HISTORY OF THE STEELERS

The NFL's fifth-oldest franchise was born July 8, 1933, when 32-year old Art Rooney founded the Pittsburgh club, naming it the Pirates. Seven losing seasons followed before the team was re-named the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1940, but the lean years continued. Improvement was evidenced in the 1950's and 1960's, but a first playoff berth continued to elude Rooney's club. The metamorphosis finally began in 1969 when Chuck Noll became the 14th head coach of the Steelers, and in 1972, 40 years after its birth, the team won its first division title.

Over the next eight years the Steelers made NFL history with four Super Bowl championships, and closed out the decade with a title that eased the memory of its first 40 years. The Steelers became known as the 1970's 'Team of the Decade.'

Arthur Joseph Rooney, the patriarch of the Steelers, was born in Coultersville, Pa. on January 27, 1901. At the age of one, Mr. Rooney moved with his family to Pittsburgh's North Side, growing up on the site where Three Rivers Stadium now stands. Mr. Rooney, the oldest of eight children, still lives just a short walk from the Steelers' home.

After attending St. Peter's Parochial School and Duquesne University Prep School, Rooney continued his education at Indiana University (Pa.), Georgetown, and Duquesne. An outstanding athlete, he excelled in football and boxing, but his finest sport was baseball. An arm injury, however, ended what was a promising career. In boxing Rooney was a standout as well, being selected in 1920 to represent the United States on the Olympic boxing team. He was also a fight promoter, his most memorable bout being Jersey Joe Walcott's 1951 upset of Ezzard Charles in Pittsburgh for the heavyweight championship of the world.

In the early years, Rooney's Steelers played their home games in Forbes Field, but competition from professional baseball and the popularity of college football prompted Rooney to often take his team to the fans, playing games in Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, New Orleans, and Louisville.

In 1939, after a 1-9-1 season, the Steelers rocked professional football by signing Colorado All-American "Whizzer" White to an unheard of \$15,800 contract. Byron White, the NFL's first big-money player and one of the Steelers' most illustrious alumni, is now a United States Supreme Court Justice.

In 1942 the Steelers turned in their first winning record (7-4) led by rookie halfback Bill Dudley, who is now a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. With the nation at war and rosters depleted, the Steelers merged in 1943 with the Philadelphia Eagles (Phil-Pitt) and in 1944 with the Chicago Cardinals (Card-Pitt).

With the return to peacetime, Rooney and the Steelers made a new commitment to bring winning football to Pittsburgh. Legendary Pitt coach Jock Sutherland, who utilized the single wing formation, was hired as the team's new head coach in 1946. In Sutherland's second season the Steelers tied for the Eastern Division title before losing to Philadelphia in the playoffs. Soon after, Sutherland died unexpectedly while on a scouting trip, and he was succeeded in 1948 by John Michelosen. In four seasons Michelosen had a 20-26-2 record, and he was replaced in 1952 by Joe Bach. After the 1953 season Bach, who had also coached the Steelers in 1935-36, resigned for health reasons.

In 1954 Rooney, for the third time, called on his friend Walt Kiesling. Kiesling had been the Steelers' head coach on two previous occasions, from 1939-40 and 1941-44. In his third stint with the team Kiesling coached for three seasons, until Buddy Parker arrived from Detroit in 1957. With the flamboyant Bobby Layne at quarterback, the Steelers recorded four winning seasons in the next six years. Parker's record of 51-47-6 is second only to Noll among the Steelers' 14 head coaches.

Unsuccessful stints by Mike Nixon (1965) and Bill Austin (1966-68) preceded what was to finally be the beginning of a dynasty in Pittsburgh. In 1969 Dan Rooney, now the team's president, called on 37-year old Chuck Noll to build a winner. Relying on the draft, Noll selected defensive tackle Joe Greene with his first pick in 1969 to form the nucleus of a solid defense. The next year he chose quarterback Terry Bradshaw, around whom he would build an explosive offense. Both players, after 13- and 14-year careers, respectively, are now future Hall of Famers.

In 1970 the National and American Football Leagues merged, and the Steelers, along with the Cleveland Browns and Baltimore Colts, agreed to move to the new American Football Conference. The Steelers and Browns remained division rivals, jumping from the NFL's Eastern Conference Century Division to the Central Division of the AFC. Two years later the Steelers won their first division crown with an 11-3 record, followed by a miraculous last-second 13-7 playoff win over Oakland when Franco Harris corralled a deflected Bradshaw pass and carried it into the endzone amid the roar of loyal Pittsburgh fans. The 1972 season ended with a 21-17 AFC Championship game loss to Miami, but the Steelers had reached a new pinnacle of success. Over the next eight years they climbed to a height unmatched by any NFL team. In 1974 the Steelers won their first league championship, and the next year became the third team to win back-to-back Super Bowls. In 1978 they became the

first to win three Super Bowls, and in 1979, the first and only team to win four Super Bowls and two consecutively twice.

After falling short of the playoffs in 1980 and 1981, the Steelers returned to postseason play in their 50th anniversary season, 1982. Commemorating the team's five decades, an anniversary banquet was held in October of 1982 to honor the Steelers' all-time team as selected by the fans. The banquet was part of a week of activities and exhibits which attracted thousands of fans in recognizing the Steelers' 50 seasons.

Art Rooney's contributions to professional football were recognized and rewarded in 1964 with his induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. By that time the Steeler front office had begun to take on a new look as Dan and Art, Jr., the oldest of Mr. Rooney's five sons, had become immersed in the operation of the club.

Growing up with the Steelers, Dan and Art, Jr. had now moved up through the ranks, having begun as youngsters working at the team's training camp. Dan's first assignment was in public relations, selling advertising and editing game programs. Art, Jr. worked in the team's ticket office, specializing in group sales.

Dan, 53, has been the president of the Steelers since 1975. He is a member of the Executive Committee for the NFL Management Council and is on the Board of Directors of NFL Films, and in the past he served as Chairman of the NFL's Expansion Committee and the league's Negotiating Committee, and was a member of the three-person Executive Committee of NFL Properties. One of the most respected executives in sports, Rooney is also active with such charities as the United Way, The Ireland Fund, and the American Diabetes Association.

Art, Jr. is the team's vice president in charge of player personnel, a position he has held since 1971. Art, 50, has been the catalyst behind the club's drafting success, and the importance of his role is intensified as the Steelers rely heavily on a philosophy of building championship teams through the draft. A former football player at St. Vincent College, where the team now holds training camp, Rooney continues to spend many hours of travel year-round scouting prospective players.

Nine former members of the Steeler family are enshrined today in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The charter class of 1963 included former NFL Commissioner Bert Bell, Cal Hubbard, and Johnny "Blood" McNally. Art Rooney, Sr. was inducted in 1964, followed by Bill Dudley and Walt Kiesling in 1966. Bobby Layne joined the group in 1967, and Marion Motley in 1968. Ernie Stautner, the last Steeler to be inducted, entered The Hall in 1969. Several members of the 'Team of the Decade,' however, are expected to be enshrined when they become eligible. The first of these, Joe Greene, will become eligible in January of 1987, and he should become the first Steeler to enter The Hall in 18 years.

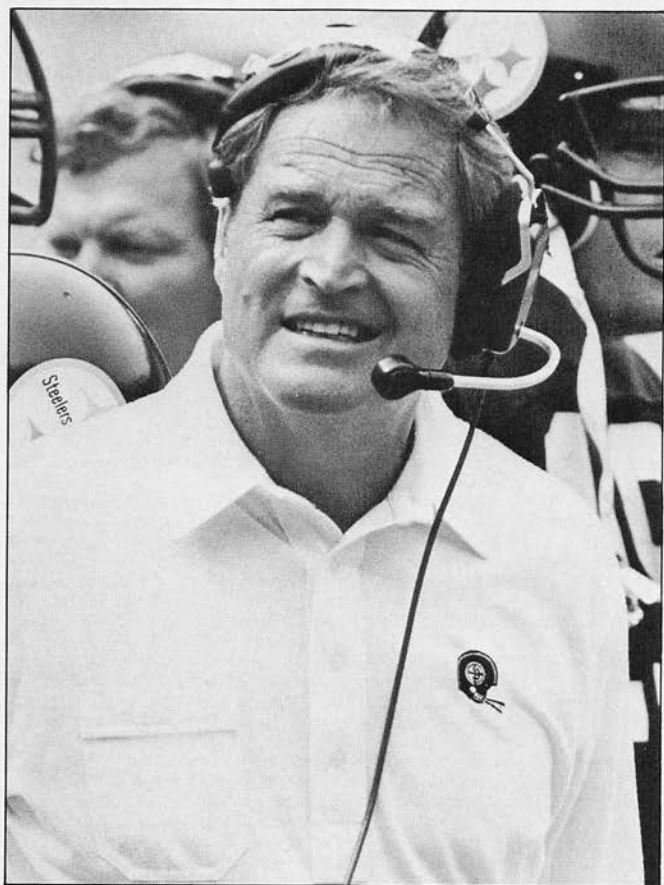

CHUCK NOLL

Head Coach

Head coach Chuck Noll embarks upon his 18th season in charge of the Steelers with the prospect of becoming the fifth-winningest coach in the history of the NFL. His record of 164-104-1 (.612) gives Noll the seventh-place ranking in career wins. With five more victories he will surpass Bud Grant (168), and seven wins will place him ahead of Paul Brown (170) for fifth place among the league's all-time coaches.

Among the NFL's current coaches, Noll ranks third in career wins and he is one of only five men to have earned 100 career victories, along with Don Shula (255), Tom Landry (253), Chuck Knox (127), and Don Coryell (113). Noll also enters the 1986 season with the seventh-best winning percentage (.612) among the current coaches.

In 1985 Noll's Steelers struggled with inconsistency, managing to put together only one three-game winning streak. The young team still held on to at least a share of the division lead through eight of the season's first 12 games, but a 3-3 record against division opponents and four fourth quarter losses dropped the club to 7-9 and out of playoff contention. The team's 7-9 record marked a break in Noll's string of 13 consecutive non-losing seasons, and became only his fourth sub-.500 finish in 17 years as a head coach. For just the third time in the last 14 years, Chuck Noll's Steelers fell short of a playoff berth.

The Chuck Noll era began in Pittsburgh in 1969, when at 37 years of age the Cleveland native left Shula's Baltimore Colts staff to take over a team that was 2-11-1 the previous year. Implementing his philosophy of building through the draft, Noll made defensive tackle Joe Greene the first draft selection of his head coaching career. A 1969 opening day victory was followed by 13 straight losses, and Noll again looked to the draft for help in 1970. He tabbed quarterback Terry Bradshaw on the first round, and opened the new decade in a new home at Three Rivers Stadium. Gradual improvement over the next

three seasons finally resulted in the 40-year old club's first-ever division title in 1972 on the heels of an 11-3 campaign. A miraculous last second catch and run by Franco Harris lifted the Steelers to a 13-7 victory over the Oakland Raiders in the first round playoff game, but Shula's Miami Dolphins, who finished as undefeated 17-0 Super Bowl champions, ended the Steelers' successful season with a 21-17 AFC Championship game decision. Noll, however, garnered UPI's AFC Coach of the Year honor for directing his team's success.

In 1973 the Steelers climbed into the playoffs as a 10-4 wildcard entry before Oakland got revenge with a 33-14 playoff win. Bouncing back in 1974, Noll's Steelers registered a 10-3-1 record before clinching the AFC title with postseason wins over Buffalo (31-14) and Oakland (24-13). In Super Bowl IX the Steeler defense limited Minnesota to 17 yards rushing and 119 yards overall, which is still a Super Bowl record, to clinch a 16-6 win and the team's first Super Bowl title. The following year the team went 12-2, defeated Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10) in the playoffs, and made Noll the third coach to win back-to-back Super Bowls with a 21-17 defeat of Dallas in Super Bowl X.

After stumbling out of the gate in 1976 with four losses in the first five games, Noll's troops reeled off nine straight wins to clinch the division title and help him win NFL Coach of the Year recognition from The Sporting News. The Steelers defeated Baltimore 40-14 in their first round playoff game, but their bid for an unprecedented third Super Bowl title was dashed by a 24-7 loss to Oakland in the AFC Championship game. Another division title in 1977 ended with a first round 34-21 loss to Denver.

With the NFL's best won-loss record in 1978, the 14-2 Steelers marched past Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5) to gain a Super Bowl XIII rematch with Dallas. The 35-31 victory made Noll the first coach to win the Vince Lombardi Trophy three times. History repeated itself in 1979 as the Steelers' 31-19 win over the Los Angeles Rams in Super Bowl XIV marked the second time the team won back-to-back Super Bowls. With the distinction of four NFL titles in six years, Noll's Steelers were named the 1970's 'Team of the Decade.'

The 1980's began slowly for the Steelers as 9-7 and 8-8 records held the team out of the playoffs in 1980 and 1981. They returned in 1982 with a 6-3 record, but were ousted by San Diego in the playoffs, 31-28. In 1983 the Los Angeles Raiders put an end to Noll's 10-6 campaign with a 38-10 playoff win, and in 1984 the Steelers advanced past Denver (24-17) before losing to Miami 45-28 in the AFC Championship game. Last year, with a 7-9 record, Noll's Steelers lost more games than they won for just the third time since 1971.

The 54-year old Noll began his professional football career in 1953 as the Cleveland Browns' 21st round draft choice out of Dayton, where he was the team captain. In his seven years as a guard and linebacker for the Browns, Noll played on four Eastern Conference champion teams and one NFL title team (1954). At the age of 27, Noll retired as a player to begin a coaching career. After an opportunity at Dayton failed to materialize, he was planning a teaching career when the Los Angeles Chargers' Sid Gilman offered him a coaching job with the new American Football League team. In Noll's six seasons on the Chargers' staff, the team won five division titles and two AFL championships.

In 1966 Noll began a three-year stint on Shula's staff at Baltimore, and that team won the 1968 NFL title before losing to the New York Jets in Super Bowl III. After that Super Bowl Noll was called by Dan Rooney to take over the Steelers.

A veteran of 34 NFL seasons as a player (seven), assistant (nine), and head coach (18), Noll is only the fourth head coach in league history to lead the same team for 18 consecutive seasons. The others are Curly Lambeau (31), Landry (27), and Steve Owen (23). As the only coach to claim four Super Bowl wins, Noll joins Vince Lombardi, Tom Flores, and Bill Walsh as the only four coaches who have not lost a Super Bowl in at least two appearances.

RON BLACKLEDGE
Offensive Line Coach-
Tackles/Tight Ends

Entering his fifth season with the Steelers, Ron Blackledge faces the important task of solidifying and adding depth to the offensive tackle and tight end positions, both of which were effected by injuries and lack of depth last season. Blackledge teams with guard/center coach Hal Hunter in overseeing the team's offensive front. Blackledge, 48, joined the Steelers August 31, 1982 as an offensive assistant. He took over as offensive line coach September 2 of that year when Rolie Dotsch left to join the USFL.

1986 marks the 27th season of Blackledge's coaching career, which began with nine years of coaching at the high school level, followed by 14 years in the college ranks. The North Canton, Ohio native coached at Canton South (1960-62), Canton Timken (1963-65), and Canton Glenwood (1967-68) before entering the college level as offensive line coach at Ashland College (1968-69). From there he coached the offensive lines at Cincinnati (1970-72), Kentucky (1973-75), and Princeton (1976). In 1977 Blackledge became the offensive coordinator at Kent State under Steeler linebacker coach Dennis Fitzgerald. He took over as Kent State's head coach for the 1979-81 seasons, compiling an 8-25 record, before joining Chuck Noll's Steeler staff.

Blackledge attended Bowling Green from 1957-59, where he played tight end and defensive end and is now enshrined in the school's hall of fame. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Bowling Green in 1960 and a master's in guidance and physical education from Ohio University in 1967.

Blackledge and wife Linda have three children - daughters Michelle (6/13/64) and Traci (8/17/71) and son Todd (2/25/61), who is a quarterback with the Kansas City Chiefs. The Blackledge family lives in the North Hills. Ron was born April 15, 1938 in North Canton, Ohio.



TONY DUNGY
Defensive Coordinator

The NFL's youngest coordinator fielded a defense in 1985 which ranked first in the AFC 11 of 16 weeks and finished the season ranked second. Against the pass the unit was even more impressive, ending with the conference's top billing after holding that position 15 out of 16 weeks. A failure to hold fourth quarter leads became apparent near season's end, however, and Tony Dungy will gear up a slightly more aggressive game plan in 1986.

The 30-year old Dungy is in his sixth year as a Steeler coach, his fourth as defensive coordinator. In 1981 he joined Chuck Noll's staff as a defensive assistant, becoming secondary coach in 1982 and defensive coordinator the following season.

Dungy's Steeler career actually began in 1977, when he made the team's roster as a free agent safety. In his second season with the Steelers he recorded six interceptions, the team's high. In 1979 Dungy was traded to the San Francisco 49ers, where he played one season. He then went to the New York Giants for a brief stint before the 1980 season, and after being waived returned to his alma mater to coach Minnesota's defensive backs. The following year he was beckoned by Noll, and returned to Pittsburgh as a 25-year old assistant coach.

As a collegian, the Jackson, Michigan native quarterbacked under Steeler offensive coordinator Tom Moore at Minnesota from 1973-76, earning team MVP honors twice and being named captain his senior year. Upon completing his college career, Dungy held the school's all-time records for total plays (999), pass attempts (586), completions (274), passing yards (3,577), and touchdowns (25). He played in the Japan and Hula Bowls and the East-West Shrine game in 1976, and received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Minnesota in 1977.

Dungy and wife Lauren and their daughter Tiara (12/28/84) live in Allison Park. Tony was born October 6, 1955 in Jackson, Michigan.



DENNIS FITZGERALD

Inside Linebackers Coach

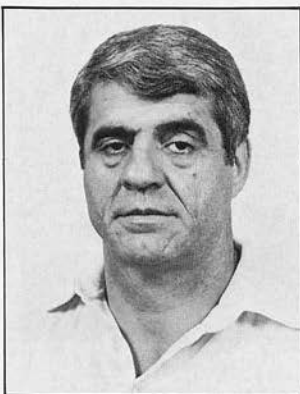
At the heart of the Steelers' defense, coached by Dennis Fitzgerald, are inside linebackers Robin Cole and David Little. Under Fitzgerald's tutelage Cole earned his first Pro Bowl trip in 1984 and Little led the Steelers in tackles in 1985. Fitzgerald's inside linebacking corps is a solid unit which is relied upon heavily to make the majority of the team's tackles.

Fitzgerald embarks upon his fifth season of coaching Steeler linebackers, his third as the inside linebacker coach. He was added to Chuck Noll's staff in 1982 after 21 years as a college coach, beginning in 1961-62 when he was an assistant freshman coach at his alma mater, Michigan. From 1963-65 Fitzgerald was the head coach of Michigan's freshman squad before coaching the varsity defensive linemen in 1966-68. In 1969 he was tabbed as Kentucky's defensive coordinator, moving to Kent State in the same capacity for the 1971-74 seasons.

In 1975 Fitzgerald succeeded Don James as Kent State's head coach, compiling an 18-16 record in three seasons. For his offensive coordinator, Fitzgerald hired Steeler offensive line coach Ron Blackledge. In 1978 Fitzgerald accepted the position as defensive coordinator at Syracuse, followed by one year as Tulane's defensive coordinator in 1981.

The former halfback and wrestler earned five letters at Michigan from 1958-60 and was the football team's MVP in 1960. In wrestling Fitzgerald's accomplishments included NCAA semi-finalist in 1960 and 1961, AAU finalist in 1961, and two Big Ten championships in 1960 and 1961 as the team captain. He received both his bachelor's degree (1961) and master's (1963) in physical education from Michigan.

Fitzgerald and wife Elizabeth have six children - son Timothy (11/3/64) and daughters Maureen (2/23/66), Eileen (8/10/67), Molly (8/8/68), Katherine (2/9/72), and Margaret (12/14/77). The Fitzgerald family lives in the North Hills. Dennis was born March 13, 1936 in Ann Arbor, Michigan.



DICK HOAK

Offensive Backfield Coach

The longest-tenured assistant on Chuck Noll's staff is in his 15th season as a Steeler coach, and in 1986 celebrates his 25th year with the organization. Dick Hoak, still the third-leading rusher in Steeler history 16 years after his retirement as a player, directed the Steelers' ball-carriers to the seventh-highest rushing total in the NFL last year as Frank Pollard and Walter Abercrombie turned in career-highs in rushes and yardage and added 24 receptions apiece.

Hoak, a native of Jeannette, Pa., was tabbed by Noll in 1972 to join the Steeler coaching staff. To his new job, his first as a coach, Hoak brought 10 years of experience as a Steeler running back (1961-70), at the end of which he stood as the franchise's number two all-time rusher behind John Henry Johnson, having since been passed by all-time leader Franco Harris. Hoak still holds the Steelers' second-place all-time ranking in career rushes, and is fourth in rushing touchdowns (25), single season rushing average (4.9 in 1968), and has the fourth-longest run in team history, a 77-yarder in 1968.

Hoak rushed for 3,965 yards in his career on 1,132 carries, adding 145 receptions for 1,152 receiving yards and another eight touchdowns to give him a total of 33 career touchdowns. He was the Steelers' leading rusher in 1965, 1968, and 1969, highlighted by his 858 yards in 1968 which ranked fourth in the NFL and earned him a trip to the Pro Bowl. He was also honored that year by Pittsburgh's Dapper Dan Club as the area's Man of the Year in Sports.

As a collegian Hoak played quarterback and running back at Penn State from 1958-60, and was the team's captain and MVP. He received his bachelor's degree in social studies from Penn State in 1961.

Hoak and his wife Lynn have three children - daughters Kelly (5/18/65) and Katie (7/23/68) and son Richard (7/5/72). The Hoak family lives in Greensburg. Dick was born December 12, 1939 in Jeannette, Pennsylvania.



JED HUGHES

Outside Linebackers Coach

The Steelers' outside linebackers are among the NFL's most talented, led by Pro Bowler Mike Merriweather and Bryan Hinkle. Under the coaching of Jed Hughes the group has demonstrated tremendous versatility the past two seasons, displaying an ability to blitz and pressure opposing quarterbacks as well as cover the receivers in the flats.

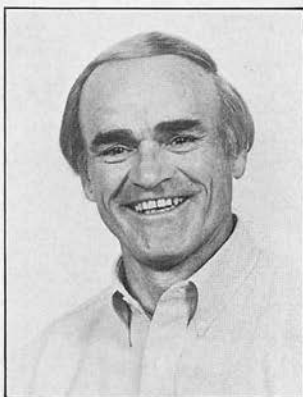
The 39-year old Hughes is the Steelers' outside linebackers coach for the third year. He came to Pittsburgh in 1984 from the Minnesota Vikings, for whom he was defensive backfield coach for the 1982 and 1983 seasons. Hughes is one of only two Steeler assistant coaches who has been on the staff of another NFL team.

Hughes' 11-year career as a college coach began after one season (1970) on the staff at Biglerville (Pa.) High. In 1971 he joined the college ranks as Stanford's offensive line coach, switching to the defensive side of the line in 1972. From there Hughes went to Michigan in 1973 as offensive line coach, followed by two years (1974-75) as that school's linebacker coach. A six-year stint at UCLA began in 1976 as inside linebacker coach before Hughes took over the defensive line and eventually became the defensive coordinator through the 1981 campaign.

As a player, Hughes was a tight end and linebacker at Springfield (Mass.) College in 1966-67, lettering in football, baseball, and wrestling. He transferred to Gettysburg (Pa.) College, playing tight end and split end in addition to playing baseball in 1968-69. He earned his undergraduate degree in biology and physical education from Gettysburg in 1970, a master's in education from Stanford in 1972, and a Ph.D. in education administration from Michigan in 1975.

In high school Hughes earned 10 letters and was a three-time all-state catcher in baseball. He served in the U.S. Navy after high school, receiving an honorable discharge in 1970.

Hughes and his wife Carol live in the North Hills. Jed was born November 14, 1947 in New York City.



HAL HUNTER

Offensive Line Coach-Guards/Centers

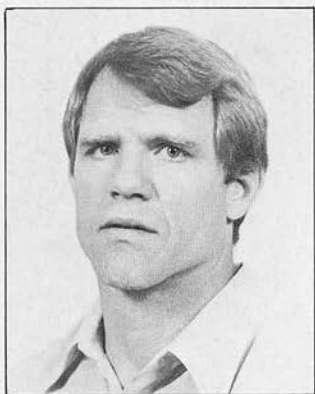
As the newest member of Chuck Noll's staff, Hal Hunter came on board February 11, 1985 to replace Bill Meyers. Hunter, 52, is charged with directing the interior of the Steeler offensive line. The heart of that group is eight-time Pro Bowler Mike Webster, who in 1986 embarks on his 13th season. Added to Hunter's ranks this year is number one draft choice John Rienstra.

Hunter, a native of Canonsburg, Pa. and former Pitt player, is a veteran of 27 years of coaching, 23 of those on the college level before he entered the professional ranks in 1981. His first coaching job was at Richmond, where he handled the defensive line from 1958-61. In 1962 Hunter began a two-year stint as offensive line coach at West Virginia, followed by stops in the same capacity at Maryland (1964-65) and Duke (1966-70). In 1971 he became Kentucky's offensive coordinator (1971-72), and in 1973 he accepted a job as Indiana's offensive line coach, which he handled through the 1976 season.

In 1977 Hunter received his first head coaching position at California State of Pennsylvania, where he compiled a 9-30-1 record in four seasons. He jumped to professional football, and the Canadian Football League, in 1981 as offensive coordinator and line coach for the Hamilton Tiger-Cats under Frank Kush. The next season Hunter moved, along with Kush, to the NFL's Baltimore Colts as offensive line coach. The club moved to Indianapolis in 1984, and Hunter capped his stay there as interim head coach for the final game of the 1984 season. Two months later he joined Noll's Steeler staff.

Hunter attended Pitt, where he was a three-year starter at linebacker and guard from 1955-57. He received his bachelor's degree in secondary education from Pitt in 1957 and a master's in science from West Virginia in 1962.

Hunter and wife Eileen have three children - daughters Heidi and Heather, and son Hal. The Hunter family lives in Gibsonia, Pa. Hal was born June 3, 1934 in Canonsburg, Pennsylvania.



JON KOLB

Defensive Line Coach

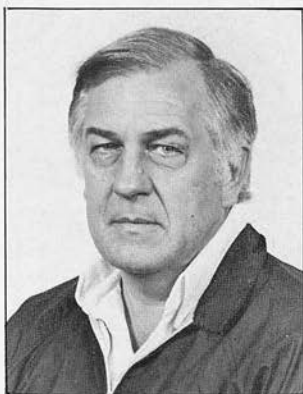
Since making the transition from Steeler player to Steeler coach in 1982, Jon Kolb has been busy passing on to his troops the techniques he learned in 13 years as a Steeler offensive tackle. Originally hired as the team's strength coach on February 17, 1982, Kolb took over the defensive line duties in July of that year when George Perles left to coach with the USFL Philadelphia Stars.

Now in his fifth year of coaching, Kolb is challenged by a need for depth on the defensive front. The unit was left thin by injuries a year ago, but still refused to allow eight opposing teams to gain 100 yards on the ground. Several of Kolb's troops were forced to learn new positions along the line, and the increased versatility should pay dividends this year. Turning up the pressure on opposing quarterbacks, however, is a big priority for 1986.

The 39-year old Kolb is one of three Chuck Noll assistants who was also a player under Noll. He was selected in the third round of the draft in 1969, Noll's inaugural season at the Steeler helm. Over the next 13 seasons, Kolb played in 177 games for the Steelers, including 156 out of a possible 157 games in his first 10 years, and he made 137 starts with a 1971-79 streak of 112 consecutive games started. His 177 games played still ranks fourth in team history along with Mike Webster's 177, and Kolb remains one of only nine Steelers to have played 13 seasons. In 1982, the club's 50th season and a year after his retirement, Kolb was named to the Steelers' 'All-Time Team.'

As a collegian, Kolb played center and linebacker at Oklahoma State from 1966-68, earning second-team All-America honors his senior year. He received his undergraduate degree in physical education from Oklahoma State in 1969.

Kolb and wife Debbie have two sons - Eric (8/28/71) and Tanner (10/26/80) - and live in the North Hills. Jon was born August 30, 1947 in Ponca City, Oklahoma.



TOM MOORE

Offensive Coordinator

In his 10th season with the Steelers, Tom Moore enters his fourth campaign as the team's offensive coordinator. The 47-year old Moore joined Chuck Noll's staff in 1977 to coach the wide receivers, taking over as offensive coordinator in 1983.

Last year the Steeler offense remained true to form by predating its attack on establishment of the running game. The team's 541 rushing attempts was the third-most by an AFC club with Frank Pollard and Walter Abercrombie both reaching career highs in carries and yardage. Overall the Steeler offense ranked in the middle of the league - 13th rushing and 13th passing - but the team scored 379 points, which was the third-highest point output in Steeler history and an average of almost 24 points per game.

Moore, a Minnesota native, came to the Steelers from the University of Minnesota, where he was the offensive coordinator from 1972-73 and 1975-76. He spent the 1974 season with the World Football League's New York Stars. His 24-year coaching career began in 1961 at Iowa, where he was the freshman coach for two seasons after a four-year playing career for the Hawkeyes. In 1965 Moore became Dayton's offensive backfield coach for five years, followed by one year as Wake Forest's offensive coordinator in 1969. A two-year stint as offensive backfield coach at Georgia Tech in 1970-71 preceded his appointment as Minnesota's offensive coordinator in 1972. Minnesota's quarterback in 1975-76 under Moore was Steeler defensive coordinator Tony Dundy.

In college, Moore quarterbacked the Iowa Hawkeyes from 1957-60, playing in 1958 on the Big Ten champion team which won a Rose Bowl victory over California. He received his bachelor's degree in history from Iowa in 1961 and a master's in guidance from Minnesota in 1966.

Moore and wife Emily live in Upper St. Clair with daughter Terry (8/31/64) and son Daniel (1/17/68). Tom was born November 7, 1938 in Owatonna, Minnesota.



WALT EVANS

Conditioning and Training Coach

Critical to every NFL team is a sound conditioning and training program to prevent injuries and speed recovery. For the Steelers, 35-year old Walt Evans is the developer and monitor of a comprehensive program for each player which includes emphasis on strength, conditioning, flexibility, nutrition, and rehabilitation. He prescribes weight and running workout schedules for every Steeler to follow during the season and in the offseason, as well as diets to suit specific needs. A key function which Evans performs, in conjunction with trainers Ralph Berlin and Fran Feld, is the daily rehabilitation of injured players.

Evans, a native of Pittsburgh, is in his fourth season with the Steelers after joining Chuck Noll's staff in 1983 as assistant conditioning coach. He brought with him an extensive background in the health and fitness fields, having served as a corporate consultant for the General Nutrition Corporation from 1980-82 prior to coming to the Steelers. At General Nutrition Evans developed fitness programs for the Westinghouse and H.J. Heinz corporations.

In high school Evans competed in football and baseball at Pittsburgh's Oliver High, later coaching football and track for South High School from 1975-79 in the city.

As a collegian Evans attended Marietta (Ohio) College, where in his freshman year he took a serious interest in weight training. As his own coach he worked his way to the top ranking in the nation for his weight class in the 1973 and 1975 national collegiate powerlifting championships.

In 1974 Evans received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Marietta, and a master's in sports physiology from Pitt in 1982. A member of the American College of Sports Medicine, he is currently working towards his doctorate of exercise physiology at Pitt.

Single, Evans lives in the North Hills. He was born May 15, 1951 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.



RALPH BERLIN

Trainer

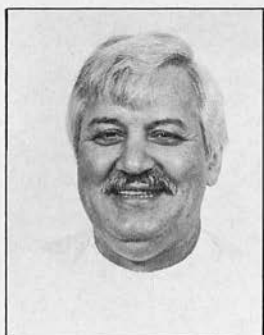
The job of the football trainer has changed dramatically in the 19 years that Ralph Berlin has been with the Steelers. With the developments and advances in football, the need for comprehensive medical treatment has grown. Berlin, a member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association and the American College of Sports Medicine, is as involved with injury prevention as he is with treatment of injuries. From taping ankles to consulting with the team's physicians, Berlin is responsible for the day-to-day health of the Steeler players. He prescribes treatments, monitors therapy, and works closely with conditioning and training coach Walt Evans on the players' rehabilitation programs.

Berlin became the Steelers' trainer in 1968. His 27-year career in the training field began in 1960, when he started as a student trainer at Iowa State after a sophomore season knee injury ended his football career there. After graduating in 1962, Berlin was hired as the head trainer at DePauw University. While at DePauw he began work towards his master's degree at Indiana University in Bloomington, and also worked with the St. Louis Cardinals football team at the Cardinals' 1963 and 1964 training camps.

In 1964 Berlin took over as Kentucky's trainer, working there until 1968 when he joined the Steelers.

Born in Pasadena, California, Berlin grew up in Philadelphia. After high school he served three years of active duty in the Marines, from 1954-57. He received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Iowa State in 1962, and his master's in health and safety from Indiana in 1965.

Berlin and wife Dee have two children, daughter Beth (25) and son Steven (23). Steven is a student at Clemson, where he was a starting defensive tackle, and is currently working with the football coaching staff. The Berlins live in Bethel Park.



TONY PARISI
Equipment Manager

Equipment manager Tony Parisi is entering his 22nd year with the Steeler organization. He came to the club in 1965 from the Pittsburgh Hornets hockey team, for whom he was trainer and backup goaltender from 1961-65. As equipment manager, Parisi is in charge of all purchasing, issuing, and reconditioning of the Steelers' football equipment and uniforms.

The native of Canada grew up playing hockey, spending most of his 16-year career on the professional level. He was a goaltender in the Chicago Blackhawks' organization in 1950-51, and his playing career, which stretched from 1949-1965, included five years of play in Europe.

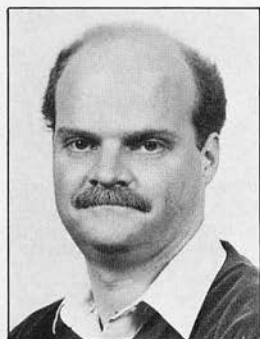
Parisi and wife Joan and daughters Paula (5/12/65) and Beth (4/4/69) live in Mount Lebanon.



RODGERS FREYVOGEL
Field Manager

Pittsburgh native Rodgers Freyvogel has been with the Steelers as their field manager since 1980. Now in his seventh season, Freyvogel is responsible for preparation of the team's practice equipment and practice fields, both at training camp and at Three Rivers Stadium. He also assists equipment manager Tony Parisi in the issuing and reconditioning of all the players' equipment and uniforms.

Freyvogel, 35, attended North Catholic High on Pittsburgh's North Side, and worked for United Parcel Service prior to joining the Steelers. He is single and lives on the North Side.



FRAN FELD
Trainer

In his first year with the Steelers is 32-year old Fran Feld, a native of New Castle, Pennsylvania. Feld joined the Steeler staff in March of this year after eight years on the training staff at Pitt. He was Pitt's head football trainer for the past three seasons after five years as the school's assistant trainer and clinical instructor, beginning in 1978. Feld made his start in the training field as the head trainer at Center High in Monaca, Pa. from 1976-78.

Feld received his bachelor's degree in history and sociology from Pitt in 1976, and a master's in physical education in 1985. Feld is single and lives in Baldwin.

FRITO-LAY 'CHALLENGE FOR CHILDREN'

Since the 'Challenge For Children' program began in 1983, the Frito-Lay Corporation has donated \$118,300 to youth-related charities in the Tri-State area. In 1986, for the fourth consecutive season, Frito-Lay will contribute \$100 for every point the Steelers score in regular and postseason games.

Last year's total was \$37,900. In 1983 the amount was \$36,500 and in 1984 it was \$43,900 as the Steelers advanced to the AFC Championship game.

Charities which have been a part of this program are Children's Hospital, Ronald McDonald House, American Diabetes Youth Research, Cystic Fibrosis, Sickle Cell Society, National Autistic Society, and the Pittsburgh Rehabilitation Institute. Grants will be provided to the Abraxas Foundation, Boys Clubs of Western Pennsylvania, Spina Bifida, and the Parental Stress Center in 1986.

DICK HALEY

Director of Player Personnel

In his 16th year as the Steelers' director of player personnel, Dick Haley has been the man behind the team's drafts since 1971. Along with Art Rooney, Jr., Haley supervises and directs the Steelers' operation of scouting, testing, and drafting college players. It is through the draft that the Steelers have been building their teams since Chuck Noll's arrival in 1969. In the 1970's the Steelers, with an unequalled four Super Bowl championships, earned the title of 'Team of the Decade,' and it was through the drafting skill of Rooney, Haley, and

Noll that those teams were built. The 1971 and 1974 Steelers drafts, in particular, have been recognized as two of the finest in NFL history.

Haley, a native of Midway, Pennsylvania, began his scouting career as an area scout in the south for the BLESTO scouting combine. After five years with BLESTO he joined the Steelers' personnel department.

For six seasons, from 1959-64, Haley was a defensive back in the NFL. He was the Washington Redskins' ninth draft choice in 1959, and played there for two seasons. In 1961 Haley went to the expansion Minnesota Vikings through the veteran draft pool, and later that season returned to his home area when the Steelers acquired him. He played for the Steelers from 1961-64, and was among the team's top interceptors in each of his three full seasons in Pittsburgh.

As a collegian, Haley was a standout halfback at Pitt from 1955-59. He played on the Panthers' Sugar Bowl and Gator Bowl teams during that period, and was the team's leading scorer and leading rusher in his senior year. Haley capped his college career with an 86-yard punt return for a touchdown in the 1959 East-West Shrine game. He received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Pitt in 1959.

Haley and his wife Carolyn have a daughter, Callie Rene, and a son, Richard Todd. The Haleys live in Bridgeville.

PERSONNEL TERMS

WAIVERS: The waiver system is a process by which player contracts or NFL rights are made available to other NFL teams. During this process, a team may make a claim to obtain a player, or waive its right to do so. Claiming teams are assigned players on a priority based on the inverse order of the standings. The claiming period from July through the end of the regular season is 24 hours and in the offseason it is 10 days. If a player passes through waivers unclaimed, he becomes a free agent. From February 1 to the end of the NFL trading period, which is after the sixth regular season game, any veteran who has acquired four years of pension credit may opt for free agency rather than accept assignment to a claiming team.

INJURED RESERVE: This is a reserve list category that may be used for a player by a team if the player is injured in a practice or a game. If a player fails the team's physical examination at the beginning of the season, he is not eligible for reserve/injured. The team instead may place the player on Physically Unable to Perform or Non-Football Injury/Illness, whichever is applicable. Each team is allowed five free reactivation moves during the season. One of these moves may be used to reactivate a player who was placed on Injured Reserve prior to the final roster cutdown on September 1.

TRADES: Unrestricted trading is permitted through the Tuesday following the sixth regular season game (October 14, 1986). Trading resumes February 2, 1987.

A native of Pittsburgh, Modrak originally joined the Steelers in 1973 on a part-time basis. He then scouted for the BLESTO scouting combine until returning to the

Steelers in 1979.

Modrak received his bachelor's degree in geography in 1965 from Indiana University of Pennsylvania, and a master's degree in physical education from West Virginia in 1972. He and wife Sandy live in Pittsburgh with their daughters Stephanie and Erin.



BOB SCHMITZ

Talent Scout — West Coast

Scouting the country's western colleges for the Steelers is former linebacker Bob Schmitz. Schmitz, in his 11th year with the team's personnel department, was a 14th-round draft choice of the Steelers in 1961 and played from 1961-66.

Schmitz started his scouting career with BLESTO in 1971 before joining the Steelers in 1976.

A graduate of Montana State, Schmitz played linebacker and guard as a collegian and received his bachelor's degree in business administration in 1961.

JOE KRUPA

College Talent Scout

Former Pro Bowl defensive tackle Joe Krupa enters his eighth season as a college talent scout for the Steelers. After a collegiate career at Purdue, Krupa was the Steelers' second-round draft choice in 1956. His nine-year playing career, which spanned 1956-64, was highlighted in 1964 when he received Pro Bowl honors. He joined the team's personnel department in 1979.

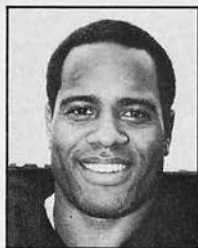
TOM DONAHOE

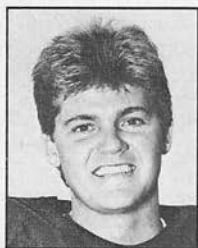

ANDERSON ON THE MARK

Kicker Gary Anderson accounted for 139 Steeler points in 1985 to win his third consecutive AFC scoring title. In the process Anderson moved into third place on the Steelers' all-time scoring list with 428 points behind Roy Gerela (731) and Franco Harris (600).

In 1985 Anderson also broke Gerela's club records for points (123) and field goals (29) in a single season. Anderson's 33 field goals led the NFL, and his streak of 18 consecutive field goals without a miss was the fourth-longest streak in league history.

For his career Anderson has made good on 94 of 117 (.803) field goal attempts, and with six more three-pointers he will qualify as the NFL's all-time leader.

Anderson, a fifth-year player from Syracuse, has also converted on his last 124 extra point attempts and owns the NFL's longest current streak in that category.

The defense was just as effective and the Colts' one score followed the only Pittsburgh turnover, a Malone interception, on a drive that netted minus two yards. The defense set up two of the last three TDs which followed interceptions by Mike Merriweather and Dwayne Woodruff. Although they only had two QB sacks, the Steelers improved their pass rush with good pressure on the Indianapolis quarterbacks.

On the last play of the first quarter with the game scoreless, Dwayne Woodruff returned an interception to the Pittsburgh 48-yard line but the result was one of 10 record-tying punts for the Steelers. Their only score was set up by Louis Lipps' 38-yard punt return. John Stallworth became the first Steeler to reach the 400 mark in career receptions.

In the highest scoring game in team history and the fourth most points ever scored by NFL teams in a game, the Steelers saw their playoff hopes all but mathematically vanish. They lost their third straight game and for the second game in a row lost a lead with less than three minutes to play. A blocked punt, a missed assignment and a lost fumble led to San Diego's first three touchdowns. The setback ruined what would have been the best comeback in Chuck Noll's 17-year tenure after the Chargers had taken a 17-point lead. John Swain's first of two interceptions on the first play of the second half set up a TD and the Steelers got another one on their next possession to tie the game at 34-34. San Diego regained the lead on a 90-yard drive but the Steelers stormed back with 10 points to take their only lead of the game, 44-41. This time San Diego answered with a 75-yard march. David Woodley had his best game as a Steeler with single game highs of 24 completions, 287 yards and three TDs while completing 69% of his passes. Turnovers set up 17 Pittsburgh points and four San Diego TDs.

Scott Campbell directed the Steelers' greatest comeback ever but they were eliminated from playoff contention before the smallest crowd in Three Rivers Stadium history. Taking over after starter David Woodley and Mark Malone were injured in the first quarter, Campbell helped overcome a 21-0 deficit with several big plays. The Bills scored on the first play of the game and upped their lead to 21 points when a Louis Lipps fumble was returned for the third TD. Lipps' team-record 15th TD and Gary Dunn's second fumble recovery late in the first half set the stage for the score that pulled the Steelers to within a TD. They cut it to four points with a field goal following the second half kickoff. Another Buffalo fumble led to a second field goal. The Steelers scored 10 points on their final two possessions when Campbell averted a huge loss to pick up a key first down on the first. Lipps' 45-yard reception and Frank Pollard's 15-yard run keyed the winning surge. Gary Anderson's streak of 18 straight successful field goal attempts ended with a 41-yard miss in the first quarter.

The Steelers completed their first losing season since 1971 with a 7-9 record. The Giants scored the first time they had the ball and then put the game out of reach with touchdowns on their first three possessions of the second quarter. New York rushed for 218 yards in the first half and their game total of 289 was the second highest against a Chuck Noll-coached Steeler team. Scott Campbell got his second start at quarterback but a strong pass rush reduced his effectiveness. The Steelers' total yardage (214) was their lowest of the season. Gary Anderson won his third straight AFC scoring title with a team-record 135 points, but Frank Pollard's bid for a 1,000-yard season fell nine yards short when a poor pitchout on an option play resulted in a fumble with just under two minutes to play.

STEELER MILESTONES

Things That Could Happen in 1986:

CHUCK NOLL

- With a record of 164-104-1, Noll can jump from seventh to fifth on list of NFL's all-time winningest coaches. He begins 1986 trailing Bud Grant (168 wins), who retired last January, and Paul Brown (170). Topping the all-time list are George Halas (325), Don Shula (255), Tom Landry (253), and Curly Lambeau (234).
- Becomes the fourth head coach in NFL history to lead the same team for 18 consecutive seasons (1969-86), the others being Lambeau (31), Landry (27), and Steve Owen (23).

WALTER ABERCROMBIE

- Needs 936 yards rushing to move up from 11th to seventh on team's all-time rushing list. With 2,007 career yards he needs 237 to pass Preston Pearson (2,243), 249 to top Terry Bradshaw (2,255), 706 to surpass Tom Tracy (2,712), and 936 to eclipse Frenchy Fuqua (2,942) for seventh place.

GARY ANDERSON

- Needs six field goals to qualify for ranking as NFL's all-time most accurate field goal kicker (minimum 100 FGs). He enters 1986 with 94 of 117 field goal attempts, a 80.34% success rate.
- Looks to win his fourth consecutive AFC scoring title, becoming the first player to do so since Gino Cappeletti won four from 1963-66.
- Should extend his streak of 124 extra point kicks without a miss, the longest current streak in the NFL.

LOUIS LIPPS

- Needs 67 points to break into team's all-time top ten scorers, eclipsing Elbie Nickel's 222. With 156 career points he enters 1986 tied for 18th.
- Needs 60 receptions to break into team's top ten all-time receivers. He begins the 1986 season ranked 22nd with 104 receptions. A repeat of last year's 59 catches would leave him tied with Lynn Chandnois (163) for 10th place.
- Needs 167 punt return yards to eclipse Theo Bell (1,259) and become Steelers' all-time punt return leader. Also needs 41 returns to top Bell's record (139) in that category.
- Will vie for his third consecutive Pro Bowl berth, becoming the first Steeler since Franco Harris (1972-74) to do so in his first three seasons.

MARK MALONE

- Needs 1,580 passing yards to move from sixth to fourth in club history behind Terry Bradshaw (27,989), Bobby Layne (8,983), and Jim Finks (8,854). He has 4,242 career passing yards, needing 199 to surpass Bill Nelson (4,440) and 1,580 to top Ed Brown (5,821) for fourth place.
- Needs 124 pass attempts to move from fifth to fourth on team's all-time list, and 544 attempts to jump to third. Bradshaw (3,901) is the record holder, followed by Finks (1,382), Layne (1,156), Brown (736), and Malone's 613.
- Needs 22 completions to rank fourth on all-time list in that category, 252 for third place. With 318 career completions he trails Bradshaw (2,025), Finks (661), Layne (569), and Brown (339).

FRANK POLLARD

- Needs 592 rushing yards to move ahead of Rocky Bleier (3,865) and 692 to pass Dick Hoak (3,965) for third place on club's all-time rushing chart behind Franco Harris (11,950) and John Henry Johnson (4,383). His career-high 991 yards last season bumped him from ninth to fifth place with 3,274 yards.

DONNIE SHELL

- With 47 career interceptions, needs just three to become the first strong safety and the 21st player in league history to collect 50 thefts. He enters 1986 as the NFL's leading active interceptor ahead of Seattle's Dave Brown (45) and Denver's Steve Foley (42).

JOHN STALLWORTH

- Should reach 500 career receptions, a feat accomplished by just 14 other players. With 462 catches, he needs 38 to reach 500 plateau. Other active players in pursuit of 500 are Nat Moore (472), James Lofton (466), Pat Tilley (465), and Wes Chandler (460).
- Could move up in ranking of 100-yard games among active receivers. He has had 24 100-yard games to rank fifth, trailing Steve Largent (36), Lofton (29), Charlie Joiner (27), and Stanley Morgan (26).

MIKE WEBSTER

- If he plays in first six games he will own the longest consecutive games streak ever by a Steeler, eclipsing Ray Mansfield's 182. A full season of 16 games played would leave him second on Steeler all-time list with 193 career games behind Mel Blount's record 200.
- Looks to maintain fourth-place ranking among active players in consecutive games played, with a streak of 177 entering 1986. The three players ahead of him are Dave Dalby (205), Ray Guy (191), and Charlie Joiner (181).
- Looks to continue streak of Pro Bowl appearances, which he extended to eight last season. He is one of only two offensive linemen, along with New England's John Hannah, to appear in every Pro Bowl during that eight-year span.

He is also one NFL title away from the record held by Lombardi and George Halas. With a 15-7 (.682) postseason record, Noll ranks third behind Lombardi (.900) and Flores (.727) among the 10 coaches who have been in at least 10 postseason games. In 33 previous seasons of professional football, Noll has been on a winning team 26 times and has participated in postseason play 22 times.

A member of the NFL's Competition Committee since 1984, Noll is actively involved with the governing of league rules, player personnel procedures, game conduct, and player and fan safety.

Noll and his wife, Marianne, have one son, Chris (28), who teaches at Proctor Academy in Andover, New Hampshire. Charles Henry Noll was born January 5, 1932 in Cleveland, Ohio, where he attended Holy Trinity School and Benedictine High. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in education from Dayton in 1953. The Nolls live in Upper St. Clair.

LIMITED INSTANT REPLAY SYSTEM TO BE USED IN 1986

At the NFL Annual Meeting in March 1986, the clubs adopted (by a 23-4-1 vote) a one-year system of limited Instant Replay of officiating calls for 1986.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks—an independent system using cameras, replay machines, and technicians separate from the network covering the game, and a “no frills” approach using existing television coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of nine nationally televised preseason games to experiment with the basic system that later was adopted for 1986. A total of 28 plays were examined closely (17 confirmed call, 4 were inconclusive, 1 was reversed, and 6 had no replay shown).

What is the objective of this system?

The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has *indisputable visual evidence* available to him that warrants the change.

Is the television network carrying the game part of the review process?

No. Although the Replay Official will be viewing the live network feed, there is no communication to television personnel as to what plays to show or not to show.

What is the step-by-step procedure of a play review?

The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other monitor continues to record the live feed.

The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues without interruption.

If the Replay Official believes an error may have been made, the Umpire will be contacted (via a paging device worn at the beltline), and he then will use a walkie-talkie for further communication with the Replay Official.

The Replay Official will watch replay(s) on one or both monitors and complete his review within a reasonable period (probably 15-20 seconds) after the play is over. (If there is a time out, the Replay Official would not necessarily be restricted to the 15-20-second period.)

The Replay Official will inform the Umpire of his decision, and the Referee will make the appropriate announcement on the wireless microphone.

The limited Instant Replay system concentrates on plays of possession or touching (e.g., fumbles, receptions, interceptions, muffs) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines, and line of scrimmage (e.g., receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line).

However, the Instant Replay system will *not* include the following fouls: clipping; encroachment and offsides; grasp of facemask; false start; defensive pass interference; offensive pass interference; offensive holding and illegal use of hands; illegal batting or punching ball; illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick; illegal crackback; illegal motion; illegal use of forearm or elbow; illegal use of hands by defense; illegally kicking the ball; illegally snapping the ball; intentional grounding; member of the punting team downfield early; illegal formation; palpably unfair act; piling on; roughing the passer; running into or roughing the kicker; striking, kicking, or kneeing; unnecessary roughness; unsportsmanlike conduct; and use of the helmet as a weapon.

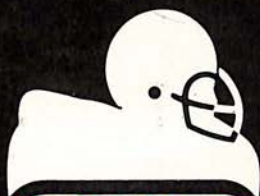
