many picks? We've got to look at what we're walking away from. I never like to walk away from a pick without having -- say if we're trading back five spots, I want five players that we would be comfortable in taking so we can't lose. That's the way we've always approached that. We never would trade up unless the player we want is available and we know on that pick that he is available. But trading back, I want to make sure that we can't lose if we do it.

With Steve Nelson not coming back and even the Justin Layne arrest, Hilton, has corner moved up your board a little bit more, and what is the value of depth of this position this year? (Joe Rutter, Tribune-Review)

Kevin Colbert: The corners are deep. Again, we talk about this every year, and every year it seems to be continuing, the trend in college football, again, becoming more horizontal. There's more corners. We always say we have 12 starters on defense and 12 starters on offense because of a slot receiver or a slot corner, and that goes all the way back to the college game. So there's a lot of depth at the wide receiver and the cornerback position. As Coach mentioned, James Pierre came on and did a nice job for us last year. Justin Layne had done some good things on the field. They're both young, ascending players. Can we add to that spot? Absolutely. Again, we talked about -- in Steve Nelson's case, Steve was a valuable player for us. However, we had to make some tough salary cap related decisions that I mentioned earlier. Steve Nelson is a starter-capable NFL corner. We just couldn't keep him under the current setup that we had or the current setup that we're dealing with from a salary cap standpoint, and we had to make some tough choices.

You guys talked a lot about the pro days and getting out on the road and not having a combine. Do you feel like in this circumstance the relationships that you have with college coaches and those staffs are going to be more important having not had that sort of applesto-apples comparison being able to talk to guys and getting feedback from coaches and not just that one snapshot that you see in a pro day? (Alan Saunders, Pittsburgh Sports Now) Kevin Colbert: It goes beyond the pro day because scouts couldn't get to the colleges except for a game setting, and even at the game settings we couldn't go on the field in the pregame. We had to sit in the stands or the press box if it was allowable. So a lot of times in those situations when you're doing games, hey, you'll see a coach sitting on a bench before a game, you may have a conversation. None of that was available to us. We couldn't visit the schools and have the day-today interaction that our scouts have when we do a school visit and spend a day watching film, talking to folks. We didn't have that this year. But that's not to say it wasn't -- it was totally negative. As Coach mentioned, Coach and myself, we got to nine pro days. We think we got to the -- what we feel had the most quality players so that we could both see them up live and in person. Our interaction with them was limited, though. We could not take them out to dinner the night before. We couldn't say hi to their parents. We couldn't have a meeting with them during that pro day setting. So we had to do all of that via Zoom. Coach and I did over 100 Zoom calls, and quite honestly, we're comfortable with the results because we actually got to spend a little more time with them and we feel good about that information. But just like we mentioned, just seeing you folks in person, it's different. You can read my eyes, you can read Coach's eyes when I'm answering the question. It's not the same when you're doing it via Zoom. It is what it is. We think we're in good shape. I feel comfortable with the information we got. It's all we can do at this point. We'll try to make the best decisions possible.

Mike Tomlin: And from a coach's perspective, no question the environment pushed us towards leaning on some coaching relationships and the gathering of information among our peers at the college level that we've known in the past. But by no means do I feel like that's an advantage. I think that that was a global tool used by all of us within the coaching ranks. I think everybody understanding the circumstances being what they were we're more open to that, and so I think it was more of a global thing. And I appreciate our coaching peers at the collegiate ranks for sharing and providing necessary information for all of us.

I want to know, with a couple days left, how much do you change your draft board? Is it set right now? And do you have any idea -- how good of an idea do you have what the teams in front of you are going to do in the first round? (Rich Walsh, KDKA)

Kevin Colbert: You know, we finished our formal meetings on Saturday, and then today, tomorrow, Wednesday, we'll look -- really tomorrow and Tuesday, or today and tomorrow -- we'll go through it and maybe brush up some things, maybe just look at what we concluded after our meetings and maybe make some minor adjustments just to make sure we got things in what we believe is the best order possible.

We don't care -- we've never worried about what the folks in front of us will do. As we've told you guys, we don't -- we used to do the mock drafts and it was a complete waste of time. What we've done now is -- and we've done this, what, for the last 12 years or so, we just mock ourselves, and we're picking first and we're going to pick a player. Okay, he's gone, we're picking second. Okay, he's gone, we're picking third. And when we're done with this process, and it'll take the good part of the day on Wednesday, when we're done with that, we'll have 24 guys in an order that we would take them, and it's not necessarily the order that you have on your board. So the order of the picks is set and you just wait and watch, and the only decision you have to make is whether you're going to trade up or trade back. It doesn't matter what happens in front of you because you've already made that decision.

How surprised were you you were able to get Vince Williams back? Did you think originally that was going to happen? And with losing Bud, how comfortable are you with your linebacker depth? And Kevin, I can't remember, you went through the positions of strength in this draft so much. What kind of a draft is it for linebackers both inside and out? (Guy Junker, WTAE)

Kevin Colbert: Yeah, just to answer that, the inside and outside depth is very good. The outside depth, when we're looking at outside linebackers, we're looking at most of the time college defensive ends because most teams are 4-3 and we have to convert them up. But that's a deep, deep group. The inside backers is a deeper group than it has been, much like the centers. We've looked and we just say, wow, this is a pretty good group. The one that's not is at defensive line. It's very lean. But in Vince's case, I'll let Coach speak to that. Vince wanted to end his career with the Pittsburgh Steelers for however long he has left. Again, we had to make tough decisions, and that was extremely tough, because Vince has been a starting player and helped us win a lot of games and he's a big part of the fabric of our team, and we value that tremendously. And for him to want to come back, it's very important and very much appreciated by us. I'll let Coach address that, as well.

Mike Tomlin: Yeah, Vince Williams is a Pittsburgh Steeler. Vince Williams bleeds black and gold, and really his decision to come back is really just an example of an opportunity for him to display that.

I can't say that I'm surprised by that, knowing what I've known about Vince and his level of commitment, not only to the game of football but to us and how we go about our business. You know, in regards to the loss of Bud and the expectations and the depth and things at that position, the linchpin of that entire discussion is the natural maturation of Alex Highsmith from year one to year two. You know the standard of expectations that we have for our young players, moving from one to two. He could be the poster boy for that. We need a significant rise in terms of all areas of play from him, but I also think it's reasonable to expect it given what he's been exposed to, given the quality young man that he is and his work ethic and the environment that we intend to put him in. I think it's reasonable to expect him to rise up and meet the challenges that you mentioned.

I have a question about the excitement about the draft. I know that generally speaking you two don't get caught up in the excitement, but you also don't live in a vacuum. Maybe it's the pandemic, maybe it's your team's needs, maybe it's the players that are available in the draft, but there seems to be a buzz around this year's draft that perhaps is a little greater than past drafts. Can you sense that? Does that kind of build your excitement, as well, for what's ahead? (Alby Oxenreiter, WPXI)

Mike Tomlin: I'll let Kevin speak to that. I probably could be described as someone who lives in a vacuum, but by choice.

Kevin Colbert: Yeah, and honestly, yeah, we really -- I don't watch any draft shows. I really don't read any of that information because I hope that we have more information that's being portrayed on the outside, and honestly most times they're talking about 20 players and the same 20 in different orders and so on and so forth. So what goes on outside, I really can't address because I don't get caught up in it because, as Coach mentioned, we're so busy trying to make sure that we get our business handled, I can't really get caught up in the outside persona. If it's exciting for our fans, great. I mean, we hope to create that excitement. And like Coach mentioned, this is the real start of the off-season, both our players that are currently here and the new players that we add. So if there's excitement, great. Our job is to build on that excitement and to make it a productive process.

If there are needs that you have and there are players that are exciting that can address those needs, does that make it more interesting for you then? (Alby Oxenreiter, WPXI) Kevin Colbert: Again, we can get excited about a player, but you don't know if that player will be there. So I'm excited about the depth of this draft because I think we can get eight players for sure that I know can make us a better team. They're there. We just have to pick the right ones.

Coach, you had some highly publicized failures on fourth and short last year. Being part of schematics and also part of personnel, would you think about drafting offensive linemen that may be more geared toward run blocking as opposed to pass blocking and vice versa? (Aubrey Bruce, The Sentinel)

Mike Tomlin: You know, like I mentioned, the personnel, the players themselves are just a component of our successes and failures, particularly in the situations that you mentioned. So we're looking at players, but we're also looking at what it is that we do and how we do it and how we set up ourselves for those instances. It's not just a personnel discussion for us, and definitely not weighted in the ways that you mentioned. Most of the time the good players are good players because the good players in all areas, the elite ones, they're good in run situations, they're good in passing situations, and things of that nature. And we're not there yet. Being in late April, we're not into the minutiae of what our short yardage, our goal line personnel is going to be per se, but rest assured that personnel is just a component of it.

At what point would you consider drafting a quarterback? And if so, why would you draft a quarterback? (Ed Bouchette, The Athletic)

Kevin Colbert: Again, wide open to all of it. If you look at our current depth, obviously we have four NFL veteran quarterbacks on our roster, which I feel great about.

We also have really three of those four that are in the last year of their so-called deals when you look at it realistically. It's an unusual group in that we do have four. Can you add a young one? Absolutely. We always have to be on the look for that next guy and try to predict the value of taking that player at that position, because most likely a young quarterback won't play for the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2021. Again, we've got four veteran guys that we're going to try to sort through. Could you add someone that could be more guaranteed to be here for the future? Absolutely. And that's our job, to try to value that. It goes all the way back to Ben. Ben wasn't a sure pick when we were sitting there at 11 because we had more pressing issues than a quarterback because Tommy Maddox had done some good things for us. It wasn't like we couldn't have started the season with Tommy. When Ben was there for us, it would have been a huge mistake not to take him. So we'll always be open to adding what we believe is the most critical position, but again, we feel good about having four vets to work with at this point.

Mike Tomlin: And it's exciting from a coaching perspective with one of those guys being a 22 year old guy like Dwayne Haskins who was viewed globally as having first-round talent just a short time ago.

We're excited about working with him and seeing what his skill set and hoping him improve is, as well.

I want to ask you about the inside linebacker position. You mentioned that it's deep in this draft. At the same time, we've seen the position change a lot over the years, more Devin Bush, less Vince Williams, if you will. How much does that influence how much you look at this class, and what do you consider to be your needs or your wants in that regard? (Dejan Kovacevic, DK Pittsburgh Sports)

Mike Tomlin: You know, in terms of the physical makeup of the linebacker position, I think it's been widespread in college ball prior to evolving and becoming more widespread in our game. I believe it's probably less of an issue now, to be quite honest with you. I think it was a significant discussion when we drafted Ryan Shazier, when we drafted him years ago and he was kind of an outlier or precursor to who is a common discussion now, a guy that's capable of running with anyone and covering and playing in all circumstances. I think that's more the norm now than it was then. So I think there's less significant discussions about the makeup or the look of them, and that's just what they look like. In terms of the draft pool, I think there's a lot of guys, and guys that we're excited about, and I'll let Kevin kind of speak to that if he wants to.

Kevin Colbert: Yeah, I agree with what Coach said. The game has changed, as I mentioned. It's more horizontal, and Ryan was ahead of the curve when we took him. You've got to keep pace with what's going on and what we have to defend in this league. But it's not different from what's going on at the college level, so a lot of those guys -- it used to be in the old days who could take on that fullback. Well, there's no fullbacks for the most part. Who could take on a guard. Well, most of the time they're running past the guard instead of taking them on. So we value that. But they also have to have a certain amount of innate intellect, of football intellect, if you will, because inside linebackers, there's not a lot of time to make decisions. They have to react. So the instinctive part of being able to play that position we think is a natural act. There's things they can be taught. The lateral ability of those players is very important. The ability to not get -- to be able to cover and not get caught in situations where they can't cover just physically, that's important. What we remind ourselves really and will continue to remind ourselves is we'll have Devin Bush back this year, and that person that's going to be paired with him will have the advantage of having him there because he's still a significant player that was taking real positive steps prior to his injury, so we're excited about that, as well.

Draft night or the three days of the draft, how exclusive is the decision making from you two or Mr. Rooney, and if you go outside that exclusivity in terms of bringing in a coordinator or anyone else to get a little bit more advice on a guy that you might take? (Bo Marchionte, College2Pro)

Mike Tomlin: Mr. Rooney is the boss.

That's the final decision, though, between you guys? How does that process work? Just say player A comes up on the Thursday night, you guys are going to select. How is that process? (Bo Marchionte, College2Pro)

Mike Tomlin: Seriously, Kevin and I have worked so long and so well together that we can kind of communicate nonverbally in those moments. But at the end of the day, Art Rooney is the boss. Kevin Colbert: And to Coach's point, we always say this: Whenever we make a pick, it's a Pittsburgh Steelers pick. We just finished three weeks of intense meetings where scouts us, assistant coaches, coordinators, head coaches, GMs, we all had our chance to have our input. But when we put a grade on a player, it's not Coach's grade, it's not my grade, it's our grade. When we select that player, it will be done as what's best for the Pittsburgh Steelers. And of course Art will be involved because he is the owner and he knows every step of the process. He sits in on meetings when he can. He gives us input when he can and when he wants to. Of course we're going to follow those leads, but I think he trusts us, as well, to present the information that, again, we've spent not only the last 11 months but these last three weeks of really trying to tie it all together and formulate an evaluation and formulate a pick that's for the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Recognizing you have a right to change your mind in a week, who today is your left tackle and right cornerback? (Jim Wexell, 247 Sports)

Mike Tomlin: You know, depth charts this time of year are funny. They don't mean anything. They're not worth the paper they're written on. Chuks will be the guy that's probably penciled in in late April at left tackle, Cam Sutton will get first opportunity at right corner, but it means absolutely nothing. And quote me on that.

Mike, you used the phrase global challenges that have gone on during this draft process. Kevin, is one of those challenges the gathering of medical information on the prospective candidates, and how have you gone about circumventing those problems? And Mike, do you get more scared off potentially from a guy because it's not as easy to get the medical information perhaps? (Tim Benz, Tribune-Review)

Kevin Colbert: I'm glad you asked about the medical process. As I mentioned, John Norwig and his staff did a good job in doing this, but I forgot to mention Jeff Foster, who's the director of the National Invitational Combine. It was a tremendous amount of work. First off, we didn't know if we would have the combine in the format that it was presented this year. We wanted more. We weren't able to do it. Again, trying to follow the protocols and make it a safe adventure. So we did basically remote physicals for the entire 328 players. Beyond that, we were able to bring 100 to Indianapolis based on our ratings based upon how we all voted for those players as 32 teams. Then we went beyond that even further and we brought in 42 additional players to the combine that we felt were the next group that had some medical issues that needed to be looked at. We only got our hands on really roughly 142. I think they may have gotten to 150, where our doctors -- again, a smaller group of doctors were actually able to give them physicals. The remainder of it, it's all remote, and it was done in different parts of the country. We have our fingers crossed that we will have as good of information as we can, but it was a huge process for Jeff Foster and his folks at the National Invitational Combine to formulate. Again, our doctors, our trainers had to work within all those different restrictions and do the best we can, so our fingers are crossed that we will have the proper medical information.

Mike, do you feel any less confident in the process? (Tim Benz, Tribune-Review)

Mike Tomlin: You know, much like in the coaching ranks, and we had to use our relationships to gather information and have a certain level of trust in those relationships, it's the same from a medical standpoint. Our training staff and medical professionals have relationships around the country and had to lean on those relationships like I'm sure medical professionals in other organizations did, and we trust them. We trust them. We trust their expertise. We trust their relationships and the people that they trust. I think that's one of the things that the circumstances force you to do is rely on the expertise and the connections and the relationship of those around you. It's just a component of dealing with what we've continued to deal with throughout this.

Najee Harris Zoom Conference Transcript

Q. Did you think the Steelers -- did you get a sense that they had you targeted all along and what's your reaction to coming here?

NAJEE HARRIS: I mean, of course you hear a lot of mixed rumors of everything that was going on with -- especially in the draft with the Steelers picking you. I'm sure there were other teams, but me personally, like even all the stuff that you see online, I did not -- no, I can't really say I expected that, though, especially being a running back. You expect a bunch of stuff, but for it to actually happen, I didn't really think that was going to happen.

Q. Steelers were last in the league in running last year. A lot of pressure being put on you probably to help that out. How much do you feel that you can help out right away?

NAJEE HARRIS: Yeah, I mean, I understand that there was -- that they did finish last in rushing last year, but I feel like through a lot of stuff, through practice and hard work, I feel like that can be changed. I don't feel no pressure at all to be honest with you. I've been put in a lot of situation with that type of stuff put on me, especially in college. NFL is different, of course, but I feel like it's nothing that I can't do in time for sure.

Q. One thing that Kevin Colbert mentioned that really impressed him and impressed Mike Tomlin in the draft process was the nine-hour drive that you made to pro day to watch your teammates working out even though you weren't able to do it or weren't participating. How did you decide to do that drive, and did they bring that up to you as something that impressed them and they liked seeing in you?

NAJEE HARRIS: Oh, I mean, I don't think they talked to me about that, but my decision to support my teammates was solely because throughout the four years I spent at Alabama, I've got a lot of memories with them, especially in the sport of football. You go through a lot of stuff with training day, so it makes the bond become bigger and bigger. My flight was canceled, so it was around 8:00 or 9:00 at night and I took it to myself, my agent was mad at me, but I took it to myself to say I really want to support my teammates and the juniors that's performed out here today because I know that people might not understand, but that type of support is big-time, and it can help you settle down all the nerves that you have if you look to the side and see your brothers are there. That was a no-brainer for me for sure.

Q. What traits do you think you have that best fit in the NFL? What are your best qualities?

NAJEE HARRIS: Yeah, I feel like now in today's game, some people say it's a passing league, so I've got to see, hey, Najee, can you be utilized in the passing game. I think I can line up out wide, I think I can line up in the slot. I think I'm a mismatch with the linebackers. I feel like if a DB or a corner is not sticking me there, then it's a mismatch on a linebacker.

So that's one thing. Running in between tackles I feel like is a big thing now in today's game. I feel like I can match all that because of my size. I'm 6'2", 230, but also it's because they added another game on, so now we're playing more games, so I feel like we need somebody to carry the load for sure, so I feel like I fit in perfectly.

Q. Where did you spend your draft night -

NAJEE HARRIS: I'm in Oakland right now. I'm in Oakland right now with all my people right now, so yeah, I'm in Oakland with a good friend of mine. That was Marcus. He just told me I'm going to be playing him twice a year. That's what he told me all draft day to be honest. He knew before me. He said, I'm going to be playing you twice a year.

Q. Why was it special for you to be here?

NAJEE HARRIS: Because this is where I'm from. I'm not from Oakland, but I'm from the Bay Area. I've been raised all across the Bay Area. Draft day only a certain amount of people could be there, and I have a lot of people that helped me out and helped me get where I'm at, so I wanted to make sure all of them could enjoy the special moment with me. I made sure I could bring as much people as possible during COVID and with the pandemic still around. So I tried to be safe, but me being around my family is for sure a big reason why I wanted to spend it with them.

Q. I'm going to ask you a two-parter. Can you help us out and tell us what's Marcus's last name? We're trying to figure out who Marcus is.

NAJEE HARRIS: That's Marcus Peters.

Q. And then the second question I have for you is that we have seen that your family went through a little bit of a tough time when you were younger, and today you had this party at a shelter that you were actually at.

NAJEE HARRIS: How did you guys see that? That's crazy.

Q. Put in perspective what it means -- you are a first-round NFL pick who is supposed to save the run game for one of the trademark franchises in the NFL?

NAJEE HARRIS: That's why I mesh with the Steelers a lot, because that's a run team; that's why I like them.

But for me to give back to the community, though, before I went to the draft day party I was at the homeless shelter and then I was -- literally I came here actually late, but I wanted to make sure that I could give back to the community and show them if y'all still need anything, like I'm never too big or too whatever to help you guys out. I'm always going to be the helping hand.

I wanted to make sure that happened, so I had a party over there, passing out food and pizza. I feel like they didn't think that was serious enough, which they did, but in my mindset I didn't think so, so I said I'm going to pull up and actually show them I'm really here if you guys need anything. I know I'm getting drafted today, but if you guys need anything, I'm literally right here. I've got my marketing team, my agency is out here, and since I'll be in Pittsburgh they'll be back here. If they need any support they can reach out to them if I'm busy and eventually it'll get back to me.

That was important. Us as a family, we went through a lot of stuff. That was actually one of the places I stayed at, in the homeless shelter. I just want to make sure they know that if they need a helping hand I'm always here.

Q. It seems like you're pretty up on things with the current state of the Steelers, but how familiar are you with their running back history here in Pittsburgh, especially since they've already had a running back named Harris who's in the Hall of Fame?

NAJEE HARRIS: Franco Harris, they had Jerome, obviously Le'Veon, had James recently. But I mean, yeah, one thing about the Steelers is recent history has always evolved around the run game.

I always thought it would be a perfect fit to be there, but like I say, with a running back everything bounces around, what's going to happen. I know a little bit about it because I am a football junkie, but I'm always open to learn more.

Q. One of the things that Kevin Colbert talked about was your decision to go back to Alabama and said that that impressed him. What kind of went into that decision for you, and was there any point during this time period that maybe you thought it wasn't going to work out so well? And do you feel like in the end that was a fruitful decision for you?

NAJEE HARRIS: Well, the decision was for me mainly because when I went to go on -- when I look at tape and film I want to be satisfied with myself. My junior year I was not satisfied with myself. There was a lot of things I felt like I needed to improve on and work on, me personally.

A lot of people were saying was it a hard decision. No, it wasn't. It was a no-brainer to be honest with you. I didn't really care about what other running backs in the draft class, it was was I happy with what I put on film that year, and no, I was not. I couldn't say I was, so I wanted to go back and improve on all those things that I felt like I needed to work on.

I think I showed that I'm a three-down back and stuff like that, but I guess the stereotype, any big back can be a three-down back, blah-blah, so I wanted to make sure is that question answered, and I feel like this year I answered a lot of those questions. There's still a lot of stuff I need to work on, but I was more satisfied with what I put on film for sure, though.

Q. In your first response to the first question, you said, as a running back in the first round you never know. For you, for Travis Etienne, for Javonte Williams, good players at that position, was this sort of a frustrating process to keep hearing that over and over again; you're good players but, hey, the running back has been devalued. Do you carry that as a chip on your shoulder?

NAJEE HARRIS: Yeah, it was extremely frustrating, especially having this draft party and inviting everybody out and not knowing what's going to happen. But yeah, I don't like it. I don't agree on it, but I'm not making the decisions.

But running backs are devalued. I personally -- therefore I can give numerous reasons why we shouldn't be devalued, but just knowing that, hey, you're better than all these guys, it's just that you play running back, so we don't know what's going to happen, when they're going to start drafting running backs. Just to finally see it happen, I'm blessed.

Q. Obviously a lot of people can tell what your skills are and know your talent on the field, but when it comes to off the field, how would you describe yourself off the field? What traits do you possess that would make Pittsburgh fall in love with you off the field?

NAJEE HARRIS: Oh, man, shoot. I'm me, though. I guess I'm a very giving person. I do a lot of stuff in the community. One thing that I went to Alabama from the West Coast, and one thing I was doing was seeing how was the poverty rate and was there things I could do in that situation. In Pittsburgh I have never lived there, I've never been over there before. All I know is about the football. I'm always hoping to learn new things. I want to see what ways I can help in the community and ways and stuff like that, having food banks, just doing stuff in the area where I can just help out people off-the-field wise stuff, too. Just really stuff like that, giving back to the community.

Q. Going back to the question on guys like Jerome Bettis, I know you're probably right on the cusp, but did you get to watch any Jerome Bettis growing up?

NAJEE HARRIS: Hell yeah. What you talking about? Hell yeah. At Notre Dame, too.

Q. You will get an opportunity to play with a future Hall-of-Famer for at least one season in Big Ben. What does that mean to you?

NAJEE HARRIS: Oh, man, that's dope as hell. It's dope, though, because shoot, I mean, people didn't realize it, but I only followed two teams and that was the Steelers and the Niners and that's because I actually liked those teams. But actually seeing Big Ben, all the Super Bowls he came into and actually seeing him perform at a high level and stuff like that and actually being able to line up with him, on the side of him and learn from him, I mean, that's an honor right there to have.

I'm excited to meet them, really the staff, everybody. But Ben, of course I'm excited to meet him, too.

Q. We talk a lot about receivers at Alabama going to the NFL, but actually you'll be the seventh active running back in the NFL from Alabama. How does it feel to officially be a part of that fraternity, and what does that say about just the powerhouse offense that you came from?

NAJEE HARRIS: Well, yeah, I was considered -- I know I'm labeled a running back, but I'm considered a receiver my damn self to be honest with you. But me playing with all those guys and actually learning and having all three of those offensive coordinators and now I'm going to be able to be in the NFL like you said and there's now seven active running backs, it just shows you really how dominant Coach Saban can be, but really just how focused we are at Alabama at achieving what we want to do. I mean, nothing ever changes. When I go to the league I'm going to work hard just the same as I worked hard at Alabama. I mean, I'm considered a receiver by them to be honest with you.

What's your first impressions of Pittsburgh and have you met any of your teammates yet? (Jeff Hathhorn, 93.7 the Fan)

They picked me up and went through the tunnel, and they told me to look out the window and I saw Heinz Field and where the Pirates' field is at too. It was dope. It was actually really nice. I've never been here before ever in my life, so to see a new scene is always nice. I did talk to [Isaiah] Buggs through social media and Minkah [Fitzpatrick] a little bit, but I'm looking forward to seeing more of the city today and tomorrow.

How much have you gotten to know about Matt Canada and his offense through the Pre-Draft process and how you think you might best fit into it? (Tim Benz, Tribune-Review) I don't really know too much about it other than what I've seen on TV when I was watching just as a fan and seeing how he utilizes his running backs, especially during the time Le'Veon [Bell] was here. Just how he uses them in the passing game, how in the running game. Just how he uses them as a three-down back, and I liked how he was lined up wide. I feel like I can do all of that stuff, if not better. I'm excited to learn more.

How did you get to know Marcus Peters and how much was he talking last night about seeing you twice a year and the Steelers-Ravens rivalry? (Brooke Pryor, ESPN)
I know a lot of the Bay area players. The Bay area is big, but it's small at the same time.
Everybody knows each other. I'm very cool with him and Marshawn Lynch. I'm actually signed with his marketing agency team. We're more as just a family in a way. They knew me since I was a kid when I stayed in Oakland. Marcus [Peters] knew my family, and Marshawn, I knew him all the way through high school. But throughout the draft, he was just saying, "it's alright, you're going to be alright, you're going to go to the Steelers and I'm going to play you twice a year." All of that stuff. He was just saying brotherly talk, just talking to me how he was going to have his other 10 players come up and hit me because he's not. But we're all cool though, they're my big brothers.

How did your hardships during childhood shape you as a person? (Ray Fittipaldo, Pittsburgh Post-Gazette)

It helped shape me in a lot of ways. I feel like somebody isn't tempered or pressured in a way if he doesn't go through something hard in their life. I've been through a lot of stuff in my life that was difficult that I had to overcome. A lot of obstacles, for the better do good. I guess it helped me in a way with football because in football you're going to go through a lot of adversity. I went through a lot of adversity when I was a kid, but just being able to overcome it shows you how much strength that you have to overcome things, and it shows you that if you can get through those things in life, there's nothing you can't get through. Like I said, in football, you're going to have a lot of obstacles that you're going to have to overcome, especially now being in the NFL. There's a lot more talent. There's a lot more details that you've got to focus on as a player. Me being raised and overcoming all of those things really helped out a lot and now that I'm playing football. It really helped me get through a lot of stuff.

How excited are you to be on your own and be a young professional for the first time out of the college environment? (Alan Saunders, Pittsburgh Sports Now)

Like I said, I've had to overcome a lot of things when I was young. At the same time, I had to grow up fast too. So me living far from home isn't really an issue. I did get homesick, I can't lie. It's just part of growing up and you're experiencing new things, and you're stepping into a more mature part of your life. That's what I did at Alabama. I knew that if I wanted to make it to the next level, there's a chance I'm not going to be playing back home, so I may as well just get used to traveling different places and get out of my comfort zone. I went to Alabama, spent four years there. It was a different environment, different group of people, especially coming from the west coast. Everything was a completely different culture change. So really coming to Pittsburgh, it's not something I haven't been through in a way because, like I said, I've been from California all the way to Alabama and now I'm in Pittsburgh. The only thing that's different is the time zone. That's it.

Can you talk about your work out videos and one that you were working on your mile per hour? (Jim Wexell, 247 Sports)

The one that was on my YouTube channel that I posted, that I made, I think that was in Houston, Texas. I can't really remember, I think it was in Houston, though. It was just a speed thing. It's a treadmill that tricks your mind into running at a faster miles per hour that you are not used to doing. You go on there and you just run on there and try to hold it however long you can and just do a couple sets of that.

How did Antioch high school help shape you and help you along the way in developing into the kind of person you have become? (Tom Reed, DK Pittsburgh Sports)

It wasn't Antioch. It was the whole bay area. I stayed everywhere in the bay area from San Francisco to Oakland to El Sobrante, Richmond, Antioch, everywhere. It was a whole community and all the neighborhoods that I lived in that helped shape me to who I am today. My parents, of course, too. My mom, to be specific. My mom really helped me out and shaped me to who I am today. Antioch, of course, helped me out a lot, and the coaches there helped me get back up on my feet when I was in certain situations at home that wasn't always good. They helped me to do things like that. For the most part, it was the whole of Northern California and family that helped me become who I am today. It takes a village to raise a child and I believe in that.

What do you think of the responsibility to turn around the Steelers run game and the Steelers investing in you in the first round of the draft? (Aditi Kinkhabwala, NFL Network) Well, I agree with them. I honestly don't think running back should be devalued. I never did believe in that at all. I guess that is just what the media is saying. I'm glad that they think the same way as me now, too. Obviously, the run game was something that wasn't so good last year, but us as a team and now that I'm here, we are try and find ways to work on that and make it be better. I'm just glad that I am here and I'm a Steelers.



Head Coach Mike Tomlin and General Manager Kevin Colbert

Opening Statement:

Kevin Colbert: Very excited to announce the selection of Najee Harris with the 24th pick of the first round. Najee is as complete a back as we could hope to get at any point in the draft and it was very exciting for him to be available for us. Najee has the size, he has the speed, he has the athleticism. He has the run skills to run inside and outside. Also, he can also play in the passing game as a receiver as a blocker. He's a three-down NFL back. He played in an NFL system and really his one hidden trait is he finds invisible yards at that second level. There's times where you think he should just be going down and all of a sudden he finds six, seven, eight yards. It's just really exciting to get what we think is a three-down back and add him to the team. Coach?

Mike Tomlin: I share Kevin's sentiments. Not a lot to add. I think a significant component that hadn't been mentioned, though, is his professional level of conditioning. He's a guy that comes to us with a professional level of conditioning along with his pedigree. I think that could be a catalyst for him to be an immediate component to our offense and to our team. A lot to be excited about tonight.

Kevin, was he identified by you guys almost immediately as the guy you wanted if you got to that 24th pick?

Kevin Colbert: Again, we were very excited that he was there for us. When we went through our scenarios, it was an easy decision by us to say, if Najee Harris is available, we will pick him. He's an exciting player, and like we said, he's a three-dimensional running back coming from a professional offensive system. He's made NFL runs his whole career, and it was easy to identify him quite honestly. I got to see him live myself this year. We had six live looks at him during the course of the season between myself and the scouts, and every time we talked about him, we were excited that again, this caliber of player would be available to us.

Did you guys get to talk to him at all at the pro days that Alabama had, and did you gain anything from that experience there?

Mike Tomlin: We had several opportunities to visit with him but not at the pro day. Kevin and the scouting department had an opportunity to visit with him in Mobile. I had an opportunity to participate in that remotely. And then we had another Zoom opportunity later in the process, and we were really comfortable with getting an opportunity to get to know him under those circumstances.

Kevin Colbert: In addition to that, at the pro days this year we weren't able to talk to players in one-on-one type interviews because of the COVID protocols that we had to follow. But in Najee's -- Najee did a really cool kind of thing because he was flying back for the pro day that he was not going to participate in because he was still coming off of an ankle injury that he had worked his way through during the season. His flight got delayed in Dallas and he decided to drive and be available and just watch his teammates at their pro day, and that really struck a chord with Coach and I. Again, we couldn't interact with him, but to watch him interact with his teammates while they were going through their pro days was truly special, and we had a few folks go back down for the second pro day when he did do some work.

From what you saw of him, what do you feel makes him a No. 1 feature back?

Mike Tomlin: You know, he's got a nice combination of size, strength and athleticism. His picking vision is excellent in terms of finding holes. He shows patience while doing that. He's a complete back. He's very good in the passing game, whether it's routes out of the backfield or aligning outside the backfield. There's not a lot of holes in his overall game, and I think those are the things that made him an attractive selection as you mentioned.

You mentioned that it was an easy decision playing out the scenarios if Najee was available, he was a guy you were going to take. Does the depth of the offensive line class, particularly looking at the offensive tackles, make that an easier decision knowing you can still get some good value on the line in day two and some of those later picks?

Kevin Colbert: Coach and I were talking on the way down, to be able to get a player like that at that pick without having to trade up was exciting because now we still have -- we have seven picks left, and there's a lot of good players left at a lot of positions. We'll redo some things and take a look at what we're looking at tomorrow, but we're excited about the depth that's left.

How tight was it or what separated Harris from Travis Etienne?

Kevin Colbert: Well, we're never going to comment on the player other than the one we took, and again, complete back in our opinion. There's nothing really to add to it. It was a pick that we were excited to make. We'll never talk about other players. There are several other players at different positions, at the same position, and hopefully they have great NFL careers, as well, but we're happy, ecstatic actually, about getting Najee.

In your pre-draft conference, you said that most Hall of Fame running backs come in the first round. Do you see that in Najee? Did you see that when you evaluated him?

Kevin Colbert: Didn't quite get him a gold jacket yet, but I said that in reference to the popular kind of thinking that running backs are devalued because of the offensive schematics that are going on in our game and in the -- at the college level. I've been fortunate to have been around two Hall of Fame runners in Jerome Bettis and Barry Sanders, and I don't think you can ever devalue greatness at the running back position. Is Najee going to be a great player? We hope so. But we selected Najee because we think he's an NFL player that's going to help us win.

You talked about on Monday really the thing that you look for on draft day is whether you are going to trade up or trade back, you're not really messing with the board there. Was there any temptation given the way things were falling to do either of those things tonight? Kevin Colbert: No, we'll identify -- this year we identified eight players that if they were available to us we would take them and not consider a trade, and Najee was one of those players. So again, ecstatic that he was there for us at 24.

Following up on Kevin's comments about that theory that you wait on a running back, is that at all a theory that the team subscribes to, or is Najee just so special that he supersedes that?

Mike Tomlin: You know, we don't subscribe to the theory that you mentioned, as Kevin so obviously stated. He was a player that we really valued. We were ecstatic that he was there, and we took him and we took him pretty quickly with little to no dialogue. We're extremely happy with where we are this evening.

Obviously what Harris is able to do on the field is completely evident, but what impressed you guys the most about his off the field abilities, his character, things along those lines? Kevin Colbert: You know, Najee decided to stay in school and go back for his senior year, which is going against the trend in college football right now. He did that, and he won a National Championship. Obviously, Alabama had a lot of great players, him being the sixth one taken in the first round, but he was a huge part of that. I think obviously that was done because he had ability, but he also made the decision that he was going back to try to win a championship, which they did. We'll get to know him more. Again, we didn't get to interact with the players like we like to, but we were comfortable in the three interactions that we did have with him, albeit the third one just watching him work with his teammates. He's a West Coast young man, and he went to school in the southeast, and he's going to play football in the north. We're excited. I think he's excited, and can't wait to see him get here.

This is sort of a unique draft year with the information and everything, with the combine and all that. From your perspective was there maybe more activity or less activity in terms of calls, teams trying to move up or down or anything from what you guys could tell?

Mike Tomlin: Not in our draft room. Not out of the ordinary in terms of the volume of calls.

For either one of you, how do you weigh with a running back like Najee the workload that he had in college? Is that always a pro in terms of he can handle that many carries, or do you have to balance that with just he's been used a lot already?

Kevin Colbert: He has, and I think that's to his credit. Sometimes you look at that and say, well, the wear and tear, he's already got this many carries, but I always look at it the other way. He was a durable player, again, in an NFL-type running offense in what is one of the toughest leagues in college football. I view it as a positive because he was very durable for Alabama.

You guys have new coaches on the offensive line, new coordinator, new lineman in Najee now. Is that good enough in your eyes to turn around the running game, or do you need to do more?

Mike Tomlin: You know, it's our intentions to turn around the run game. Whether or not our work is complete as we sit here tonight in that regard or not, whether it's the acquisition of players, the development of schematics, the finding of cohesion within our staff, all of that is irrelevant in terms of completeness tonight. Our intentions are to improve our running game.

Pat Freiermuth Zoom Conference Transcript

Did you have any sense that it could be the Steelers? (Jeff Hathhorn, 93.7 the Fan)

Yeah, I'm really excited. Obviously since Pro Day, Coach Alfredo [Roberts] and Coach [Mike] Tomlin and Coach [Matt] Canada were there. I hit it off with them since day one. I kind of felt like if I was there at 55 that they might draft me. When I say that Pittsburgh area code, I thought it was one of my friends from Penn State pranking me, but I answered the phone and it was coach Tomlin. It was one of the best feelings I've ever had. Playing for an organization such storied as the Steelers, especially having Franco Harris announce my pick. He's a legend from Penn State and the Steelers, and that was just another honor. I'm just very excited to be a part of this organization.

How is your shoulder? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette)

My shoulder's fully healthy. I got cleared a few weeks ago to do everything. Full contact, everything like that. I think I got the surgery at the right time which allowed me to be fully healthy before my NFL career and rookie minicamp so I can go through that whole process and get my whole routine. I'm fully healthy. I'm ready to go and I'm excited to get into that offense and make some plays.

What do you think your biggest attribute you bring to the Steelers? (Joe Rutter, Tribune-Review)

It fits me well. I'm a versatile tight end. I'll go in there and stick my face in there and block defensive ends, and I'll go out there and make some plays in the passing game. So, whatever I'm asked to do, I'm going to do it. I've always been a team-first guy, and I think I kind of showed that at Penn State with the guys trusting me and everything like that. I'm always going to put the team first. If Coach Canada is telling me to go in there and block the whole game, I'm going to do it to the best of my ability. That's kind of the guy I am and that's the kind of guy I'm continuing to be.

How much have you thought about working with Ben Roethlisberger? (Chris Carter, DK Pittsburgh Sports)

Yeah, that was just kind of weird you saying "Ben Roethlisberger" because, me growing up obviously seeing him play and watching him ball out, that's kind of weird he's going to be my quarterback now. I can't wait and I'm going to go out there and catch footballs from him, and I'm going to make plays for him. It's going to be an unreal experience, just be in that offense with him.

How did the Steelers say they envisioned you in their offense? (Brooke Pryor, ESPN) I see myself as just going out there and doing whatever is asked of me. I think that's what they liked about me the most is me throughout the process I was willing to do anything. I made that quite evident. Like I said, if they tell me to go in there and block the whole game, I'm going to do that. I think they're going to move me around the offense a lot and make mismatches, but when they ask me to go in there and block, I'm going to do it. I'm excited to be a part of that offense.

What went into your decision to play last season and did you ever regret it after your injury? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review)

First of all, I wanted to play this season because I love Penn State. I love that whole community. I love everything that they've done for me. I've said this multiple times that I owe that university more than it owes me. So, every chance that I can go out there and put a Penn State jersey on, I was going to do it. I never thought of opting out. When the season got canceled, I was like, what's my next step? But I was waiting for them to put it back on. So, when they did, I was excited about that. I have no regrets about going out there and playing the season and getting hurt. You never want to get hurt, but that's the first major injury I've ever had, hopefully the last one, and I learned a lot from that adversity wise. So, I'll take those lessons and I cherish them. I have no regrets.

What do you think you can learn from Eric Ebron this season? (Noah Strackbein, Sports Illustrated)

I'm excited to learn from Eric Ebron. Obviously, he's a vet. He's established himself in the NFL a long time. I'm excited to go out there and just pick his brain and learn from him. I think that's what made me successful at Penn State was picking those older guys' brains. So, I can't wait to see what his routine is and see his process and learn from him and have him be a mentor for me. I can't wait to be in that room and, like I said, learn from him. I can't wait to be a part of this organization.

Were you surprised that you lasted until 55? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette)

No, I'm just excited to be a Pittsburgh Steeler. I don't really care what happened before the draft and this process, but like I said, I'm excited where I'm at. I'm excited the Steelers gave me an opportunity, and I can promise you and the rest of Steelers' nation that I'm going to make the most of it. They're going to get a guy that comes in every single day and works his tail off. So, I'm excited for the opportunity. This is meant to be.

What was the moment like when you got the call with your family? (Mac Cerullo, Daily News of Newburyport)

It meant a lot for me because they were there from the start. They saw something in me that maybe when I didn't see it, they kept pushing me to be great. I owe the world to my mom and my dad, my brother, my sister, and everyone else that was here tonight. They've been there from the start. I'm excited to continue my next chapter in Pittsburgh and have them watch there every step of the way.

How would you say you are a different person after your three seasons at Penn State? (Alan Saunders, Pittsburgh Sports Now)

I played my last year, it was only four games, but my freshman year I went in there and my role was to block in the beginning of the season. They allowed me to make plays in the red zone in zone coverage and stuff. Then in my sophomore year, I went out there and was the man answer. I think that this past year, my junior year, I was putting it all together. I showed that I can block with the best of d-ends and pass pro and go out there and make plays against man and zone. I try to piece it together my whole career, so I'm going to try to do that and take make complete game to the Steelers and continue to add onto that.



Alfredo Roberts on TE Pat Freiermuth:

You all know, we took Pat Freiermuth from Penn State. He is exciting to me. I am excited to work with him. Had a chance to work with him at his Pro Day. The energy he exudes, he is a serious but fun guy. He has some position flexibility. He will be kind of a throwback tight end because he can play the position and do some multiple things. You can flex him out. His positional flexibility is going to give us a chance to do a lot of different things and a lot of different sets with the guys that are already here.

How specifically does Pat Freiermuth compliment Eric Ebron and the other tight ends you have? (Brooke Pryor, ESPN)

He can do some of the heavy lifting when we talk about getting in line and doing some things. He can also work from the backfield because he can bend well and move well in space. We can flex him out if need be. In big packages, he can do a number of different things. I just like what he adds right now and what he is going to grow into in the future.

How is he as a blocker? (Tim Benz, Tribune-Review)

I think all guys, even the guys who I've worked with in the League for a while, still have some technique things they want to work on and work through. As he grows, he will be more efficient. Some of the things we are going to ask him to do, we are going to work at. I think he has some natural knee bending, some pad level that he does easily now. You just kind of situate those things that he does well and things that he needs to come on, we will find a way to get those things better.

What do you think of his ability to get down field? (Jeff Hathhorn, 93.7 the Fan)

I think his ability to get down field is better than average. He has shown that in his college tape or in his early years. The things that we are going to ask him to do, he will have an opportunity to get vertical. He will have an opportunity to have a route tree. He really catches the ball with ease, and he does some things nice after the catch. I think he has a lot of potential and upside.

Do you see Pat Freiermuth who could replace Vance McDonald's snaps? (Noah Strackbein, Sports Illustrated)

Unfortunately, I wasn't fortunate enough to work with Vance [McDonald] last year. I think they are different. Vance did a nice job in the area he played. I think he offered a little bit different. I think he will have an opportunity to do some of those things that Vance did in line. I think he will have an opportunity to do something out in space.

Is there anyone who you have worked with that Pat Freiermuth reminds you of? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette)

Similar to Hunter [Henry], the young man who is now at the Patriots. I think he is a little bit different because he is built a little bit different. He will be a little bit different than anybody I've worked with in the sense of his build. It will be a fun—not even a project, because he is a lot more accomplished than a project.

Can you talk about the excitement of having two athletic tight ends you have now? (Chris Carter, DK Pittsburgh Sports)

It's just so many things we can actually do. Having some experience in Indianapolis with Coby Fleener and Dwayne Allen, I think it kind of fits like that for me with having guys being able to take

advantage of defenses because we can run the football with those guys and you can spread them out in space and throw the football with those guys, and then you add Ben Roethlisberger with his accuracy and the things he's done in this league. It's going to be a fun for coach Canada to put some things together.

Do you anticipate 12 personnel is something you guys are going to use and do him and Ebron give you two nice pieces you can use out of that formation? (Alan Saunders, Pittsburgh Sports Now)

Well selfishly, I like to have 13 personnel, but the receiver group here is so talented, we're going to be fighting for playing time. It's going to be fun to have those meetings to game plan. We have some targets that we drafted, fantastic runner and the guys already on this roster. It's just going to be fun to game plan and get ready each week.

How would you describe your overall philosophy or how you work with the tight ends? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review)

My philosophy is to have those guys make their plays in the passing game and in the run game. Always be a part of the team structure. Always find a way to make things better. Be problem solvers. Just to grow. Believe in the process, and try to win as many games as we possibly can.

Do the Steelers want you to play at center not guard? (Joe Rutter/Trib)

Yeah, I'm open to playing both, but was definitely talking with Coach [Adrian] Klemm and Coach [Mike] Tomlin about the center position.

What was the reasoning for your move from defense to offense earlier in your career? (Mark Kaboly/The Athletic)

I was awful at defense, first of all let's say that. But also, coach Levi Smith saw that there was a need on the team for depth purposes as well and he knew I could do it. So that's kind of what we did.

Are you comfortable coming into the NFL and replacing Maurkice Pouncey at that position? (Gerry Dulac/Post-Gazette)

Absolutely. Great player obviously, probably a Hall of Famer in my opinion if you ask me, but definitely just looking forward to stepping in and trying to contribute as soon as possible.

What was talking with some of your teammates like so far? (Chris Carter/DK)

Zach [Banner] told me just to enjoy the moment and not do anything stupid obviously, but I think it's going to be a warm welcoming from everybody in Pittsburgh.

Did you watch Maurkice Pouncey much and what did you learn from him? (Tim Benz/Trib) Pouncey seemed like a really witty player. Obviously high football IQ, he knows what he's doing. He played that position for a very long time. Also seemed really gritty, but just a good teammate as well.

Did you talk to the Steelers about playing in a zone scheme in Illinois and what about your game translates to the NFL? (Alan Saunders/Pittsburgh Sports Now)

I feel like I'm a really athletic offensive lineman. I feel like I'm the most athletic offensive lineman in this year's class. I play with a mean streak. I'm looking to play physical and finish guys. So I think that's something that will translate over well. But yeah, at Illinois we did run a lot of zone.

How do you feel like you're a culture fit with the Steelers? (Brooke Pryor//ESPN)

I think hopefully I kind of fit right in. Just looking to come in, be a sponge, soak up whatever from the older guys, and I just want to be a workhorse and be ready to get to work.

Who all was there when you got the call and how are you celebrating? (Brian Batko/Post-Gazette)

Some family, close friends, my fraternity brothers were here as well, but it was a great moment. Got the call, everybody was excited for me. It was a great time.

How does it feel to come into an offensive line that's kind of regrouping and what are your expectations for yourself? (Noah Strackbein/Sports Illustrated)

I think it's not something I haven't done before. Honestly, I think we'll be fine. I just want to come in and be a sponge like I said and learn as much as possible as fast as possible.

Adrian Klemm on Kendrick Green:

Just really excited about KG [Kendrick Green]. That's a guy we had our eye on. We love the way that he plays in terms of what we have been talking about and in terms of changing our demeanor. Just the type of attitude that we want to carry onto the field, he embodies all of that. He has great leadership qualities. He was an alpha in that program, and he is just a tremendous player. He can do it all. The pulls, physical in the run game, pass protect, all those different things. I'm just really ecstatic to coach him going forward.

Is a mean streak something that can be taught, or do you have to be born with it? (Mark Kaboly, The Athletic)

I think people like to say they can teach it, but I think it is inherently in you. Like some people just naturally have that—as a coach you can be demanding of it, but in critical moments of a game when man measures man, whoever you truly are is going to come out. If you have that dog in you, that wolf in you, you are going to continue to do that in critical moments of the game. I love it when I find a guy that I don't have to bring that out of. He's just naturally like that, he carries himself that way, he plays with that nastiness at that position. This is just a guy that can do that. We have a number of guys in our group that can do that. Even if they can't do it, we are going to demand all they have and more and try to get all that we can out of it. I'm really excited about it and in terms of what we're talking about doing here embodies all of that.

Are you eying Kendrick Green as a center and why is that nastiness important to you? (Gerry Dulac, Post-Gazette)

It just sets the tone, especially at that position. It's the belly of the beast. He comes out and he's playing with that type of demeanor, that carries throughout the group. If we play collectively like that, it is contagious on the team. It starts with that guy, and that's been the case here whether it's [Maurkice] Pouncey, Dermontti Dawson, Mike Webster, whatever the case. I'm not comparing him to those guys, but just in terms of that's the leader of your group. And you would like him to be the leader of your side of the ball. I think it starts with him, and if you have that, I think it's contagious and it carries over to the side of ball as a whole.

And you are looking at him at center? (Gerry Dulac, Post-Gazette)

We are looking at him at center, but he is more than capable of playing all three positions equally well. I'm just excited about his position flexibility and all that he can do.

How do you handle expectations if he fills in for a guy who might be a Hall of Famer? (Jeff Hathhorn. 93.7 the Fan)

Well, first of all, Pouncey is a definite Hall of Famer, but I'm not comparing him to him. There is a standard here long before I came here with the expectation of our offensive line. He needs to not only maintain that but elevate that. He is coming in and competing with some other guys who are trying to do the same thing. Hopefully, iron sharpens iron, and everybody gets better from it.

What makes you confident he can make that transition from guard to center? (Brooke Pryor, ESPN)

Well, he played center, but he played at a high level. You are talking about a guy who took snaps in practice, but didn't play a number of games there. There were two games that he played in, I think it was his bowl game and one this year where he didn't even know he was going to play (center) in the game. But he was ready for it. He was making calls from the guard position. I think at one point he played next to a tight end. They ran through a number of linemen. They had three or four quarterbacks playing throughout the year. Just to operate under those kinds of circumstances and still play at a high level, it was just really impressive. And from a mental standpoint, I had the opportunity to go out for his pro day and work him out myself, feel his power, see the suddenness up close and personal. His ability to retain and just what he knows and his understanding for offensive line play as a whole was tremendous. He was very impressive.

Do you think he can play more than zone at the next level? How do you expect this line to play in general with the returning guys? (Alan Saunders, Pittsburgh Sports Now)

I'm not going to get into the other guys too much. This is his day. We're here talking about him and excited about him. When the coaches are made available at camp, I will let Matt Canada lead the way on that and I will follow up on it, but today is his day. We are just really excited for him and want to focus on that.

What leadership qualities did you see from him? (Chris Carter, DK Pittsburgh Sports)

It's not just the things that I've heard from the coaches, I've talked to his coach and people around his program, but also the place he trains now I know the guy he works out for. And just talking to other guys he has played with in the past and just see him interact with people at his pro day and how people follow him. He had a commanding presence. When he walked in a room, he didn't need to say much, he just came in and changed the energy in the room. Just talking to him. Some people are a little bit timid. He wasn't. He just really embraced the moment. He was energized by the moment. There was no nervousness or anything like that. It goes beyond just the play. It's just the way a man carries himself when he walks in a room and he just has that. He walks and he commands respect. It's pretty impressive, I like it.

Did you get a lot of zoom calls with him and is there anything he said that stood out to you? (Joe Rutter, Tribune-Review)

There wasn't anything in particular, just a combination of everything all together. He's a special kid all the way around. Just a lot of things stood out immediately when we first met him and then some things on film obviously stood out, verified in person. Just walking away felt really good about him. Just kind of crossing our fingers that we'd get him, and we did, so really happy about that. Very excited.

What makes him such a good run blocker? (Noah Strackbein, Sports Illustrated)

His ability to redirect. He is so athletic. He has great balance. You know, some people could say that maybe he's too aggressive at times, but I'd rather be that than have to beg him to be aggressive. He just runs off the ball like I said before, he's not timid at all and he throws his hands. He can redirect. He's got feet with a good center of gravity. His change of direction is excellent, and he just finishes plays with a nasty demeanor and imposes his will every play.

Is he a project for you guys or is he polished enough that he can compete for a starting role? (Tim Benz, Tribune-Review)

I don't think anybody's really polished. Everybody needs to get better as they progress. Even guys that are at this level already. Some people look at it as a negative, but I look at it as a positive because he's been able to play guard and center, in some cases in the same game, I think his understanding for o-line play is as a whole is further ahead than most other guys playing one position their whole career.

How was he able to excel at just under 6'2" and what gives you confidence that he can hold up at the next level? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette)

He's just explosive. He's different in that way. There's a lot of guys that are pushers and shovers. This guy's a puncher. He can roll his hips. He can bend. He gets under defenders. He gets in defenders quick. Anything that someone may think is a disadvantage for him, I don't see it being that way. I think his explosiveness and all those different attributes that he has are different. Things that can't be timed. Those things can be beneficial and that separates him from his opponents that he's going up against with a size advantage.


What can he do to be better at pass protection? Do you see that? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review)

What have the Steelers said to you regarding where they want to play you? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette)

Honestly, I haven't really talked much to them about where I'll be playing. So I'm just anxious and kind of as clueless as you are, but I know they drafted me for a reason. So whatever it is, I'm ready to take it on.

Did you have any idea that the Steelers were interested in you? (Noah Strackbein, Sports Illustrated)

Yeah, I talked to the at the Senior Bowl, just the way everything works with Covid going on. We met with all 32 teams and we were limited to 15-minute meetings, so obviously you're not going to be able to know really what team is set apart within every team getting a 15-minute wingspan to meet with you. But besides my agent letting me know when I first signed with him that they really had a lot of interest in me, I really didn't know anything much about them having interest in me other than that honestly.

Did you move from guard out to tackle and was it much of an adjustment? (Joe Rutter, Tribune-Review)

Yeah, I started at guard and I eventually moved to tackle my third game of the season, and it honestly wasn't a hard transition at all. I think it was within one practice, literally from guard to tackle. So just the coaching style we have at A&M, we kind of have that NFL mentality of next man up. So you've got to be ready to play every single position.

What does it mean to you to be a Pittsburgh Steeler and what do you know about the Steelers? (Jenna Harner, WPXI)

It means everything honestly. Growing up and watching them win the Super Bowl, playing in Super Bowls. Obviously, I know the history of the black and yellow, being a football fan myself. Knowing the tradition runs deep down there or shall I say up there with football. So I definitely know people there are very serious about the NFL teams that they have and I look forward to continuing that.

How would you describe your mentality playing football? (Jeff Hawthorne, 93.7)

I would describe my mentality as hard working. I think this game requires a lot of preparation, a lot of hard work, and I think regardless of the talent that you do have, I think you still have to work hard every day. You still have to prepare yourself obviously for those moments, and that's the mindset that I have.

What part of your game have you always been confident in, your ability to get guys off the ball and help your offense generate the run game? (Chris Carter, DK)

I think this year we showed that in this A&M offensive line that we love to run the ball. That's what we want to do. We want to run the ball. I mean, we get excited when our coach calls a run play, so I think that all should just tell you enough about the demeanor in which myself and my teammates had this past season.

Do you feel like you're prepared mentality more than some guys in this class because of how many reps you've gotten and playing high level opponents in the SEC? (Alan Saunders, Pittsburgh Sports Now)

Yeah, somebody actually told me maybe about a year or two ago when I first started at left tackle that the more you play, the better you're going to get. I think experience is definitely a pride and that's something that's helped me along the way. So I definitely believe that playing against SEC competition every week and also being a three-year starter, getting all of those game reps, I defiantly think it plays a part. Most definitely.

Do you feel like you have that nasty streak that the coaches are looking for? (Brooke Pryor, ESPN)

Yeah, I think it definitely is honestly. Like I said, I think I exhibited that this past season with us having a tremendous run game at A&M and moving guys out of the way, paving the way for running backs.

Do you prefer to have Jr. as part of your name? Do you go by Big Dan? Have you met Kendrick Green at all? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review)

Yes, I do like to go by Jr. Yes, you can say my nickname is Big Dan. And Kendrick Green, that's my guy. Literally texted him right before the pick went up and let him know we're about to be teammates. So I'm waiting to talk to him in a minute. We train together.

He's a very mature player. He's spent a long time starting in the SEC, competing at a high level. Just excited to get somebody in with position flexibility in terms of playing on the right and left. He's a guy that's focused primarily on the left, but he's capable of playing on the right, and that just adds depth without adding number. So just really excited this.

Was it the plan to get some of the guys you were looking for or is that just the way the draft broke? (Mark Kaboly, The Athletic)

In terms of what we're looking for in the room, these are exactly the type of guys we want. Guys with position flexibility that played at a high level, that have shown their ability through being healthy, and we've addressed those needs. Just really happy with the results right now.

How much was Dan having experience in blocking in zone schemes and being a run-first guy weigh in on who you guys liked to add to your room this year? (Chris Carter, DK Pittsburgh Sports)

It weighed in big time. I'm not going to sit here and act like that's hasn't been a concern here. We want to improve our run game and we want to get guys on our team that can thrive in what we're going to do schematically, and we believe that both of those guys can do those things so they can perform at a high level because we've seen them do it already.

Does he have a nastiness on the field? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review)

Yeah, I mean guys can be a certain way off the field and can turn it up on the field. This is a guy that is more than capable of being nasty, and playing physically, finishing, and all of those types of things. You hear some of the things Mel Kiper say talking about physicality, I mean, that guy has finished and pounded people in the dirt. You know, sometimes schematically what people are asked to do at the collegiate level or the NFL level, sometimes you can't do certain things because it's not within that scheme, but there's plays that we've seen him finish guys off and do the extra, and take guys to the sideline and all that. It's not flashes. He plays consistently at a high level with a high motor. I'm really excited about that. I'd like to talk about yesterday. It's always exciting when you don't have to beg a guy to do those things. He does that naturally.

Do you view this pick as a project down the road or how NFL ready is Dan? (Brooke Pryor, ESPN)

I don't view him as a project at all. We're throwing him right into the mix in terms of competing. We haven't decided if it's going to be right or left. He's capable of playing both sides, but it's a guy that's started over 30 games in the SEC. There's a lot of guys in that league that'll be in this league soon or they're in here now. So, I think he's more than ready to compete and accept the challenge that's ahead of him. So, we're not really concerned about that.

How are you going to work all of your lineman together and is DeCastro going to lead them to play physical football? (Jim Wexell, 247 sports)

We're trying to get a certain kid in here that has a certain mindset already, and there have been some young guys here that do have that mindset, and Dave came from that background. One of the things they do at Stanford is called they are building a bully. When Dave was playing there and a couple years after that, it was one of the most dominant run games in terms of offensive linemen going into the league and running backs and things like that. So, he has it in him, and he's shown that. He's been one of the most dominant players in the league when he's healthy, and those guys will follow his lead. It's not as much what he says vocally. If you go turn on the film and watch him, he inspires those young guys. I think him being around so many young guys going into the season is going to energize him. You can see it already with the times that he's come up here. He's excited about things and he's ready to go, and we're ready to roll.

Were you guys aware that Dan and Kendrick knew each other and trained together and how much does that help their transition into the league? (Noah Strackbein, Sports Illustrated)

I don't know how much it helps the transition. I number of us know they got their training with down there, and he does a really good job. We can check in and see what they're doing, but I'm not really too worried about checking on them. They just have a different mindset in terms of their work ethic and all of that. I think it prepares them to get ready for the season in terms of conditioning, but in terms of getting them ready for the season, it's getting here in the classroom, virtual meetings, and all those types of things. Just being around the guys. I think then we'll really be able to tell what they're made of.

Do you think there's a chance for him to play guard? (Jeff Hawthorne, 93.7 the Fan) He's shown that he can do that, but that's not where we have him penciled in right now. I can say that maybe he'll get a shot there, but the reality is he should be a tackle, and we'll just see how he progresses from there.

How much did you prioritize durability this year with no combine and not as much medical info on players? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette)

That wasn't a defining factor, but it was definitely something that was factored in. I mentioned that early on during my intro just that their level of availability throughout their collegiate careers were really impressive, and to be able to battle through some things and continue to play at a high level to a point that some of us didn't even know there were issues during the season until after because there was no drop in their play, and they fought through things. It's just something you should be commended for. A lot of guys don't do that, and going into this season, playing, and not opting out, just all those things talks to their level of commitment to their team and to their craft.

Was NFL readiness something you were looking for at the tackle position for if there was an injury this season? (Alan Saunders, Pittsburgh Sports Now)

You're just looking for guys that are athletic, can do things they are asked of, show some physicality that show a high level of competitive spirit, that can play with poise, and just want to compete. Those are things you are projecting. Maybe it's only a guy that's played 12 games, but anytime you have something like this with these guys with 30 plus game starters in big time conferences, that is a positive. It's not something you're necessarily looking for, but it is a definite positive that you take into account when you're evaluating these guys.

Do you consider yourself more of a run-stopping inside guy or dropping into coverage to stop the pass? (Gerry Dulac, Post-Gazette)

I feel like I can do whatever my coach asks me to do. If it's stopping the run, stopping the pass, I know that this league is changing. Linebackers have to be able to run and move. So, I look forward to being able to get out there and showcase my talents.

What's it like to have an A&M connection and what can you tell us about you two? (Jeff Hathhorne, 93.7)

It's an unbelievable feeling. If you look at the recent years, the Steelers have always picked some of the players from same teams that played together. So, for me to go play with Dan Moore, that's my guy. Najee from Alabama, we became close friends. For me to go out there and put on a show with them, that's huge. It's all about having guys that you trust and the guys at the Steelers in the locker room are fired up about it. I'm ready to go to work.

Do you know much about the room you are going into? (Joe Rutter, Tribune-Review)

I look forward to the challenge. I'm going to go out and compete. I'm going to go out and give it all I've got. Like I said, it's an amazing feeling. I'm extremely blessed to be in this situation. I'm going to make sure the Steelers are going to be proud of their draft pick. I'm going to go give it my all.

What does it mean to you to be a Pittsburgh Steeler and what do you know about the organization? (Jenna Harner, WPXI)

I'm just so excited. It's something unexplainable for me. I'm just extremely happy. It's always been one of the things I've dreamed about. Always been one of my longest goals of life. Making it to the NFL. Now that I'm here, my hard work has paid off, but the work is not done. It's just getting started. So, I look forward to it. And about the Pittsburgh Steelers, I don't know much, but I look forward to finding out everything I can that's going to help us win.

Are you going to try to keep number one? (Alan Saunders, Pittsburgh Sports Now)

For me it was all about getting the number first, it didn't matter what number it was, but we'll see when we get there. For me, it isn't even about the number, it's about getting on the field and making plays and helping the team, contribute however I can.

What's your confidence with the guys you're going to be facing in the AFC North? (Chris Carter, DK Pittsburgh Sports)

For me, I feel like the SEC is one of the most competitive conferences in college football. I went against great guys all year. Like I said, I'm always up for the challenge. It's a competitive league, and I look forward to getting out there showcasing my talents. Let everyone know I'm ready for it.

Can you give a scouting report on tackling Najee Harris? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review) Najee Harris is a great back. I like his play style. Every time we played against him, I always looked forward to it. They got us pretty good, but he's a great back and I'm glad to be his teammate. I look forward to getting some dubs with him for sure.

What special teams did you play in college and do you embrace that opportunity at the next level? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette)

Most definitely so. The way it worked at A&M, if you were a starter, you had to play on special teams. You had to play somewhere. That's just coach Fisher's rules because it's so important. The special teams' area isn't really talked about much, so I look forward to playing special teams. It's part of football. It's something that has to be played. I love special teams. Personally, I love the defensive side of special teams. So, I look forward to contributing however I can.

Do you consider yourself a mean, physical football player? (Noah Strackbein, Sports Illustrated)

Most definitely. The A&M program, one of our pillars is about toughness, pride, and grit. That's the culture we're building around. So, I feel confident and I'm ready to take it to the Steelers and add on what I can by bringing my one percent.

How did you get the name Buddy? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review)

It's a funny answer. All my life I've been called Buddy, but my real name is Devodrick Johnson. In high school, I was Devodrick until I started getting recruited. Coaches were like, "what's your name?" I was like, "I'm Buddy Johnson." So ever since then it's been running from there. The moment I knew I was really Buddy Johnson was when I go on A&M roster and it says number one Buddy Johnson. My mom was like, "why'd they change your name?" I was like, "it's something you gave me." So, I've been embracing it. Devodrick is not a name I don't like. I love both of my names. It's just part of my personality. It's just who I am. Part of my identity. It came from a cartoon character named Buddy that my mom dressed me up as back in Halloween when I was younger. I guess he work like jeans, some boots or something like that. That's all I really know.

What was the feeling when you heard your name called and the fourth A&M in the round? (Travis Brown, Bryan-College Station Eagle)

It means the world just to hear my name being called. I know all of the hard work I put in. It's paid off, and like I said, it's always been one of my goals to play in the NFL. So, to go out put on a show and be able to play in the big leagues, I'm ready for it. At A&M we had some great guys so for us to get off the board, for teams to see that for A&M, it's huge for our program. I'm excited for not only me, but also my teammates as well.

What does it mean for you to be with your teammate Dan Moore in Pittsburgh?

Dan Moore. That's my dude. That's my guy. We're close friends. He's on the other side of the ball, but we hangout a lot. I tried to stay in contact with everyone when Covid was going on, and that was one of the guys that helped me. He was a leader on the team that helped us keep the team together. So extremely blessed for the Steelers to get two of our great leaders to step up and go out and help the team get dubs. Me and him, we're fired up ready to go. I can tell you that. We'll give it our all.



Jerry Olsavsky on Buddy Johnson:

I like Buddy [Johnson]. He's a good player. He's a good inside linebacker. I think it's real appropriate that the first defensive player we got in 2021 draft was an inside linebacker. I'm always excited. I love guys who've played football being from Texas A&M. Buddy fits the bill.

How do you envision Buddy fitting in with the inside linebackers? (Brooke Pryor, ESPN) I think Buddy fits in great with the group. The reason I say that is because he likes football. He plays downhill. He's good in pass coverage, in zone drops, and things like that. So that's right what we want. When he first gets here, the one thing he's going to do, he's going to be unselfish. He's going to listen to Devin [Bush] and Vince [Williams] and the older guys, Robert [Spillane], and he's going to play some special teams. He's going to do some things for us there and we're really going to like him.

How much did him being aggressive against the run speak to you about how he can contribute to you guys taking on some of the stronger running teams in your division? (Chris Carter, DK Pittsburgh Sports)

It always speaks to me because that's one of the first things I want to see. How far from the line of scrimmage the linebacker is when the ball is coming towards him, and when you attack the line of scrimmage, we call that going downhill, and Buddy does that really well. You can tell that he's been around football a long time. He feels comfortable moving with the run and attacking blockers and things like that. I think he needs some work on just cleaning up some things just to be more proficient up here in the NFL. The blockers on the offensive line are much better than totality at college and it's something that just takes some technique, but the fact that he attacks as his main weapon is really good. You can't teach that. Buddy got that growing up and however he came to fall in love with football. So that's something that I don't have to worry about. We'll just clean it up a little bit, but it's always one of the first things I look for is an attacking middle linebacker.

Is it necessary to accumulate options at inside linebacker if Devin Bush needs to be held back early on? (Mark Kaboly, the Athletic)

I don't think that has anything to do with Devin. Devin is rehabbing. He's feeling good. We expect him to be back. A guy like Devin, when you get him on your team, you know a setback like this like what happened last year where he missed some time, is not a setback. It's just a bump in the road and he's ready to go. The reason you get a guy like Buddy is because like last year happened. We went through six inside linebackers. Now you don't expect that to happen. It's still the pandemic, but Vince I lost with the pandemic. Robert went down, things like that. It's a tough game inside, and you can't have enough good players. You also need players that man the specials teams, and that's really important. Danny Smith is a big part of our game, and that's what we need. My guys are generally on all four core special teams. So, they're getting their snaps every game. They're getting 15-20 snaps and that's real football out there. You need a guy who you can just put on the field and he knows where the ball is going, and that's what Buddy has, and I anticipate him being really good on special teams and really good wherever he fits in amongst my guys in my room.

What did you see in Buddy that give you some projection to some sub package roles? (Alan Saunders, Pittsburgh Sports Now)

As I said, when I look for a linebacker, I look for a guy that attacks the line of scrimmage. That's the first thing. And then you just try to get them to grow on you. So, when Buddy worked out and Buddy jumped 38.5 vertically and 10'8" on a broad jump, that shows me explosion. So that means he's got explosion in his body and we redirect it to get out there and cover somebody in the pass who is explosive, like a wide receiver or a tight end who's explosive, and since you have the measurable, then it's safe for us to assume that with some proper coaching and some technique, that you will be able to matchup against a guy like that. So that's really what we see in Buddy as a whole. He's going to go downhill and he's going to hit you, and then he's got some explosion that you don't always see in the box so to speak. When a guy is going from tackle to tackle, you don't see 38 inch vertical jumps, you don't see the broad jump, but when you see that on the other side, that's my job to get that talent onto the field, and I can't teach that. You can't teach 38 inches. So that's what I like about Buddy. What I also like about Buddy is he was the green dot at A&M so he lines people up. He's used to being the leader, the guy that people look at. We talk about Devin is the quarterback of the defense. You can't have enough guys like that. Every single one of my guys, Vince, Devin, Robert, they all have a presence where they can say, "hey, this is what we're doing," and get guys going the same way. So that's another thing that Buddy bring to the table.

How nice is it that Vince Williams is back for Buddy to learn from? (Noah Strackbein, Sports Illustrated)

Oh, it's great, having Vince there. When I talk about Vince, people need to know that Vince is the ultimate professional. He may look like he's a throwback, grind them up type of football, but Vince, if you look at his career, he came here as a rookie, he had some starts because of injury as a rookie, and then he was a special teams ace, then he played and he rushed the passer. If you saw Vince's offseason regiment, you'd say to yourself, "oh, I'm not surprised that Vince is an eight year pro and has so many sacks and so any interceptions," because in the offseason he's all professional business. That's why Vince is so vital in my room because that's just how he operates. He tells the guys, "hey, you don't want to do it? You don't have to do what I do," but he's got his resume to speak for him. So, all you've got to do is read the resume and you'll know how to do it. That's why I like Vince in the room because Vince is a team player who doesn't care. Now he wants to play every snap, he wants to do everything, just like all of my guys. Ulley [Gilbert] wants to play every snap. Markus [Allen] want to play every snap. Robert want to play every snap. It's hard to have that in a room and not have guys at each other's throats, but my guys are like that. They're rooting for each other because that's what football is. Football is an ultimate team game and that's how the guys in my room play it. So, to bring Buddy Johnson in who is another guy who we think fits that mold, is a perfect situation for me.

How does this motivate guys like Markus and Ulley to step up as it gets more crowded in that room? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette)

It may be apparent to some people, but the guys in my room are motivated before. That's not how they think. They think, "I want to be the best middle linebacker that I can, that's what I want." I'm not going to put six inside linebackers on the field at once, but that's how I coach them. I want them to get the most out of their ability because I think they're all talented and everyone goes downhill, everyone can make spectacular plays. We need to do that on a consistent basis throughout 16 games to get a good position in the playoffs and then to have a lot of success in the playoffs. That's something we need to do. Someone in your family could say they should be motivated taking a guy in the fourth round. These guys are already motivated. Vince was motivated back in sixth grade. We just want that to keep coming out of them. I also want them to help Buddy Johnson out. I got helped out by players like David Little. We were going out to a game once and he was like, "don't worry about it, we'll get it right on the field." That made me feel great. That's what I want my guys to do. That's what Devin does. He's like, "don't worry, we'll get this," and they get it, and that's what you have to do to be a successful team, and I think Buddy will fit right in there.

Does it matter that he produced in college on that good of a defense in the SEC? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review)

I don't look at the production numbers. I look at the film and I see production, and I say, "wow, this guy's a good player." I didn't know he had that stat based on the SEC, and that's great, but if you just watch one game, you're like, "wow, this guy is active," and that's what I'm looking for. It's not a numbers game. It's a team game. It's about enforcing your will on the other offense, and that's what we need to do. We have a chance to do that every play. Devin, Robert, Vince, they're doing that to the offensive linemen every play. We're here and that's how it's going to be. The numbers that they record and stuff like that, we're not really interested in that. We're concerned about enforcing our will on the other offense. I'm happy to know that he was the leading tackler in the SEC. I did not know that. The three games I watched, he played pretty good against the first round pick we got. So that's what I'm looking at. I want you to play some good people and see if you can play, and if you can, you've got a spot for yourself in the NFL.

Did you have any idea the Steelers were so interested in you to come up and trade for you in the fifth round? Have they said what position they would like you to play at? (Brooke Pryor, ESPN)

I've just been waiting around. I knew there was interest there. I felt like I had a great talk with Coach Tomlin a couple weeks ago. So I knew the interest was there, but I've just been waiting around today just for anything. I am so excited it happened to be the Steelers. We've talked about me being a little bit back up (in weight) more than what I'm at now. 280s, 290s. So honestly, wherever they want me when I get there, I'm comfortable playing any position. I feel like that's what helped me at Wisconsin. I was able to move along the line, inside, outside, 5 Tech. We talked about getting my weight a little bit back up, so I'm assuming d-line, but I'll be ready for anything.

Is there a story behind the second H in your name? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review) No, there's not. It's just there.

You were a teammate of T.J. Watt's for a year, correct? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review) Yeah, my true freshman year T.J. [Watt] was there. We interacted a little bit. Him being an outside backer kind of limited our interaction. I was never really around him. But of course, just being able to watch him practice and kind of see the mindset that he had the first year that I was there, I was definitely able to learn a lot from him, even kind of watching from a far not being around him in drills and stuff like that. I'm excited as can be to be able to work with him on the defense.

Was it frustrating seeing your ranking in some of these draft services? (Mark Kaboly, The Athletic)

I didn't look too much into it. It's not really about where you start, it's where you finish. That's kind of the mentality I had. I know the player that I am and I know what I can bring to a team. To me, of course I wanted to hear my name called and I was super excited to hear my name called. For

me, it was getting the opportunity and luckily, I have the opportunity now, so it's just time to show what I can do.

Yeah, I've been working like crazy this offseason just to be able to improve primary moves, secondary moves, anything that I can learn. When I was in California training for the pro day, I was with Coach Ed. Just being with him for a month or two, I learned an extraordinary amount. Just new techniques and stuff like that. Isaiahh [Loudermilk] is a defensive lineman. When I say defensive line, he's going to play

What did you see from him at Wisconsin that made him an intriguing prospect? (Joe Rutter, Tribune-Review)

I think he fits the mold for what we want to do here in Pittsburgh. He's a big strapping young man and I know he lost some weight to do his pro day, but around about 285, 290, he can play a 4-I down over the guards when we go in our sub package, and he can push the middle of the pocket. To get a kid with this kid of size and this kind of height in the 5th round, I think it's a really good get for the Steelers.

How wide open is the competition in your room right now to not just make the roster but get some time? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette)

I come from the south and they say defensive linemen are just like pretty women. There's not a lot of them, but everybody wants them, and when you find a big guy like that and you want to get him on your team, I think that's thing you do. Mike T and Kevin Colbert did a good job of getting us some talent.

Was there any table banging on your part to get back into the 5th round to get him? (Mark Kaboly, The Athletic)

No, with the Covid protocol I was sitting in my office and didn't have my mic on. I think coach Tomlin and Colbert did a good job of really scouting and scout did a great job of evaluating the talent. We didn't have a pick in the 5^{th} round, and we figured he wouldn't be there in the 6^{th} , so they made the move and I'm glad they did.

How much did you watch his tape and see you can use this guy in so many different types of ways? (Chris Carter, DK Pittsburgh Sports)

I think that's what it was all about. His versatility really helped him get picked for this team. The only bad thing about him, he's going to come here and won't be able to wear number 97.

How much had you communicated with Isaiahh throughout the draft process? (Brooke Pryor, ESPN)

I don't think those conversations go on with any kid because these kids don't know where they're going to get drafted and we don't really know how they're going to get slotted on draft weekend. I maybe spoke to about 40 or 50 defensive linemen because we didn't have the combine and we had certain pro days that we could go to, but only three members of each team could go, so I did a lot of zooming and a lot of talking to kids on the phone just to get them acclimated and to find out a little about the kids. He was one of the young men I spoke to, so it worked out great.

Is there a desire to lessen some of your older defensive linemen snaps or do you ride them as much as they can play? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review)

I think it's a little bit of both. If you got young guys who can step up, you put them on the field. If not, those older guys have to play. I think Tyson [Alualu], Cam [Heyward], [Stephon] Tuitt, they do a really good job of taking care of their bodies and playing well. You know, Isaiah Buggs, Carlos Davis, Henry Mondeaux, all of those young guys, they're backing up for a reason and they try to give us quality reps. So, I think the more competition we can get in that room, the better it'd be for everybody because you want your guys fresh, especially playing 17 games this year.

Have you ever played outside linebacker? (Joe Rutter, Tribune-Review)

Absolutely. I feel I've showed my ability to play in space on film. I've been asked to do a lot over my time at Temple and Miami. Of course I have some work to do, but I'm 100 percent confident in my ability to play linebacker.

What do you attribute you getting the ball a lot to? (Alan Saunders, Pittsburgh Sports Now)

My goal every time I step onto the field is to be disruptive and however that may be. May that be getting a sack fumble, whether that may be pressuring the quarterback, whether that may be getting a TFL, making a big play on the running back, helping my teammate make a big play. Whatever the case may be, whether it be special teams, blocking field goals. My goal every time I step onto the field every time is to just be disruptive.

What defines "Temple tough" and did you bring that to Miami with you? (Mike Prisuta, WDVE)

Temple tough is a mentality, not just physically tough, but mentally tough, and it's a mentality you've got to bring every day. It's something that we're kind of conditioned to be. If you look at any Temple football player that have went pro in the past, you'll see that there's a difference in their mentality than guys that come from elsewhere.

How much of a chip does this put on your shoulder of where you got drafted? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette)

Number one, I'd like to say that it's a dream come true. I appreciate the opportunity. It's a he blessing to be drafted in any round, and of course, I expected to go higher in the draft. I'll shoot you straight. I feel like I was going to go higher. It was a long three days sitting on the couch, but that's kind of been the story of my life. I wasn't highly recruited coming out of high school. I had to work my way into a starting role at Temple, even coming out of Miami. Somehow I became a second fiddle. I've always had to prove myself and just work a little bit harder. So it's nothing new to me.

How does it feel to be a Steeler and what do you know about the team? (Jenna Harner, WPXI)

It's actually funny. I know a lot about the Steelers because growing up in Baltimore I was on the opposite side of the rivalry. So I know a lot about the Steelers. I watch them every year and it's a huge blessing to be in the same room as guys like TJ Watt. It's a huge blessing.

How have you become so productive? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review)

Somehow along the way during this draft process I was labeled as not the most athletic guy. I'm not a guy that will just run a 4.3. I'm not going to jump a 45-inch vertical, but I have decent athleticism. I'm a technician and I'm a football player. When I line up in front of a guy, my technique and my football intelligence is what's going to make me a good player, while I still possess athleticism.

How excited are you to play with T.J. Watt and what do you think of him? (Noah Strackbein, Sports Illustrated)

I'm excited man. I've always watched this defense, and this is right up my alley. Hard nose, rugged football. This is right up my alley and it worked out even though I went low in the draft. It worked out. There aren't too many programs in the league that would've been a better fit than the Steelers. I'm excited to be here. I can't wait to start improving and just get to work.

How did you bring more moves into your game and how do you want to keep improving? (Chris Carter, DK Pittsburgh Sports)

Just a lot of repetition, and that's with anything. The only way you'll be good in this game is if you do it 1,000 times before game day. I attribute anything to repetition, the hard work, and my repetition.

What have they told you about the opportunity for playing time this season? (Tim Benz, Tribune-Review)

Obviously, it's a position with some flexibility. There's opportunity there, but I understand nothing is going to be given to me. I understand that I'm going to have to come in and work. I have to grind, but that's right up my alley like I said. The programs that I come from Temple and Miami, growing up in Baltimore, that's right up my alley, hard nose, hard work, blue collar.

What are these Ravens vs Steelers going to be like now in your family? (Jeff Hathhorn, 93.7)

I'm not sure. I'll be totally honest, I'm in a house full of Ravens fans, but I told them today I don't even want to see the color purple. Have got somebody dropping off a Terrible Towel to me tonight. I don't even want to see the color purple anymore.

How does Quincy Roche fit into the mix? (Tim Benz, Tribune-Review)

Well, we'll see. We aren't finished with our free agency and stuff like that. We've got four guys that we know of. Where does Quincy fit in that situation? We'll have to wait and see what we do in training camp, how everybody's doing in training camp. Obviously Alex Highsmith filled in pretty well for us last year. Everybody knows about TJ [Watt]. He's solid. I think we'll be okay at that position, but again, it's a lot of stuff we just have to wait and see when we get to training camp and see how we develop in those situations.

What do you look for to tell you that a guy can make the transition from rush to pass coverage? (Mark Kaboly, The Athletic)

Well our guys usually do a pretty good job in terms of working these guys out. Is pass coverage a big deal for us? It is a times. We don't ask them to do one or two things. Most of the time when we're playing zone defense, we ask them to do what we call a spot drop where they just drop to the numbers and read the quarterback and stuff like that or if someone runs what we call a wheel route that can take them in that situation. We've got one more coverage that we use that we ask a little bit more from them. We spend a lot of time trying to teach that in training camp. So it's not like we ask them to do a lot. A lot of times they're playing more of a defensive rush end guy for us than they are in coverage, however, we will use them in coverage, but for mostly the main part of their responsibility is going to be stopping the run and rushing the passer.

Why did you decide to address up front first in the draft? (Noah Strackbein, Sports Illustrated)

I think what we did was take the best athlete that we had ranked high. It was still a need, but what I think you've got to do is hopefully get the best guy that you can get, regardless of the position needs for us that we did take care of, but it was because we had guys rated higher at that position that maybe we did as a corner. We've still got a need at corner, and that doesn't mean we won't draft anybody in the 7th round to play corner, but we'll wait and see what's left for us in the draft and try to draft accordingly.

What do you guys think you have in Cassius Marsh? (Mike Prisuta, WDVE)

There's still some things he's got to learn in our defense. He picked it up pretty well last year, and we were glad to have him because we needed him for depth last year when Bud [Dupree] got hurt it really kind of put us in a bind in terms of the outside linebacker position. We didn't ask Cassius to do a lot in terms of coverage. When he comes back, we've got to try and get him in position where he's comfortable in what we're going to ask him to do. The only way to get comfortable in what we ask him to do is to do it. So we're going to try and teach him what we like to do with the outside linebackers, but he's still got a good knack for rushing the passer and playing the run, so he's got his foot forward on that one. The only thing we've got to do is teach him what we try to do trying to use these guys for pass coverage.

Where did you have Quincy ranked in the draft? (Chris Carter, DK Pittsburgh Sports) Well it was a little bit of a surprise him being there. We rated him around the late 3rd, early 4th, all the way into the 5th round, but like I said, we had different people on our board at the time that might have been rated a little bit higher and so we took the highest rated guy. It might not

necessarily be what you need or what you want. Sometimes you take a position and hope you can get another position later in the draft. I'm sure Kevin has talked about the and Mike has talked about that. So for us, we had several needs on defense, we got to them. We're still in need of a couple positions here and there, but we'll see what happens.

Why do you think his production wasn't as prolific with Miami? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette) Well they had a lot of people down there playing. It wasn't just him. I'm not a big fan of the portal in college football. I think it makes it tough for colleges to keep people at their schools, and they've got to play them in ways to keep everybody happy. But with the situation in college nowadays where you can go somewhere if you don't like where you're at, they're different people playing at those positions at different times, especially with the opt out stuff that happened last year. These last couple of years have been kind of crazy in terms of college football, and really kind of crazy in terms of us evaluating people wondering if they are coming out or not coming out. I think those 4.5 sacks at the time for the circumstance, I don't know how much that means to be honest with you. You look at what happened at Penn State and the couple of kids they had outside there too, same with him. We just try to figure out what we see on film and see how they're going to contribute to our team.

Were you ready to get some defensive guys after the first four rounds? (Joe Rutter, Tribune-Review)

I know this and I've been here a long time, and I've been fortunate enough to coach in three Super Bowls, and I think in all three of those Super Bowls we had a good running game. So I'm not going to gripe and complain about us picking Najee in the 1st round and saying on offense the first day or two. That doesn't bother me because the best defense to me is always sitting on the sideline watching your offense run the football. We've got to get a better rushing attack and I understand that. The head coach is doing what he thinks is best and so is Kevin. They're doing what they think is best for this team and I agree with them, even if we might not get a pick til later on. I'm for that. I'm for us being a good football team. I'm not for us just being great at defense. I'm for winning football and trying to win the Super Bowl.

What are your thoughts on the first two guys you got today? (Joe Rutter, Tribune-Review) I like him [Buddy Johnson]. I think he's going to be a good player for us. Very quick. He moves good. He's going to come in and help you with depth, but he's also got to come in and help you with special teams. If you draft a linebacker, inside or outside, he has to contribute to the special teams and make the special teams good in order for him to buy time for him to make the team and work toward to becoming a starter in the National Football League. You don't get that time to do all of that stuff as a linebacker in the National Football League unless you show that you are valuable to the team. How do you do that? You play good special teams and that's a big part of what we emphasize here. They've got to play good special for us and I'm sure we're going to ask him to do the same thing, but we're going to be alright I think with what we've got. The thing that we can hopefully get and see what's back there in the 7th round is covering some more needs.

What is it about Buddy Johnson that makes him so productive when people have negative opinions on his abilities? (Chris Adamski, Tribune-Review)

They've got to be fast enough to play in this league, fast enough for what we ask them to do in order to be successful. But the biggest thing for outside linebacker is really sacks. That's a big part of our game. We've led the league in sacks the last four years, I believe. So this kid is very good at rushing the passer. He does a good job at what we call long arming people, pushing people with the inside hand past the quarterback and make the play. He does a great job of that, and that shows up. So do numbers of sacks mean something? Yeah, they mean something, but there are other parts of the game that he has to pay attention to, and we as coaches got to do a good job of teaching him what to do within the framework of the defense we're trying to run.

Is there such a thing as a guy that finds the ball or being in the right place at the right time? (Alan Saunders, Pittsburgh Sports Now)

All of the above. Mike [Tomlin] does a great job of emphasis of what our guys do, what they are looking at. He calls it ball awareness. And what is ball awareness? When you are rushing the passer and you get a clean look to get to him and strip the ball from the passer, or someone is running and you tackle him and you've got your hand on the ball and you try to rip it out. Stuff like that. And we have led the League a lot of times in takeaways, too, which is always helpful for us. We want to try to score touchdowns if we can. For us, ball awareness is a huge part of our defense.

Get the ball back for the offense. What does that mean? Stripping the ball and causing fumbles or causing interceptions, hitting the quarterback right when he's throwing it, stuff like that. Mike does a great job of emphasizing that to the whole team and to the whole defense, and our guys seem to own it.

What was it about Isaiahh Loudermilk that you liked so much? (Brooke Pryor, ESPN)

I like Loudermilk because he reminds me a little bit of a young Cam Heyward. He's surely not as developed as Cam was. Cam came out of college and we drafted him with a high pick. He helped us quite a bit, but he still had a lot to learn. Cam will be a good tutor to this guy. I think Loudermilk would do well to get in that crowd with Cam and the rest of our defensive line and learn a lot from them. And [Karl] Dunbar does a great job with them. He does a great job in terms of teaching them to rush the passer, what their technique is in the running game. What are they doing in double teams, what are they doing in slip blocks, all that stuff he does a great job of coaching them. I'm not worried about that. I know he is going to develop and Karl will do a good job of developing them.

First of all, thank you. For me, honestly the first answer to that is I'm comfortable with any one of those positions on the back end. I'm comfortable enough to play any one of those positions, but if I had to pinpoint a position, I would say probably that slot, that nickel position. It's just being able to be effective in the run game, in the pass game, in zone, man. Honestly, I'm very comfortable being able to play any position on the back end.

How difficult is it to know all those different positions, and what do you think the value is in what you do, especially in today's NFL? (Jeff Hathhorn, 93.7 The Fan)

For me, it's not too difficult. I kind of mentioned it with the first question I answered. I've always prided myself on knowing those type of things, so that's something that I've just tried to train myself mentally to be able to do, for that mental capacity to be able to understand those different positions on the back end. I feel like it brings a lot of value, especially how the game is now-adays. There are a lot of high-powered offenses in the League, great, elite talent on the opposite side of the ball, and just being able to have those guys that can kind of play out here at corner, or play in the slot, or be a free safety, or be a strong safety. I feel like it brings a lot of, it just brings a lot of help to the defensive side of the ball knowing that if we have limited numbers here, this guy, he can move from his position and go out and play another position as well. I feel like now-adays, having a guy who can do it all, it helps out a lot.

What does it mean to you to be a Pittsburgh Steeler, and do you have any previous knowledge of the Steelers organization? (Jenna Harner, WPXI)

It means a lot. It's a blessing, honestly, just being able to hear my name called and being able to speak to Coach [Mike] Tomlin on the phone and being able to have this opportunity. It's a historical organization that any football fan knows about, so just being able to have the opportunity to come down there in Pittsburgh and be a part of that organization, it's a blessing. I can't wait to get down there and get to work.

We prided ourselves on being key on special teams, and I've played on all four special teams units my freshman year, and then my last two years I did three. I was on both coverage units and then punt return, so that's something I've always prided myself on is being that key part of special teams. I'm look forward to being a key part of special teams when I get down to Pittsburgh as well. So that's something that I take pride in because it's a key part of the game. Football is a complimentary game. You have to have offense, defense and special teams together to get that outcome.

You spent one season with Baker Mayfield in Oklahoma. Did you ever pick him off in practice, and are you looking forward to facing him twice a year maybe? (Brian Batko, Post-Gazette)

I am looking forward to facing him. I had him my freshman year, and I want to say if I did, maybe once, but hopefully I can get him for sure with us playing each other two times a year. I'm excited for that. Bake's a great competitor, a great quarterback, so I'm excited about that.

Put together one of the most decorated individual seasons in Georgia Tech football history ... won the Ray Guy Award as the nation's top punter ... became the second Yellow Jacket to win the Ray Guy Award (joining Durant Brooks – 2007) ... became the first African American to win the Ray Guy Award in its 21-year history ... was a unanimous first-team All-American, becoming only the third Georgia Tech player to ever earn unanimous All-America honors (joining Ken Swilling – 1990 and Calvin Johnson – 2006) ... led the nation and set Georgia Tech and Atlantic Coast Conference records with a 48.0-yard punting average ... to put the whopping 48.0-yard average into perspective, the margin between his average and the third-best average in the nation (46.7 -Washington State's Oscar Draguicevich) was the same as the margin between Draguicevich and the nation's ninth-best average (45.4 – San Diego State's Tanner Kuljian) ... 49% of his punts (22of-45) traveled 50 or more yards, 47% (21-of-45) were fair caught, 40% (18-of-45) were downed inside the opponent's 20 yard line and only 17% (8-of-45) were returned ... helped Georgia Tech rank second nationally in net punting (44.62-yard average) ... averaged at least 51 yards per punt three times in nine games (51.2 vs. UCF on Sept. 19, 51.0 at Boston College on Oct. 24 and 51.0 vs. Pitt on Dec. 10) ... was named the Ray Guy Award National Punter of the Week twice (51.2) avg., 3 inside 20, career-long 70-yarder vs. UCF on Sept. 19 and 51.0 avg., 3 inside 20 at Boston College on Oct. 24) and one of the award's "Ray's 4" recipients (honoring the nation's four best punters each week) five times (41.7 avg., 2 inside 20 at Florida State, 49.3 avg., 3 inside 20, 64yarder downed at 4 yard line at Syracuse on Sept. 26 and 48.3 avg., 3 inside 20 vs. Clemson on Oct. 17, in addition to the performances vs. UCF and at BC) ... finished with a 44.7-yard career punting average, which ranks second in Georgia Tech history behind only Brooks (45.3).

One of the nation's top weapons on special teams, Harvin ranked 17th nationally and fifth in the ACC with a 44.8-yard punting average – good for the fifth-best single-season punting average in school history, giving him two of the top-10 season marks in the Georgia Tech annals for his career ... boomed 80 punts for 3,583 total yards – both good for third all-time in school history ... a careerhigh 18 of 80 punts, including 10 in the first four games of 2019, were downed inside the 20-yard line ... 26-of-80 punts traveled 50 yards or more ... averaged at least 45 yards per punt six times in 12 games and 50 yards or more twice – 51.4 at Duke (Oct. 12), 45.5 at Miami (Fla.) (Oct. 19), 46.4 vs. Pitt (Nov. 2), 48.2 vs. vs. Virginia Tech (Nov. 16), 50.5 vs. NC State (Nov. 21), and 45.2 vs. then-No. 4 Georgia (Nov. 30) ... his whopping 51.4-yards average at Duke (Oct 12) ranked 16th in school history for single-game average ... named ACC Specialist of the Week after he averaged 45.5 yards per punt and threw a 41-yard touchdown pass to Nathan Cottrell on a fake punt in Tech's 28-21 overtime win over Miami (Fla.) (Oct. 19) – the first completion of his career ... Harvin finished the season with a 774.4 pass-efficiency rating ... amassed 434 punting yards on nine kicks against Virginia Tech (Nov. 16), ranking tied for ninth in school history ... set two program records by punting 13 times for 587 yards against Georgia (Nov. 30) – the most since 1997.

2018 SEASON

Second-team all-ACC ... one of the nation's least-utilized weapons, Harvin would've led the ACC and ranked 16th nationally through the regular season with a 44.3-yard punting average, but with just 31 attempts fell fall short of the 3.6 punts per game needed to qualify for the NCAA's official statistical rankings ... season average fell to 41.3 yards per punt after he uncharacteristically kicked four times for just 75 yards (18.8 avg.) in Quick Lane Bowl vs. Minnesota ... Sixteen of his 35 punts (including 14 of his last 21) were downed inside the 20-yard line, 10-of-35 traveled 50 yards or more and three of his booming punts were muffed, all of which were recovered by Georgia Tech and led directly to scores (two touchdowns and a field goal) ... Averaged at least 45 yards per punt seven times in 12 games – 48.0 vs. Alcorn State (Sept. 1), 48.5 vs. Clemson (Sept. 22), 53.0 vs. Bowling Green (Sept. 29) ... 46.2 vs. Duke (Oct. 13), 45.0 at North Carolina (Nov. 3), 47.3 vs. Miami (Nov. 10) and 46.7 vs. Virginia (Nov. 17) ... Averaged a whopping 47.7 yards per punt in six home games but just 34.6 yards per punt in six games away from home ... Played in only 12 games because he was the only healthy, non-redshirting player that did not see action in Georgia Tech's 66-31 romp at Louisville (Oct. 5).

2017 SEASON

Led all NCAA Division I true freshmen, ranked 16th overall nationally and was second in the ACC in punting average at 44.1 yards per punt ... 44.1-yard average was a Georgia Tech freshman record, breaking the 18-year-old record of 43.8 yards per punt (Dan Dyke - 1999) ... fifth-best overall single-season punting average in school history ... only the third FWAA freshman all-American in GT history, joining place kicker Travis Bell (2004) and guard Will Jackson (2010) ... became the first Georgia Tech freshman to be named all-ACC since Calvin Johnson (first-team WR) and Bell (second-team PK) in 2004 ... for the season, 16 of his 50 punts downed inside the 20-yard line (32 percent), 13-of-50 traveled 50-plus yards (26 percent) and just 21 were returned (42 percent) ... opened his collegiate career by averaging 46 yards over three punts, including a 56-yarder that was downed at the 18-yard line, against Tennessee (Sept. 4) ... two of his three punts were downed inside the 20-yard line in home debut against Jacksonville State (Sept. 9) ... averaged 47.3 yards per punt (second-highest of the season) against North Carolina (Sept. 30) ... had 4-of-6 punts downed inside the 20-yard line, including a season-long 62-yarder, at Miami (Oct. 14) ... averaged a season-high 51.5 yards per punt, including a 56-yarder, in win over Wake Forest (Oct. 21) ... in a driving rain at Clemson (Oct. 28), averaged 46.9 yards per punt with 5-of-9 traveling 50-plus yards ... in three games in October, averaged a whopping 46.9 yards over 17 punts with 7-of-17 traveling 50 yards or more and 7-of-17 downed inside the 20-yard line ... for the season, averaged 40 yards or more per punt in 10-of-11 games.

Rated as a three-star prospect by ESPN, 247Sports and Rivals ... ranked as the No. 2 punter in the Class of 2017 by Kohl's Kicking Camps ... nation's No. 4-ranked punter according to ESPN and 247Sports ... Two-time all-state honoree ... selected to play in Blue-Grey All-America Game and Shrine Bowl of the Carolinas ... averaged 42.5 yards per punt with a long of 72 as a senior ... led the state in punting average as a junior and senior ... helped lead Sumter to four-straight district championships (2013-16), back-to-back regional championships (2015-16) and a state runner-up finish (2014) ... coached by Mark Barnes ... also earned four letters in track and field and helped lead Sumter to three-straight regional championships as a thrower ... four-time academic letterwinner ... graduated with a 3.8 grade point average.

Kevin Colbert Opening Statement:

KEVIN COLBERT: We're happy to reach the conclusion of the 2021 Draft. We just met with all the scouts and coaches, congratulated them on their efforts. Our bottom line is we think we're a better team today than we were yesterday. That's always the goal coming out of this process. We've talked about Najee and Pat and Kendrick Green before. Yesterday I know the assistant coaches addressed those guys that we didn't talk about. We'll be glad to answer any questions along those lines. But Pat and Kendrick, both quality players. Both have versatility. Pat can play in the formation, outside the formation. Kendrick has played both center and guard. He'll start off as a center here.

Today we added Dan Moore. Three-year starter down at Texas A&M playing in the SEC at left tackle. (He) did a nice job there. Buddy Johnson is his teammate. He was the team captain, but he was also the leader of that group. That group had several very good players on it, as witnessed by the draft picks today. Buddy was a big part of it. He's a good run defender that shows up in coverage. He'll be able to help out on special teams.

We traded our fourth round pick in 2022 to be able to draft Isaiahh Loudermilk this year. In doing that, just to address the trade, we're pretty sure we'll have some type of compensatory pick in that fourth round range. We never know exactly what that will be. We feel confident. We just wanted to get back into that fifth round this year, especially when a guy like Isaiahh was available. Loudermilk played in 3-4 defense, has the length and athleticism that you like. He's played techniques that he'll continue to be taught here. That was really exciting to be able to trade back into that round, and get a guy like Isaiahh.

Quincy Roche did a nice job after he grad transferred from Temple down to the University of Miami. At Temple his junior year he was I believe 13 sacks. He played exclusively defensive end for Miami. But he has the athleticism to definitely project to the outside backer spot. Tre Norwood is a safety/corner. He's played both at Oklahoma. He was moved to safety before he was injured last season in 2019. He came back, put together five interceptions for Oklahoma this season. Playing mainly safety, but he also is a package guy that can move around, and coach will address that.

Pressley Harvin is a big legged guy. When I say that, he has a naturally powerful leg. He averaged 44.7 for his career. I believe it was 47.6 this season. It's just a natural, powerful leg. Again, excited to have him come in and join the competition.

We're in the process of starting to sign free agents. Hopefully we get that process wrapped up here quick, then we'll be ready to move on.

Mike Tomlin: Nothing to add. I'll be happy to address any questions you might have. Kevin did an awesome job of summarizing what we've done today and this weekend to get to this point.

Coach and Kevin, is it just coincidence or did you make a concentrated effort, you took a lot of seniors, guys with multiple starts over their career? Was that any part of the focus?

Mike Tomlin: I don't know that senior was a direct focus. I know we really were interested in guys that had an opportunity to play in 2020. No disrespect to those who didn't play in 2020 or who participated in conferences who had uncertainty in that area. We just had a certain level of comfort with people with fluid résumés and participation in 2020. When it was close, Kevin mentioned on several occasions leading up to this weekend we were going to lean toward those who played in 2020.

It happened to work out you were going to use the first four on offense, then follow it up with the next four on defense?

Kevin Colbert: Yeah, again, just to echo coach's comments with the seniors, there was really no plan for that entering into this draft. That's just the way it unfolded for us. Happy to have some balance. I don't even know what the exact numbers were. Looks like it was four, four, one. We included the special teams for the tiebreaker. But it was no intent to do that. Hopefully, again, we got balanced help for both sides of the football or all three sides of the football.

Kevin, seemed like you played the draft board quite well by getting skill positions early where that might not have been as deep, getting value with Green and Moore later where positions were deeper. Is that fair to say? It seems like you balanced need with want with those first four.

Kevin Colbert: I think when we look at the board, we look at who's available, regardless of the depth. If we really liked that player, we're going to take them there. If we know there is good depth at two positions and two players are graded pretty close, we will take the player that has the least amount of depth as we look at the total picture. In that case, what I mean to say is if we like a guy, regardless of the depth, we'll take him. But if it's close and there's more depth, we'll probably take the position with the least depth.

Talking with Adrian Klemm last night, he mentioned an emphasis on drafting these offensive linemen that have a nasty streak. With the guys across the board, they all have this toughness, nastiness. How important was it to bring guys like that into the fold?

Mike Tomlin: I think that play demeanor that you mentioned is something that we always covet, at least the time period I've been here. I think it's a component of football that's time tested, supersedes all trends and things of that nature. I don't know if that was a new discussion or new discovery for us.

On Monday you made it a point to mention fixing the running game isn't exclusively based on bringing in new faces. If you look at the first four guys, in general those guys are designed to maybe help you better in that area. What do you like about that group? Do you think your running game is better than it was three days ago?

Mike Tomlin: I like the players. I like their talents. I like what they were able to do at their universities. As I mentioned on Monday, the acquisition of players is just a component of it. Obviously I feel better about where we are today than I did on Monday because those are four quality players. But as I mentioned on Monday, it's just a component. We're excited about teaching them. We're excited about training. We're excited about the evolution of our schematics. All of those things are going to ultimately determine the look of it all.

Mike, what's the value of having a guy the size of Loudermilk that can play at any point along the line? What does that bring?

Mike Tomlin: There's a scarcity. When you talk about the size of Loudermilk, that was one of the things that was really intriguing to us. Also intriguing to us is that he's got a lot of experience in a very similar scheme defensively. It wasn't a lot of guesswork. Much like when we were looking at Watt, when he came out of Wisconsin, it was an easy evaluation because all the things that he did at Wisconsin, whether it was play anywhere from a five to the interior parts of their formation structure, we'll be asking him to do similar things.

I know Kevin said you guys weren't overly focused on one position or one type of thing. You did draft a lot of guys that are going to be involved in the trenches either running the ball or blocking runners or stopping the runners. You're in a division where there's a lot of good running talent. How do you think you're going to fare with the guys you added? Kevin Colbert: Hopefully these guys will make us a better team. As we mentioned when we opened up, we think we'll be better. As coach alluded to, the new work will start on Monday, not with this group because they can't come in quite yet. We hope we've added people on both sides, interior, offensive and defensive linemen. We really added people at every level at positions that we really wanted to add to. Again, we'll wait and see how much they can do for us.

Mike, you mentioned that excitement you had about these guys. What excites you about this draft class as a whole, what they're going to bring to this team?

Mike Tomlin: I can't think of a last day of a draft where I haven't been excited. New men to work with is exciting. Getting to know these guys over the course of the last several months through our research brings a certain level of anticipation. We're excited about getting started with them. There are a lot of reasons to be excited. If you're in this business, particularly from a coach's standpoint, players are the lifeblood. New quality, talented, young men to work with makes you smile.

A lot of Big Ten and SEC guys early, then you stuck with the power conference guys. You've been open about liking some of the MAC talent you had. They played a short schedule. How much did that play into things evaluating these guys?

Kevin Colbert: During the process we did mention there wasn't as many MAC players that were on our board this year. Not to say there wasn't good players in the MAC, there just wasn't as many as there have been in recent years. Their shortened season I'm sure didn't help along those lines. The MAC has always produced good NFL players. This year was just a little bit less numbers than usual.

A lot of your players have experience, your rookies have experience, at multiple positions. Was versatility an emphasis when you looked who was left on the board?

Kevin Colbert: Yeah, we always look for that versatility because we have to figure out what they can do, if they have different options and talents. I know coach is always excited about bringing a guy in and finding out about them. We'll learn about these players as we go on. But when you have different options for them, I know it's exciting for coach. I'll let coach address that, too. Mike Tomlin: Yeah, versatility helps them, and it helps us. By that I mean when you're a young guy trying to carve out a niche for yourself, versatility aids you in doing so. It also aids us in terms of making decisions and finding work for them. Versatility is an asset that we're really excited about. It helps all parties involved.

Kevin, you were real patient waiting for defensive back and outside linebacker help, even though you had some free agent departures this off-season. Is that a result of how the board broke, or depth at those positions, your own depth on your roster?

Kevin Colbert: Really everything because we knew there was certain amounts of depth at all the different positions. We just had to wait it out. Again, trading back into the fifth round with a future pick, we didn't want to let a defensive player like Isaiahh Loudermilk out there. To be able to draft that young man at that position, I think it was just indicative of the people that we felt were available.

In Isaiahh's case, there wasn't a lot of defensive linemen entering into this draft. Obviously, they started to get picked. That's why we were willing to trade a pick from next year because we're pretty sure we'll have some type of compensatory pick. That wasn't the one we traded. We traded our actual pick. It will be supplanted by a compensatory pick in some form.
