COACH

BILL AUSTIN, Head Coach

Most football authorities who know Bill Austin rate him as a promising young man with a bright future in this hazardous occupation of football coaching. Austin starts his life as a head coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers this year. He will be the fourteenth headmaster in the Steelers' 34-year history in the National Football League.

And he comes with a wealth of experience. He's a Californian who first began thinking seriously of football as a career when he gained some fame as a lineman with Oregon State in the late forties.

The New York Giants drafted him in 1949 and he played two seasons before serving a hitch in the service. He returned to play with the Giants from 1953 through 1957. His coach, Jim Lee Howell, called him the "best offensive guard in the league." He received his baptism in coaching at Wichita University in 1958 when he signed on as a line coach with Woody Woodward. The following year he joined Vince Lombardi, who was starting his dynasty at Green Bay. He was the offensive line coach there until 1964. He spent one year as an assistant coach in Los Angeles. Austin was born October 28, 1928 in San Pedro, California, but he and his wife now make their home in Pittsburgh.

ASSISTANT COACHES

LAVERN "TORGY" TORGESON, Defensive Coach

Lavern "Torgy" Torgeson, who spent eight years as a linebacker and five time an All NFL Pro selectee, has charge of the Steelers entire defensive unit.

He first came to the Steelers in 1962 as an assistant to Buddy Parker and now is the oldest coach in the point of service.

He was the Detroit Lions' fifth draft pick in 1951 and was cocaptain of some of the Auto City's greatest championship teams. He finished his playing career with the Washington Redskins and turned to coaching when a damaged knee put him out of action.

"Torgy" played at Washington State and since 1951, he has been associated with the National Football League, either as a player or a coach. He now resides in Pittsburgh with his wife and two daughters. He was born February 28, 1929,



TOM FLETCHER, Defensive Backfield Coach

It took Tom Fletcher a little while but he finally made it to the National Football League. He joins the Steeler staff as coach of the defensive backs.

He first tried his hand with the pros back in 1953. He went to camp with the San Francisco 49ers but a serious ankle injury during the pre-season cut short his career. He quit for a season and tried again with the New York Giants but the ankle injury was chronic. He then joined the Arizona State staff as an assistant to Clyde Smith and stayed on when Dan Devine moved to the head coaching post. Later, Fletcher moved with Devine to Missouri before joining the Steelers in 1966.

He was a halfback along with former Steeler John Henry Johnson, at St. Mary's and when the California college dropped football, both players switched to Arizona State.

He was born November 3, 1928. He is married and has two daughters.



DON HEINRICH, Offensive Backfield Coach



A Young man with ten years experience in the National Football League handles the offensive backfield for the Steelers. He is Don Heinrich, the former University of Washington All American who spent six years as guarterback with the New York Giants. A brilliant diagnostician of defense, Heinrich was the nation's leading collegiate passer in both the 1950 and 1952 seasons. Five of his six years in pro ball were spent under Vince Lombardi, then the Giants offensive coach.

He worked a season for Tom Landry at Dallas and then returned to New York to handle the offensive backfield. He rounded out his education as an assistant with the Los Angeles Rams and then helped to establish the Atlanta Falcons' scouting system.

He was born September 19, 1931, is married and the father of four youngsters.

LEON McLAUGHLIN, Offensive Line Coach

Leon McLaughlin, former star center for UCLA and the Los Angeles Rams, has charge of the Steelers' offensive line.

McLaughlin came to Pittsburgh from the Stanford football staff. He had been there since 1959,

He graduated from UCLA in 1950 and played on the 1946 Bruin team which met Illinois in the Rose Bowl in the opening game of the Pacific Coast Conference—Big Ten post-season series.

He joined the Los Angeles Rams in 1951 and was a standout center until 1955. He played on the 1951 Championship team and the 1955 divisional winner. Prior to his work at Stanford, he worked at the high school level and at Washington State University. He was born May 30, 1925 in Santa Monica, Calif. He is married and the father of four youngsters.



HUGH "BONES" TAYLOR, End Coach

Hugh Taylor has charge of the Steelers' offensive ends. You may know him better as "Bones" Taylor. He and Sammy Baugh caused a great deal of trouble in the National Football League a few years back.

Taylor played with the Washington Redskins from 1947 to 1954, and he was a rather busy fellow. He caught 272 passes for 5,233 yards and 58 touchdowns, something no Redskin has done before or since.

In the intervening years he has been a head coach at Arkansas State and the Houston Oilers. He also labored as an assistant at Florida State, the New York Jets and San Diego.

Born in Wynne, Arkansas on July 7, 1923; is married and has four daughters.



STEELERS' TRAINER

ROGER D. McGILL

Joined the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1962 as Head Trainer. He brought with him 15 years of experience along with a Masters Degree in Education and a Therapy degree from Veterans hospital. He started his career as an assistant to Howard Waite, former trainer at the University of Pittsburgh. A former Marine, Roger fis married and has two sons and a daughter. He is past president of the Eastern Athletic Trainers Association. He and his family reside in Mt. Lebanon, Pa.


