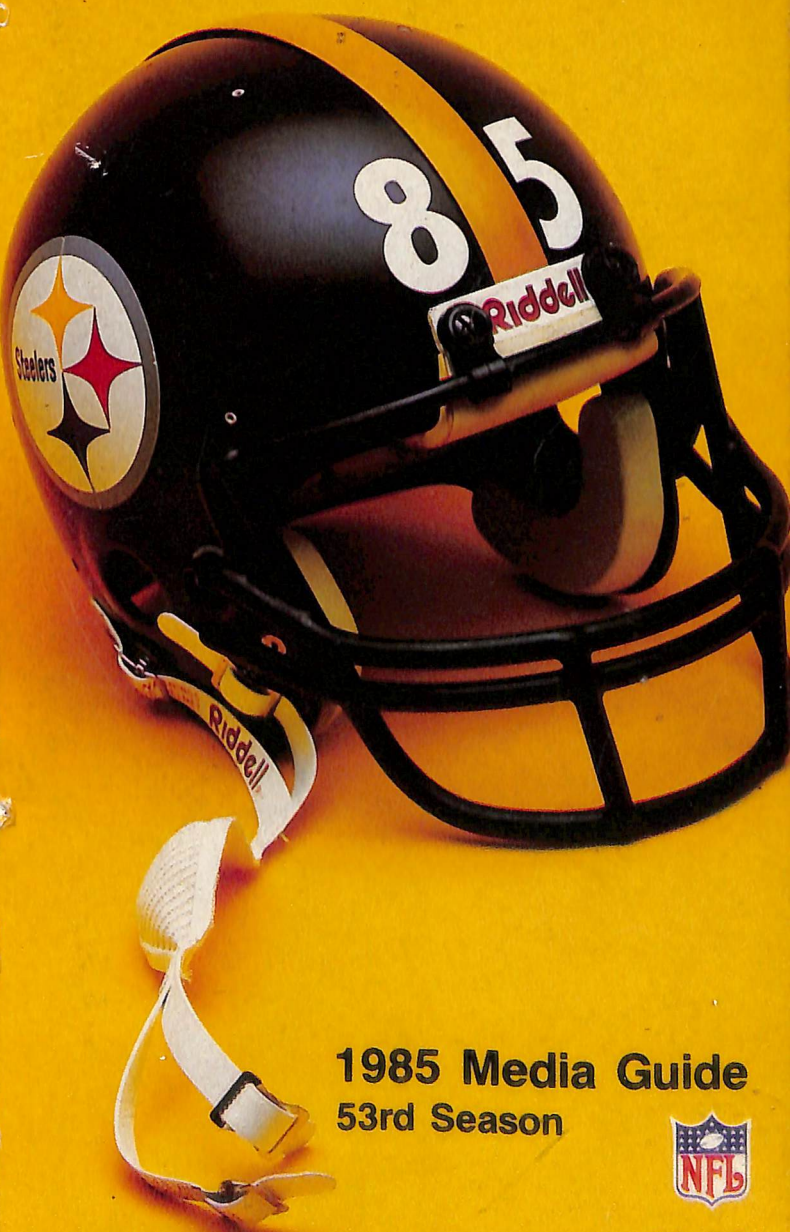

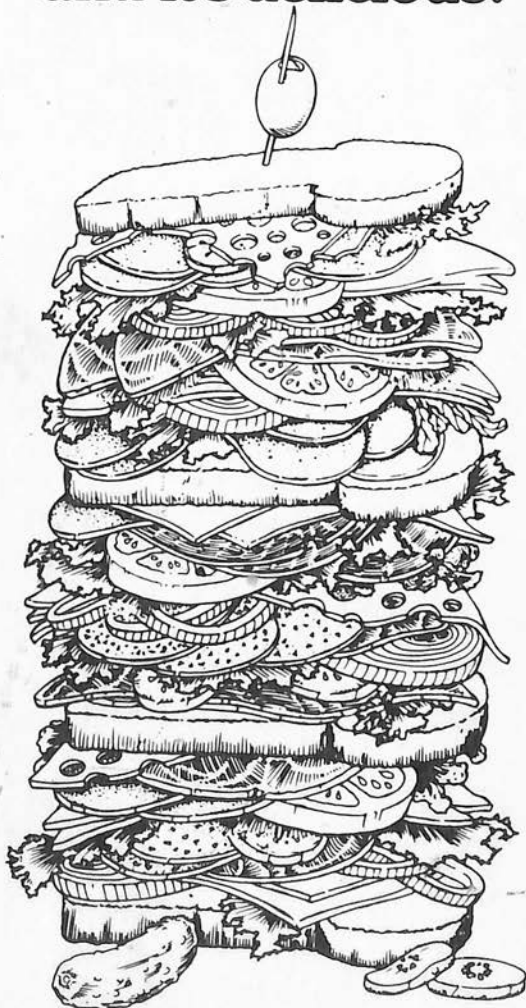

STEELER HISTORY

The first AFC Championship game trip since 1979 and a second straight AFC Central division title made 1984 a productive and memorable season for the youthful Pittsburgh Steelers.

With 60 percent of the roster having three or less years pro experience, Chuck Noll's team which was 4-4 at midseason, played its best football late in the year, clinching the division title and a playoff berth in 'must win' situations against Cleveland and on the road in the final week against the Los Angeles Raiders. In the playoffs, a key fourth quarter interception by safety Eric Williams and Frank Pollard's determined two-yard scoring run propelled the underdog Steelers past Denver, 24-17, and into the AFC Championship game vs. Miami before being eliminated by Dan Marino and the Dolphin aerial game, 45-28.

As the Steelers went to camp in 1984, a trio of future Hall of Famers closed out stellar careers. Terry Bradshaw, a 14-year veteran and two-time Super Bowl MVP, announced his retirement in July while running back Franco Harris, a 12-year veteran, was released on Aug. 13 and cornerback Mel Blount retired.

Bradshaw, a No. 1 pick in 1970, left the game as one of its top rated all-time passers and the holder of virtually every Steeler passing record. Harris, selected first in 1972, dominates the Steeler rushing record book and ranks third among all-time runners. Blount, who played 14 seasons, is the team's pass interception leader (57) and shares seventh on the all-time NFL list.

The Steelers were founded by Art Rooney in 1933 and carried the nickname Pirates until 1940. For more than five decades now, Mr. Rooney has watched the growth of the NFL's fifth oldest franchise. The early years — 1930's and 1940's — were lean times while the 1950's and 1960's brought some success, though never a playoff entry. But during the 1970's, the Steelers were pro football's most successful team. They won four Super Bowls, two more than any other team in NFL history while making the postseason playoffs a record-tying eight straight years.

Born in Coultsville, Pa., on January 26, 1901, Mr. Rooney moved to Pittsburgh with his family when he was a year and a half old. He grew up on the site now occupied by Three Rivers Stadium and still lives just a short walk from the Steelers' home field.

He was an outstanding athlete who excelled in football, baseball and boxing. Knute Rockne wanted him to play at Notre Dame, but he attended Indiana State (Pa.), Georgetown and Duquesne. In baseball, he was signed by the Boston Red Sox and Chicago Cubs, but an arm injury ended his major league ambitions. He was also selected to represent the United States on the 1920 Olympic boxing team.

With competition coming from major league baseball and the more established collegiate football game, the early years proved to be difficult ones for the Steelers and other pro football teams. Mr. Rooney's team played their games at Forbes Field, but frequently took the games to the fans, playing in such places as Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, New Orleans and Louisville.

In 1939, the Steelers stunned the sports world by signing Colorado All America Whizzer White to a \$15,800 contract, an unheard of sum at that time. The NFL's first big-money player is now United States Supreme Court Justice Byron White.

Sparked by rookie halfback Bill Dudley, now a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the Steelers had their first winning season in 1942 (7-4). The nucleus of that promising club was soon in the military. During World War II, the Steelers combined forces with the Philadelphia Eagles (1943) and Chicago Cardinals (1944).

After the war, the Steelers rekindled their efforts to bring a winner to Pittsburgh. Jock Sutherland, a legend at the University of Pittsburgh, joined the team in 1946. Utilizing the single wing, the Steelers tied for the divisional title in 1947 before losing in the playoffs to Philadelphia.

When Sutherland died unexpectedly on a scouting trip in 1948, the Steelers were dealt another setback. John Michelosen replaced him.

In 1952, Joe Bach began his second term as the team's coach as the Steelers became the last pro club to abandon the single wing. Under Bach, the Steelers were playing exciting football and improved their performance to .500 in 1953 when he resigned for health reasons.

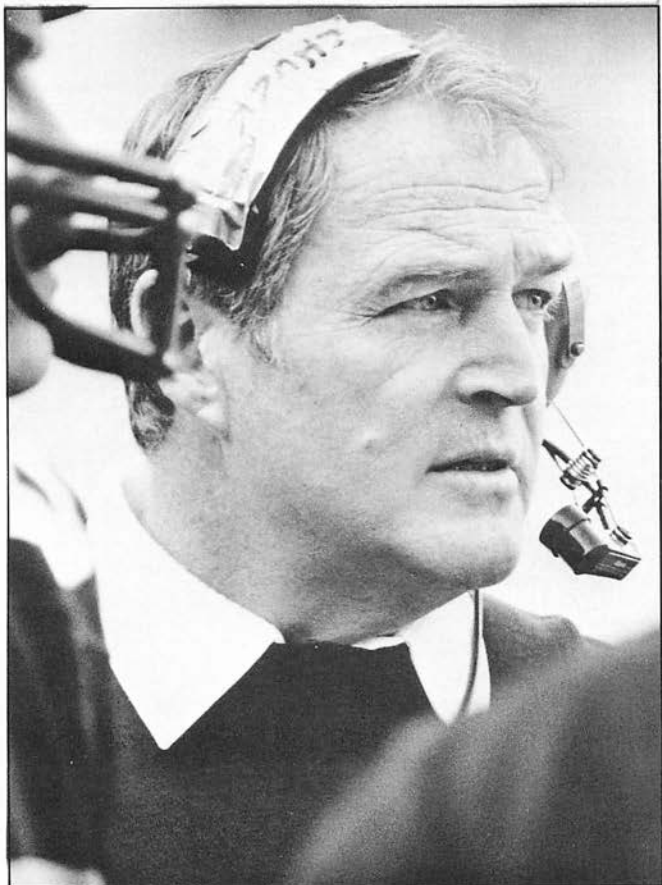
For the third time, Rooney called on his friend Walt Kiesling. He coached the team through 1956 before Buddy Parker arrived from Detroit (1957). Parker and the flamboyant Bobby Layne reeled off a string of four winning seasons in six years beginning with a 7-4-1 mark in 1958. In 1963, the Steelers fell one game short of delivering a title when they lost their final game to the New York Giants.

In 1964, Art Rooney, Sr. was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. At about the same time, a transition was beginning to take shape in the front office. Dan and Art, Jr., the oldest of Mr. Rooney's five sons, became active in the organization on a full-time basis.

As youngsters, both had performed menial duties in training camp and their life spans actually paralleled that of the Steelers. Dan's first formal assignment was selling advertising and editing the program. Art, Jr. worked in the ticket office, specializing in group sales.

STEELER COACHES



CHUCK NOLL

Head Coach

Steeler head coach Chuck Noll, now in his 17th season, is the seventh winningest coach in NFL history with a 157-95-1 (.623) overall record. The 52-year-old Cleveland, Ohio native who has put together 13 consecutive non-losing seasons and made the playoffs 11 times in that span, is third among active coaches behind Dallas' Tom Landry (243) and Miami's Don Shula (242).

Noll's 1984 Steelers won their ninth AFC Central title, tying Minnesota for the most division championships since the pro football merger in 1970. In a season which was called one of Noll's finest as a coach, the youthful Steelers needed a road victory against the defending Super Bowl champion Los Angeles Raiders in the final week of regular season to finish 9-7, win a second straight division crown and earn a third consecutive playoff appearance.

The Steelers entered the AFC Playoff game at Denver with one of the NFL's youngest teams. Two-thirds of the roster had three or less years of NFL experience including 15 rookie and first-year players and as many as four rookies starting on offense. Against the Broncos, Eric Williams' fourth quarter interception and Frank Pollard's two-yard scoring run put the Steelers in the AFC Championship game. A week later, the Steelers bowed to air-minded Miami, 45-28.

Noll has the longest tenure of any of the 14 Steeler head coaches and has been with the same club longer than any other AFC head coach. He is 15-7 in postseason (.682), a mark which is the second highest winning percentage among active coaches whose teams have appeared in at least 10 games. Among the 17 pro coaches with 100 or more victories, his postseason record is topped only by Vince Lombardi (9-1) and Weeb Ewbank (4-1). Noll is the only coach to win four Super Bowls and needs one more to tie Lombardi and the late George Halas, who each won five NFL championships. Noll, Lombardi and Tom Flores are the only NFL coaches who have not lost in the Super Bowl among those there more than once.

The 1985 season marks Noll's 33rd year in pro football as a player, assistant and head coach. His teams have recorded 26 winning seasons and made the playoffs 21 times. He is one of only five NFL all-time head coaches to lead a team for 17 consecutive seasons — Curly Lambeau (31), Landry (23), Steve Owen (23) and Bud Grant (17).

A former San Diego Charger assistant under Sid Gillman in the AFL, Noll came to Pittsburgh in 1969 from Shula's Baltimore Colts' staff. He immediately committed the team to a program of building through the draft. The Steelers have had extra selections in 15 of the last 16 drafts.

In Noll's inaugural year, Joe Greene was the Steelers' No. 1 pick. The team finished 1-13, winning the opener before losing 13 in a row. A year later, the Steelers selected quarterback Terry Bradshaw with their first selection. The losing streak carried over into 1970 as the Steelers began a new decade in a brand new Three Rivers Stadium with three consecutive setbacks and finished 5-9. In 1971, the club was 6-8, but the foundation was being built.

The breakthrough came in 1972 when the Steelers posted an 11-3 record and won their first AFC Central title. The team upended Oakland, 13-7, in the first round of the playoffs on a miraculous last-second touchdown by Franco Harris on a deflected pass. Eight days later, the Steelers lost to Miami, 21-17, in the AFC Championship game. The Dolphins finished with a perfect 17-0 record and their first Super Bowl. Noll was named UPI's AFC Coach of the Year.

The next year (1973), the team reeled off 10 wins but lost in the first round of the playoffs to Oakland. The club's productive drafting was beginning to pay big dividends.

In 1974, the Steelers rolled to the best regular season record in the NFL — 12-2 — and climbed to their ultimate goal. Pittsburgh whipped Buffalo (31-14) and Oakland (24-13) to win the AFC title and advanced to Super Bowl IX. Against Minnesota, the Steelers held the Vikings to just 17 yards rushing and won their first-ever world championship, 16-6. The victory climaxed a string of stellar defensive performances. To reach the Super Bowl, the Steeler defense produced one of the greatest efforts in playoff history, limiting the Raiders to 29 yards rushing.

In 1975, Noll became the third coach to win back-to-back Super Bowls when the Steelers won 10 of 14 regular season games, defeated Baltimore and Oakland in the AFC playoffs and capped the season by beating Dallas, 21-17, in Super Bowl X in Miami.

The following season (1976), the Steelers fielded what many say was Noll's best club, but it lost four of the first five games before rallying to win the last nine regular season games in a row and the opening playoff game. Noll was named NFL Coach of the Year by the Sporting News, but the Steelers' bid to become the first team in league history to win the Super Bowl three times ended with a 24-7 AFC Championship game loss to Oakland.

Pittsburgh made the playoffs for the sixth straight season in 1977, losing in the first round to Denver. In 1978 and 1979, the team rebounded, posting the best regular season won-loss records in the NFL and then going on to win Super Bowl XIII (35-31) and XIV (31-19) against Dallas and Los Angeles to finish the 1970's as the "Team of the Decade." In six short seasons, the Steelers had become the first NFL team to win four Super Bowls and the first to win two consecutively twice.

As the 1980's began, the Steelers missed the playoffs in 1980 and 1981, breaking an eight year streak. In the last three seasons — 1982, 1983, 1984 — while the roster has undergone wholesale changes, Noll's clubs have put together three consecutive playoff appearances. Four players — LB Jack Lambert, S Donnie Shell, WR John Stallworth and C Mike Webster — remain who played in all four Super Bowls and just seven have played in at least one.

Noll's pro football career began as a 21st round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1953 following a college career at Dayton, where he was team captain. He played seven seasons (77 career games) with the Browns as an offensive guard and linebacker. During that span, Cleveland won five Eastern Conference championships and played for three NFL titles (1953-54-55), winning two.

Noll's playing career ended prematurely at 27 when he retired to enter the coaching profession. However, an opportunity at Dayton did not materialize. He was planning a teaching career when Sid Gillman offered him the last spot on the staff of the Los Angeles Chargers of the new American Football League. Noll served as defensive assistant for six years with the Chargers winning four divisional titles and two AFL championships.

In 1966, he returned to the NFL as defensive backfield coach on the staff of Don Shula in Baltimore. In his three years, the Colts lost just three regular season games and won an NFL title in 1968 before losing to the New York Jets in Super Bowl III.

In 1984, Noll was appointed to the NFL Competition Committee by Commissioner Pete Rozelle. The Competition Committee is responsible for examining all competitive aspects of football including rules of the playing field, game conduct and many related areas such as player personnel procedures, eligibility and player and fan safety.

PERSONAL: Full name: Charles Henry Noll. Date of birth: January 5, 1932 in Cleveland, Ohio. Married, wife Marianne, and son Chris, (12/22/57), who teaches at Proctor Academy in Andover, New Hampshire. Noll attended Benedictine High School in Cleveland and received a Bachelor of Science degree in Education from Dayton (1953). The Nolls live in Upper St. Clair.



RON BLACKLEDGE

Offensive Line Coach —
Tackles/Tight Ends

Ron Blackledge, now in his fourth Steeler season, teams with Hal Hunter in handling the club's offensive line. Blackledge, a North Canton, Ohio native, coaches the offensive tackles and tight ends. He came to Pittsburgh in 1982 as an offensive assistant and then stepped into the offensive line job when Rollie Dotsch joined the USFL.

Blackledge spent 1984 shuffling personnel and battling a seige of injuries which struck hard at tackle and tight end. Five different starting combinations worked at tackle and three different tight ends started.

Veterans Larry Brown and Bennie Cunningham missed more than half the season and their replacements — Steve August, Ray Snell, Emil Boures and Chris Kolodziejki — also missed extended time. Tunch Ilkin was one of only two linemen and the only tackle to make every start.

A veteran of 25 years in the coaching profession, Blackledge came to the Steelers from Kent State where he was head coach (1979-81), compiling an 8-25 mark. He served as offensive coordinator (1977-78) at Kent State under Dennis Fitzgerald, now a Steeler assistant. Blackledge's coaching career began in the high school ranks for nine years at Canton South (1960-62), Canton Timken (1963-65) as head coach and at Canton Glenwood (1967-68). He coached the offensive line at Ashland College (1968-69) and then moved to Cincinnati (1970-72). For three seasons (1973-75), he coached the offensive line at Kentucky and then at Princeton (1976).

Blackledge played tight end and defensive end at Bowling Green where he is a member of the school's Hall of Fame. He has a Physical Education degree (1960) and holds a master's in Guidance and Physical Education from Ohio University (1967).

PERSONAL: Full name: Ronald Dale Blackledge. Date of Birth: April 15, 1938 in North Canton, Ohio. Married, wife Linda, with daughters Michelle (6/13/64) and Traci (8/17/71) and son Todd (2/25/61), a quarterback with the Kansas City Chiefs. The Blackledge family lives in the North Hills.



TONY DUNGY

Defensive Coordinator

Defensive coordinator Tony Dungy, 29, is the NFL's youngest coordinator — defensive or offensive. A member of Chuck Noll's Steeler staff for five seasons, he is beginning his second year as coordinator of a defense which ranked fifth in the NFL — third in the AFC — in 1984.

Dungy's initial season as coordinator began with the task of replacing the retired Mel Blount, a position change for Robin Cole, starting status for Bryan Hinkle and the loss of Jack Lambert in the regular season opener with a toe injury. At year's end, Sam Washington, Blount's replacement,

ranked among league and team leaders in interceptions. Hinkle distinguished himself at right outside linebacker and David Little stepped in for Lambert to fill big on-field and leadership void. The Steeler defense intercepted 31 opponent passes, the second best total in the NFL. Against the run, the unit led the NFL in fewest yards allowed, fewest first downs and lowest average per rushing attempt while shutting down all six 1,000-yard rushers it faced.

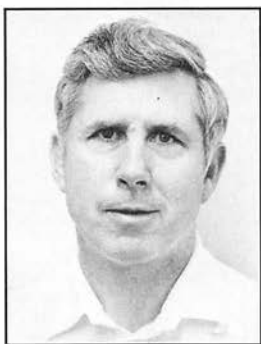
Dungy's Steeler career began as a free agent safety in 1977. He won a roster spot over veterans Ray Oldham and former All Pro Glen Edwards. He played two years, mostly as a fifth defensive back and on special teams. Dungy led the 1978 Steeler defense in interceptions (6) although making just two starts. He was traded to San Francisco in August of 1979 for a draft choice and the following year was again traded to the New York Giants and later waived.

After one season as defensive backfield coach at Minnesota (1980), Dungy rejoined the Steelers as a defensive assistant (1981) and took over the secondary in 1982.

Dungy played quarterback as a collegian at Minnesota. A two-time MVP and senior captain, he held Gopher records for total plays (999), passing attempts (586), completions (274), passing yards (3,577) and touchdowns (25) until 1982. He played in the Japan and Hula Bowls and East-West game.

He has a Business Administration degree (1977).

PERSONAL: Full name: Anthony Kevin Dungy. Date of birth: October 6, 1955 in Jackson, Michigan. Married, wife Lauren, and daughter Tiara (12/28/84). The Dungy family lives in Allison Park.



DENNIS FITZGERALD

Inside Linebacker Coach

Dennis Fitzgerald, a veteran of 25 years in the coaching profession, is in his fourth season on the Steeler staff and second season as inside linebacker coach.

Fitzgerald and the Steelers had some anxious moments at the start of last season when perennial All Pro Jack Lambert, the 'heart and soul' of the defense, suffered a debilitating dislocated big toe in the first series of the first game. He was replaced by David Little, a four-year veteran with only two games of starting experience, alongside Robin Cole, who was moving inside for the first time. At season's end, the result was

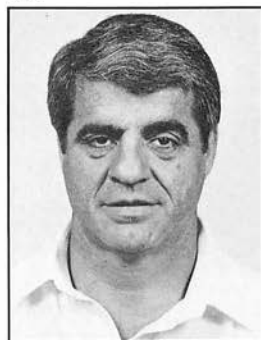
the NFL's fifth best defense and first in fewest rushing yards allowed (101.1 per game), a Pro Bowl year for Robin Cole and top flight play from Little.

Fitzgerald, a native of Ann Arbor, Michigan, joined the Steelers from Tulane (1981) where he was defensive coordinator. He began his career at Michigan as assistant freshman coach (1961-62) and head freshman coach (1963-65) before moving to defensive line coach under Bump Elliott. In 1969-70, he served as defensive coordinator at Kentucky before going to Kent State (1971-74), where he coached Lambert and eventually succeeded Don James as head coach. In three seasons (1975-77), Fitzgerald compiled an 18-16 mark including 8-4 in 1976. From 1978-80, he coordinated the Syracuse defense.

A five-time letterman in football and wrestling at Michigan, he was named football MVP in 1960 as a halfback. Fitzgerald still holds the school record for longest kickoff return — 99 yards vs. Michigan State (1960). He also won two Big Ten championships (1960-61) in wrestling and served as captain. He was an NCAA semifinalist twice (1960-61), a national AAU finalist (1961) and participated in the 1963 Pan American and World Championships.

Fitzgerald has an undergraduate and master's degree in Physical Education from Michigan.

DICK HOAK

Offensive Backfield Coach

Offensive backfield coach Dick Hoak, a former Steeler running back, is in his 24th season with the Pittsburgh organization. This season will be Hoak's 14th as a coach after playing for the Steelers for 10 years (1961-70).

For the first time in more than a decade, Hoak engineered the development of a group of young Steeler runners which did not include the Hall of Fame talents of Franco Harris. It was a year of transition and great production. He helped underrated Frank Pollard develop into one of the NFL's top ranked rushers and found running room

for former No. 1 pick Walter Abercrombie and Rich Erenberg.

The Steeler rushing attack piled up 2,179 yards in 1984, second in the AFC, and propelled the team's late season playoff surge. Pollard gained a career high 810 yards, sixth in the AFC, including the first two 100-yard games of his career. His ranking was the highest by a Steeler runner since Harris (1979). Abercrombie also gained a career high 610 yards and the first 100-yards game (2) of his career while Erneberg, an untested No. 9 draft choice, started nine games and finished third in rushing and receiving.

Hoak finished his Steeler playing career as the No. 3 all-time rusher behind Harris and John Henry Johnson. He gained 3,965 yards and scored 25 touchdowns on 1,132 rushing attempts. He also caught 145 career passes for 1,152 yards and eight scores. A three-time rushing leader, he had a Pro Bowl season in 1968, gaining 858 yards to finish fourth in the NFL. Hall of Famer Bobby Layne, a former teammate, once called him "the most perfect player in my time."

Hoak played both quarterback and running back at Penn State (1958-60) where he was offensive captain and team MVP. He has a Social Studies degree (1961). Hoak is a former recipient of the Dapper Dan Club's award as Pittsburgh's outstanding sports figure.

JED HUGHES

Outside Linebacker Coach

Jed Hughes, a former defensive coordinator at UCLA and Minnesota Vikings' assistant, is now in his second season as outside linebacker coach, a position which produced Pro Bowler Mike Merriweather, a major Steeler story last season. Hughes, 37, teams with inside linebacker coach Dennis Fitzgerald.

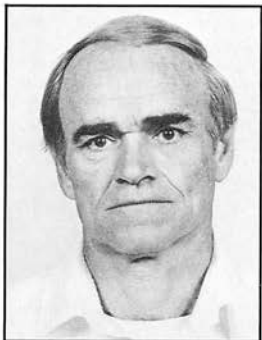
With Robin Cole's move inside, Hughes' outside linebacking corps included Merriweather, a second-year starter, and Bryan Hinkle, a starter for the first time as well as inexperienced young backups. Merriweather, a former No. 3 pick, exploded for

a team record 15 sacks, led the team in tackles and was selected to his first Pro Bowl. It was the 15th consecutive season the Steelers had placed a linebacker in the prestigious game. Hinkle, the team's interception leader among linebackers, played standout football as a member of the league's No. 5 rated defense. Hughes also found time to get Craig Bingham and Todd Seabaugh some playing experience.

Hughes coached the Vikings defensive secondary (1982-83) before coming to the Steelers. His background also includes 11 years in the collegiate ranks at Stanford, Michigan and UCLA. His coaching career began at Biglerville (Pa.) High (1970). In 1971 and 1972, he coached first the offensive and then defensive lines at Stanford before going to Michigan as offensive line coach for a season and linebacker coach for three years (1973-75). At UCLA (1976-71), Hughes coached the inside linebackers and defensive line before being named defensive coordinator.

The New York City native holds a bachelor's degree in Biology and Physical Education (1970) from Gettysburg College. He has a master's in Education from Stanford (1972) and a Ph.D. in Education Administration (1975) from Michigan. Hughes was a two-year starter in both football and baseball in Gettysburg. He served in the U.S. Navy following high school, receiving an honorable discharge in 1970. He won 10 high school letters and was a three-time all-state baseball player.

HAL HUNTER

Offensive Line Coach — Guards/Centers

Hal Hunter, a former collegiate head coach with professional experience in both the NFL and CFL, begins his first season as Steeler offensive line coach. He will handle the guards and centers and team with Ron Blackledge. Hunter joined the Steeler staff on Feb. 11, 1985, replacing Bill Meyers, who returned to the college ranks.

Hunter inherits a seven-time Pro Bowl center in Mike Webster and a group of youthful guards including veteran Craig Wolfley and Terry Long. The guard position is the deepest Steeler offensive line situa-

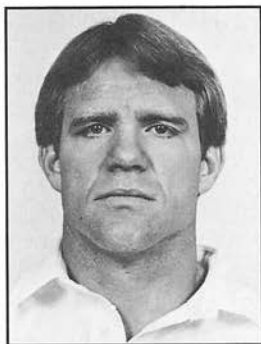
tion although additional experience and peak health are important 1985 goals. The team also will be looking to develop depth at both positions.

A Canonsburg, Pa., native with more than 26 years of coaching experience, Hunter came to Pittsburgh from the Indianapolis Colts where he served as offensive line coach (1982-84) under Frank Kush. In 1981, he was offensive coordinator and line coach of the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the CFL with Kush. Hunter was a finalist for the Colts' head coaching position last January.

Hunter's collegiate experience began at Richmond (1958-61) as defensive line coach. He coached the offensive line at West Virginia (1962-63), Maryland (1964-65) and Duke (1966-70). He served as offensive coordinator at Kentucky (1974-76) and later as offensive line coach at Indiana (1973-76) before going to California State of Pennsylvania as head coach, (1977-80), compiling a 9-30-1 record in four seasons.

As a player, Hunter was a three-year starter at linebacker and offensive guard at Pitt (1955-57) and was a senior co-captain. He has a bachelor's in Secondary Education from Pitt (1957) and a master's in Science from West Virginia (1962).

JON KOLB

Defensive Line Coach

In his fourth season as a Steeler coach after 13 seasons as an offensive tackle and a member of the 'Team of the Decade,' Jon Kolb handles the defensive line. He joined Chuck Noll's staff on Feb. 17, 1982 after retiring as a player.

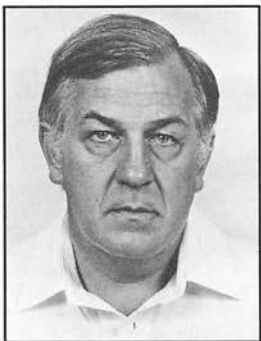
Kolb and the defensive line face an interesting challenge in 1985. Nose tackle Gary Dunn, the 'senior citizen' up front, has played Pro Bowl caliber football the last three seasons to anchor the defense while younger players such as Edmund Nelson and John Goodman have developed into first rate players. In 1983, the Steelers pass

rush featured speed and quickness on the outside in Keith Gary and Keith Willis, who set a team record with 14 sacks. Last season, both Gary and Willis labored with nagging injuries which cut into their production. At the same time, Kolb was nurturing converted offensive lineman Mark Catano, a situational player who made some key plays late in the season.

With half of last year's 47 sacks coming from the linebackers, an effective pass rush from the line and Willis and Gary's return to peak health are key concerns as reflected in the No. 1 draft status of Darryl Sims.

One of nine Steelers to play 13 seasons, Kolb was a No. 3 draft choice in Noll's first draft class in 1969. His career included 138 starts — 112 in a row (1971-79) — at tackle after playing center at Oklahoma State. In his first 10 seasons, Kolb played 156 of 157 possible games and ranks fourth in all-time career games behind all-time leader Mel Blount (200). He was a senior All-America before coming to the Steelers.

TOM MOORE

Offensive Coordinator

Tom Moore, a member of Chuck Noll's staff for nine seasons, is in his third year as the Steelers' offensive coordinator.

The club's retooled offense, featuring a pair of new quarterbacks, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and Rookie of the Year at wide receiver balanced by a solid running game, was a critical part of the Steelers' second straight AFC Central division title and playoff berth. The turnaround, featuring a cluster of rookies, was dramatic. For the second straight season, the Steelers began the season with a new quarterback (David Woodley) and then injuries spelled

opportunity for Mark Malone. At the same time, the wide receiver position, a problem area in 1983, became a team strength with John Stallworth's record setting season and the introduction of No. 1 pick Louis Lipps. Both players were named to the Pro Bowl.

Two years ago, the Steeler passing attack ranked 27th in the league, a telling statistic in the pass-oriented NFL. Last year, the club improved to 15th and finished second in the AFC in rushing. The pass offense led the league in yards per completion and Malone, seeing his first extended action, led all pro passers with a 14.66 per completion average while compiling a 7-4 record as a starter. Moore sees continued improvement in 1985, citing competition for the No. 1 quarterback position coupled with more consistent performances from all of the offensive weapons.

Moore began his Steeler coaching career in 1977 working with the wide receivers. He came to Pittsburgh from Minnesota where he was offensive coordinator and coached Tony Dungy, now the team's defensive coordinator. His coaching career began at Dayton (1965) as backfield coach. Moore became offensive coordinator at Wake Forest (1969) after a military obligation and then coached the offensive backs at Georgia Tech (1970-71). He accepted the first of two opportunities as offensive coordinator at Minnesota (1972-73) before joining the New York Stars of the World Football League (1974). He returned to Minnesota when the WFL folded.

Moore was a quarterback under Forest Evasheveski at Iowa (1957-60) playing on a Big Ten championship team (1958) which beat California in the Rose Bowl and established a total offensive record (580 yards).

Moore has a History degree (1961) and a master's in Guidance (1966) from Minnesota.

WALT EVANS

Conditioning and Training Coach

Pittsburgh native Walt Evans is in his third season with the Steelers as conditioning and training coach. He joined the Steelers in 1983 as assistant before assuming expanded responsibilities in the 1985 off-season.

Evans is charged with developing and maintaining a comprehensive conditioning and strength program as well as spending considerable time in the related areas of flexibility, rehabilitation and nutrition. The Steelers' program begins with a cardiovascular stress test for all players to identify the conditioning needs of each. A work-

out routine is then developed to meet a player's specific needs.

Evans, 34, served as a corporate consultant for General Nutrition Corporation (1980-82) before joining the Steelers. In that capacity, he helped formulate health and fitness programs for major areas corporations such as Westinghouse and H.J. Heinz. He coached football and track at South High School (1975-79).

A 1974 graduate of Marietta College in Ohio with a B.A. in Physical Education, Evans received a master's degree in Sports Physiology from Pitt and is pursuing a doctorate. He is a member of the American College of Sports Medicine and has written several articles on health and fitness for major magazines in the field. He is also working on a book on conditioning.

Evans played football and basketball at Oliver High. He played in the city championship game, the last game played at Forbes Field.

Gary Stragar is in his fifth season as a Steeler trainer. The McKeesport native joined the team as a training camp assistant in 1981 and was hired full time the following year.

Prior to coming to Pittsburgh, he served as assistant trainer at Syracuse for two years (1980-81) and as a graduate assistant (1978-79). Stragar has a B.S. in Physical Education from Kent State (1977) and a master's in Physical Educa-

tion from Syracuse (1979).

KANSAS CITY 37, STEELERS 27

Sept. 2 at Pittsburgh, 56,709

The Steelers lost their third home opener in four years on four costly turnovers — two bad snaps and two interceptions — which the Chiefs converted into 20 points. The mistakes spoiled a Steeler record 419 net yards passing and great individual efforts by receivers John Stallworth and Louis Lipps, playing his first regular season game. Stallworth had a career-high 167 yards and became the team's all-time leader in this department with 5,571 yards. Lipps caught six passes for 183 yards, the sixth highest total ever by a Steeler, and scored two TDs, one on an 80-yard pass from David Woodley. Woodley suffered a concussion in his first game as a Steeler and had to leave early in the third quarter. The Steelers struggled with their running game and even though they outgained the Chiefs by 201 yards, made the big errors which Kansas City did not behind QB Todd Blackledge, making his first NFL start.

AFC PLAYOFFS

STEELERS 24, DENVER 17

Dec. 30 at Denver, 74,981

The Steelers overcame a near-disastrous start, a blocked punt and three missed field goals to earn their first postseason win since Super Bowl XIV. Eric Williams' interception and 28-yard return to the two-yard line with three and a half minutes to play set up the winning touchdown, scored on a gutty two-yard plunge by Frank Pollard. Twice the Steelers came back from seven point deficits and their three scoring drives prior to the final TD averaged almost 70 yards while the Broncos never travelled more than 46 yards for their 17 points. The game opened with Mark Malone losing the ball on fumbles the first two times the Steelers had the ball. Even though Denver scored after the second one, the Pittsburgh defense displayed a preview of how tough it was going to be. Malone rebounded from his early miscues to complete six of eight passes on the Steelers' two scoring drives which gave them a halftime lead. A blocked punt on Pittsburgh's first second half possession gave Denver the ball on the four-yard line but for the second time inside their own ten, the Steeler defense stiffened and the Broncos had to settle for a field goal. The next time the Broncos had the ball they broke the 10-10 tie with their most impressive offensive series of the game with the TD coming on a John Elway bullet to Steve Watson, the Denver offensive hero with 11 receptions. After Louis Lipps returned the kickoff 34 yards, he and Malone combined for 47 yards on three passes to forge another deadlock as Lipps broke several tackles on the seven-yard scoring play. The Broncos managed only two first downs the rest of the game with the last one coming with just 22 seconds left as the blitzing Steeler defense, sparked by Williams' steal and David Little's two sacks, battered Elway on almost every play. The running of Pollard and Walter Abercrombie carried the Steelers to the nine-yard line but the 54-yard march was wasted when Gary Anderson was wide left on a 26-yard attempt. Two plays later, Williams turned the game around again with his big play. Pollard with 99 yards and Abercrombie with 75 had postseason career highs rushing while Gary Dunn had his first career interception in the second quarter to end a Denver threat on the four-yard line.

AFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

MIAMI 45, STEELERS 28

Jan. 6 at Miami, 76,029

The Miami passing game overwhelmed the Steeler defense as Dan Marino set AFC Championship game records with 421 yards passing and four TDs. Eleven of Marino's 21 completions were for 20 yards or more and three were at least 40 yards as the Steeler secondary could not contain the ultra-quick Dolphin receivers. Three of their TD drives took less than two minutes to complete. The Steelers controlled the ball on the ground most of the first half but after they had taken a 14-10 lead on John Stallworth's NFL record 11th TD reception in postseason, the Dolphins scored two TDs in the last 2:52 of the half and added another one on their first possession of the second half. Following this scoring barrage, the Steelers were forced to open their offense and stray from their ball-control game which was very effective in the first 30 minutes and had accounted for 123 yards rushing and a four-minute edge in possession time. If there was a turning point, it came with a minute and a half left in the first half and Miami holding a 17-14 lead when Mark Malone suffered his third interception which the Dolphins quickly converted into a TD and a 10-point margin. From the end of the first half to their first series of the fourth quarter, the Dolphins scored on five straight possessions. They converted each of Malone's interceptions into TDs and the Dolphins' turnover edge of 4-1 was far too much for the Steelers to overcome. The total yards of 1,024 by both teams was an AFC title game record as was the 50 first downs. The victory gave Miami a record-tying fifth Super Bowl berth which was denied the Steelers who had advanced to the championship game for the first time since 1979. Stallworth added to his TD reception mark with a tumbling third quarter score that brought the Steelers to within 10 points. But, Marino answered with 80 and 66-yard drives to put the game out of reach. Malone had career-highs with 20 completions and 312 yards passing.

At 52, Dan is one of the most able and respected executives in sports. He currently serves on the three-member Executive Committee of NFL Properties and the same body of the Management Council and is on the Board of NFL Films. He also has served as Chairman of the NFL's Expansion Committee. On a club level, he has been the architect of one of the most successful franchises in professional sports and guides it with a steady hand.

Art's most significant contribution was and still is in personnel. A former football player at St. Vincent College, he is the man behind the great Steeler drafts. He oversees a department that has been creative and productive and still spends many hours himself scouring the country for talent.

After Parker left prior to the 1965 season, Mike Nixon and Bill Austin attempted to produce a winner. They failed.

In 1969, the Rooneys named 37-year-old Chuck Noll as the 14th coach in the club's history. Relying solely on the draft to build, he patiently nursed his young team to maturity.

The team's ability to maximize their draft selections has been the key to their unprecedented success. When Joe Greene was picked in the first round in 1969, he became the nucleus of what was to become a great defense. The following year Terry Bradshaw was the first choice and it was the makings of an explosive offense.

After three building years under Noll in which the team went from 1-13 in 1969 to 5-9 and 6-8 the next two seasons, the big breakthrough came in 1972 as the Steelers won their first division title ever. They lost to Miami, the eventual NFL champion, in the AFC Championship game but it was to be their first of six trips in eight years to that plateau.

In 1974, the Steelers won their first league crown. The next season they became the third team to win back-to-back Super Bowls. In 1978, they were the first team to win three Super Bowls and in 1979, became the first to win four and win two consecutively twice. Their total of four league championships is third to Green Bay (11) and Chicago (8).

As the 1980's began, the Steelers saw an eight-year playoff streak end by missing postseason action in 1980 and 1981. Then, with the roster being rejuvenated by an influx of young talent, the team has started another string with three straight playoff berths in 1982-83-84.

The Steelers 50th Anniversary season was a very special one. An all-time team was selected by the fans and honored at a gala banquet in October of 1982. The banquet was part of a weekend of activities which attracted thousands of people to an exhibit featuring memorabilia and other informational materials from the five decades of Steeler football.

Things That Could Happen in 1985:

CHUCK NOLL

• Currently seventh on the all-time list of NFL coaches with 157-95-1 record. Minnesota's Bud Grant, who returns to active coaching this season, is sixth (161-99-5) and Paul Brown (170-108-6) is fifth behind the late George Halas, the all-time leader (326-150-30). Noll is third among active head coaches with 157 victories behind Tom Landry (243) and Don Shula (242). His winning percentage (.623) is sixth among active coaches behind Joe Gibbs (47-18-0, .723), Shula (242-94-6, .716), Tom Flores (66-33-0, .667), Landry (243-141-6, .631) and Chuck Knox (119-71-1, .626).

GARY ANDERSON

• Led AFC in scoring the last two consecutive seasons with 119 points in 1983 and 117 in 1984. No Steeler placekicker has ever won three AFC scoring titles. Roy Gerela also won two.

BENNIE CUNNINGHAM

• With 196 receptions, currently eighth on all-time Steelers' list. Could climb as high as fifth. Needs four catches to pass Roy Jefferson (199) for seventh; 34 to pass Buddy Dial (229) and 35 to pass Ray Mathews (230) for fifth.

FRANK POLLARD

• With 2,283 career yards rushing, currently eighth on club's all-time list. Could climb as high as fifth. Needs 430 yards to pass Tom Tracy (2,712); 660 to pass French Fuqua (2,942) and 989 to pass Fran Rogel (3,271) for fifth.

DONNIE SHELL

• With 43 career interceptions, the NFL leader among active players. Needs 10 to pass Jack Butler (52) for second place on the Steeler all-time list behind leader Mel Blount (57).

JOHN STALLWORTH

• With three 1,000-yard seasons as a receiver, needs one more to tie for third place on the NFL's all-time list with Del Shofner (Los Angeles), Lionel Taylor (Denver) and San Diego's Charlie Joiner behind Lance Alworth, the record-holder (7). Stallworth broke seven Steeler records in 1984. He is the all-time leader in career catches (387), yards (6,799), touchdown receptions (55), single season catches (80), single season yards (1,395), 1,000-yard seasons (3) and most 100-yard games (22).

• As 1985 season begins, needs 13 catches to reach 400 mark. Forty-four (44) all-time NFL receivers have caught 400 or more passes. There are four active players ahead of Stallworth — Kellen Winslow (399), James Lofton (397), Wes Chandler (393) and Charlie Young (390).

• Stallworth is the all-time NFL record holder in postseason for most touchdowns (12) and most 100-yard games (5). His string of eight straight post-season games with a touchdown reception, another NFL mark, was broken at Denver last year but started again with two touchdown catches vs. Miami.

MIKE WEBSTER

• Has played 180 consecutive games including postseason. Webster's string includes 161 in regular season, sixth among active players behind Dave Dalby (189), Joe DeLamielleure (175), Ray Guy (175), Gregg Bingham (173), Charlie Joiner (165) and Webster. He is moving towards Ray Mansfield's team mark (182). Webster has never missed a career game, has not missed a start since gaining full-time status in 1977 and has not missed an offensive play in the last five regular seasons. His 180 game string includes 19 in postseason.
