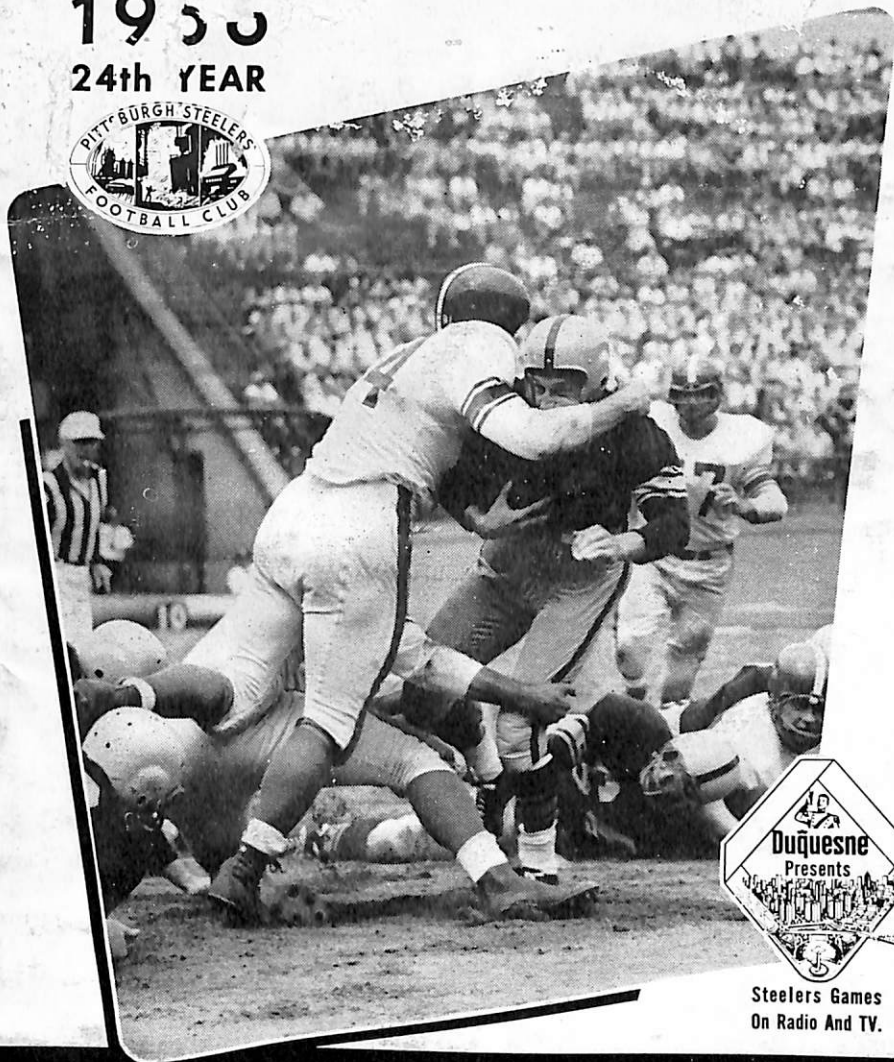

THE STEELERS SEASON BOOK PLAN

Season Books:

You can purchase a book of six tickets for all the Steelers home games any time from the end of the season right up through the first week of September.

Naturally, the best seats are secured if you get your season ticket early. All 1955 season ticket holders may hold their same location or reserve their right for a better spot by renewing their order right after the season, or before the deadline of each year.

Season Books are priced at \$22.00 for seats in first tier reserved, second tier reserved and first tier boxes. Second and third tier boxes sell for \$31.20 each seat and some first tier box and reserve seats and left field bleacher reserved seats sell for \$15.00 each.

Single Game:

Tickets for all Steeler home games go on sale simultaneously in the first week of August. Single Game tickets are priced at \$2.00, \$3.00, \$5.00, and \$6.00. (Pre-Season game ticket prices are slightly lower.) All prices include tax.

Gift Certificates:

Season Books of six tickets for all Steeler home games may be secured at the standard prices prevailing above. They make ideal gifts for Christmas, birthdays, anniversaries and all other occasions for young and old alike. Attractive gift certificates are available at all times at no additional cost.

Mail Orders:

Mail orders will be filled promptly if accompanied by money order or check. Be sure to add 35 cents for handling, postage and registry fee.

Tickets for any Steeler out-of-town game may be secured at our ticket offices, 521 Grant Street, one week before scheduled date of game.

COACHING STAFF

WALTER KIESLING (Head Coach)

Come this autumn, the National Football League will celebrate its 37th year of operation.

And for 31 of those 37 seasons, Walter Kiesling, the broad-shouldered, soft-spoken head coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers, has taken an active part in pro football's developments.

Although not one of the founding fathers, Big Kies has devoted the greater part of his 53 years to a game which had its beginnings on the rock-studded sandlots and when the spoils were what itinerant fans put in the hat. Today, thanks to many Walter Kieslings, the sport has developed into a solvent, big league operation.

Kiesling grew up in St. Paul, Minnesota. He was a good, all-around athlete and he was bigger than all the other kids. He developed into a great high school football star and was offered a chance to play at Notre Dame.

But his mother felt that South Bend, Indiana, was too far from the Twin Cities and Kies entered St. Thomas College in his own backyard. He was a standout in both football and baseball and, for a time, it looked like he would devote his full talents to Abner Doubleday's game.

Upon graduation, he moved along rapidly in baseball and shortly found himself the property of Minneapolis in the fast American Association, one step below the major leagues. He was a first baseman.

Kies recalls that everything was going along smoothly until some smart pitcher found he couldn't hit the curve. And, as soon as the word got around, Kies packed his bag and returned to football.

His first football job was with the Duluth Eskimos. He spent two seasons there before moving to Pottsville, Pennsylvania.

Then, he spent five seasons with the Chicago Cardinals, two with the Chicago Bears, and one with the Green Bay Packers. In 1932, while playing with the Cards, he was named all-league tackle.

He first came to Pittsburgh in 1937 to join forces with the legendary Johnny Blood, who was then player-coach of the Roneyemen. When Blood stepped out in 1939, Kies took over as head coach and in 1942, his team just missed winning the Eastern championship.

In 1943, he served as co-coach of the Phil-Pitt combine and in 1944, he held a similar post when the Cardinals and Steelers merged. He then returned to the Packers as an assistant coach and remained in Green Bay until returning to Pittsburgh in 1949. He worked as an assistant coach until just before the beginning of the 1954 campaign when he was given the head master duties once again.

CHARLES CHERUNDOLO

(Assistant Coach)

It almost would be impossible for the Pittsburgh Steelers to start the season if Charles (Chuck) Cherundolo wasn't around. He first became associated with professional football in 1937 and, aside from a tour of wartime duty in the Navy, has been active in the National League ever since.

He first played with the Cleveland Rams and the Philadelphia Eagles before coming to Pittsburgh in 1941. He came here first as a great center and later as a coach.

Easily one of the most popular athletes ever to play with the Steelers, Cherundolo made good a three-year threat to quit at the end of the 1948 season. Immediately he was offered a job as an assistant coach.

A native of Old Forge, Pa., he first gained football fame in the late thirties when he was selected as the center of most All-America teams. At the time, he was playing for Penn State.

In 1937 he signed a pro contract with the Cleveland Rams, a club which since has switched its franchise to Los Angeles. He was traded to the Eagles and then to Pittsburgh.

During the off-season, Cherundolo now resides in Pittsburgh, where he is a partner in a very successful business enterprise. He is married and the father of two children.

NICK SKORICH

(Assistant Coach)

Most of the football authorities who know Nick Skorich rate him as a fellow with a great future in this strange business of x's and o's.

Nick made his first impression in the professional league back in 1946 when the late Dr. Jock Sutherland was the Pittsburgh Steelers' head coach.

Skorich was small. He was about five-eight and weighed only 200 pounds. Hardly any weight at all for a guard. But he caught the Doctor's eye with his hard work and, more important, his mastery of the intricate Sutherland system.

"Some day," Jock said, "this young fellow will be a great coach. Not only does he know his own assignments, but he is familiar with every other assignment. He works at this game."

When Skorich retired as an active player, he became head coach at Central Catholic High School in Pittsburgh and within a short time had the city's championship team.

For one season, Skorich was the head coach at Rensselaer Polytechnical College. He left there in 1954 to join the Steelers. In addition to his coaching duties, he also is rated a top scout.

He's married and the father of two youngsters.

BILL DUDLEY

(Assistant Coach)

Perhaps, in future years, another player will come along and unseat him but, at the moment, Bill Dudley remains the greatest all-time player in the Pittsburgh Steelers' twenty-four year history.

Now, after a ten-year lapse, he returns to his favorite city. This time he will act as an assistant to head coach Walter Kiesling who, incidentally, was Dudley's headmaster when he first broke into the National League in 1942. Specifically, he will be in charge of the backfield.

In 1941, as a 19-year-old collegian, Dudley led the football world in scoring and was the University of Virginia's first All-American player.

The Steelers selected him No. 1 in the 1942 draft but it was not a unanimous choice. A lot of the football experts—and they are legion—scoffed at drafting a player from a school that was not ranked very high in football circles. Besides the dissenters reasoned, he was really a little fellow for the pro league. Only five-feet-ten and 170 pounds.

His playing career now is over but his record and feats remain, many of which cannot be told properly by the cold statistic. Twice he led the league in ground gaining. He was a great defensive back, maybe the best in the league. He won games with his punting, his place-kicking and his field goal artistry.

All this is written down in the records. But not etched in the records were the intangibles—his unshakeable confidence, his terrific desire.

In addition to his ten years in the pro league, with three years out for military service, Dudley has been working as a Coach.

He spent a period as player-coach with the Washington Redskins. Worked as an assistant at both Yale and his alma mater, Virginia, before returning to Pittsburgh.

He now lives in Lynchburg, Va., and is rated as one of the top young insurance executives in the nation.

BILL McPEAK

(Assistant Coach)

The youngest member of the Pittsburgh Steelers' coaching staff is Bill McPeak, a fellow still in his twenties who operates as a player-coach.

Actually, when McPeak isn't playing his defensive end position, he spends his time working with the defensive linemen. During the off-season, he moves around the country scouting college talent.

Originally, McPeak was drafted, signed and then released by the Cleveland Browns. Paul Brown still refers to the release of McPeak as one of his big football blunders.

He came to the Steelers in 1949 and almost immediately became a first-string end. Prior to that he was one of the few bright stars to play at the University of Pittsburgh during that period when athletes were de-emphasized.

An exceptionally intelligent player, McPeak is expected to develop into one of the better coaches of the future. But he expects to remain on the active roster for a few more seasons before devoting his full-time to coaching.

Twice named to the All-American teams and twice captain of the Pitt teams, McPeak completes a coaching staff that comprises all former Steeler players.

RUSS CRAFT

(Assistant Coach)

For a boy who was born in tiny McEwan, Tennessee, Russ Craft has come a long way.

He spent ten years as a player in the National Football League, retiring at the end of the 1954 season. This fall he returns to the league in the role of an assistant coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Craft played at the University of Alabama and graduated in time to spend 38 months as an active campaigner in World War II.

When the war ended, Craft joined the Philadelphia Eagles. During the first three seasons, he worked with the offensive platoon, but was overshadowed somewhat by big Steve Van Buren, perhaps one of the great all-time runners in football.

Then he was shifted to the defensive unit and before long, Greasy Neale, his coach, was calling Craft "the smartest and quickest defensive back I ever saw."

Last fall, the Steelers were weakest in the secondary defense. A lot of top collegiate defensive backs were drafted to correct this weakness. Craft's main duty will be to build these youngsters into a unit good enough to play in football's toughest league.

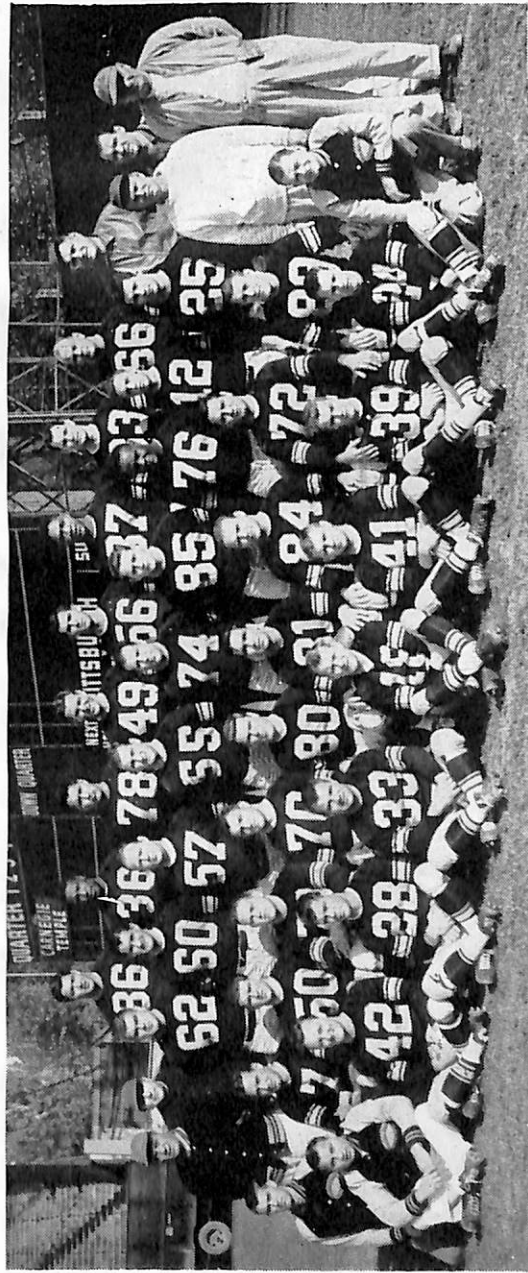

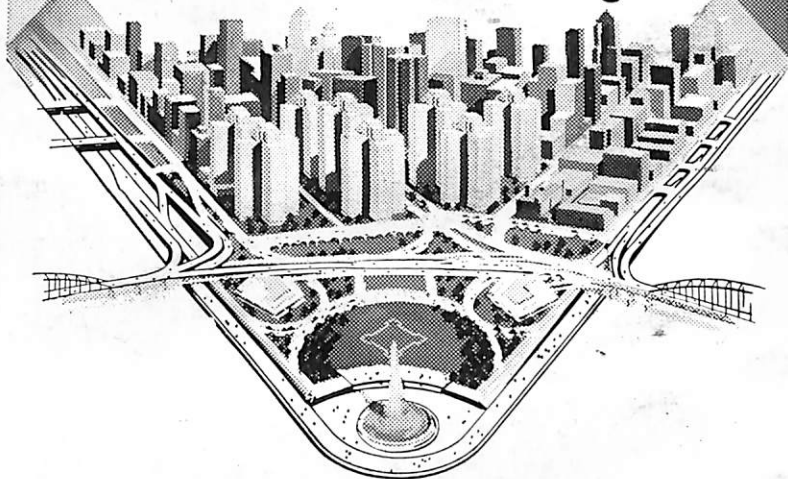
