COACH

BUDDY PARKER, Head Coach

Started as a player in 1935, became player coach with Chicago Cardinals in 1943. Remained as Jimmy Conzelman's assistant coach and became head coach midway of 1949 season, splitting year with Phil Handler.

Moved to Detroit as an assistant under the late Bo McMillin in 1950 and became head coach in 1951. In six years with Lions, Parker coached three Western conference and two world championship teams. The Lions' over-all record during his tenure was 45-23-2 in regular league play and 3-1 in conference championships.

The 1962 Steelers enjoyed their best finish in Parker's nine seasons here, posting a 9-5 record and finishing second in the Eastern conference. They subsequently dropped a 17-10 decision to the Lions in the third annual Playoff Bowl. The 1963 club, however, actually, came closer; although finishing fourth, with a 7-4-3 record, the Steelers could have won the conference title by defeating New York in the final game. The Steelers are 51-47-6 in the regular season games under Parker.

Parker's coaching record in the NFL, counting the 6-5-1 record the Chicago Cards posted in 1949 under both Parker and Handler, is 102-75-9 in regular season play and 3-2 in post-season games.

Born December 16, 1913 in Slaton, Texas. Played halfback at Centenary college. Lives in Pittsburgh with his wife, Jane, and son, Bob.

ASSISTANT COACHES

MIKE NIXON

Came to the Steelers after serving as head coach of the Washington Redskins. Was an assistant here under Dr. Jock Sutherland and Johnny Michelosen. He played with the Brooklyn Dodgers and also coached the then Chicago Cardinals. He was an All-American at Pitt and coached both there and West Virginia. He once was a member of the Pennsylvania Legislature. He was born Nov. 21, 1911. Is married and has a daughter. Lives in Mt. Lebanon, Pa.



LAVERN "TORGY" TORGESON

Was an all-pro linebacker five times. He started with Detroit and finished with the Redskins. A damaged knee ended his playing days in 1958. Tried to play again in 1959 but when the knee failed to respond to treatment, he joined Bill McPeak's coaching staff. Moved, with his wife and two daughters to Pittsburgh three years ago. He was born February 28, 1929.



JIM DORAN

A former Detroit Lions great who played for Buddy Parker in 1951 through 1957, the year Parker left Detroit. He finished up his Detroit days in 1959 when he went to Dallas and played the 1960 and '61 seasons. Was out of football 1962 and '63 and returned last season as a coach. Helps coach the offensive ends. A graduate of Iowa State. Is a native of Beaver, Iowa, population 80 people. Had a fabulous career as one of the top receivers in the NFL. He was the Most Valuable Player in the Lions title year of 1952; this honor bestowed on him by his teammates. Married a Pittsburgh girl last year. Lives in Paton, Iowa. Birthdate, August 11, 1927.





BOBBY LAYNE

One of football's all-time great players and quarterbacks. Played with the Chicago Bears, the New York Bulldogs, the Detroit Lions and the Pittsburgh Steelers. He played 15 seasons and established more records than can be listed here. He played in 175 games, more than any other player in National Football League history. Was a great college athlete at the University of Texas. He now lives in Lubbock, Texas, with his wife, Carol and two boys. Birthday: Dec. 19, 1927.



TOM KEANE

A native West Virginian who spent the past couple of seasons doubling as head coach and general manager of the Wheeling Ironmen in United Football League. Was a war-time freshman on the Unbeaten Ohio State team, spent a couple of years in the Navy and then returned to star at the University of West Virginia. Played professionally with the Los Angeles Rams, the defunct Dallas Texans and the Baltimore Colts. Also served as a coach with the Chicago Cardinals. He is married and has a family of two boys and a girl. He was born on September 7, 1926.



ERNE HEFFERLE

Has coached football at all levels—high school, college and the pros. He started this career at a Western Pennsylvania high school, worked at both Boston College and the University of Pittsburgh, and received his professional baptism with the Washington Redskins. The 1965 season is his first with the Steelers. He operates with the offensive unit, concentrating his activities with the receivers. He holds a Masters Degree from the University of Pittsburgh. He lives in Monroeville, Pa. with his wife and three daughters. Birthday—January 12, 1915.

STEELERS' TRAINER

ROGER D. MCGILL

Joined the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1962 as head trainer. And he brought with him 15 years of experience. He also brings with him a Masters Degree in Education and a therapy degree from Veterans Hospital. He started his career as an assistant to trainer, Howard Waite at the University of Pittsburgh. A former Marine, he is married and is the father of two youngsters. He succeeds Dr. Raymond Sweeney.

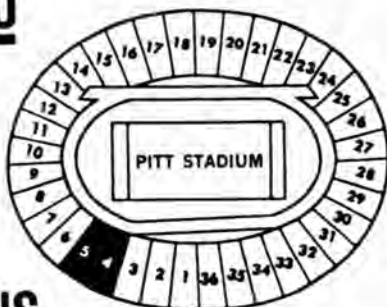

Russell, a hustling rookie, took over the middle linebacker post and looked like a seasoned veteran. Married and lives in Ladue, Missouri.

University of Maryland

Attempting to cut upfield to block, Sandusky suffered a severe knee sprain in last year's first Eagle game and was out for the remainder of the season. Underwent surgery for correction of knee injury and hopefully, is sound now. Drafted by San Francisco, he was traded to the Steelers along with Earl Morrall. Morrall has since gone on to Detroit but Sandusky remained to become one of the best in the league and Steeler history.
