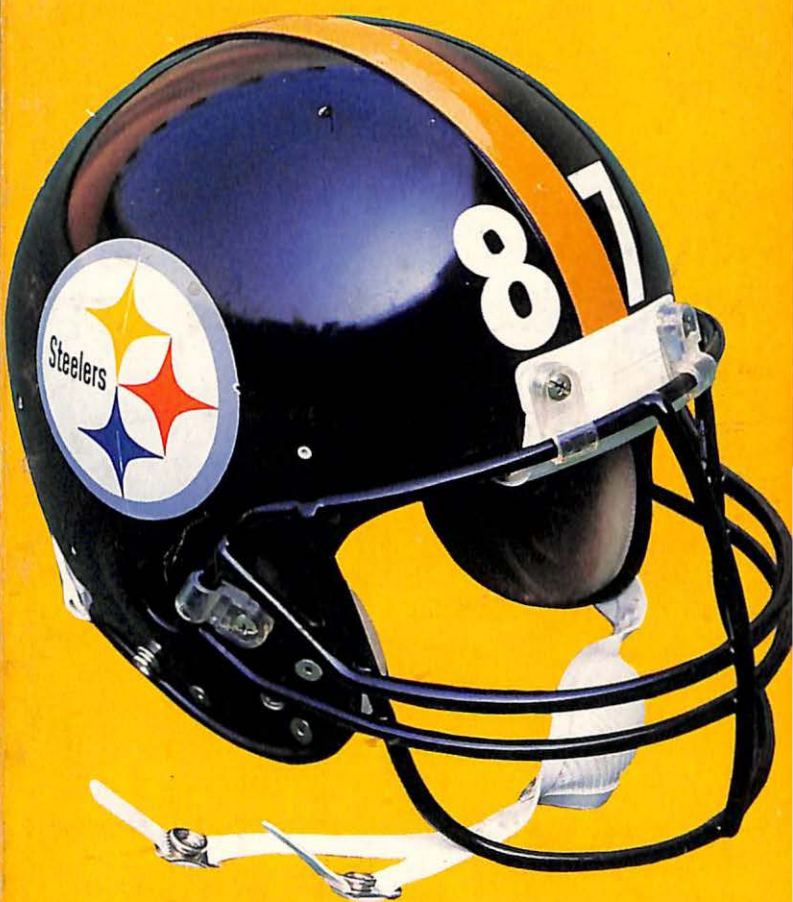

HISTORY OF THE STEELERS

In 1987 the Pittsburgh Steelers celebrate their 55th season in the National Football League. In those 55 years the Steelers have experienced the low end and the high end of the football spectrum. In 1970 the Steelers began to evolve into one of the most dominating teams in the history of the league, making the playoffs eight straight years and winning four Super Bowl championships in a span of six seasons.

One person has walked every step of the team's storied past since founding the club in 1933.

Arthur J. Rooney, Sr. made Pittsburgh an NFL city on July 8, 1933 when he founded the league's fifth franchise. Named the Pirates, the team won just 22 games and went through five head coaches in its first seven seasons. In 1940 the team was re-named the Pittsburgh Steelers in recognition of the industry upon which Pittsburgh had been built.

The 1940s brought some improvement as the Steelers managed five .500 or better campaigns, including a first-ever playoff entry in 1947 which resulted in a 21-0 loss to Philadelphia. In the decade of the 1950s the team again was .500 or better five times, but a second postseason appearance eluded them.

In 1962 the Steelers' 9-5 record propelled them into a playoff bowl game against Detroit, but they came away 17-10 losers and would experience only one more winning season in the next nine years.

What would mark the beginning of the end to the Steelers' losing ways came in 1969 when Chuck Noll was hired as the 14th head coach of the franchise. In his 18 seasons Noll has led the Steelers to four league titles, including nine division titles, 10 playoff appearances and 13 consecutive non-losing seasons.

The patriarch of the Pittsburgh Steelers, Arthur Joseph Rooney was born January 27, 1901 in Coulterville, Pennsylvania. A year and a half later he moved with his family to Pittsburgh's North Side. He grew up on the site where Three Rivers Stadium now stands, and today still lives a short distance from the stadium.

The oldest of eight children, Rooney attended St. Peter's Parochial School and Duquesne University Prep School. He pursued his college studies as well as athletics at Indiana Normal (now University of Pennsylvania), Georgetown, and Duquesne University. Rooney was an outstanding athlete, particularly in football and boxing, but his best sport was baseball. An arm injury, however, put an end to what was a promising baseball career. As a boxer he continued to excel and in 1920 was named to the United States' Olympic Boxing team, though he did not participate in the Olympics. After his boxing days ended Rooney continued as a fight promoter, his most memorable bout being the 1951 heavyweight championship of the world in which Jersey Joe Walcott upset Ezzard Charles in Pittsburgh.

In the early years of the Steelers, Rooney's team played home games at Forbes Field. Games were often taken to the fans, however, as competition from baseball and college football led Rooney to schedule home games in Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, New Orleans, and Louisville in the late 1930s.

In 1939 the Steelers acquired the NFL's first big-money player when Rooney signed Colorado All-American Byron "Whizzer" White for an unheard of \$15,800. White is now one of the league's most illustrious alumni as a United States Supreme Court Justice.

Under head coach Walt Kiesling and with the play of rookie Bill Dudley, who is now a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the 1942 Steelers turned in the first winning record in the 10-year history of the franchise. The next two seasons Rooney merged his team with Philadelphia in 1943 (Phil-Pitt) and with the Chicago Cardinals in 1944 (Card-Pitt) as rosters were depleted with the nation at war.

A return to peacetime brought a renewed commitment from Rooney to establish a winning tradition in Pittsburgh. He hired former Pitt coach Jock Sutherland in 1946, and in Sutherland's second season, utilizing the single wing formation, he led the Steelers to an 8-4 finish and a tie for the Eastern Division title. The club's first-ever postseason appearance, however, ended in a 21-0 shutout. Sutherland died unexpectedly while on a scouting trip soon after and was replaced by John Michelosen, who compiled a 20-26-2 record in four seasons.

In 1952 Rooney named Joe Bach as head coach for the second time after Bach had coached the team in 1935-36, but Bach resigned in 1953 after two seasons because of health reasons. Rooney then called upon assistant coach Walt Kiesling. It was Kiesling's third stint as head coach of the Steelers as he had held the position from 1939-40 and 1941-44. He stayed three years and was succeeded in 1957 by Buddy Parker. In Parker's eight campaigns he led the team to five non-losing records, three of those with the flamboyant Bobby Layne at quarterback. In 1962, Layne's last season with the Steelers, the team captured its second-ever playoff entry before dropping a 17-10 decision to Detroit, the team for which Layne played prior to joining the Steelers. As head coach, Parker compiled a 51-47-6 record, still ranking

second to Noll in the 55 years of the Steelers, before being replaced in 1965 by Mike Nixon.

Brief stints by Nixon, who was 2-12 in his one season, and Bill Austin, who was 11-28-3 from 1966-68, preceded the hiring of Chuck Noll in 1969. The 37-year old Noll was called on by Dan Rooney, the oldest of Art Rooney's five sons and now the team's president, to bring the Steelers out of their past history of losing. Noll directed his new club to an opening day win in 1969 before losing the remaining 13 contests, but a foundation was being built as Noll used sound draft selections to begin establishing a powerhouse that would dominate the NFL for a decade.

With the 1970 merger of the NFL and the American Football League, the Steelers agreed to move to the new American Football Conference of the NFL, joined by the Cleveland Browns and the Baltimore Colts. The Steelers and Browns, division rivals since 1950, remained division foes as they both became members of the AFC's Central division.

1970 also marked the team's move to a new home, Three Rivers Stadium. The Steelers had been playing their home games at Forbes Field from 1933-1957, and from 1958-1962 at both Forbes Field and Pitt Stadium. From 1963-1969 the team took up residence at Pitt Stadium until Three Rivers was opened in 1970.

Rooney's Steelers saw gradual improvement in their first three years under Noll, with records of 5-9 in 1970 and 6-8 in 1971. The team finally claimed its first division crown in 1972 with an 11-3 record, followed by a 13-7 playoff win over Oakland when Franco Harris ignited the Pittsburgh crowd with a last-second touchdown after catching a deflected pass. The Steelers fell to the undefeated Miami Dolphins the next week in the AFC Championship game, 21-17, but the team had experienced a new pinnacle of success which it would exceed in the years to come.

In 1973 Noll's troops reeled off a 10-4 record to set up a rematch with Oakland in the playoffs, but the Raiders avenged their earlier loss with a 33-14 victory. The following season the Steelers would not be denied after a 10-3-1 campaign. Playoff victories over Buffalo (32-14) and Oakland (24-13) thrust the Pittsburgh team into Super Bowl IX, in which they dominated the Minnesota Vikings 16-6 and allowed a Super Bowl record-low 119 total yards.

In 1975 the Steelers became the third team to win back-to-back Super Bowls when they downed the Dallas Cowboys 21-17 in Super Bowl X following a 12-2 regular season, including 11 straight wins, and playoff victories over Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10). A 10-4 record in 1976 was impressive after the team lost four of its first five outings and reeled off nine straight wins to reach the playoffs. The 10-4 finish preceded a 40-14 playoff victory over Baltimore, but Oakland took a 24-7 decision in the AFC Championship game to prevent a third straight Super Bowl appearance by the Steelers. The 1977 Steelers battled to a 9-5 finish but lost a first-round playoff game to Denver, 34-21.

In 1978 the Steelers regained their position as NFL Champion after closing out the regular season with the league's best record, 14-2. They breezed through playoff wins over Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5) before claiming a thrilling Super Bowl XIII win over Dallas, 35-31. With that victory the Steelers became the NFL's first team to win the Vince Lombardi trophy three times. They made football history the following season by defeating the Los Angeles Rams 31-19 in Super Bowl XIV for their fourth Super Bowl title and second pair of back-to-back wins. The fourth championship came on the heels of a 12-4 regular season finish and postseason victories over Miami (34-14) and Houston (27-13).

Opening a new decade, the Steelers faltered in 1980 and 1981 with 9-7 and 8-8 records to fall out of the playoffs and end an eight-year streak of post-season appearances. They marked the club's 50th anniversary season, 1982, with a return to postseason play after a 6-3 finish in the strike-shortened schedule, but the anniversary season ended in a first-round playoff loss to San Diego, 31-28. In October of 1982 an anniversary banquet commemorating the club's first 50 years was held to honor the Steelers' all-time team as selected by fan balloting. The banquet was part of a week of activities and exhibits which attracted thousands of fans to Pittsburgh.

In 1983 the Steelers again earned a playoff berth, this time with a 10-6 record, but lost to the Los Angeles Raiders 38-10 in the first round. A 9-7 mark in 1984 was good enough for the division title, and the team gained momentum with a season-ending 13-7 win over the Raiders before a spirited 24-17 upset in Denver in the playoffs. An AFC Championship game showdown in Miami proved to be the end of the road, however, as the Dolphins' powerful air attack took a 45-28 decision to prevent the Steelers' fifth Super Bowl appearance.

1984 marked the end of 13 years of non-losing records as the team fell to 7-9 in 1985 and 6-10 last season. Despite the team's worst record since 1970, the 1986 Steelers bounced back from a 1-6 start to post a 5-4 finish and get the team moving in the right direction coming into the 1987 campaign.

The history of the Pittsburgh Steelers includes several members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. In 1964, Art Rooney, Sr. was inducted into The Hall. By that time his oldest son, Dan, had been working full-time for the team for

CHUCK NOLL

Head Coach

In 1987 head coach Chuck Noll enters his 19th season with the Steelers, coming off a season in which many observers felt he turned in his best coaching performance to date.

Entering the 35th year of his association with professional football, Noll is tied with Paul Brown as the fifth-winningest coach in NFL history. Noll's mark of 170-114-1 (.598) places him behind George Halas (325), Don Shula (263), Tom Landry (260), and Curly Lambeau (234) in career wins. Among active coaches, Noll stands third behind Shula and Landry in victories and is one of only four current coaches, along with Chuck Knox (137), to have recorded 100 career victories.

Noll's unprecedented four Super Bowl victories make him one of just four coaches to be undefeated in at least two Super Bowl appearances, and the Steelers are the only team to ever win back-to-back Super Bowl titles twice. With a 15-7 (.682) postseason record, Noll ranks third behind Vince Lombardi (.900) and Tom Flores (.727) among the 10 coaches who have been in at least 10 postseason games.

There were humble beginnings for Noll and the Steelers in 1969 as his initial team won its first game of the season and went on to lose the next 13 games. But there was a foundation to build upon. In his first draft as head coach, prior to the 1969 season, Noll used his first pick to select defensive lineman Joe Greene out of North Texas State. This past January Greene was elected for induction into Pro Football's Hall of Fame. In his second draft (1970) Noll picked quarterback Terry Bradshaw with his first pick and, like Greene, Bradshaw is destined for the Hall of Fame. Those two players were key building blocks for the Steelers' success during the 1970s.

In Noll's second season the Steelers were 5-9, having picked up the club's

most victories in a season in four years. The team's victory output continued to increase as the Steelers went 6-8 in 1971.

It was during the 40th anniversary season of the Steelers that Noll led the team to its first division crown with an 11-3 record in 1972. Noll's team advanced in the playoffs that year by upending the Oakland Raiders, 13-7, when Franco Harris scooped a deflected Bradshaw pass out of the air and scored the winning touchdown. The 1972 season ended the following week when Shula's Miami Dolphins defeated Noll's squad, 21-17, in the AFC Championship game. The Dolphins went on to capture the Super Bowl title with a 17-0 record, the only team in NFL history to accomplish that feat. Noll, however, was rewarded for his efforts when he was named UPI's AFC Coach of the Year.

In 1973, as a 10-4 wildcard entry, the Steelers traveled to Oakland and were defeated, 33-14, by the Raiders to halt a three-game Pittsburgh win streak in the series. In 1974 Noll became the first coach in the team's history to register three consecutive winning seasons. Going 10-3-1 in the regular season, the Steelers took the AFC title by defeating Buffalo (31-14) and Oakland (24-13). Those victories were followed by a 16-6 win over Minnesota in Super Bowl IX when the Steeler defense limited the Vikings to 17 yards rushing and 119 yards overall.

The 1975 Steelers did not let up, running up a 12-2 record and defeating Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10) to capture a second consecutive AFC title. By defeating Dallas, 21-17, in Super Bowl X, Noll became the third coach to win back-to-back Super Bowls.

As was the case last season, Noll turned his team around in 1976 when the Steelers opened the season with four losses in their first five games. The Steelers bounced back to reel off nine straight wins and capture the division title and then defeated Baltimore, 40-14, in the playoffs. Their bid for an unprecedented third Super Bowl title came to an end with a 24-7 loss to Oakland in the AFC Championship game. The Sporting News, citing the job Noll did in leading his club back from a 1-5 start, named Noll NFL Coach of the Year.

Noll's Steelers were 9-5 and the division champion in 1977, but the season ended with a 34-21 loss to Denver in the playoffs. With the NFL's best won-loss record in 1978, the 14-2 Steelers marched past Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5) to set up the first rematch in Super Bowl history when the Steelers took on Dallas in Super Bowl XIII. The 35-31 victory made Noll the first coach to ever win the Vince Lombardi Trophy three times. The Steelers and Noll added to that record in 1979 when the team won consecutive Super Bowl titles for the second time. The victim this time was the Los Angeles Rams as Pittsburgh took a 31-19 decision. As a result of the four Super Bowl triumphs in six seasons, the Steelers earned the title of "Team of the Decade" for the 1970s.

The 1980s began slowly for the Steelers as they did not make the playoffs in 1980 or 1981 with 9-7 and 8-8 records, respectively, breaking an eight-year streak of postseason play. In the strike-shortened 1982 season, the Steelers went 6-3 and returned to the playoffs but lost to San Diego, 31-28, in the opening round of postseason play. In 1983 the Los Angeles Raiders put an end to Noll's 10-6 campaign with a 38-10 playoff win. The 1984 Steelers advanced to the AFC Championship game with a 24-17 victory over Denver, but the following week Miami took a 45-28 decision in the AFC Championship game to earn a trip to the Super Bowl. The Steelers have not advanced to the playoffs the past two years, having gone 7-9 in 1985 and 6-10 last year.

Last season the Steelers got off to a 1-6 start before rebounding to a 5-4 finish. The second half rally included back-to-back overtime losses on the road to Cleveland and Chicago, both division champions, and an inspired 45-24 victory over the playoff-bound New York Jets. After the stirring victory over the Jets, the Steeler players recognized Noll for his efforts by awarding him the game ball. It is the strong finish of the 1986 team that gives good reason for optimism as Noll leads his team into the 1987 season.

Noll's association with professional football began when he was a 21st round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1953 following a career at Dayton, where he was a team captain. He played seven seasons (77 career games) with the Browns from 1953-59 as an offensive guard and linebacker. During Noll's career, the Browns won five Eastern Conference championships and played for three NFL titles (1953, '54, '55), winning two.

Noll's playing career ended at the age of 27 when he retired to enter the coaching profession. However, an opportunity to coach at Dayton did not materialize, and Noll made plans for a teaching career. Sid Gillman then offered him the last spot on the staff of the Los Angeles Chargers, where Noll served as a defensive assistant for six years as the Chargers won four division titles and two AFL championships.

In 1966 Noll returned to the NFL as a defensive coach on Shula's staff in Baltimore. In his three years the Colts lost just seven regular season games and won an NFL title in 1968 before losing to the AFL's New York Jets in Super Bowl III.

Shortly after the Super Bowl game against the Jets, Dan Rooney named the 36-year old Noll head coach of the Steelers, making him the 14th head coach in the organization's history.

RON BLACKLEDGE
Offensive Line Coach —
Tackles/Tight Ends

Now in his 28th year of coaching, Ron Blackledge will team with guard/center coach Hal Hunter to continue building the foundation of the Pittsburgh offense.

A key reason for the Steelers' third-place conference ranking in rushing in 1986 was the play of the offensive line. Crippled by injuries at the start of the season, the line held its own with seven different starting combinations in the first eight games.

Blackledge, a 49-year old native of North Canton, Ohio, joined the Steelers on August 31, 1982, as an offensive assistant. He became the offensive line coach later that year on September 2 when Rollie Dotsch left to join the USFL.

Blackledge's coaching career includes nine years at the high school level and 14 in the college ranks. As a tight end and defensive end at Bowling Green, Blackledge starred from 1957-59 and is now a member of his alma mater's hall of fame.

He got his coaching start at the high school level in his native Canton, Ohio, at Canton South (1960-62), Canton Timken (1963-65) and Canton Glenwood (1967-68). After that Blackledge headed to the collegiate level as the offensive line coach at Ashland College (1968-69). He performed the same duties at Cincinnati (1970-72), Kentucky (1973-75), and Princeton (1976). In 1977 Blackledge became the offensive coordinator at Kent State under Steeler computer & special teams coach Dennis Fitzgerald. From 1979-81 Blackledge was the head coach at Kent State before joining Chuck Noll's staff in 1982.

Blackledge earned his bachelor's degree in physical education at Bowling Green (1960) and went on to earn a master's in guidance and physical education from Ohio University in 1967.

Blackledge and wife Linda have three children: daughters Michelle (6/13/64) and Traci (8/17/71) and son Todd (2/25/61), who is a quarterback with the Kansas City Chiefs. The Blackledge family lives in the North Hills. Ron was born April 15, 1938, in North Canton, Ohio.



TONY DUNGY
Defensive Coordinator

Entering his seventh season on Chuck Noll's staff and his fifth as defensive coordinator, Tony Dungy is considered one of the bright young minds in the NFL.

At 31 years old, he is the youngest coordinator in the NFL. Dungy's unit had one or more interceptions in 12 of 16 games last season and held the opposition to under 100 yards rushing in five of those contests. Overall, the Steeler defense finished sixth in the AFC while attaining an eighth place ranking against both the run and the pass.

Dungy joined Noll's staff in 1981, at the age of 25, as a defensive assistant. The following season he coached the secondary, and in 1983 Dungy was named the team's defensive coordinator. He is one of four Steeler assistant coaches who also played under Noll.

After a distinguished college career as a quarterback at the University of Minnesota, Dungy made the Steeler roster as a free agent safety in 1977. In his second year with the Steelers (1978) he produced six interceptions to lead the team. He was traded to the San Francisco 49ers in 1979, and his career ended with the New York Giants in 1980. After his playing career Dungy returned to his alma mater to coach the defensive backs through the 1980 season before joining the Steeler staff in 1981.

While a player at Minnesota, Dungy quarterbacked under Steeler offensive coordinator Tom Moore in 1973 and 1975-76. The Jackson, Michigan, native earned team MVP honors twice during his career and captained the Golden Gophers as a senior. At the completion of his career, he held the school's all-time records for total plays (999), pass attempts (586), completions (274), passing yards (3,577), and touchdowns (25). He played in the Japan and Hula Bowls and the East-West Shrine game in 1976.

A 1977 Minnesota graduate, Dungy holds a bachelor's degree in business administration.

Dungy and his wife Lauren live with their daughter Tiara (12/28/84) in Allison Park. Tony was born October 6, 1955, in Jackson, Michigan.



DENNIS FITZGERALD
Computer & Special
Teams Coach

Now in his sixth season with the Steelers, Dennis Fitzgerald has assumed a new role. Along with Jon Kolb, Fitzgerald will coach the special teams and be responsible for the newly-installed computer system.

Fitzgerald made his mark as a defensive specialist and will continue to work in that area with the computer system.

Prior to this season, Fitzgerald coached the Steeler linebacking corps for five seasons.

Fitzgerald came to Chuck Noll's staff in 1982 after 21 years as a college coach.

After earning five letters as a half-back and a wrestler at Michigan from 1958-60 and being named the Wolverines' football MVP as a senior, Fitzgerald became an assistant freshman coach at his alma mater from 1961-62. He was the head freshman coach from 1963-65 before joining the varsity staff as defensive line coach, a position he held from 1966-68. He moved on to Kentucky in 1969 as defensive coordinator and held the same position for the 1971-74 seasons at Kent State.

Fitzgerald succeeded Don James as the Kent State head coach in 1975 and, during his three seasons as the head man, compiled an 18-16 record. Steeler offensive line coach Ron Blackledge served as his offensive coordinator at Kent State. In 1978 Fitzgerald was named Syracuse's defensive coordinator, and in 1981 he held the same position with Tulane before coming to the Steelers.

Fitzgerald had an outstanding wrestling career as a collegian when he was NCAA semi-finalist in 1960 and 1961, an AAU finalist in 1961, and a two-time Big Ten champ in 1960 and '61. He also captained the team as a senior. He holds his bachelor's (1961) and master's (1963) degrees in physical education from Michigan.

Fitzgerald and wife Elizabeth have six children: son Timothy (11/3/64) and daughters Maureen (2/23/66), Eileen (8/10/67), Molly (8/8/68), Katherine (2/9/72), and Margaret (12/14/77). The Fitzgeralds live in the North Hills. Dennis was born March 13, 1936, in Ann Arbor, Michigan.



JOE GREENE
Defensive Line Coach

Joe Greene became the newest member of Chuck Noll's coaching staff on February 19 of this year when he was hired as the Steelers' defensive line coach. The 41-year old Greene also was enshrined into the Pro Football Hall of Fame this year, on August 8, in his first year of eligibility. Greene was joined by running back John Henry Johnson, and the event marked the first time a Steeler had been inducted since 1969.

Joe Greene's arrival as defensive line coach follows his five-year retirement after a 13-year career as a perennial all-pro defensive tackle for the Steelers. In 1969 the North Texas State product became the first draft selection of Noll's career as a head coach, and over the next 13 seasons he established himself as the most dominating defensive lineman in the game and the cornerstone of the famed "Steel Curtain Defense."

Greene earned NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year honors in 1969 and made his first trip to the Pro Bowl, the first in what would become an eight-year streak. Today Greene ranks second in team history in career quarterback sacks, with 66, and is a member of the Steelers' All-Time Team.

At the end of his college career at North Texas State, Greene was named consensus All-American. He was the fourth player selected in the 1969 draft, and is now the fourth Steeler assistant coach who was also a player under Noll.

Greene is a native of Temple, Texas, where he attended Dunbar High. He graduated from North Texas State in 1968 with a bachelor's degree in physical education, and he currently serves on the board of trustees for his alma mater. In February of this year Greene received the first annual Walter Camp Football Foundation "Alumni Award."

Greene and wife Agnes have three children: sons Charles ("Major") (7/29/68) and Edward (10/13/69) and daughter JoQuel (10/13/73). Major currently plays football at North Texas State. The Greene family lives in the North Hills. Joe was born September 24, 1946, in Temple, Texas.



DICK HOAK
Offensive Backfield Coach

Under Dick Hoak, the Steeler rushing attack was the most balanced in the NFL last season as Earnest Jackson and Walter Abercrombie carried the ball 216 and 214 times, respectively, while the Steeler running game rated third-best in the AFC.

Now in his 16th season as a Steeler coach and in his 26th as a member of the Pittsburgh organization, Hoak looks to continue building a balanced and effective rushing attack in 1987.

Hoak, 47, joined Chuck Noll's staff in 1972, and is the longest-tenured assistant on the staff and one of four coaches who was also a player under Noll. Hoak initially established himself in the Steeler organization with a brilliant 10-year career as a running back.

Hoak played for the Steelers from 1961-70, and at the end of his career was the team's second-leading all-time rusher, with 3,965 yards, behind John Henry Johnson. Franco Harris has since moved into the top spot on that chart, but Hoak's name is still prominent in the Steeler record book as the No. 2 man in career rushing attempts (1,132) while maintaining the No. 4 spot in rushing touchdowns (25). He also recorded the fourth-longest run in team history when he scored a 77-yard touchdown against New Orleans in 1968.

For his career Hoak added 145 pass receptions for another 1,152 yards and eight touchdowns.

Hoak led the Steelers in rushing in 1965, 1968 and 1969. His 858 yards in 1968 ranked fourth in the NFL and earned him a trip to the Pro Bowl. That year he was also honored as the area's Man of the Year in Sports by the Dapper Dan Club of Pittsburgh.

Prior to his pro career, Hoak was a quarterback and running back at Penn State from 1958-60 where he was team captain and MVP.

A 1961 graduate of Penn State, Hoak holds a bachelor's degree in social studies.

Hoak and wife Lynn have three children: daughters Kelly (5/18/65) and Katie (7/23/68) and son Richard (7/5/72). The Hoaks live in Greensburg. Dick was born December 12, 1939, in Jeannette, Pennsylvania.



JED HUGHES
Linebacker Coach

Entering his fourth year on the Steeler staff, Jed Hughes takes on added responsibility after serving as the outside linebackers coach for the past three seasons. As a result of changes on Chuck Noll's staff this season, Hughes now handles the inside and outside linebackers.

Under Hughes' guidance, the trio of Mike Merriweather, Bryan Hinkle and Anthony Henton excelled last season. Hinkle was named the Steelers' 1986 Most Valuable Player, while Merriweather made his third trip to the Pro Bowl. Henton, meanwhile, was named the Steelers' Rookie of the Year.

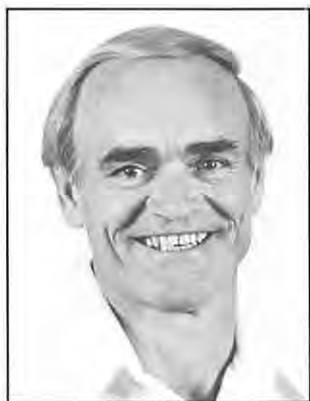
Hughes, 40, arrived in Pittsburgh in 1984 after having coached the defensive backfield for the Minnesota Vikings during the 1982 and 1983 seasons. Hughes is one of just two assistants on the Steeler staff who has coached for another NFL team.

Now entering his 18th year as a coach, Hughes' career began in 1970 on the staff at Biglerville (Pa.) High School. From there he moved to the collegiate ranks and Stanford where he coached the offensive line in 1971 and the defensive line in 1972. Hughes joined the Michigan staff in 1973 as the offensive line coach and switched responsibilities to the linebacker corps there during the next two seasons. He spent the next six seasons on UCLA's staff as the linebacker coach, defensive line coach, and finally as the defensive coordinator.

Hughes was a three-sport athlete at Springfield (Mass.) College in 1966-67 before transferring to Gettysburg College from 1968-69. While at Springfield, Hughes lettered in football as a tight end and linebacker, baseball and wrestling. At Gettysburg he played tight end and split end and was a member of the baseball team.

A member of the class of '70 of Gettysburg, Hughes holds a bachelor's degree in biology and physical education. He received his master's in education from Stanford in 1972 and a Ph.D. in education administration from Michigan in 1975.

Hughes and his wife Carol live in the North Hills. Jed was born November 14, 1947, in New York City.



HAL HUNTER
Offensive Line Coach —
Guards/Centers

In his role as offensive line coach, Hal Hunter is responsible for the guards and centers. Last season veteran center Mike Webster returned from a preseason elbow injury to fulfill his customary role as anchor of the line and team leader after missing the first four games. Hunter will continue to direct the development of the interior linemen, which include Craig Wolfley, Terry Long, and John Rienstra.

Hunter came to the Steelers in February of 1985. He entered the professional ranks in 1981 when he joined Frank Kush's staff as offensive coordinator of the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League. In 1982 Hunter moved to the NFL's Baltimore Colts as offensive line coach under Kush. In 1984 the Colts moved to Indianapolis and Hunter was named interim head coach for the final game of that season.

Prior to his professional coaching career, Hunter coached 23 years at the collegiate level starting as the defensive line coach at Richmond from 1958-61. He then moved to West Virginia as offensive line coach for two seasons before working at Maryland from 1964-65 and Duke from 1966-70. His final two stops as a collegiate assistant were at Kentucky as the offensive coordinator (1971-72) and Indiana (1973-76) as offensive line coach.

From 1977-80 Hunter was head coach at California State College of Pennsylvania.

Hunter was a three-year starter at linebacker and guard at Pitt from 1953-55, and the school's heavy-weight wrestler from 1952-54. He placed fourth in the 1956 AAU wrestling championships, and in 1956 received his bachelor's degree in secondary education from Pitt. Hunter also holds a master's in science from West Virginia as a 1962 graduate of that program.

Hunter and wife Eileen have three children: daughters Heidi and Heather and son Hal, who is an assistant football coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. The Hunters live in Gibsonia, Pa. Hal was born June 3, 1934, in Canonsburg, Pennsylvania.



JON KOLB
Computer & Special
Teams Coach

Entering his sixth season as a Steeler assistant, Jon Kolb teams with Dennis Fitzgerald in coaching the special teams and handling the newly-installed computer system.

Kolb, an offensive tackle for the Steelers for 13 seasons, joined the coaching staff in 1982 as strength coach. Shortly thereafter he became the team's defensive line coach, continuing in that position through the 1986 season. In his new role he returns to the offensive phase in handling the offensive computerized breakdown of video tape, a development that will allow for more efficient and comprehensive evaluation of Steeler and opponent tendencies.

Last season under Kolb, the defensive line was the most improved part of the defense as it accounted for 30½ of the team's 43 sacks.

A member of the Steelers' All-Time Team, Kolb is one of four Pittsburgh assistant coaches to have played under Chuck Noll as well. A third round pick in 1969, Kolb is one of just nine Steelers to have played 13 seasons, during which he played in 177 games, the fifth-highest total ever for a Steeler. In his first 10 years in the league Kolb played in 156 of a possible 157 games. In his 13 years as a player he started 137 games, including 112 straight from 1971-79. Kolb is a member of a select group. He and Joe Greene are two members of Noll's staff to have played on all four Super Bowl champion teams.

A 1969 graduate of Oklahoma State, Kolb was a two-time All-Big Eight selection for the Cowboys. As a senior he was a consensus second-team All-America and played in all the major post-season bowl games. He played center and linebacker during his college career (1966-68). He holds a bachelor's degree in physical education from Oklahoma State. Kolb was inducted into the Western Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame last spring.

Kolb and wife Debbie have two sons: Eric (8/28/71) and Tanner (10/26/80). The Kolbs live in the North Hills. Jon was born August 30, 1947, in Ponca City, Oklahoma.



TOM MOORE
Offensive Coordinator

Tom Moore is now in his fifth year as the Steelers' offensive coordinator and his 11th season as a member of Chuck Noll's staff.

The 1987 season brings the challenge of continuing the solid rushing performance of last season while improving the passing efficiency. In 1986 the Steelers had the No. 3 running unit in the AFC, but the completion rate for the pass offense was 48.5.

Moore's offense ignited a 5-4 finish in the last nine games as it scored 32 of the 34 times it had the ball inside the opposition's 20-yard line. Further evidence of the team's turnaround was an increase in total offense from 250.9 yards per game to 339.4 in the last nine, and a pass completion rate which jumped from 40.5% to 55.0%.

Moore, 48, joined Noll's staff in 1977 as wide receivers coach. He was elevated to his current position in 1983. Now in his 25th year of coaching, Moore came to the Steelers from the University of Minnesota where he was offensive coordinator from 1972-73 and 1975-76.

His first professional coaching position was with the New York Stars of the World Football League in 1974.

Moore's coaching career began in 1961 at Iowa, his alma mater, where he was the freshman coach for two seasons. He moved to Dayton as offensive backfield coach in 1965 and stayed there for five years before serving for one season as the offensive coordinator at Wake Forest. Before going to Minnesota in 1972, Moore was the offensive backfield coach at Georgia Tech for two years.

Moore's quarterback at Minnesota during the 1975-76 seasons was Steeler defensive coordinator Tony Dungy.

A 1961 graduate of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in history, Moore quarterbacked the Hawkeyes from 1957-60.

In addition to his bachelor's degree, Moore earned a master's degree in guidance from Minnesota in 1966.

Moore and wife Emily have two children: daughter Terry (8/31/64) and son Daniel (1/17/68). The Moores live in Upper St. Clair. Tom was born November 7, 1938, in Owatonna, Minnesota.



WALT EVANS
Conditioning and Training Coach

Pittsburgh native Walt Evans is in his fifth season with the Steelers as the team's conditioning and training coach. The 36-year old Evans, who originally joined Chuck Noll's staff in 1983 as assistant conditioning coach, is responsible for developing and monitoring individualized conditioning programs for every Steeler player.

The broad scope of Evans' work entails five key areas — strength, conditioning, flexibility, nutrition, and rehabilitation. He designs specific weight programs, plans graduated running schedules, monitors each player's progress, and re-designs routines as needed.

A vital part of Evans' job, which he performs in conjunction with trainers Ralph Berlin and Francis Feld, is the rehabilitation of injured players. Evans works one-on-one with players recovering from injuries, many of whom are returning from surgery.

When he joined the Steeler coaching staff, Evans brought with him a wealth of experience and education in the health and fitness field. From 1980-82 he served as corporate fitness consultant for the General Nutrition Corporation, where he developed fitness programs for employees of Westinghouse and H.J. Heinz.

Evans graduated from Marietta in 1974 with a degree in physical education. He earned his master's in sports physiology from Pitt in 1982, and is currently working towards a doctorate of exercise physiology at Pitt. He is also a member of the American College of Sports Medicine.

Evans is single and lives in the North Hills. He was born May 15, 1951, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

DICK HALEY

Director of Player Personnel

Former Steeler defensive back Dick Haley is in his 17th season as the team's director of player personnel. Haley oversees the Steelers' personnel department, which includes the scouting, testing, evaluating, and drafting of college players.

The Steelers strongly adhere to a philosophy of building through the draft, as they have been doing since Chuck Noll became head coach in 1969. With that philosophy the team built a dominating defense and an explosive offense in the early 1970s which would eventually claim an un-

equalled four Super Bowl championships and earn the title "Team of the Decade." Two of those early draft classes, in 1971 and 1974, have been cited as two of the most productive in NFL history and a standard for the draft selection process.

A native of Midway, Pennsylvania, Haley began his scouting career with the BLESTO scouting combine. He was with BLESTO as an area scout in the south for five years prior to joining the Steelers in 1971.

As a college player Haley was a standout halfback for Pitt from 1955-59 and was the team's leading rusher and leading scorer as a senior. He played in the Panthers' Sugar Bowl and Gator Bowl appearances and capped his collegiate career in the 1959 East-West Shrine game. In that game he scored a touchdown on an 86-yard punt return.

In 1959, Haley's six-year professional playing career began as a ninth-round draft choice of the Washington Redskins. He played for the Redskins two seasons before going to the expansion Minnesota Vikings through the veteran draft pool in 1961. During the 1961 season Haley returned to his home state when the Steelers acquired him. He was among the team's top interceptors in each of his five years with the Steelers from 1961-64.

Dick and his wife Carolyn have two children — daughter Callie Rene, and son Richard Todd. The Haleys live in Bridgeville.



TOM MODRAK

Director of Pro Scouting

Pittsburgh native Tom Modrak is in his ninth year with the Steelers after joining the club's personnel department in 1979 as pro talent scout. As director of pro scouting he is responsible for scouting the Steelers' upcoming opponents and personnel. Modrak is also the Steelers' personnel liaison to the other NFL teams.

Modrak first joined the Steelers in 1973 as a part-time scout before working for the BLESTO scouting combine for six years. In 1979 he returned to the Steelers on a full-time basis.

Was also named by Sports Illustrated as Co-Offensive Player of the Week with Jackson for performance vs. Cincinnati. Increased production coincided with team's return to form as offense found overall improvement. Made 31 of his 47 receptions in final nine weeks. Tallied six TDs in last six games including three vs. New York Jets (12/13). Scored eight TDs overall during year (6 rush, 2 rec.) to lead team in TDs and finish second in scoring. In 1985 made great strides with 851 rushing yards in 16 starts, his first full season. Recorded nine TDs to rank third on team in scoring. Entering 1987, Shell shares the lead among active NFL players with Seattle's Dave Brown. Shell is also closing in on the Steelers' career interception record, currently ranking third behind Mel Blount (57) and Jack Butler (52).

SS Donnie Shell, WR John Stallworth, and C Mike Webster are the only remaining players from all four Steeler Super Bowl champion teams (1974, 1975, 1978, 1979).

The Steelers were shut out for the first time in 54 years in an opening game and did not score for the first time in 56 games (12-12-82 vs. Buffalo). Their nine first downs tied for the third fewest and their 146 yards were the fifth lowest in Chuck Noll's 18 seasons. The defense kept Pittsburgh in the game for almost three quarters. In spite of four first half Steeler turnovers, Seattle was held to one TD while the Steeler offense generated just 57 yards in the first half when the defense had two interceptions and three QB sacks. An interception and blocked punt accounted for two of Seattle's three second half TDs. The Steelers crossed midfield just twice, once on their first possession of the game and again midway through the final quarter. Mark Malone had his poorest game of his career. Five Steelers made their first NFL starts, three in the offensive line, and they gained 101 yards on punt returns.

Lipps' fumble on his own 19-yard line set up the tying field goal. The Lions stopped the Steelers on a fourth and one play at the Detroit 45 on the first series of the third quarter. On the next play, Joe Ferguson and Pete Mandley con-

nected on a 51-yard pass which was the big play that gave the Lions their only lead of the game, 17-10. On the next series, a 48-yard pass to Lipps was the key in the drive that tied the game. On the winning TD, Lipps caught a slant pass and fought the last 15 yards into the end zone. The Steelers had season highs for yards, first downs and plays. Donnie Shell became the 22nd player in NFL history to intercept 50 passes.

Today, the 55-year old Noll is only the fourth coach in league history to lead the same team for 19 consecutive seasons. Curly Lambeau (31), Tom Landry (28), and Steve Owen (23) are the other coaches who share that distinction.

Marking his continued contributions to professional football, Noll was named 1984 by Commissioner Pete Rozelle to the league's competition committee. In that capacity, Noll was involved in the governing of league rules, player and fan safety, game conduct, and player personnel procedures.

Noll and his wife Marianne have one son, Chris (29), who teaches at Proctor Academy in Andover, New Hampshire. Charles Henry Noll was born January 5, 1932, in Cleveland, Ohio, where he attended Holy Trinity School and Benedictine High. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in education from Dayton in 1953. The Nolls live in Upper St. Clair.

decade. In 1975 Daniel M. Rooney was named president of the Steelers, and today he is one of the most active executives in the National Football League.

Dan Rooney was graduated from Pittsburgh's North Catholic High School in 1950 and from there went on to earn his bachelor's degree in accounting from Duquesne in 1955. He immediately went to work for the Steelers, and over the next 20 years developed a background in every facet of the operation which prepared him for his appointment as president. Rooney has been a central figure in NFL operations, including membership on the board of directors for NFL Properties, the NFL Trust Fund, and NFL Films, as well as being a member of the scheduling committee and the ring committee. In 1973 he was named chairman of the expansion committee, which considered new franchise locations and directed the addition of Tampa and Seattle as expansion cities in 1976. That year Rooney was named chairman of the negotiating committee, and in 1982 he contributed to the negotiations for the Collective Bargaining Agreement for the NFL owners and the Players' Association. Today Rooney serves on the six-person Council Executive Committee.

In addition to his many league-wide activities, Dan Rooney is one of the most active executives in Pittsburgh civic affairs. He currently serves as vice president for the United Way, and is an officer and board member for The American Diabetes Association, the Pittsburgh History and Landmarks Foundation, Duquesne University, and The American Ireland Fund.

Now in his 33rd year with the Steelers, the 55-year-old Rooney was born July 20, 1932 on Pittsburgh's North Side. Dan and his wife Patricia have nine children and live in the Pittsburgh suburb of Mount Lebanon.

The induction of Joe Greene and John Henry Johnson into the Pro Football Hall of Fame this year marked the first time since 1969 that a Steeler has been inducted into The Hall. It is expected to be the beginning of a parade of former Steelers, however, as several players from the Super Bowl teams of the 1970s become eligible in the next few years.

Joe Greene's selection came in his first year of eligibility. The 10-time Pro Bowl performer was one of the game's most dominating players throughout his 13-year career after becoming Chuck Noll's first draft selection in 1969. Greene retired after the 1981 season, and in February of this year returned to the Steelers as the team's defensive line coach.

John Henry Johnson played for four teams - San Francisco, Detroit, Pittsburgh, and Houston - in his 13-year career, but the highlight years were 1960-65 when he was with the Steelers and led the team in rushing for four straight seasons. In 1962 Johnson earned a Pro Bowl berth after becoming the first Steeler ever to rush for 1,000 yards in a single season. Today he ranks second on the Steelers' all-time rushing chart.
