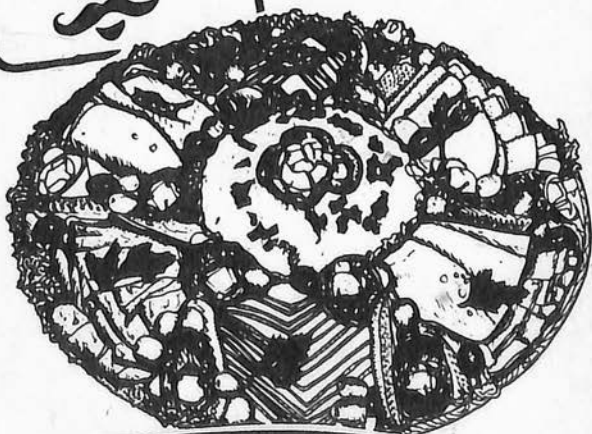

STEELER HISTORY

A year ago, the Pittsburgh Steelers capped their memorable 50 Seasons Celebration with a return to the NFL playoffs.

In 1983, as the club embarks on its second half century, the rejuvenated Steelers under head coach Chuck Noll want to continue the momentum generated last season in hopes of realizing the ultimate goal, a return to Super Bowl championship caliber.

The Steelers were founded by Art Rooney in 1933 and carried the nickname Pirates until 1940. For more than five decades now, Mr. Rooney has watched the growth of the NFL's fifth oldest franchise. The early years—1930's and 1940's—were lean times while the 1950's and 1960's brought some success, though never a playoff entry. But during the 1970's, the Steelers were pro football's most successful team. They won four Super Bowls, two more than any other team in NFL history while making the postseason playoffs a record-tying eight straight years.

Born in Coulterville, Pa., on January 26, 1901, Mr. Rooney moved to Pittsburgh with his family when he was a year and a half old. He grew up on the site now occupied by Three Rivers Stadium and still lives just a short walk from the Steelers' home field.

He was an outstanding athlete who excelled in football, baseball and boxing. Knute Rockne wanted him to play at Notre Dame, but he attended Indiana State (Pa.), Georgetown and Duquesne. In baseball, he was signed by the Boston Red Sox and Chicago Cubs, but an arm injury ended his major league ambitions. He was also selected to represent the United States on the 1920 Olympic boxing team.

With competition coming from major league baseball and the more established collegiate football game, the early years proved to be difficult ones for the Steelers and other pro football teams. Mr. Rooney's team played their games at Forbes Field, but frequently took the games to the fans, playing in such places as Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, New Orleans and Louisville.

In 1939, the Steelers stunned the sports world by signing Colorado All America Whizzer White to a \$15,800 contract, an unheard of sum at that time. The NFL's first big-money player is now United States Supreme Court Justice Byron White.

Sparked by rookie halfback Bill Dudley, now a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the Steelers had their first winning season in 1942 (7-4). The nucleus of that promising club was soon in the military. During World War II, the Steelers combined forces with the Philadelphia Eagles (1943) and Chicago Cardinals (1944).

After the war, the Steelers rekindled their efforts to bring a winner to Pittsburgh. Jock Sutherland, a legend at the University of Pittsburgh, joined the team in 1946. Utilizing the single wing, the Steelers tied for the divisional title in 1947 before losing in the playoffs to Philadelphia.

When Sutherland died unexpectedly on a scouting trip in 1948, the Steelers were dealt another setback. John Michelosen replaced him.

In 1952, Joe Bach began his second term as the team's coach as the Steelers became the last pro club to abandon the single wing. Under Bach, the Steelers were playing exciting football and improved their performance to .500 in 1953 when he resigned for health reasons.

For the third time, Rooney called on his friend Walt Kiesling. He coached the team through 1956 before Buddy Parker arrived from Detroit (1957). Parker and the flamboyant Bobby Layne reeled off a string of four winning seasons in six years beginning with a 7-4-1 mark in 1958. In 1963, the Steelers fell one game short of delivering a title when they lost their final game to the New York Giants.

In 1964, Art Rooney, Sr. was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. At about the same time, a transition was beginning to take shape in the front office. Dan and Art, Jr., the oldest of Mr. Rooney's five sons, became active in the organization on a full-time basis.

As youngsters, both had performed menial duties in training camp and their life spans actually paralleled that of the Steelers. Dan's first formal assignment was selling advertising and editing the program. Art, Jr. worked in the ticket office, specializing in group sales.

At 50, Dan is one of the most able and respected executives in sports. He currently serves on the three-member Executive Committee of NFL Properties and the same body of the Management Council and is on the Board of NFL Films. He also has served as Chairman of the NFL's Expansion Committee. On a club level, he has been the architect of one of the most successful franchises in professional sports and guides it with a steady hand.

Art's most significant contribution was and still is in personnel. A former football player at St. Vincent College, he is the man behind the great Steeler drafts. He oversees a department that has been creative and productive and still spends many hours himself scouring the country for talent.

After Parker left prior to the 1965 season, Mike Nixon and Bill Austin attempted to produce a winner. They failed.

STEELER COACHES



CHUCK NOLL

Head Coach

Challenges have been a part of Chuck Noll's life since he entered the world of pro football more than three decades ago.

When he came to Pittsburgh in 1969 to inherit a 2-11-2 team, he faced the ultimate task for a head coach. Four years later, the team made the playoffs and six years later, the Steelers were world champions, a distinction the club would earn four times in six years and be named the NFL's Team of the Decade for the 1970's.

Noll, beginning his 15th season, has conquered many obstacles while maintaining the Steelers as a playoff caliber football team. A year ago, he faced one of his most intriguing seasons.

The Steelers had not made the playoffs since 1979, had a disappointing 8-8 mark in 1981 to break a nine-year run of winning seasons and seemed to be in decline. The veteran-laden roster was aging and rediscovering that championship spark were vital concerns.

When the strike-shortened 1982 season closed, Noll had the reigns of a hungry playoff entrant which posted a 6-3 record. He had engineered significant transition including the injection of 15 new players, major defensive changes, a revamped offense while generating the type of momentum he expects the team to carry into 1983.

Steeler changes began early in 1982. Retirements of Joe Greene, Sam Davis and Jon Kolb set the tone. Noll and staff instituted a new conditioning and strength program. And, when training camp opened, the roster was Noll's largest since 1971.

For the first time in Noll's head coaching career, the team went away from the 4-3 defense, making a dramatic switch to the 3-4 scheme. Offensively, a ball control passing attack utilizing a variety of talents was introduced. His willingness to adjust made the difference.

Still, Noll's evolving team faces several more important challenges this season. Retirements of all-time greats Lynn Swann and Jack Ham plus USFL signings by Jim Smith and Ray Pinney pose critical questionmarks.

As one of only 15 pro coaches to win 100 games, Noll is eager to continue what was started last season. The development of a Steeler team with just nine players left who played in all four Super Bowls further exemplifies what have become his trademarks—patience and enthusiasm for teaching aspects of the game.

With a 137-80-1 (.631) career mark, he is eighth on the all-time list of NFL coaches after passing Weeb Ewbank (134) and Hank Stram (136) last season. The 51-year-old Noll is third among active coaches in winning percentage behind Don Shula (214-85-6, .713) and Tom Landry (222-129-6, .632). He is the only pro coach to win four Super Bowl championships and joins Vince Lombardi (5) and George Halas (5) as one of only three NFL coaches to win four league titles. Noll and Lombardi are the only coaches in pro football history who have not lost in the Super Bowl among those there more than once while Noll's 14-5 postseason record is topped only by Lombardi (9-1).

The Cleveland, Ohio native is in his 31st season in pro football as a

player, assistant and head coach. To date, his teams have recorded 24 winning seasons and made the playoffs 19 times. He has the longest tenure of the 14 Steeler head coaches.

In 1969, when Noll came to Pittsburgh from Don Shula's staff in Baltimore, he committed the club to a program of building through the draft. It is a practice from which he has rarely wavered. The club makes infrequent trades with past transactions following a pattern of trading expendable players for future draft choices. In fact, Noll has made just five trades in 14 seasons which brought players to the Steelers. By comparison, the Steelers have had extra picks in 13 of the last 14 drafts including 1983. Thirteen Steelers including eight 1982 starters were obtained with extra draft choices.

Noll's early years with the Steelers were not particularly successful ones. His first team made its regular season debut with a win and then lost 13 consecutive games to finish with the No. 1 draft choice. The losing streak carried over into 1970 when the Steelers began a new decade in a brand new Three Rivers Stadium with three straight losses on route to a 5-9 overall mark behind rookie quarterback Terry Bradshaw.

By 1971 (6-8), the Steelers were putting together the pieces of a solid football operation. The breakthrough came in 1972 when the club won its first AFC Central Division championship and posted an 11-3 record. The Steelers upended Oakland, 13-7 in the first round of the playoffs on a miraculous last-second touchdown by Franco Harris on a deflected pass. Eight days later, the Steelers lost to undefeated Miami, 21-17, in the AFC

title game. The Dolphins went on to post a perfect 17-0 record and win their first Super Bowl while Noll was named UPI's AFC Coach of the Year.

In 1973, the Steelers reeled off 10 wins, but were eliminated by Oakland in the first round. The next season (1974), Pittsburgh rolled to the best regular season won-loss record in the NFL — 12-2. It was Noll's sixth season of building and that season, the club would reach its ultimate goal. The Steelers whipped Buffalo, 31-14, and Oakland, 24-13, to win the AFC title and advance to Super Bowl IX. Against the Raiders, the Steeler defense recorded one of the greatest efforts in playoff history, holding Oakland to 29 yards rushing. Two weeks later against Minnesota in the Super Bowl, the Steeler defense limited the Vikings to just 17 yards rushing and won Pittsburgh's first-ever world title, 16-6.

Noll's patience and the Steelers productive drafting was beginning to pay big dividends. In 1975, Noll became the third coach to win back-to-back Super Bowls as the Steelers won 10 of 14 regular season games, beat Baltimore and Oakland in the AFC playoffs and went on to top Dallas, 21-17 in Super Bowl X at Miami.

The following season (1976) is one of the more talked about Steeler campaigns in recent years. The defending Super Bowl champions lost four of their first five games, but then rallied to win 10 games in a row to finish the season. Noll was honored as the NFL Coach of the Year by the Sporting News, but the Steelers bid to become the first team in league history to win the Super Bowl three times in a row ended in the AFC Championship game when Oakland posted a 24-7 win.

Pittsburgh made the playoffs for the sixth straight season in 1977, but was eliminated by Denver in the first round. Some observers felt that the team was in decline after losing in the first round for only the second time in seven seasons. But in 1978 and 1979, the team posted the best regular season won-loss records in the NFL and went on to win Super Bowls XIII over Dallas (35-31) and XIV against Los Angeles (31-19) to finish out a decade in which the Steelers were named 'Team of the Decade'. In six short seasons, the club had become the first NFL team to win four Super Bowls and the first to win two consecutively twice.

Noll's pro football career began as a 21st round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1953 following a college career at Dayton, where he was a team captain. He played seven seasons (77 career games) with the Browns as an offensive guard and linebacker. During that span, Cleveland won five Eastern Conference championships and played for three NFL titles (1953-54-55), winning two.

Noll's playing career ended prematurely at 27 when he retired to enter the coaching profession. However, an opportunity at Dayton did not materialize. He was planning a teaching career when Sid Gillman offered him the last spot on the staff of the Los Angeles Chargers of the new American Football League. Noll served as defensive assistant for six years with the Chargers winning four divisional titles and two AFL championships.

In 1966, he returned to the NFL as a defensive coach on the staff of Don Shula in Baltimore. In his three years, the Colts lost just three regular season games and won an NFL title in 1968 before losing to the New York Jets in Super Bowl III.

RON BLACKLEDGE

Offensive Line Coach

Offensive line coach Ron Blackledge, a veteran of more than 20 years of coaching experience in the college and high school ranks, begins his second season with the Steelers. The 43-year-old North Canton, Ohio native joined the Chuck Noll's staff on Aug. 13, 1982 as an offensive assistant and stepped into a void left when Rollie Dotsch moved to the USFL a month later.

Blackledge inherited one of the NFL's most efficient units. The Steeler offensive front perennially ranks among the best in the league in protecting the quarterback

and per play rushing average. Last season was no different as the Steelers finished sixth in average yards per rush (4.1) and ninth in sacks allowed.

Blackledge is well qualified for the job. He came to the Steelers from Kent State, where he served as head coach from 1979 thru 1981 and compiled an 8-25 record. Prior to that, he was offensive coordinator and line coach under head coach Dennis Fitzgerald (1977-78).

He began his coaching career at Canton South High School (1960-62), later moved to Canton Timken (1963-66) as head coach and then to Canton Glenwood (1967-68) as an assistant. Blackledge entered the collegiate ranks as offensive line coach at Ashland College (1968-69) before moving to the University of Cincinnati in a similar capacity (1970-72). From 1973 thru 1975, he served as offensive line coach at Kentucky and later joined the Princeton staff (1976) before going to Kent State (1977).

Blackledge played tight end and defensive end at Bowling Green University and is a member of the school's Hall of Fame. He earned a Physical Education degree (1960) and later received a masters in Guidance and Physical Education from Ohio University (1967).

PERSONAL: Full name: Ronald Dale Blackledge. Date of birth: April 15, 1938 in North Canton, Ohio. Married, wife Linda, with daughters Michelle (6/13/64) and Traci (8/17/71) and son Todd (2/25/61), who played quarterback at Penn State and was a first round draft choice of the Kansas City Chiefs last April 26.



TONY DUNGY

Defensive Backfield Coach

Tony Dungy, one of pro football's bright young coaching prospects, begins his third season on the Steeler staff and his second at defensive secondary coach. A former Steeler player, Dungy joined the club in 1981 as a defensive assistant.

The 27-year-old Jackson, Michigan native, engineered an interesting combination of accomplishments by the Steeler secondary in 1982. As a unit, the Steelers finished tied for fourth in the NFL with 17 interceptions in nine games while Donnie

Shell and Dwayne Woodruff, the team's MVP, shared the AFC lead and were second in the league with five interceptions. With the team's shift to the 3-4 defense, it proved to be a major transitional year for the secondary which also combined with the linebacking corps for 19½ of the 34 sacks.

Dungy's first stint with the Steelers came in 1977 when he made the team as a free agent safety beating out veterans Ray Oldham and Glen Edwards after converting from quarterback. He played two seasons, primarily as the fifth defensive back, and excelled on special teams. In 1978, though starting only two games, he led the club in interceptions (6). Dungy was traded to San Francisco in August of 1979 for a draft choice. In 1980, he was traded to the New York Giants and later waived.

Dungy's coaching career began at Minnesota (1980) as defensive backfield coach. As a player, he was an option quarterback, senior captain, two-time MVP and played in Japan and Hula Bowls and East-West game. Until 1982, Dungy held Gopher records for total plays (999), passing attempts (586), completions (274), passing yards (3,577) and touchdowns (25). He is now No. 2 behind Mike Hohensee. He has a Business Administration degree (1977).

PERSONAL: Full name: Anthony Kevin Dungy. Date of birth: October 6, 1955 in Jackson, Michigan. Married, wife Lauren. The Dungys live in the Greentree area of Pittsburgh.



DENNIS FITZGERALD

Linebacker Coach

Dennis Fitzgerald, who joined the Steelers on July 21, 1982, is in his second season as the club's linebacker coach.

Fitzgerald had 22 years of experience before joining the Steelers. He came to Pittsburgh from Tulane, where he served as defensive coordinator in 1981.

Fitzgerald and the Steeler linebacking corps face an important season with the retirement of Jack Ham and the continued growth into the 3-4 defensive scheme.

The Ann Arbor, Michigan native began his coaching career at Michigan where he was an assistant freshman coach (1961-62) and later head freshman coach (1963-65) after finishing his playing career. In 1965, he was promoted to defensive line coach under Bump Elliott.

In 1969-70, Fitzgerald served as defensive coordinator at Kentucky under John Ray before moving to Kent State as defensive coordinator (1971-74) where he coached eight-time Steeler All Pro Jack Lambert before succeeding Don James as head coach in 1975. In three seasons, he compiled an 18-16 overall record including an 8-4 mark in 1976.

In 1978, Fitzgerald moved to Syracuse as defensive coordinator.

As a player, Fitzgerald lettered five times in both football and wrestling at Michigan where he was named the football team's most valuable player in 1960 as a halfback. He still holds the school record for longest kickoff return—99 yards vs. Michigan State in 1960.

He also captained Michigan's wrestling team which won Big 10 championships in 1960 and 1961. He was an NCAA semifinalist twice (1960-61), a national AAU finalist (1961) and participated in the 1963 Pan American Games and World Championships.

He received an undergraduate (1961) and masters degree (1963) in Physical Education from Michigan.

DICK HOAK

Offensive Backfield Coach

Offensive backfield coach Dick Hoak, now in his 12th season as a coach, has been a member of the Steeler organization for 22 years including 10 years as a running back.

He brings to the offense a unique combination which blends the credentials of a teacher and the talents of a player.

Since Hoak joined the staff in 1972, versatility as exemplified in the contributions of Franco Harris has been a major factor in the club's offensive success. Harris is the all-time NFL leader in carries and No. 3 all-time rusher. Last year,

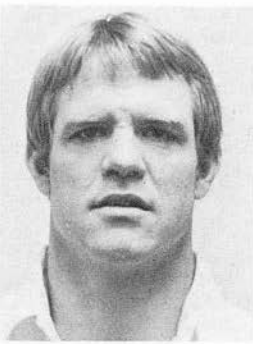
he became the first Steeler to lead the team in rushing and receiving in the same season.

Hoak is second all-time on the Steeler list for rushing attempts (1,132) and third behind Harris and John Henry Johnson in career rushing yards (3,965). He scored 25 touchdowns and led the team in rushing three times from 1961-1970. He also caught 146 career passes for 1,152 yards and eight touchdowns. Hoak's best season was 1968 when he gained 858 yards rushing, fourth in the NFL, and played in the Pro Bowl. Former teammate Bobby Layne once called him "the most perfect player in my time."

Hoak excelled as a collegian at Penn State (1958-60) where he was offensive captain and team MVP while playing both quarterback and halfback. He earned a Social Studies degree in 1961.

He is a former recipient of the Dapper Dan Club award as Pittsburgh's outstanding sports figure.

JON KOLB

Defensive Line/Conditioning Coach

Jon Kolb, a 13-year veteran player and member of the Steelers' 50 Seasons All-Time team, begins his second season as defensive line and conditioning coach. Kolb was appointed to the coaching staff on February 17, 1982, soon after his retirement. He took over the defensive line duties in July when George Perles joined the USFL.

As defensive line coach, Kolb played an important role in the team's shift to the 3-4 alignment. That unit sacked opposing quarterbacks 34 times, second in the NFL, while allowing only 84.7 yards per

game rushing to establish a new team record.

In his role as conditioning coach, the 36-year-old Kolb is charged with developing and maintaining a strength and flexibility program designed to maximize the talents of every Steeler player. He brought a unique approach to the team last season and it continues this year. Without sacrificing their role as pioneers in weight work, Kolb introduced cardio-vascular stress tests for all players. The tests identify the conditioning needs of each individual player.

Kolb's playing career began as a No. 3 draft choice in 1969, Noll's first season. He is one of only eight Steelers to play 13 seasons and stands fourth all-time in career games (177) behind Mel Blount (184). Kolb started 138 games including 112 in a row (1971-79) as one of the building blocks for what would be named the 'Team of the Decade.' In his first 10 seasons, the former college All-America center, started 156 of 157 possible games including postseason (1969-78).

TOM MOORE

Offensive Coordinator

Tom Moore, a veteran of 23 years in the coaching profession, is in his first season as offensive coordinator. He was promoted following the 1982 season by Chuck Noll.

Moore and the balance of the offensive staff are coming off a very productive season. The club revamped its offensive package last season, introducing a more ball-control offense utilizing more receivers, shorter pass routes and quicker throws by the quarterbacks to complement the team's consistent running at-

tack. As a unit, the offense finished fourth in the AFC in rushing (131.9 per game), eighth in passing (198.1) and scored 22.7 points per game. Terry Bradshaw shared the NFL lead in touchdown passes (17).

With Lynn Swann's retirement and Jim Smith's departure to the USFL, Moore faces a critical rebuilding task this season at wide receiver, a position he will be tutoring for the seventh season.

Moore came to the Steelers in 1977 from Minnesota where he served as offensive coordinator and coached then quarterback Tony Dungy, now a Steeler defensive assistant. He began his coaching career at Iowa as freshman coach (1961-62). After a military stint, he returned to coaching at Dayton (1965) as offensive backfield coach. He was offensive coordinator at Wake Forest (1969) and coached the backfield at Georgia Tech (1970-71) before moving to Minnesota for the first of two assignments as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach (1972-73). In 1974, he entered the pro ranks with the New York Stars of the World Football League and returned to Minnesota when the league folded.

Moore was a quarterback under Forest Evashevski at Iowa (1957-60) on a Big 10 championship team (1958). That club defeated California in the Rose Bowl and established a total offensive record (580).

He earned a History degree in 1961 and received a masters in Guidance from Minnesota in 1966.

WOODY WIDENHOFER

Assistant Head Coach

Woody Widenhofer, in his fifth season as defensive coordinator, is beginning his second season as assistant head coach. Widenhofer has been a member of the Chuck Noll's staff for 11 seasons. He was promoted to assistant head coach on July 21, 1982 replacing George Perles.

Widenhofer engineered the club's switch to the 3-4 scheme, a dramatic change from the traditional 4-3 which helped the Steelers win four Super Bowl titles. Major adjustments had to be made, especially at linebacker, and the coaches

and players had to learn about the 3-4 as the season was played. The results were productive. The Steeler defense finished second in the league in sacks (34) and tied for fourth with 17 interceptions, two behind league-leading Miami. The team also allowed 146 points, fourth fewest in the NFL while establishing a new team record for fewest yards allowed rushing per game (84.7).

In 1983, the Steeler defense is expected to continue to grow into the new alignment. But, important changes must also be made. The retirement of Jack Ham creates a big void which must be filled with younger players. And, with more than half of the sacks coming from linebackers and defensive backs, Widenhofer plans to spend more time on pass rush from the defensive front.

Widenhofer joined the Steelers in 1973 as linebacker coach and was a major contributor to the development of perennial All Pros Ham and Jack Lambert. In 1978, he coached the secondary before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 1979.

Before joining the Steelers, Widenhofer served as linebacker coach at Minnesota (1972) and defensive coordinator at Eastern Michigan (1971), where the program went 11-0 and was ranked third nationally. He began coaching in the collegiate ranks at Michigan State where he coordinated the freshman program and coached the defensive line (1969-70). His first coaching opportunity came to Detroit's Holy Redeemer High School (1965) and he later moved to Nativity High (1967-68).

Widenhofer played linebacker for Dan Devine at Missouri, but his career was cut short by a broken leg after lettering twice. He received a masters degree in Physical Education from Michigan State.

Steeler History—Continued

In 1969, the Rooneys named 37-year-old Chuck Noll as the 14th coach in the club's history. Relying solely on the draft to build, he patiently nursed his young team to maturity.

The team's ability to maximize their draft selections has been the key to their unprecedented success. When Joe Greene was picked in the first round in 1969, he became the nucleus of what was to become a great defense. The following year Terry Bradshaw was the first choice and it was the makings of an explosive offense.

After three building years under Noll in which the team went from 1-13 in 1969 to 5-9 and 6-8 the next two seasons, the big breakthrough came in 1972 as the Steelers won their first division title ever. They lost to Miami, the eventual NFL champion, in the AFC Championship game but it was to be their first of six trips in eight years to that plateau.

In 1974, the Steelers won their first league crown. The next season they became the third team to win back-to-back Super Bowls. In 1978, they were the first team to win three Super Bowls and in 1979, became the first to win four and win two consecutively twice. Their total of four league championships is third to Green Bay (11) and Chicago (8).

The Steelers 50th Anniversary season was a very special one. An all-time team was selected by the fans and honored at a gala banquet in October. The banquet was part of a weekend of activities which attracted thousands of people to an exhibit featuring memorabilia and other informational materials from the five decades of Steeler football.

Director of Player Personnel



Dick Haley, a native of Midway, Pa., is in his 13th season as the Steelers' Director of Player Personnel. The former University of Pittsburgh standout has been a vital contributor in the team's success in building and maintaining a caliber club through the draft.

Haley played defensive back for Washington, Minnesota and the Steelers, a total of seven seasons (1959-65) before starting his player personnel career as a BLESTO area scout. As Director of Player Personnel, he spends a great deal of time during the year away from home scouting pro prospects.

BILL NUNN, JR.

Assistant Director of Player Personnel

Had to make major transition in 1982 as team went to 3-4 alignment forcing change in familiar man-to-man style of play... Helped team finish tied for fourth among NFL club's with 17 interceptions... Rewrote Steeler record for career interceptions he shared with Jack Butler after theft of Paul McDonald pass at Cleveland (12/19)... Enjoyed standout season in 1981, sharing the team interception lead (6) with Jack Lambert... Returned interception 50-yards for a touchdown vs. San Francisco (11/1)... It was his third career touchdown return... Crossed 50 barrier three weeks later vs. Los Angeles with two interceptions off Dan Pastorini, the seventh time he has picked off two passes in a game... NFL's Most Valuable Defensive Player and team MVP in 1975 when he intercepted 11 passes, a Steeler all-time record... Was first Steeler to lead league in interceptions since Bill Dudley (1946)... 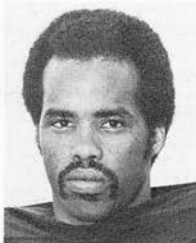

Has the second highest seniority (with Ken Stabler) of all active NFL QBs behind St. Louis' Jim Hart (18)... Is second oldest Steeler, five months younger than Mel Blount... Ranks ninth in career TD passes with 210 and can pass John Brodie (214), George Blanda (236) and Len Dawson (239) to move into sixth place in 1983 with a good season... Is 11th in passes attempted (3,893), 15th in completions (2,020) and 12th in total yards (27,912) and should move into the Top Ten in the first and third categories this season... Has been at his best in postseason play throughout his career especially in four Super Bowls where he completed 49 of 84 passes (58.3%) with nine TDs and only three interceptions... Holds six SB records including career marks for yards passing (932), highest average gain (11.1) and TD passes (9) and single game highs for yards passing (318 vs. Dallas in SB XIII), TD passes (4 in SB XIII) and highest average gain (14.7) which is also an all-time high for all postseason play... 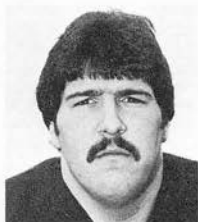

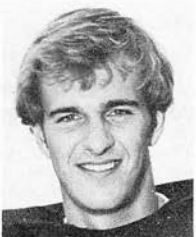

Is the all-time leader in rushing attempts with 2,602... With seven 1,000-yard seasons, is tied with Brown for the most and his six consecutive 1,000-yard seasons (1974-79) is an NFL record he shares with Walter Payton... With 93 touchdowns is tied with Jim Taylor for fourth place behind Brown (126), Lenny Moore (113) and Don Hutson (105) and is second in TDs rushing with 86 behind Brown (106)... With 558 career points is the sixth leading active scorer in the NFL and first among non-kickers... Has scored two TDs in a game 21 times and has scored three in three different games, most recently vs Cleveland (11/25/79)... Ranks as the NFL's all-time postseason leader in rushing

yards (1,523), attempts (394), 100-yard games (5) and touchdowns (16) ... Has been the leading rusher in 13 of the 18 postseason games he has played ... Holds Super Bowl career records for yards rushing (354), attempts (101) and TDs (4) and single game mark for TDs (2 vs. LA in SB XIV) ... Was the only NFL player named to the Pro Bowl every season from 1972 thru 1980 ... Has been remarkably durable, missing just nine games in 11 seasons and playing in 167 out of a possible 176 ... At 33, is the second oldest running back in the NFL behind John Riggins (34) ... Can become the second NFL player to rush for 1,000 yards after the age of 30 ... Former Steeler John Henry Johnson was the first when he gained 1,046 yards in 1964 at age 35 ... Steelers are 38-4 (43-4 including postseason) in games he has rushed for 100 yards ... Is fifth on all-time list for combined net yards with 13,164 behind Brown (15,459), Simpson (14,368), Bobby Mitchell (14,078) and Payton (13,224) and could move into second place in 1983 ... Had one of his most productive seasons in the abbreviated 1982 schedule ... Capitalized on redesigned Steeler offense in which his role includes more duties as a pass receiver to become first player in team history to lead the club in rushing and receiving in the same season ... Rushed for 604 yards to rank seventh in the AFC ... Added three 100-yard games rushing to increase career regular season total to 42 which ties him with Simpson for third most behind Brown (58) and Walter Payton (48) ... In spite of nine game schedule, had second best season with 31 receptions including a single game career high of 11 vs. Cincinnati (9/19) ... With 272 career catches, is fourth on the all-time Steeler list ... Owns AFC Championship career records for yards rushing (402), attempts (113) and TDs rushing (4) and AFC Playoff highs for rushing (767), attempts (180), TDs (9) and TDs rushing (8) ... Became third player to rush for 10,000 yards, reaching it vs. Seattle (11/18) ... Caught career-high 37 passes ... Missed Pro Bowl for the first time ... Is one of the greatest big-game players in NFL history ... His success has paralleled that of the Steelers ... Team had never made the playoffs before his arrival and then made them eight straight seasons ... Has unique running style which blends fullback's size and halfback's speed ... Has rushed more times (402), gained more yards (1,834), scored more TDs (16) and has more 100-yard games (8) against Cleveland than any other team ... Longest run (75 yards, 11/19/72) was vs. the Browns ... Monday

night football's all-time leading rusher with 1,394 yards on 301 carries (4.6), nine TDs and seven 100-yard games . . . Has gained 1,662 yards in 21 prime time ABC appearances . . . Named Player of the Decade (1970s) by College and Pro Football Newsweekly and selected to most NFL 1970s Teams of the Decade . . . The Steelers ended their 50th season with one of their most bitter losses ever. Dan Fouts threw two short TD passes to Kellen Winslow in the final nine minutes after the Steelers had taken an 11-point lead early in the fourth quarter. Terry Bradshaw played one of the greatest games of his career as he completed 25 of his first 28 passes, including 15 in a row, but threw two interceptions which knocked the Steelers out of the playoffs. The initial interception came on a first down play from the San Diego 29-yard line on the first play after the two minute warning in the second quarter with the Steelers leading, 14-10. Bruce Laird returned the interception 35 yards and the Chargers drove 64 yards to take their first lead, 17-14. The last and most costly interception came with 11 minutes to play and the Steelers holding a 28-17 margin. This one was returned by Jeff Allen to the Pittsburgh 29-yard line from where the Chargers scored on five plays plus an important holding penalty which nullified a Mel Blount interception. After two Steeler first downs on the next series, John Goodson's 20-yard punt gave San Diego decent field position and they capitalized with the winning score. The game started on a bizarre note when rookie Guy Ruff recovered James Brooks' fumble of the opening kickoff in the end zone to set an NFL record for the quickest score at the start of a game.

ACTIVE STEELERS IN PRO BOWL

Eight active Steelers have played in the Pro Bowl led by veteran running back Franco Harris, who is the only active player in the NFL to be named to the Pro Bowl nine consecutive times (1973-80).

Last season, linebacker Jack Lambert tied a record held by former teammate Jack Ham of playing in eight straight games.

Remaining active players with Pro Bowl experience include Mel Blount (5), Donnie Shell (5), Mike Webster (5), Terry Bradshaw (4), John Stallworth (2) and Larry Brown (1).

Webster and Shell join Lambert with pro streaks. They have each earned a spot in the game for five consecutive seasons.

Harris' nine appearances ties him for second in the all-time Steeler record book with Ernie Stautner behind Joe Greene (10).

STEELER MILESTONES

Things That Could Happen in 1983:

CHUCK NOLL

● Currently eighth on all-time list of NFL coaches with 137-80-1 record after passing Weeb Ewbank (134) and Hank Stram (136) last season. Minnesota's Bud Grant (153-91-5) is seventh and Steve Owen (154-108-17) sixth behind leader George Halas (326-150-30). Noll is one of just 15 pro coaches to win 100 or more games. With a .631 winning percentage, he is third among active head coaches who have served minimum of five years behind Don Shula (214-85-6, .713) and Tom Landry (222-129-6, .632).

MEL BLOUNT

● With 53 career interceptions, can extend his club record and climb into NFL's all-time top ten and as high as fourth. Needs two interceptions to pass Willie Brown (54) for 11th; four to pass Lem Barney and Pat Fischer (56) for 10th; five to pass Bobby Boyd, Johnny Robinson and Ken Riley (57); six to pass Emmitt Thomas (58) and 10 to pass Dick LeBeau (62) for fourth place.

● Blount is second among active NFL players in career interceptions behind Cincinnati's Ken Riley (57).

● By playing one regular season game, can join Ernie Stautner and Terry Bradshaw as one of only three Steelers to play 14 seasons.

TERRY BRADSHAW

● By playing one regular season game, joins Ernie Stautner and Mel Blount as one of only three Steelers to play 14 seasons.

● Ranks ninth in all-time touchdown passes (210) and could climb as high as sixth. Needs five to pass John Brodie (214); 27 to pass George Blanda (236) and 30 to pass Len Dawson (239). Bradshaw enters 1983 as the leading active quarterback in touchdown passes.

● Ranks 11th in all-time passing attempts (3,893) and could climb into the top ten and as high as seventh. Needs 115 attempts to pass George Blanda (4,007) for 10th; 370 to pass Sonny Jurgensen (4,262); 461 to pass Norm Snead (4,353) and 503 to pass Y. A. Tittle (4,395) for seventh. Bradshaw has more passing attempts than any active quarterback except Jim Hart (4,978).

● Ranks 15th in all-time passes completed (2,020) and could climb into the top ten and as high as ninth. Needs 34 to pass Craig Morton (2,053), who shares 13th with Dan Fouts; 117 to pass Len Dawson (2,136) for 11th and 257 to pass Norm Snead (2,276) for ninth. Jim Hart (2,540), Ken Anderson (2,254) and Ken Stabler (2,061) rank third, 10th and 12th respectively and remain active.

● Ranks 12th in all-time yards passing (27,912) and could climb into the top ten and as high as seventh. Needs 800 yards to pass Len Dawson (28,711) for 10th; 1,533 to pass Roman Gabriel (29,444); 2,886 to pass Norm Snead (30,797) and 3,637 yards to pass John Brodie (31,548) for seventh. Bradshaw begins the season third among active quarterbacks. Cincinnati's Ken Anderson is 11th (28,057), St. Louis' Jim Hart third (34,047) and San Diego's Dan Fouts 15th (27,145).

FRANCO HARRIS

● With 10,943 career rushing yards, needs 294 to pass O.J. Simpson (11,236) for the second place on the all-time list behind Jim Brown (12,312). He needs just 57 yards to become only the third player in pro football history to reach the 11,000 yard plateau. Harris is the NFL's all-time leader in rushing attempts (2,602).

● Begins 1983 tied for fourth on the all-time list for total touchdowns (93) with Jim Taylor. Needs 13 touchdowns to pass Don Hutson (105) for third behind Lenny Moore (113) and Jim Brown (126). With 86 touchdowns rushing, Harris is second on the all-time list behind Brown (106).

● With a 1,000-yard season, he will become the first player in NFL history to accomplish that feat eight times. He and Brown have each had seven. Walter Payton has six.

JOHN STALLWORTH

● With 299 career catches, needs 31 to pass Elbie Nickel (329) for second place on the club's all-time list and 38 to pass Lynn Swann (336) for first place.

● With 5,304 career receiving yards, needs 159 to pass Lynn Swann's Steeler record (5,462) for first place.

● With 44 career touchdown receptions, needs eight to pass Lynn Swann's team record (51). Ranks third on all-time club list for total touchdowns behind Franco Harris (93) and Swann (53).
