STEELER HISTORY

In their 48th year, the Pittsburgh Steelers can become the first team in pro football history to make the playoffs nine straight seasons. Entering this season, they share the record of eight with Dallas (1966-73). The 1980 Steelers also have the opportunity to become the first team to win three straight Super Bowls and only the third team to ever win three NFL titles in a row.

Last season Pittsburgh won an unprecedented fourth Super Bowl. It was the second time the Steelers have won two Super Bowls in a row and their total of four is twice as many as any other team. Since their playoff string began in 1972, they have compiled a 88-27-1 (.763) record which is

the best in the NFL during that period.

The Steelers were founded in 1933 by Art Rooney and today are the fifth oldest team in the NFL. Until 1940 the team nickname was the Pi-

rates

Mr. Rooney was born in Coultersville, Pa. on January 26, 1901 and moved to Pittsburgh with his family when he was a year and a half old. He spent his boyhood on the site which Three Rivers Stadium now occupies and still lives just a five minute walk from the Steelers' home field.

He was an outstanding athlete and excelled in football, baseball and boxing. Knute Rockne wanted him to play at Notre Dame but he attended Indiana State (Pa.), Georgetown and Duquesne. In baseball he was signed by the Boston Red Sox and Chicago Cubs. An arm injury ended his major league ambitions. He was selected to represent the United States

on the Olympic boxing team.

For the Steelers and other pro football teams, the early years were a struggle as they competed with major league baseball, then the national pastime, and college football, the more established and popular version of the gridiron sport. The Steelers played their home games at Forbes Field but often it was necessary to take the game to the fans. It was not unusual for home games to be held in places such as Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, Louisville and New Orleans.

In 1938 Mr. Rooney shocked the sports world by signing Colorado All America Whizzer White to a contract calling for \$15,800, an unheard of sum at that time in pro football. The NFL's first big-money player is now

United States Supreme Court Justice Byron White.

It was not until 1942 that the Steelers had their first winning season. Sparked by rookie halfback Bill Dudley, a genuine triple threat who is now in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, they compiled a 7-4 record and finished second in the Eastern Division.

But this success was short-lived and the nucleus of a promising team was soon in the military. Because of the manpower shortage created by World War II, the Steelers combined forces with the Philadelphia Eagles in

1943 and the Chicago Cardinals the next season.

After the war the Steelers made another major move in an attempt to bring Pittsburgh a winner when Jock Sutherland was appointed head coach in 1946. Dr. Sutherland had become a legend in the city coaching the University of Pittsburgh.

Utilizing the single wing offense, he quickly had the Steelers headed in the right direction and they tied for the divisional title in 1947 before losing

a playoff to Philadelphia.

Again fate was unkind to the Steelers when Sutherland died unexpectedly while on a scouting trip in the spring of 1948. He was succeeded by John Michelosen.

An era ended in 1952 when Joe Bach began his second term as the team's coach and the Steelers became the last pro club to abandon the single wing. Bach had the Steelers playing more exciting football and improved their performance to .500 in 1953 when he resigned because of failing health.

For the third time, Rooney called on his long-time friend, Walt Kiesling, to take over. He held forth until Buddy Parker arrived from Detroit in 1957

and gave Pittsburgh its best professional football until the present era. With the flamboyant Bobby Layne joining his former coach in 1958, the Steelers went 7-4-1 and started a string of four winning seasons in six years. However, they fell short of a title although the 1963 team could have delivered one if it had won its final game against the New York Giants.


In 1964 Art Rooney, Sr. was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. At about the same time, a transition was beginning to take shape in the front office. Dan and Art, Jr., the oldest of Mr. Rooney's five sons,

became active in the organization on a full-time basis.

As youngsters both had performed menial duties in training camp and their life spans actually parallelled that of the Steelers. Dan's first formal assignment was selling ads and editing the program. Art, Jr. worked in the ticket office, specializing in group sales.

At 48 Dan is one of the most able and respected executives in sports. He currently serves on the three-member Executive Committee of NFL Properties and the same body of the Management Council and is on the

STEELER COACHES



CHUCK NOLL

Head Coach

Chuck Noll is one of the most successful coaches in National Football League history. He is one of only four who have won four league championships. He and Vince Lombardi, who won five, are the only coaches to do it in the modern post-World War II era of the sport.

Now in his 12th season with the Steelers, the 48-year old Noll has the best record of any coach in the league since 1972. His teams have com-piled a 88-27-1 (.763) regular season mark during this eight-year period and have made the playoffs in each of those seasons, winning the division title outright six times and tying for it in two other years. He can set a new pro football record in 1980 by making the playoffs for the ninth straight time, a mark he currently shares with Tom Landry of Dallas (1966-73).

In postseason play, Noll has a phenomenal 14-4 ((.778) record which is topped only by Lombardi's 9-1 (.900). Chuck has won four Super Bowls, twice as many as any other coach. He and Lombardi are the only coaches

who have been in that classic more than once without losing.

In 1979, Noll became the 14th pro coach to win 100 regular season games. His overall record is 100-57-1 (.636). If you include postseason games he is 114-61-1 (.651), which elevates him to 12th place and just

nine victories out of tenth.

If Noll can win his fifth Super Bowl this season, it will enable the Steelers to match Green Bay's incredible string of five championships in seven years, an accomplishment considered the most outstanding team feat in pro football history. Another title would enable him to become the third coach to win three straight league championships. Curly Lambeau (1929-31) and Lombardi (1965-76) are the others.

The 1980 season is Noll's 28th straight year in professional football. His NFL career began in 1953 when he was selected on the 21st round of the player draft by his hometown Cleveland Browns. He played seven years with them, three as a guard and four as a linebacker. He was on five teams that won Eastern Conference titles and two of those went on to capture NFL championships. At 27, he prematurely retired as a player to go into coaching, which had been his ultimate goal. When a position at the University of Dayton, his alma mater, did not materialize, he was the last man added to Sid Gillman's staff with the Los Angeles (now San Diego) Chargers who were being formed in 1960 to play in the new American Football League. In his six years as a defensive assistant with the Chargers, they won five division titles and two AFL crowns.

In 1966 he returned to the NFL in Baltimore as a defensive aide to Don

Shula. In three years there the Colts lost just seven regular season games and won the NFL championship in 1968 before losing Super Bowl III to the New York Jets.

In 1969 Noll became the 14th man to coach the Steelers. The team had only four winning seasons in 19 years, and had only 18 victories in the

previous five seasons.

The new Steelers' coach committed himself to building his team through the annual college drafts, and last season every player on the Steelers was a home-grown product, either selected in the draft or signed as a free agent immediately following the draft.

This has been the major factor in Noll's success. He and the efficient Steeler personnel department have done an excellent job in acquiring top-flight talent, and Noll has been patient enough to let it mature and

levelop.

One of Noll's greatest assets is his ability and desire to teach. Unlike many of his contemporaries, he enjoys this phase of his profession more than any other. This has been another key to his and the team's success. The tedious process of working on a man-to-man basis with players ap-

peals to his teaching instincts.

Noll seldom makes trades. In the early years of his Steeler tenure, he resisted the temptation to make deals, some of which probably would have brought the team closer to respectability, but no closer to the ultimate objective of a championship. The Steelers have not made a trade in which they acquired a player since the spring of 1978 and during Chuck's 12 years in Pittsburgh, have made just five deals of this nature. His usual pattern is to trade expendable players for future draft choices. As a result, 13 players on the active roster at Super Bowl time last season were players drafted with extra picks.

Noll is very flexible in his strategy and has won in a variety of ways. He has played to his team's strengths and personnel. In the early winning years, the Steelers' success was basically the result of one of the greatest defenses in pro football history which was combined with a conservative ball-control offense. As the offense matured and rule changes were legislated that made it easier to throw the football, the style and image of the team was altered to capitalize on these changes. Now the offense has

great balance and striking power, and with some player turnover on de-

fense in recent seasons, this unit still remains among the best.

Noll's original task was not an easy one and success was not immediate. His initial act was drafting Joe Greene, which provided the nucleus of the great defense that followed. In his first season, the team won its opening game and lost the next 13. This gave the Steelers the first choice in the 1970 draft, which they used to pick Terry Bradshaw, who became the foundation of a potent offense. The record improved to 5-9 that year and to 6-8 in 1971.

In 1972 the Steelers surprised the pro football world with an 11-3 record, the best in the team's history, which earned them their first division They beat Oakland on a miraculous last-second touchdown in an opening round playoff game before losing in the AFC Championship game to Miami which went on to win its first Super Bowl. Noll was named AFC

Coach of the Year by UPI.

The following season the Steelers made the playoffs again as a wild-

card team before being eliminated by Oakland in the first round.

After posting the best regular season record in the league at 12-2 in 1974, the Steelers reached Noll's goal of an NFL championship. The march to the title was highlighted by one of the most incredible defensive performances ever, when Oakland was held to 29 yards rushing in the AFC title game and Minnesota to 17 in Super Bowl IX. Chuck became the third coach to win back-to-back Super Bowls the following season when the Steelers came from behind to beat Dallas in Super Bowl X.

After losing four of their first five games in 1976, Noll rallied his team to win ten in a row. However, the Steelers first bid to win three straight NFL titles fell short when they lost to Oakland in the championship game. Football News honored Chuck as its NFL Coach of the Year. The next year they lost to Denver in the first round of the playoffs, only the second

time in eight years that has happened.

The Steelers again registered the league's best record of 14-2 in 1978 and became the first of the three teams that had won back-to-back Super Bowls to come back with an unprecedented third victory. They overcame a Dallas lead to defeat the Cowboys in Super Bowl XIII. It was the highest scoring Super Bowl ever and the most exciting to that point.

Last season their 12-4 mark was again the NFL's best, and they topped their performance of the previous year in Super Bowl XIV by rallying for 14 points in the fourth quarter to win their fourth SB title and their second pair

of back-to-back victories in the big game.

Most of Chuck's day-to-day responsibilities involve the offense. He is in reality the offensive coordinator, working with the quarterbacks in meetings and practices. He also coaches the special teams.

By nature, he is a low-profile type and derives as much satisfaction in the daily routine of football as he does from the excitement of the games. He is a private person with the ability to relate well on a face-to-face basis. His relationship with his players is one of mutual respect but he can be

tough when necessary.

Away from football, Chuck has a wide variety of interests which are unusual in their scope but truly reflect the type person he is. He is wellread and conversant on a myriad of subjects. He has his own plane which he utilizes to scout college players. His hobbies are golf, tennis, scuba diving, photography, gardening and he enjoys classical music. He is a wine connoisseur and food gourmet.

Chuck was born in Cleveland on January 5, 1932. He and his wife Marianne have a 22 year old son, Chris, who is a graduate student at

Brown University.

ROLLIE DOTSCH Offensive Line Coach

In just his second season as Offensive Line Coach, Rollie Dotsch did a tremendous job in 1979 under very difficult conditions.

In spite of injuries to several starters and their backups, the Steeler offensive line ranked high in all categories as the team had the best rushing average in the NFL and gave up the third fewest QB sacks in the

AFC.

A testimony to Rollie's coaching ability was the play of the young replacements. They performed like veterans and maintained their poise through a series of important, pressure games.

Dotsch came into the league in 1971 with Green Bay as the offensive line coach. After four seasons there, he went to New England in 1975 to work with the linebackers and took the same position with Detroit for a year before joining the Steelers in 1978. In his two years in Pittsburgh, the team has won the Super Bowl twice.

Rollie is the only Steeler assistant who has head coaching experience at the college level. From 1966-70 he compiled a 33-15-1 record at Northern Michigan where he was also the Athletic Director. Prior to that he had been an assistant there, at Colorado and Missouri.

A graduate of Michigan State, Rollie lettered three years as a two-way lineman and played on the 1952 national championship team. He majored in History and earned his master's at Michigan in Secondary Education

gan in Secondary Education.
The 47-year-old Dotsch is a native of Escanaba, Michigan where he began his coaching career in 1956 at the high school level. He and his wife Carol have two daughters, Helen (19) and Molly (4), and one son, Michael (24).



DICK HOAK Offensive Backfield Coach

Offensive backfield coach Dick Hoak is the only Steeler assistant who played pro football and brings to coaching the same outstanding qualities he possessed as a player for ten years in the NFL. He is intelligent and low-key and is a good teacher who has an excellent rapport with the players.

Since joining the staff in 1972 he has developed the team's running backs into a versatile and productive unit. Last year he did a superb job in using his personnel, parwith the Bleierticularly Thornton tandem. The team led the NFL in average yards per rushing attempt and the three top backs not only had high averages but each set career marks for pass receptions. He has been instrumental in helping to make Franco Harris one of the greatest runners of all-time and was one of the first to recognize his great potential.

Dick was a halfback and quarterback at Penn State and was selected on the seventh round of the prodraft. He was used only as a running back with the Steelers from 1961-70. He was a complete player and a very resourceful one. He is the team's third leading rusher of all-time with 3,965 yards and was also an outstanding receiver and passer.

His best season was 1968 when he gained 858 yards to rank fourth in the NFL. He played in the Pro Bowl and was named to the All Eastern Conference team. He was selected as Pittsburgh's outstanding sports figure by the Dapper Dan Club.

Dick is a native of Jeannette, Pa. and will be 38 in December. He and his wife Lynn have two daughters, Kelly (15) and Katie (12), and a son, Richard (8). They live in Greensburg.



TOM MOORE Receiver Coach

The Steeler receiving corps is one of the best in the history of pro football and has played a major role in the team's success, especially the last two years. The man behind the individual and collective accomplishments of this group is Re-ceiver Coach Tom Moore.

Now in his fourth year with the Steelers, Tom arrived as the team was changing its offensive philosophy and was instrumental in the successful transition to a more wide open style of play. The key was the passing game and during the period since then the Steelers have had the ability to score from anywhere through the air.

In addition to tutoring the receivers, Tom has contributed greatly to the weekly game plan and in this position has been able to maximize the potential of the

passing game.
The Steeler post is his second stint in pro football. In 1974, between assignments at the University of Minnesota, he was an offensive aide with the World Football League's New York Stars

began his coaching He career in 1961 as the freshman coach at lowa, his alma mater, where he lettered three years and played on the Big 10 titlist in 1958. After two years in coaching, he went into the Army for two more. From 1965-68 he was the offensive coordinator at Dayton. He filled the same position at Wake Forest for a year and spent another season at Georgia Tech as backfield coach. In 1972-73 he was at Minnesota and returned in 1975-76.

A native of Owatonna, Minn., Tom was an All America high school quarterback in Rochester. He will be 41 in November. He and his wife Willy have a daughter, Terry (15), and a son,

Thomas (10).



GEORGE PERLES Assistant Head Coach

As the assistant head coach, George Perles has a wide range of responsibilities. In addition to his primary duty as the defensive line coach, he relieves Chuck Noll of part of his workload by handling some administrative tasks. In this role he complements the head coach well and it still enables him to utilize his unique ability to relate to people, especially the players.

George joined Steelers in 1972 and the team has made the playoffs every year since. At the time, the defensive line was the key to the Steeler success. It was his ability to fully de-velop this talented unit that was primarily responsible for establishing the team's incredible winning pattern. Since then he has skillfully made the necessary changes in personnel and strategy to maintain this level of excellence.

In 1978 George was promoted to defensive coordi-nator and the defense re-turned to its championship level. Last year he became first assistant head coach ever for the Steelers.

Before going to Michigan State, George spent two years in the Army. In college he was a starting two-way tackle. He earned a master's in Physical Education.

His coaching career began in the high school ranks with a pair of two year stints in Chicago and Detroit, his hometown. His first college job was at Dayton as defensive coordinator in 1965. In 1967 he returned as an assistant at Michigan State and remained there until joining the Steelers.

The 46-year old Perles is a native of Detroit. He and his wife Sally have four children, one daughter, Kath-leen (22) and three sons, Terrence (20), John (17) and

Patrick (16).



PAUL URAM

Conditioning Coach Paul Uram has been with the Steelers since 1972 as flexibility coach and this season takes on the added duties of strength coach. He also works with the special teams and kickers. His new title is Conditioning Coach.

The Steelers have made the playoffs each of the first eight years Paul has been on the staff. One reason for their success has been the limited amount of playing time lost to preventable in-juries which is the intended function of the flexibility program. It has been designed to better prepare athletes for competition through stretching exercises.

Paul was a pioneer in this field and prior to joining the Steelers worked with several football and league baseball teams. He has written a book on the subject which is titled "Refining Human Movement.

As strength coach also, he will continue the fine program instituted by Lou Riecke in 1970. Paul's long background in overall conditioning and his success in the field makes him a natural for the dual role. In both of these capacities, he works with the players daily in training camp and during the season. He tailors an individual flexibility and weight program for each of the players. These programs are particularly helpful for players rehabilitating

Uram was an outstanding athlete in football, track and gymnastics. At Slippery Rock, he lettered in football and track. He has a master's in Physical Education from

At Butler High School, he coached gymnastics football. He is a member of Helms and Western Pennsylvania Halls of Fame.

A native of Butler, Paul and his wife Helen live there with their son, Ron(23).



DICK WALKER Defensive Backfield Coach

Defensive Backfield Coach Dick Walker is one of five former Big 10 assistants with the Steelers and the winning reputation earned in his prior coaching experiences has carried over to Pittsburgh. The Steelers have won two Super Bowls since he was added to the staff in 1978.

In his two years with the team there has been a marked improvement in the secondary. Last year it allowed a completion rate of 47.1%, the lowest in the NFL, and had 27 interceptions to rank third in the AFC. The team is now deeper in the defensive backfield than ever before.

Dick's only previous pro coaching assignment was with New England in 1977 and while he was there the Patriots had one of the NFL's top secondarys. began his career at Cathedral Latin High in Cleveland in 1957 and moved to Watterson High in Columbus. In seven seasons there he compiled a 51-11-3 record and won the state title in 1966.

From there he moved into college coaching and spent 1967-68 as an assistant at Toledo. In 1969 he went to work for Woody Hayes at Ohio State and remained through 1976. The Buckeyes were a perennial national power and won or tied for seven Big 10 titles. Their strength was in their defense and Walker helped develop six All America backs.

Dick lettered three years as a center and linebacker at John Carroll where he ma-jored in History. He was an All Conference choice twice.

Dick is 47. He and his wife Eleanor have two sons, Brad (23), and Tom (17), and a daughter, Kim (20). They live in Upper St. Clair.



WOODY WIDENHOFER Defensive Coordinator

Although he is just 37, Defensive Coordinator Woody Widenhofer is in his eighth season with the Steelers and his 16th year of coaching. His accomplishments are very impressive and he is a prime prospect for a future head coaching post.

Actually his present post is his third assignment with the Steelers. He began as linebacker coach in 1973 and developed the skills of All Pros Jack Ham and Jack Lambert. Shortly after, he brought along the younger players and now Robin Cole and Dennis Winston are on the verge of stardom. In 1978 he took over the entire secondary which resulted in a dramatic improvement.

In Woody's first year as the coordinator last season, the Steeler defense had greater versatility and was more flexible than at any time since the team started winning in 1972. This enabled this unit to overcome a series of injuries and utilize its tremendous depth, a situation he played a major role in creating.

Widenhofer came to the Steelers from the Minnesota where he spent one season as the linebacker coach. That was preceded by a year at Eastern Michigan as the defensive coordinator. His first college post was at Michigan State in 1969-70 where he also earned his master's degree in Physical Education.

An injury at Missouri ended his playing career after he lettered two years as a linebacker and led to coaching. He began with four years at the high school level in Detroit.

Woody spent the first years of his life in Butler, Pa. before moving to Detroit where he was an outstanding high school athlete.



RALPH BERLIN Trainer

Ralph Berlin is the Steelers' head trainer and is in his 13th season with the team. He had previous pro experience with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Ralph was born in Pasadena, California but grew up in Philadelphia. After completing high school, he enlisted in the Marine Corps for three years.

In 1958 at lowa State, Berlin's playing career was shortened by a knee injury.

After finishing college as a physical education major, Ralph went into training on a full-time basis at DePauw (Ind.) and Kentucky. During this period, he earned his master's in health and safety.

Ralph and his wife Dee have a daughter Beth (18) and a son Steven (16).



TONY PARISI Equipment Manager

A transplanted Canadian who found his way from hockey to football, Tony Parisi is in his 16th year with the Steelers. He is the team's equipment manager and is responsible for the purchasing, care and reconditioning of the equipment. He was the trainer of the Pittsburgh Hornets' hockey team for four years before coming to the Steelers. He played pro hockey as a goaltender. Tony and his wife Joan have two daughters, Paula (15) and (11).



Rookie Matt Bahr atoned for an earlier missed extra point with his first NFL field goal, a 41-yarder at 5:10 of sudden-death to give the undermanned Steelers a tough come-from-behind victory. The winning kick came after the Steelers had held NE without a first down after the overtime kickoff. Sidney Thornton and Franco Harris rushed for 36 yards and Thornton added six on a pass to set up the field goal. NE scored after the opening kickoff with most of the yardage coming on Steve Grogan passes. The Steelers came back to get their first TD after a Jack Lambert interception. Grogan's passes and a Harris fumble led to two second quarter field goals. After a Thornton fumble ended a Steeler threat at the NE 19, a 14-yard punt led to the tieing score. The Steelers covered 34 yards on two Terry Bradshaw passes, the first for 13 yards to John Stallworth and the second to Thornton who was all alone in the middle of the end zone. The Steelers played without six players, two more were lost during the game and three others were used sparingly. Gary Dunn, subbing for Joe Greene, had three sacks and paced the defense which allowed the Patriots one first down in their final five possessions.

The Steeler defense played one of its finest games ever in a surprisingly easy victory. The defense had a hand in 24 of the Steelers' 38 points, their most ever against Houston, on six turnovers. In the first half the Oilers made just two first downs and netted 21 yards and 71 of their 124 yards came on a late fourth quarter scoring drive. Earl Campbell was held to a career-low of 38 yards rushing and that was the key to the outcome. Pittsburgh's pass defense was just as tough. Before leaving the game Dan Pastorini completed just four of 16 attempts and for the day the Steelers had five interceptions and five sacks. Tom Beasley, Mike Wagner, Dennis Winston and John Banaszak were among the defensive standouts.

Beasley had a team record 11 unassisted tackles. Wagner had two interceptions. Winston forced a fumble and scored his first pro TD and Banaszak had his first interception ever. For the second straight game Sidney Thornton scored two TDs, duplicating his opening day feat of one rushing and one receiving. Greg Hawthorne scored on an 8-yard run the first time he carried the ball as a pro. Another big factor was the play of the Steeler special teams which consistently had a big edge on the exchanges.

Terry Bradshaw's first interception was returned to the 2-yard line and led to the Eagles' final score. His second in the fourth quarter stopped a Steeler drive that had reached the 14-yard line. On Pittsburgh's next series, Franco Harris lost a fumble going into the end zone. These two lost scoring opportunities eventually led to the Steelers' first loss. When the Steelers finally put an 80-yard scoring drive together on five straight Bradshaw passes, it was too late as they never regained possession. The defense was again superb in playing without five starters. In the second half the Eagles gained just 88 yards but they broke the halftime tie with a 35-yard field goal drive and then the gift touchdown enabled them to sit on their lead. Injuries in the offensive line and at wide receiver where Lynn Swann missed the game hampered the Steelers but the fumbles and interceptions are what really doomed them.

The Steelers regained sole possession of first place in the second highest scoring game in team history and scored more points (51) than at any time in Chuck Noll's 11 seasons as their coach. With the regular line intact for the first time this season, the offense rushed for a team record 361 yards and scored TDs on four of its first 15 plays. Franco Harris snapped his early season slump with the fourth best regular season game of his career and his 71-yard run was his second longest ever. Rocky Bleier's 70-yard run was his longest ever and moved him past Fran Rogel into fourth place on the all-time team rushing list. Sidney Thornton brought his total in the last three games to 315. For the ninth time in his career Terry Bradshaw threw three TD passes and the Steelers committed just one turnover after having four in each of the three previous games. Brian Sipe's 365 yards passing and five TD tosses were the most ever against a Noll-coached Steeler team. It was the first time this season the defense allowed more than two TDs in a game. Mike Wagner intercepted two passes for the second time in 1979.

In the most shocking upset in recent Steeler history, the Bengals won their first game of the season with a lot of help from their error-prone opponents. The Steelers committed nine turnovers, a high during Chuck Noll's 11-year regime, and three of them led directly to TDs. With Cincinnati leading, 7-3, the Steelers turned the ball over on three straight possessions which the Bengals converted into 20 points in a one minute, 54-second span of the second quarter to assume a near-insurmountable 27-3 halftime lead. What little chance the Steelers had to get back into the game ended when they turned the ball over on four of their five third quarter possessions. The big Cincinnati lead forced the Steelers into a passing game as Terry Bradshaw threw a career-high 40 passes and the team ran just 18 times, the fewest rushing attempts since 1971. The losing margin of 24 points was the widest in a Pittsburgh loss since 1971. In spite of giving up 34 points, the Steeler defense played well enough to win, allowing the Bengals just two bonafide scoring drives and only seven points after the second quarter disaster.

Bradshaw, helped by the return of Lynn Swann who missed three games with a hamstring injury and the continued fine play of John Stallworth and Jim Smith, completed 75 percent of his passes for his second best percentage game of his career. Harris had his 32nd 100-yard game to move right on schedule for a 1,000-yard season. He scored two TDs in a game for the 16th time. Sidney Thornton also scored twice in a game for the third time this season

and rookie Anthony Anderson registered his first pro TD. With the exception of a 64-yard TD pass which tied the game following Pittsburgh's first score, the Broncos were held in check by a Steeler defense that forced three turnovers and had four QB sacks, its highest in six weeks, and allowed just 57 yards rushing, a season-low for Pittsburgh.

Greenwood's two QB sacks and Dennis Winston's 10 unassisted tackles, to hold Dallas to its lowest point total in 108 games. On offense Pittsburgh went to a ball-contol running game and gained more yards on the ground than in the air for the second time this season. The Cowboys came into the game as the NFL's top offensive team but the Steelers completely shut down their running game, holding them to 17 yards in the first half, and forced them to throw 42 passes. The Steelers had their best pass rush of the season. Of the Cowboys' 278 yards, 168 came after the Steelers had scored their second TD. The Pittsburgh offense consisted mainly of their one-two running punch of Franco Harris and Sidney Thornton who totaled 170 yards and averaged over five yards a carry. Harris had his 33rd 100-yard game and third in the last four. He scored two TDs in a game for the 17th time. John Stallworth had a regular-season career-high seven receptions.

He and Mike Kruczek combined for 390 yards in the air, another high under Noll who won his 96th game to tie Vince Lombardi for 14th place. It was another big day for the offense as they scored 24 points on their first four possessions and committed just one turnover. Terry Bradshaw had his third 300-yard passing game in the last five weeks and became the first Steeler to ever pass for 3,000 yards in a season. He connected with Lynn Swann on two long scoring plays. Swann's receiving yardage of 192 was the fourth highest in team history. It was the fourth time in the last five games the Steelers had scored 30 or more points. Joe Greene and Steve Furness led a rejuvenated pass rush with two sacks each as the team registered six. It was the Steelers 13th straight victory at home.

The first time can on Lynn Swann's first pro TD rushing. But the Oilers came back on a 69-yard drive, highlighted by Earl Campbell's 31-yard run. The Oilers rushed for 190 yards and Campbell had 109, both team and individual seasons highs against the Steelers. Chuck Noll became the 14th coach in pro football history to win 100 regular season games as the Steelers clinched their sixth straight AFC Central Division title and the seventh in the last eight seasons. It was their 14th victory in a row at home. The shutout was the Steelers first since 1977 and they limited Buffalo to 156 yards and one first down rushing. A 31-yard field goal was nullified by a delay penalty on the Bills' first possession and then Joe Greene blocked the next kick which ended Buffalo's deepest penetration. The victory for the Steelers concluded their most successful season ever offensively. They gained the second highest yardage total in pro football history and set a team record with 416 points. John Stallworth's 70 receptions established a new team high. Franco Harris registered his 35th 100-yard game and scored his 71st and 72nd TDs rushing, the fourth most ever. Theo Bell's 10 punt returns set another team record.

The Steelers were flawless in the first quarter and controlled the football for over 13 minutes as they scored TDs the first three times they had the ball while Miami was able to run just seven plays for a net of two yards. Pittsburgh converted four of four third-down plays in the opening period and was successful on 11 of 14 the entire game. In directing the three early drives, Terry Bradshaw completed 7 of 9 passes. With a big cushion, the defense never gave Miami a chance, stopping the Dolphins without a score twice in the second quarter when they had first downs inside the Pittsburgh 10-yard line. Dennis Winston's interception ended one drive and a great goal-line stand the other. At halftime the Steelers held a 229-35 edge in yardage and a 15-4 margin in first downs. For the game, the Dolphins, a ball-control team, rushed for 25 yards on 22 carries with 21 of those yards coming in the final quarter. It was the fourth straight postseason game in which the Steelers had scored over 30 points. Bradshaw set a personal postseason record with 21 completions and Franco Harris was the leading rusher for the 12th time in 15 postseason games as he upped his all-time leading total to 1,357 yards and scored his 15th TD, another postseason record. The victory was the Steelers' 15th straight at home and sixth postseason win in a row at Three Rivers.

The Steelers won their fourth AFC Championship in six years in a hardfought, physical game that was much closer than the final score indicates and typifies the rivalry that exists between the AFC Central rivals. Even though the statistics favored the Steelers, their last TD came in the final minute and the final score was their largest margin of the game. Terry Bradshaw continued his spectacular postseason play, converting 13 of 19 third-down opportunities, and the defense did not allow a TD, holding the Oilers to just 24 yards rushing and Earl Campbell to 15 yards on 17 attempts. Houston jumped in front when Vernon Perry stopped a promising drive with an interception which he returned 75 yards. The teams traded field goals on back-to-back possessions. Bradshaw guided his team to TDs on their next two chances which gave the Steelers a lead they never surrendered although it was seriously threatened late in the third quarter when the officials ruled Mike Renfro did not have possession of what appeared to be a tying TD pass. The Oilers settled for a field goal which the Steelers soon matched. A fumble led to Pittsburgh's last score. Bradshaw's two TD passes gave him a postseason career total of 26, an NFL record, and upped his yardage record to 3,199. Franco Harris was the leading rusher for the 13th time in 16 postseason games and increased his rushing yardage to 1,442, another NFL mark. The win was the Steelers 16th straight at home and seventh playoff win in a row at Three Rivers.

As a player, assistant and head coach, this is Chuck Noll's 28th consecutive year in pro football. In his first 27 seasons, his teams have had 22 winning records and made the playoffs 18 times. The cumulative mark of Noll's team's is 265-125-11.

Pittsburgh 31, Los Angeles 19

Jan. 20 at Pasadena, 103,985

The Steelers won an unprecedented fourth Super Bowl. It was their fourth NFL title in six seasons and the second time they had won Super Bowls back to back. For the second year in a row, the Super Bowl itself matched the buildup as the lead changed hands six times. The Steelers did not go ahead to stay until early in the fourth quarter and their final TD came with less than two minutes to play. It was a much higher scoring game than anticipated with the big-play featuring both offenses as six plays from scrimmage went for more than 30 yards. The Steelers' Larry Anderson added four kickoff returns of 37 yards or more to give the Pittsburgh offense excellent field position after each of the Rams' first half scores and then put the offense in high gear with a long return to start the second half. The Steelers scored the first two times they had the ball and the Rams, after failing on their initial possession scored on three of their next four for a 13-10 halftime lead. Both teams tallied the first time they had the ball in the second half on long but quick drives. The Rams failure to convert two third quarter interceptions kept the Steelers within one score which they got on a third down and seven bomb. Their final score was set up by another Bradshaw-Stallworth long-gainer of 45 yards and an interference penalty. In spite of three interceptions, Terry Bradshaw earned his second straight Super Bowl MVP trophy and set career SB records for passing yards (932) and TD passes (9). His counterpart, Vince Ferragamo, matched Bradshaw for three quarters but Jack Lambert's interception with a little more than five minutes to play was the game's biggest defensive play and LA's only turnover. Franco Harris set SB career records for TDs(4), rushing attempts (101) and rushing yardage (354). Lynn Swann, who was injured early in the third quarter and did not return, established new career marks for receptions (16) and yards receiving (364) and he and John Stallworth now share the record for TD receptions (3). Anderson's 162 yards on five kickoff returns for an average of 32.4 are all new SB game records.

Board of NFL Films. He served in the past as Chairman of the NFL's Expansion Committee and guided the league through the difficult process that resulted in the current labor contract with the players. On a club level, he has been the architect of one of the most successful franchises in professional sports and guides it with a steady hand.

Art's most significant contribution was and still is in personnel. A former football player at St. Vincent College, he is the man behind the great Steeler drafts. He oversees a department that has been creative and productive and still spends many hours himself scouring the country for talent.

After Parker left prior to the 1965 season, Mike Nixon and Bill Austin

attempted to produce a winner. They failed.

In 1969 the Rooneys named 37-year-old Chuck Noll as the 14th coach in the club's history. Relying solely on the draft to build the team, he

patiently nursed his young team to maturity.

The team's ability to maximize their draft selections has been the key to their unprecedented success. When Joe Greene was picked in the first round in 1969, he became the nucleus of what was to become a great defense. The following year Terry Bradshaw was the first choice and it was the makings of an explosive offense.

After three building years under Noll in which the team went from 1-13 in 1969 to 5-9 and 6-8 the next two seasons, the big breakthrough came in 1972 as the Steelers won their first division title ever. They lost to Miami, the eventual NFL champion, in the AFC Championship game but it

was to be their first of six trips in eight years to that plateau.

In 1974 the Steelers won their first league crown. The next season they became the third team to win back-to-back Super Bowls. In 1978 they were the first team to win three Super Bowls and last season the first to win four and win two consecutively twice. Their total of four league championships is third to Green Bay (11) and Chicago (8).
