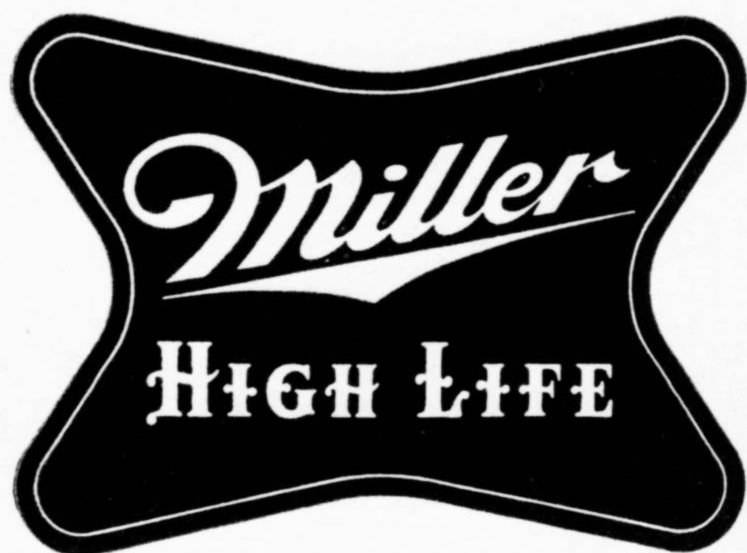

Season Books:

You can purchase a book of six tickets for all the Steelers home games any time from the end of the season right up through the first week of September.

Naturally, the best seats are secured if you get your season ticket early. All 1953 season ticket holders may hold their same location or reserve their right for a better spot by renewing their order right after the season, or before the deadline of each year.

Season Books are priced at \$22.00 for seats in first tier reserved, second tier reserved and first tier boxes. Second and third tier boxes sell for \$31.20 each seat and some first tier box and reserve seats and left field bleacher reserved seats sell for \$15.00 each.

Single Game:

Tickets for all Steeler home games go on sale simultaneously in the first week of August. Single Game tickets are priced at \$2.00, \$3.00, \$4.25, and \$6.00 (Pre-Season game ticket prices are slightly lower.) All prices include tax.

Gift Certificates:

Season Books of six tickets for all Steeler home games may be secured at the standard prices prevailing above. They make ideal gifts for Christmas, birthdays, anniversaries and all other occasions for young and old alike. Attractive gift certificates are available at all times at no additional cost.

COACHING STAFF

JOE BACH (Head Coach)

Joe Bach, a balding, broad-shouldered gentleman of fifty-two years, who is best-remembered as one of Notre Dame's Seven Mules, completed an unusual cycle when he signed as head coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers football team on December 18, 1951.

For this was the second time within the previous 17 years that Bach had been nominated as headmaster of the Pittsburgh professional team—a situation probably without parallel in the National League's long history.

Bach first became head coach of the Pittsburgh team (then known as the Pirates) in 1935 when the club was starting its third season in the pro league. He stayed two seasons before returning to the collegiate coaching ranks and in his final year, his team narrowly missed winning the eastern division championship. As a matter of fact, the Pirates lost the title in the final game of the season.

Very few people in football today have had a richer athletic background than Bach. He will be starting on his thirtieth year of coaching this fall.

He was born in Tower, Minn., on January 17, 1901. He began his collegiate athletic career at little Carleton school in Northfield, Minn., but, after one semester, transferred to Notre Dame.

Bach started his long coaching career at Syracuse University as an aide to Pete Reynolds and stayed in upstate New York until he became an assistant to his old teammate, Elmer Layden. Layden then was the head coach at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh. That was 1929.

When Layden resigned at the close of the 1933 season to take over the head coaching post at Notre Dame, Bach succeeded him as the No. 1 football man with the Dukes. In his one trial as head coach, he gave the Dukes one of the two strongest teams in the school's history. His 1934 eleven was among the country's leading scorers.

During the following two years, Bach had his first brush with the pros and, at the same time, worked with Howard Harpster at Carnegie Tech as his line coach.

From 1937 through 1941, Bach was head coach at Niagara University and 1942 found him as the head tutor of the Fort Knox army eleven.

In 1943, he returned to the pros, spending some time at Detroit, Boston and New York. It was during this period—seven years, to be exact—that

Bach gained a thorough knowledge of the present day pro coaches and personnel.

During the 1950-51 seasons, Bach was head coach at St. Bonaventure College in Olean, N. Y.

Bach is married and has a daughter, Joanne.

WALTER KIESLING

(Assistant Coach)

Walter Kiesling, the self-styled "old man" of the Pittsburgh Steelers coaching staff, celebrates his twenty-ninth season in professional football this year. He was born in St. Paul, Minn., and is a graduate of St. Thomas College.

The 50-year-old mentor started his pro career 29 years ago with a team known as the Duluth Eskimos.

Big Kies, as he is known to his associates, has compiled a creditable record both as a player and a coach in organized football. He has played and coached with some of the all-time greats in the game.

After two seasons with the Eskimos, he shifted his lineman talents to the Pottsville (Pa.) eleven. Then he spent five seasons with the Chicago Cardinals, two with the Chicago Bears and one with the Green Bay Packers. In 1932, while playing with the Cards, he was named all-league tackle.

He first came to Pittsburgh in 1937 to join the staff of fabulous Johnny Blood, who was then player-coach of the Pittsburgh team. When Blood stepped out in 1939, Kiesling took over as head coach of the Steelers and in 1942, his team just missed winning the eastern championship.

In 1943, he served as co-coach of the Phil-Pitt combine and in 1944, he held a similar post when the Cardinals and Steelers merged. He then returned to the Packers as an assistant coach and remained in Green Bay until returning to Pittsburgh, where he resides with his wife.

CHARLES CHERUNDOLO

(Assistant Coach)

Time finally caught up with Charles (Chuck) Cherundolo, one of the best-known and most popular football players ever to hitch up a Pittsburgh Steeler uniform.

After ten seasons of active player service in the National League, the affable athlete from Old Forge (Pa.) made good a three-year threat and resigned at the end of the 1948 season. Immediately, he was offered and accepted an assistant coaching berth with the Steelers.

Cherundolo first gained national football fame in the late thirties when he was selected for the center post on most All-America elevens. At the time, Charley was playing for his alma mater, Penn State.

In 1937, he signed a pro contract with the Cleveland Rams, a club which since has switched its franchise to Los Angeles. He was with the Rams through the 1939 season and then was traded to the Philadelphia Eagles.

In 1941, he joined the Pittsburgh Steelers and during the 1942 campaign, he entered military service with the Navy. He returned to Pittsburgh in 1945 and played until his retirement in 1948.

Always ranked as a top center both in the college and pro ranks, Cherundolo, now 38, moves into the coaching field and already a number of outstanding observers have tabbed him as a "gentleman most likely to succeed."

During the off-season, Cherundolo resides in Pittsburgh, where he is a highly successful business executive. He is married and the father of two children.

GENE RONZANI

(Assistant Coach)

The Pittsburgh Steelers and Gene Ronzani, the club's new backfield coach, have a joint celebration this fall. Both will mark their 22nd season in the National Football League.

Back in 1933, Art Rooney, then and still president of the Pittsburgh team, was awarded a franchise in the National Football League. At the same time, Ronzani, one of Marquette University's all-time great athletes, was signing a contract to play with George Halas' Chicago Bears.

He began his pro career as a halfback and starred on three championship teams. Operating in the same famed backfield were such never-to-be-forgotten greats as Bronko Nagurski, Beattie Feathers and Carl Brumbaugh.

In 1937, Halas converted the burly Italian boy from Iron Mountain, Mich., to quarterback, a post he held until the arrival of Sid Luckman. In 1939, he was appointed head coach of the Newark Bears, then a Chicago farm club, but Halas recalled him to active duty when Luckman was ordered into the Coast Guard in 1943.

Later, he was named headmaster of the Akron Bear farm club and in 1947 was named backfield assistant and quarterback coach with the parent organization.

Eventually, the Green Bay Packers, searching for a young head coach, tapped Ronzani for the job. That was 1950. He remained in Packerland for four semesters.

He is 45 years old and single.

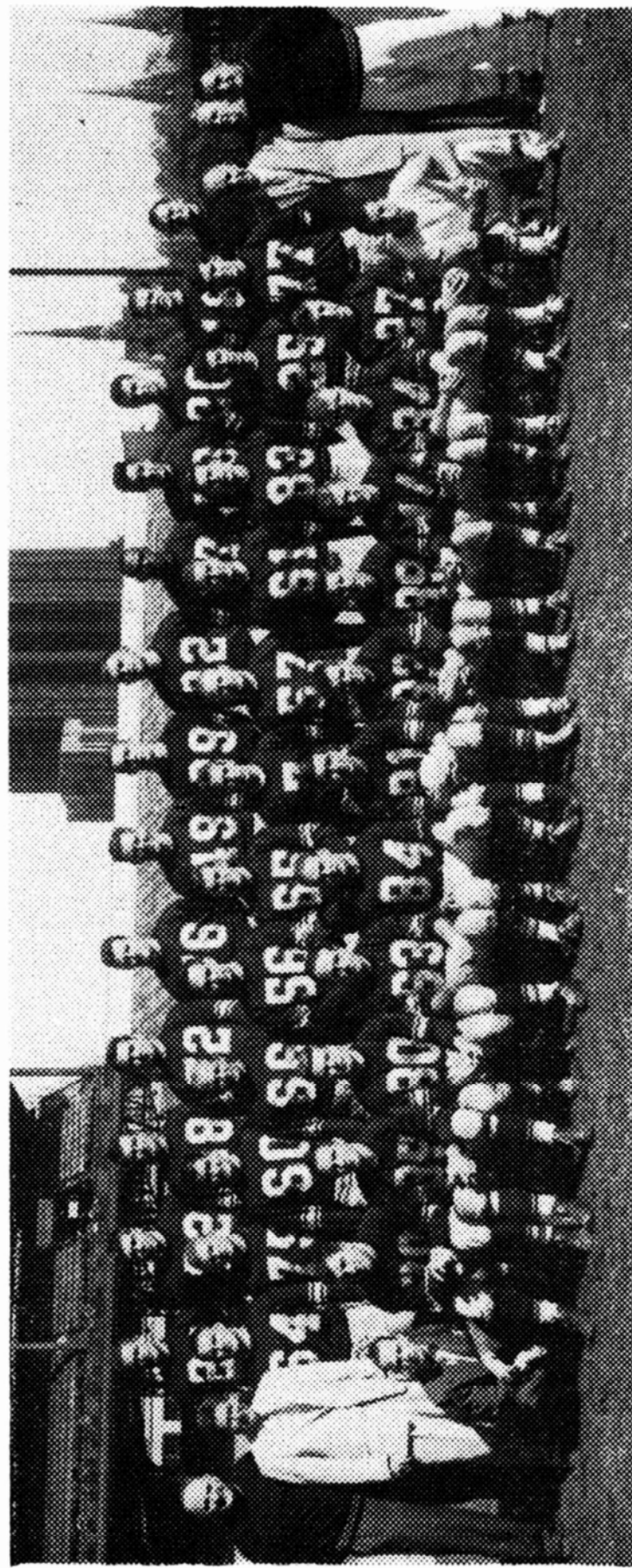

PRESS, RADIO AND TV COVERAGE

Probably no fans in the National Football League get greater and more up-to-the-minute coverage than Pittsburghers. Two of the writers—**JACK SELL** of the Post-Gazette and **TOM BIRKS** of the Sun-Telegraph are on familiar ground whether drawing out the facts from an owner, a coach or a player.

Both have been covering the Steelers for 21 years—since 1933 when **ART ROONEY** obtained a franchise in the football's young major league. Indirectly, both have had a great bearing in helping the league grow into one of football's most enterprising organizations.

In addition, both have the experience and background in reporting and football to give you the most accurate accounts of the National League games played throughout the country.

PAT LIVINGSTON, the Pittsburgh Press reporter, has an unique background for covering professional football. He spent a number of years as public relations director of the Steelers before joining the Press' sports staff.

Thus he understands the football business from both sides of the fence. And, like Tom and Jack, he is on intimate terms with all the owners, players and coaches in the league.

Behind these gentlemen are such sports authorities as **AL ABRAMS**, the Post-Gazette sports editor, who makes it his business to travel about the nation getting the facts on all the top sports events . . . **HARRY KECK**, sports editor of the Sun-Telegraph, who has been keeping the Pittsburgh fans accurately informed for more seasons than he likes to recall . . . and **CHET SMITH**, sports editor of the Press, who ranks as one of the nation's top football experts.

Others keeping tab on the Steelers are **AL TEDERSTROM**, the executive sports editor of the Press; **GIL REMLEY**, the head man on the desk at the Post-Gazette and **PHIL GRABOWSKI**, the Tele's top desk man.

JOE TUCKER, Station WWSW's sports director, handles the play-by-play of the Steelers' games on radio when the team is at Forbes Field and switches to television when the team is on the road. And when Tucker is on TV, **BOB PRINCE**, who normally handles the radio color, becomes the radio play-by-play announcer.

Like the newsmen, both Tucker and Prince have a wealth of experience in sports. Both men spend time in the Steelers' training camp—on the practice field and in the classroom with the players—learning the fundamentals of the Steelers' system. This enables both to speak authoritatively when giving the weekly game accounts.

Other radio sports figures who cover the Steelers are **BILL SUTHERLAND**, who handles the color on numerous occasions. **JOHNNY BOYER**, a former pro player, who works behind Station KDKA's mikes; **PIE TRAYNOR**, Station KQV's man on sports and one of baseball's all-time greats, and **JACK HENRY**, also on KQV. On Television you hear sports figures like **RAY SCOTT** and **NICK PERRY**. And a nod to the wire service gentlemen—**JOE BRADIS** (AP), **RUDY CERNKOVIC** (UP) and **JOHN GO-LIGHTLY** (INS)—whose Steeler stories are carried coast-to-coast.

You often hear people say "Pittsburgh is the greatest sports town in America." It is. And these sports writers, radiocasters and TV-men play a vital part in making the world's most progressive city so sports conscious.
