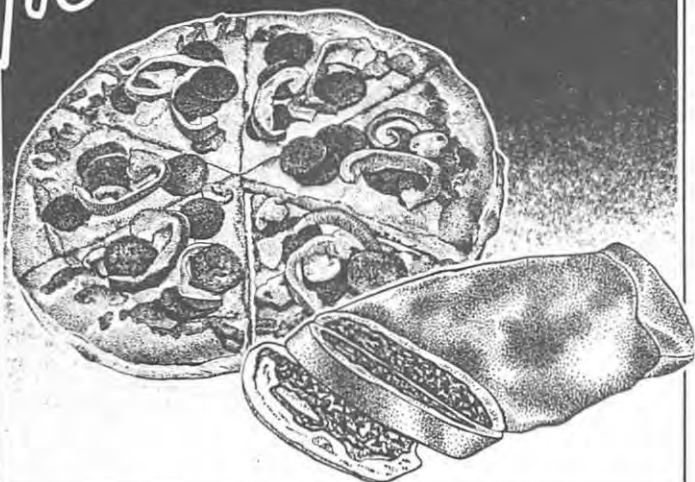

HISTORY OF THE STEELERS

A youthful Pittsburgh Steelers team improved to 8-7 in 1987 and was in contention for the AFC Central division title entering the 15th week of the season. In 1988, more work must be done to better that mark as the Steelers aim for their 10th division crown in their 56-year history.

The Pittsburgh Steelers are the fifth-oldest franchise in the NFL, founded on July 8, 1933 by Arthur Joseph Rooney. Rooney named his team the Pittsburgh Pirates, and the club struggled through its first seven seasons with five different head coaches and just 22 wins. In 1940, Rooney changed the name to the Pittsburgh Steelers, recognizing the industry which had always been the foundation of Pittsburgh. The name change did not change the club's losing ways, however, as 40 years would pass since the Steelers' birth before the team could wear the title of champions. Once that level was reached, however, the Steelers would enjoy a degree of success unprecedented in the history of professional football.

Arthur Joseph Rooney was born on January 27, 1901 in Coulterville, Pennsylvania, the oldest of Daniel and Margaret Rooney's nine children. When Rooney was a year old, his family moved to Old Allegheny, now called the North Side of Pittsburgh. Rooney grew up on the site where Three Rivers Stadium now stands, and today still lives just a short distance from the stadium.

Rooney attended St. Peter's Parochial School and Duquesne University Prep School prior to pursuing his college studies at Indiana (Pa.) Normal, now known as Indiana State University of Pennsylvania. He spent one year at Georgetown University and later attended Duquesne University. An outstanding athlete, Rooney played semi-pro football, minor league baseball, and was a boxer.

In 1920 Rooney was named to the United States' Olympic Boxing team, though he did not participate in the Olympics. He also held middleweight and welterweight titles from the AAU Boxing Championships. Between 1921 and 1925 Rooney played minor league baseball, but an arm injury put an end to a very promising career. He continued playing football for several semi-pro teams in the Pittsburgh area.

On June 11, 1931, Rooney married Kathleen McNulty. The Rooneys had five sons — Daniel, Art Jr., Tim, John, and Pat.

Known as the Pirates when they were founded two years later, Rooney's team joined the Eastern division of the realigned 10-team National Football League. Home games were played at Forbes Field, but because of competition from major league baseball and college football, Rooney often took the games to the fans. In the late 1930s, games were played at such sites as Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, New Orleans, and Louisville.

In 1938 Rooney signed the NFL's first big-money player when he paid Colorado All-American Byron "Whizzer" White an unheard-of salary of \$15,800. The rookie running back responded by leading the NFL in rushing. Today White is one of the league's most illustrious alumni as a United States Supreme Court Justice.

In 1940 the Pirates were renamed, but as the Steelers they continued to struggle. The team's first winning record (7-4) came in 1942 under head coach Walt Kiesling and sparked by the play of rookie running back Bill Dudley, who was the league's leading rusher. The next year Dudley joined the armed forces with the nation at war, and with rosters depleted Rooney merged the Steelers with Philadelphia (Phil-Pitts) in 1943 and with the Chicago Cardinals (Card-Pitts) in 1944.

In 1946 Rooney hired legendary Pitt coach Jock Sutherland, and Dudley returned from the war to join the Steelers. Dudley, who is now a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, was named the NFL's MVP after leading the league in rushing, interceptions, and punt returns in 1946. The next year Kiesling directed the Steelers to an 8-4 record and a tie for the Eastern division title, but the team lost its first-ever postseason game, 21-0 to Philadelphia. That spring, Kiesling died unexpectedly while on a scouting trip. He was succeeded by John Michelosen, who recorded a 20-26-2 mark over four seasons.

Joe Bach, who had been the Steelers' head coach in 1935-36, began a second stint as head coach in 1952. That year the Steelers became the last NFL team to abandon the single wing for the T-formation. Two years later

Bach resigned for health reasons, and assistant coach Walt Kiesling embarked upon his third term as head coach. Kiesling had been the head coach in 1939-40 and 1941-44, and his third stint lasted from 1954-56.

Buddy Parker was named head coach in 1957, leading the Steelers to five non-losing records on his eight seasons. For three years, the flamboyant Bobby Layne quarterbacked the Steelers, and in the 1962 season, Layne's last in Pittsburgh, the team went 9-5 to earn its second postseason appearance before losing to Detroit, 17-10. Parker's overall record of 51-48-6 ranks third to Noll and Sutherland (13-10-1) among the Steelers' all-time head coaches.

Brief stints by Mike Nixon in 1965 and Bill Austin from 1966-68 were followed by the 1969 hiring of Chuck Noll. As the 14th head coach in the Steelers' history, the 37-year old Noll brought with him a firm belief in building a championship team through the draft. Noll's first selection as head coach was North Texas State All-American Joe Greene, who was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame last year. It was around Greene that Noll began to build a defense that would dominate the NFL and come to be known as the "Steel Curtain."

The Steelers won their first game under Noll in 1969, but followed with 13 straight losses and won the right to make the first overall selection in the 1970 draft. With that pick Noll tabbed Louisiana Tech quarterback Terry Bradshaw, around whom he began to build a powerful offense.

1970 also marked two other significant changes for the Steelers as they moved into a new stadium and moved to a new division.

Three Rivers Stadium opened in 1970 and became the team's new home. Prior to Three Rivers, the Steelers played their home games at Forbes Field from 1933-57 and at both Forbes Field and Pitt Stadium from 1958-62. From 1963-69 the team played at Pitt Stadium until Three Rivers was opened in 1970.

The Steelers also made a move from the NFL's Century division to the Central division of the new AFC as the NFL and American Football Leagues merged in 1970.

Gradual improvement in Noll's first three campaigns was reflected in records of 5-9 in 1970 and 6-8 in 1971. With an 11-3 mark in 1972 the Steelers claimed their first division title and marched to a playoff showdown against the Oakland Raiders. Franco Harris' "Immaculate Reception" in the final minute of the game led to the Steelers' first-ever postseason victory by a 13-10 margin. The next week the undefeated Miami Dolphins claimed a 21-17 AFC Championship game win to end the Steelers' dream season, but the winning was just beginning for the Steelers.

The next year the Steelers posted a 10-4 mark, but the Raiders got revenge by downing the Steelers 33-14 in the playoffs. In 1974 the Steelers made a breakthrough after a 10-3-1 record clinched their second division title. They defeated Buffalo 32-14 and Oakland 24-13 in the playoffs to advance to Super Bowl IX. Led by a fierce defense, the Steelers beat Minnesota by a 16-6 score. The Steelers would make NFL history over the next five years with a run of success that has not been matched since.

11 straight wins in 1975 paved the way for a 12-2 finish and a second straight division championship for the Steelers. Postseason victories over Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10) preceded the Steelers' 21-17 defeat of the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl X. With that win, the Steelers became the third team in league history to win back-to-back Super Bowls, joining Green Bay and Miami.

In 1976 the team won nine straight games after a 1-4 start to finish with a 10-4 record. The Steelers then defeated Baltimore 40-14 in the playoffs, but came up short the next week against Oakland, 24-7. The 1977 Steelers won a fourth straight division title, but lost to Denver 34-21 after completing the season with a 9-5 mark.

The Steelers regained their title of NFL Champion in 1978 after a league-leading 14-2 regular season. Wins over Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5) set up a Super Bowl rematch with Dallas, and the Steelers were victorious again, this time by a 35-31 score in Super Bowl XIII. The Steelers were now the only team ever to win the Super Bowl three times.

In 1979 the Steelers made history one more time as they won their fourth Super Bowl and became the only team to win back-to-back Super Bowls twice. Their 31-19 win over the Los Angeles Rams in Super Bowl XIV followed a 12-4 finish and postseason victories over Miami (34-14) and Houston (27-13). With a fourth Super Bowl championship and eight consecutive years of post-season play, the Steelers earned the right to be called the "Team of the Decade."

The Steelers slipped at the start of a new decade as their records of 9-7 in 1980 and 8-8 in 1981 held them out of the playoffs for the first time in a decade.

1982 marked the 50th season since the Steelers were founded, and they celebrated the anniversary with a return to the playoffs after going 6-3 in the strike-shortened campaign. During the season the Steelers held an anniversary banquet to honor the club's all-time team as selected by the fans, and to commemorate the Steelers' first 50 years. The banquet was part of a week of activities and exhibits which attracted thousands of fans to Pittsburgh. The San Diego Chargers, however, ended the anniversary season with a 31-28 win over the Steelers in the playoffs.

The Steelers won their eighth division title and first in four years when they went 10-6 in 1983. Once again, they were unable to advance, falling to the Los Angeles Raiders 38-10.

In 1984 the Steelers got closer to the Super Bowl than they had been in five years, winning the division again with a 9-7 mark capped by a 13-7 upset of the Los Angeles Raiders on the season's final weekend. A rousing 24-17 road victory over Denver put the Steelers in the AFC Championship game against Miami, but the Dolphins' powerful passing game clinched a 45-28 decision and denied the Steelers a fifth Super Bowl appearance.

A 7-9 record in 1985 ended the Steelers' streak of 13 consecutive non-losing seasons, and in 1986 the team dropped to 6-10 for their worst record since 1970. Despite the record, optimism was found in the team's comeback after a 1-6 start.

In 1987, the Steelers went 8-7 and were in position to claim their 10th division title entering the next-to-last game of the season with an 8-5 mark. Losses to Houston and Cleveland, however, ended their hopes for a return to the playoffs.

The history of the Pittsburgh Steelers is sprinkled with many current members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Art Rooney, Sr., the patriarch of the Steelers, was inducted in 1964. By that time he had turned over operation of the club to his oldest son, Dan. Dan Rooney had assumed great responsibility since he began working full time for the Steelers in 1955. In 1975 Dan Rooney was named president of the Steelers, and today he is one of the most active executives in the NFL as well as one of Pittsburgh's most involved executives in civic affairs.

Among his civic activities, Dan Rooney currently serves as president for the United Way, and is an officer and board member for the American Diabetes Association, the Pittsburgh History and Landmarks Foundation, Duquesne University, and the American Ireland Fund.

As a key figure in NFL operations for over 15 years, Dan Rooney's league functions have included membership on the board of directors for NFL Properties, the NFL Trust Fund, NFL Films, the Scheduling Committee, and the Ring Committee. He was appointed chairman of the Expansion Committee in 1973, which considered new franchise locations and directed the addition of Seattle and Tampa Bay as expansion franchises in 1976. In 1976 he was also named chairman of the Negotiating Committee, and in 1982 contributed to the negotiations for the Collective Bargaining Agreement for NFL owners and the Players' Association. Rooney is currently a member of the six-person Council Executive Committee.

Now in his 34th year with the Steelers, Rooney's experience in every facet of the organization began upon his graduation from Duquesne University in 1955. He was graduated from North Catholic High School, where he played quarterback, in 1950. In 1955 he was graduated from Duquesne with a B.A. degree in accounting.

Dan and his wife, Patricia, have nine children and live in the Pittsburgh suburb of Mt. Lebanon. Dan Rooney was born July 20, 1932 on Pittsburgh's North Side.

FRITO-LAY "CHALLENGE FOR CHILDREN"

Since the "Challenge For Children" program began in 1983, the Frito-Lay Corporation has donated \$177,500 to youth-related charities in the Tri-State area. In 1988, for the sixth consecutive season, Frito-Lay will contribute \$100 for every point the Steelers score in regular and postseason games.

Last year's total was \$28,500. In 1983 the amount was \$36,500, in 1984 it was \$43,900 as the Steelers advanced to the AFC Championship game, in 1985 the total was \$37,900, and in 1986 the donation was \$30,700.

Charities which have been a part of this program are Children's Hospital, Ronald McDonald House, American Diabetes Youth Research, Cystic Fibrosis, Sickle Cell Society, National Autistic Society, the Abraxas Foundation, Boys Clubs of Western Pennsylvania, Spina Bifida, and the Parental Stress Center. Grants were provided to the Western Pennsylvania School for Blind Children, March of Dimes, Pittsburgh Rehabilitation Institute, and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome in 1987. This year's donations will go to the Lupus Foundation of America, National Society for Autistic Children, Make-A-Wish Foundation, and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome Foundation.

Head Coach

The 1988 season is an anniversary for head coach Chuck Noll as it marks his 20th campaign with the Steelers. Since 1969, when he became the 14th head coach in the club's history, Noll has coached 300 regular season and postseason games from the Steelers' sideline. Having compiled an overall career record of 178-121-1 (.595), Noll ranks as the fifth-winningest coach in the history of the National Football League and third among the current coaches.

Now in his 36th year of professional football, Noll's 178 career wins are bettered only by George Halas (325), Don Shula (271), Tom Landry (267), and Curly Lambeau (234) in the 66-year history of the league. Noll, along with Shula, Landry, and Chuck Knox, is one of four active NFL coaches with at least 100 career victories. He is also just the fourth man in league history to lead the same team for 20 consecutive seasons, joining Lambeau (31), Landry (29), and Steve Owen (23).

Noll's most distinguished accomplishments, however, were the four Super Bowl championships to which he led the Steelers over a six-year period. He is the only coach ever to win four Super Bowls and the only to win back-to-back championships twice. Only three other men — Vince Lombardi, Tom Flores, and Bill Walsh — are undefeated in at least two Super Bowl appearances. With a 15-7 (.682) postseason record, Noll is the leader among the six all-time coaches who have led their teams to at least 15 postseason games, and he ranks second to Joe Gibbs (11-3) among the current coaches with 10 or more postseason appearances.

Entering the 1988 season, the 56-year old Noll will continue his firm belief in building through the draft, a philosophy which has proven successful throughout his coaching career. Great Steeler drafts in the early 1970s produced four Super Bowl championships and the "Team of the Decade" title, and last year's productive rookie crop was a primary reason for the Steelers' turnaround and their first winning record since 1984.

The beginning of Chuck Noll's two decades with the Steelers was in 1969, when Steeler president Dan Rooney brought the 37-year old Cleveland native to Pittsburgh from Shula's Baltimore Colts staff. With nine years of experience as an assistant coach, Noll established his plan of sound drafting to build a champion football team. His first selection as a head coach was Joe Greene, an All-America defensive tackle from North Texas State who was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame last year. It was around Greene that Noll began to build a unit that would come to be known as the "Steel Curtain" defense.

Noll won his first game as an NFL head coach, but lost the remaining 13 in 1969. The Steelers benefited, however, from having the first overall pick in the 1970 draft, which Noll used to select Louisiana Tech quarterback Terry Bradshaw. The building of a dominating offense had begun, and Noll's drafting began to pay off.

Gradual improvement over the next two years gave the Steelers records of 5-9 in 1970 and 6-8 in 1971. In 1972 an 11-3 campaign gave the Steelers their first-ever division title, exactly 40 years after their founding. Noll's troops advanced to claim a 13-7 last-minute playoff win over the Oakland Raiders for the first postseason victory in the club's history, but the undefeated Miami Dolphins ended the Steelers' dream with a 21-17 decision in the AFC Championship game.

In 1973 Noll directed the Steelers to a 10-4 finish to claim a wild-card playoff berth before allowing Oakland to avenge the previous year's loss, 33-14. The next year, however, Noll began a string of six consecutive AFC Central division titles which would run the team's playoff streak to eight years. A 10-3-1 record in 1974 and postseason wins over Buffalo (32-14) and Oakland (24-13) resulted in the Steelers' appearance in Super Bowl IX against Minnesota. Their 16-6 victory marked the beginning of a success story unprecedented in the NFL. The following year Noll's Steelers went 12-2 and downed Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10) in the playoffs, then beat Dallas by a 21-17 score in Super Bowl X to make Noll the third coach to win back-to-back Super Bowls, joining Lombardi and Shula.

1976 and 1977 saw the Steelers win their third and fourth consecutive division titles, with records of 10-4 and 9-5, but postseason losses to Oakland (24-7) in the 1976 AFC Championship game and to Denver (34-21) in the 1977 playoffs prevented a third Super Bowl opportunity.

Noll got his team off to a fast start in 1978 with seven straight wins, and completed the season with an NFL-best and team-record 14-2 mark. Lopsided wins over Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5) set up a Super Bowl rematch with Dallas, and Noll was victorious again with a 35-31 Super Bowl XIII decision. With that win he became the only coach to claim three Super Bowl titles.

In 1979, Noll made history as the only coach to win four Super Bowl trophies and the only man to win back-to-back Super Bowls twice. His 12-4 team turned in postseason wins over Miami (34-14) and Houston (27-13) before defeating the Los Angeles Rams 31-19 in Super Bowl XIV. With four Super Bowl wins in a span of six years, the Steelers were tagged the 1970s "Team of the Decade."

The beginning of a new decade was not as prosperous for Noll, as his teams slipped to 9-7 in 1980 and 9-8 in 1981, missing the playoffs both years to end an eight-year streak.

Celebrating the club's 50th season in 1982, the Steelers rose to the occasion and returned to postseason play after a 6-3 mark in the strike-shortened schedule. A 31-28 Super Bowl tournament loss to San Diego ended the mile-

stone campaign, but Noll had his troops back on track as they claimed the division title each of the next two years.

After a 10-6 record in 1983, the Steelers dropped a 38-10 playoff game to the Los Angeles Raiders. In 1984 they were 9-7, and progressed further in the playoffs with a 24-17 win at Denver which set up an AFC Championship game with the Miami Dolphins. The Dolphins' powerful aerial attack proved to be too much, as Dan Marino led his team to a 45-28 victory.

In 1985 and 1986 Noll's teams stumbled to 7-9 and 6-10 record to finish third in the AFC Central. Extremely productive drafting, however, helped improve their mark to 8-7 last year. Nine of the 13 players drafted in 1987 were on the roster and three of the first four were regulars in the defensive secondary. Overall improvement was highlighted by better defensive and special teams play, and Noll was again given credit for a tremendous coaching job as he kept his team in playoff contention until the end.

Noll began his NFL career in 1953 as a 21st-round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns following his college career as captain of Dayton's squad. He played guard for the Browns for seven years (77 games) before retiring in 1960 and beginning his coaching career at the age of 27. During Noll's playing career, the Browns won two NFL titles (1954, '55) and four Eastern conference championships (1953-55, '57).

From 1960-65 Noll was a defensive assistant under Sid Gillman for the Los Angeles/San Diego Chargers. During that period the Chargers won five Western conference titles and one AFL championship (1963). In 1966 he began a three-year stint on Shula's Baltimore Colts staff prior to joining the Steelers in 1969. While he was with the Colts, the team lost just seven regular season games in three years and claimed the NFL title in 1968 before losing to the AFL's New York Jets in Super Bowl III.

One of the most respected coaches in the NFL, Noll was named by Commissioner Pete Rozelle to serve two years on the league's competition committee, which he did in 1984-85.

Chuck and his wife Marianne have one son, Chris, who is 30 and teaches at Proctor Academy in Andover, New Hampshire. Chuck was born January 5, 1932 in Cleveland. He attended Holy Trinity School and Benedictine High before enrolling at Dayton. He was graduated from Dayton in 1953 with a bachelor of science degree in education. The Nolls live in Upper St. Clair.

RON BLACKLEDGE
Offensive Line Coach —
Tackles/Tight Ends

Ron Blackledge is in his seventh year as a Steeler assistant coach. A veteran of 29 years of coaching, he spent 22 at the high school and collegiate level prior to joining Noll's staff on August 31, 1982 as an offensive assistant. On September 2 of that year he became offensive line coach when Rollie Dotsch went to the USFL.

Blackledge teams with guards/centers coach Hal Hunter in overseeing the intricate blocking schemes of the Steeler line. Typified by traps and pulling by the guards and tackles, it is one of the most complex blocking schemes in the NFL.

The 50-year old Blackledge is a native of North Canton, Ohio, where he began his coaching career in 1960 at Canton South High (1960-62), followed by stops at Canton Timken (1963-65) and Canton Glenwood (1967-68). His collegiate coaching career began at Ashland College (1968-69) as offensive line coach, followed by stints in the same capacity at Cincinnati (1970-72), Kentucky (1973-75), and Princeton (1976).

In 1977 Blackledge went to Kent State as offensive coordinator under Steeler special teams coach Dennis Fitzgerald. Blackledge was Kent State's head coach from 1979-81, and came to the Steelers the next year.

A member of the Bowling Green Hall of Fame, Blackledge starred as a tight end and defensive end for that school from 1957-59. He was graduated from Bowling Green in 1960 with a bachelor's in physical education. In 1967 he earned his master's in guidance and physical education from Ohio University.

Ron and his wife Linda have three children: son Todd (2-25-61), a sixth-year quarterback who joined the Steelers this year, and daughters Michelle (6-13-64) and Traci (8-17-71). The Blackledge family lives in the North Hills. Ron was born April 15, 1938, in North Canton, Ohio.



TONY DUNGY
Defensive Coordinator

Tony Dungy enters his sixth season as the Steelers' defensive coordinator and his eighth year as a member of Noll's defensive staff. The 32-year old Dungy is the NFL's youngest coordinator, and is considered one of the league's bright young coaches.

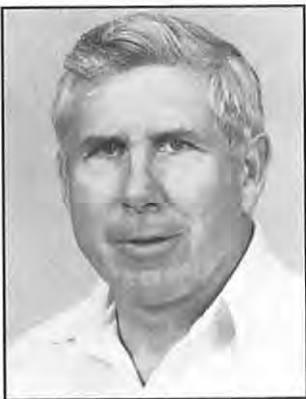
At the age of 25, Dungy joined Noll's staff as a defensive assistant in 1981, becoming secondary coach the next year and defensive coordinator in 1983. He is one of four current Steeler assistant coaches who was also a player under Noll.

Dungy's three-year playing career began in 1977 when he made the Steelers' roster as a free agent safety. In 1978 he led the team with six interceptions, but was traded to the San Francisco 49ers the next year. His career ended prior to the 1980 season after he was traded to and waived by the New York Giants.

Dungy enjoyed a distinguished college career as quarterback at Minnesota from 1973-76. He was twice named the team's MVP and was the captain as a senior. For three seasons — 1973, 1975-76 — Dungy's coach at Minnesota was Steeler offensive coordinator Tom Moore, and in 1976 his backup was Cleveland Browns' quarterback coach Marc Trestman. Upon completing his career, Dungy held the school records for total plays (999), pass attempts (586), completions (274), passing yards (3,577), and touchdown passes (25). Following the 1976 season he played in the Japan and Hula Bowls and the East-West Shrine game. Dungy was graduated from Minnesota in 1977 with a bachelor's in business administration.

Dungy's coaching career began in 1980 as defensive backs coach at Minnesota before returning to the Steelers as a coach in 1981.

Tony and his wife Lauren have two children, daughter Tiara (12-28-84) and son Jamie (1-6-87). The Dungy's live in Allison Park. Tony was born October 6, 1955, in Jackson, Michigan.



DENNIS FITZGERALD
Special Teams Coach/
Defensive Assistant

Dennis Fitzgerald joined Noll's staff in 1982 after 21 years as a college coach. He is in his seventh season with the Steelers and his second coaching the special teams. Fitzgerald was line-backer coach for the Steelers for his first five years in the NFL.

In addition to coaching special teams along with Jon Kolb, Fitzgerald handles the computerized breakdown of defensive video tape.

Fitzgerald began his coaching career as assistant freshman coach for Michigan in 1961. He held that position for two seasons prior to being head coach of the freshman team from 1963-65. He was defensive line coach for the varsity from 1966-68 before going to Kentucky in 1969 as defensive coordinator. From 1971-74 Fitzgerald was defensive coordinator at Kent State. He succeeded Don James as head coach in 1975, and in three seasons had a record of 18-16. During that time, his offensive coordinator was Steeler offensive line coach Ron Blackledge.

Fitzgerald was named defensive coordinator at Syracuse in 1978 and at Tulane in 1981 prior to joining the Steelers.

As a halfback and wrestler, Fitzgerald earned five letters at Michigan between 1958-60. He was also named the football team's MVP and captain of the wrestling team as a senior. In wrestling, he was the Big Ten champion and an NCAA semifinalist in 1960 and '61, as well as an AAU finalist in 1961.

Fitzgerald earned two degrees in physical education from Michigan, receiving his bachelor's in 1961 and his master's in 1963.

Dennis and his wife Elizabeth have six children: son Timothy (11-3-64) and daughters Maureen (2-23-66), Eileen (8-10-67), Molly (8-8-68), Katherine (2-9-72), and Margaret (12-14-77). The Fitzgeralds live in the North Hills. Dennis was born March 13, 1936, in Ann Arbor, Michigan.



JOE GREENE
Defensive Line Coach

Joe Greene is in the second year of his coaching career since returning to the Steelers on February 19, 1987. Greene is in charge of the defensive line, which is where he made his mark for 13 seasons as a perennial All-Pro defensive tackle for the Steelers.

Last year, Greene received football's greatest honor when he was inducted, in his first year of eligibility, to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Joining him was former Steeler running back John Henry Johnson, marking the first time since 1969, Greene's rookie year, that a Steeler entered The Hall.

One of four Steeler assistants who played under Noll and one of two from all four Super Bowl teams, Greene has the distinction of being the first player drafted by Noll. He was the fourth player selected overall in 1969, and was named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year in addition to making his first of nine Pro Bowl Trips. Over the course of his 13-year career, Greene established himself as the most dominating defensive lineman in the NFL. He was the heart of the famed "Steel Curtain" defense, and still ranks second in team history with 66 quarterback sacks. He is also a member of the Steelers' All-Time Team. In 1987 he was awarded the first Walter Camp Football Foundation "Alumni Award."

Greene is a native of Temple, Texas, where he attended Dunbar High. He spent the next four years at North Texas State, and was a consensus All-American. He was graduated from North Texas State in 1968 with a bachelor's in physical education, and today serves on the school's board of trustees.

Greene is active in the Pittsburgh community. This year he is serving as honorary chairman for the Central Blood Bank corporate drive.

Joe and his wife Agnes have three children: sons Major (7-29-68) and Delon (10-13-69), and daughter JoQuel (10-13-73). Major plays football at North Texas State, and Delon is a freshman at Pitt this year. Joe was born September 24, 1946 in Temple, Texas.



DICK HOAK
Offensive Backfield Coach



JED HUGHES
Linebacker Coach

Dick Hoak is the longest-tenured assistant on Noll's staff, now in his 17th season as a coach and his 27th year with the Steeler organization. A native of nearby Jeannette, Pennsylvania, the 48-year-old Hoak became a Steeler coach in 1970 immediately following his brilliant 10-year career as a player for the Steelers. He is one of four Noll assistants who was also a player under Noll, with his last season as a player (1970) being Noll's second as the Steeler head coach. Hoak is the only assistant remaining from all four Super Bowl staffs.

Hoak began his Steeler career as a running back, drafted in the seventh round in 1961 out of Penn State. He was the team's leading rusher in 1965, '68, and '69. His 858 rushing yards in 1968 ranked fourth in the NFL and led to his being named to the Pro Bowl that year. He was also honored as the Dapper Dan Club's Man of the Year in Sports in 1968.

Hoak completed his 10-year playing career in 1970, ranking second to John Henry Johnson in team history for career rushing yards with 3,965. Today Hoak is the third-leading rusher, having been passed by Franco Harris, but he also is second in touchdowns (25) and fourth in rush attempts (1,132). He added 145 pass receptions for 1,152 yards and eight receiving touchdowns in his career and his 77-yard touchdown run vs. New Orleans in 1968 is still the fourth-longest in team history.

Hoak can claim the distinction of being the only Steeler ever to play in regular season games at Forbes Field, Pitt Stadium, and Three Rivers.

As a quarterback and running back at Penn State from 1958-60, Hoak was selected the team's captain and MVP. He was graduated in 1961 with a bachelor's degree in social studies.

Dick and his wife Lynn have three children: daughters Kelly (5-18-65) and Katie (7-23-68) and son Richard (7-5-72). The Hoak family lives in Greensburg. Dick was born December 12, 1939, in Jeannette, Pennsylvania.

Jed Hughes enters his 19th year of coaching and his fifth with the Steelers. The 41-year old Hughes, who joined Noll's staff in 1984, is in charge of the team's inside and outside linebackers. For his first three seasons he was charged with handling the outside linebackers. Under Hughes, the Steelers' MVPs of the past two seasons have both been linebackers—Bryan Hinkle and Mike Merriweather.

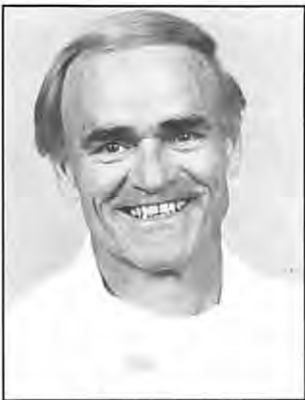
Hughes is one of just two Steeler assistant coaches who has been on the staff of another NFL team. In 1982 and 1983 he was defensive backfield coach for the Minnesota Vikings prior to coming to the Steelers in 1984.

One year as a coach at Biglerville (Pa.) High in 1970 led to Hughes' first coaching position at the college level. In 1971 he was named Stanford's assistant line coach, working two seasons with the offensive and defensive lines. Hughes went to Michigan in 1973 as offensive line coach. Again, he followed that with a move to the defense when he coached the team's linebackers in 1974-75. In 1976 Hughes moved to UCLA, where he coached the linebackers in 1976 and was defensive coordinator from 1977-81. From 1976-78 Hughes was joined on the UCLA staff by Steeler receivers coach Dwain Painter.

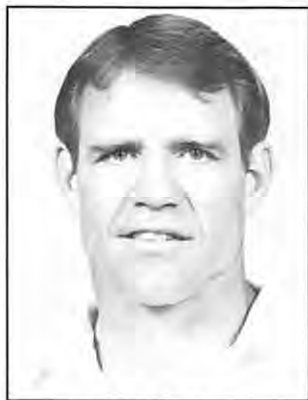
From 1966-67, Hughes attended Springfield (Mass.) College, where he was a three-sport letterman in football (linebacker; tight end), baseball, and wrestling. He transferred to Gettysburg College for the 1968-69 seasons, and started at tight end and split end while also starting at catcher on the baseball team.

Hughes was graduated from Gettysburg College in 1970 with a bachelor's degree in biology and physical education. In 1972 he received his master's in education from Stanford, and earned a Ph.D. in education from Michigan in 1975.

Offensive Line Coach —

Special Teams Coach/
Offensive Assistant

Hal Hunter became a member of Noll's staff in 1985 and enters his fourth season of coaching the Steelers' guards and centers. He teams with Ron Blackledge in coaching the offensive line.

A former Pitt linebacker, Hunter is a veteran of 31 years of coaching. He is the only Steeler assistant to have coached in Canada, and one of two who have worked for another NFL team.

Hunter's professional coaching career began in 1981 as offensive coordinator under Frank Kush for the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the CFL. In 1982 he went with Kush to the Baltimore Colts as offensive line coach, and was interim head coach for the Indianapolis Colts for the final game of the 1984 season.

Hunter began his 23-year collegiate coaching career in 1958 as defensive line coach at Richmond. In 1962 he began a two-year stint as offensive line coach at West Virginia, followed by positions at Maryland in 1964-65 and Duke from 1966-70. Hunter served as offensive coordinator at Kentucky in 1971-72 and as offensive line coach for Indiana from 1973-76.

In 1977 Hunter was named head coach at California State College of Pennsylvania, where he served through 1980 before joining Kush.

As a player, Hunter was a three year starter at linebacker and guard for Pitt from 1953-55. He was also the Panthers' heavyweight wrestler from 1952-54, placing fourth in the 1956 AAU wrestling championships.

Hunter was graduated from Pitt in 1956 with a bachelor's in secondary education. He received his master's in science from West Virginia in 1962.

Hal and his wife Eileen have three children: son Hal, who is offensive line coach at Akron, and daughters Heidi and Heather. The Hunters live in Gibsonia, Pa. Hal was born June 3, 1934, in Canonsburg, Pennsylvania.

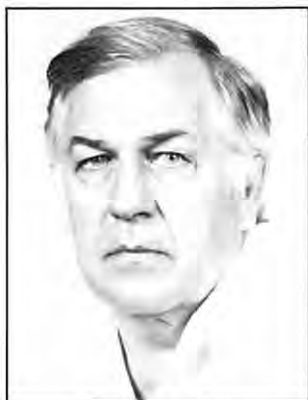
Jon Kolb, like Chuck Noll, celebrates his 20th season with the Steelers in 1988. The 41-year old Kolb is in his seventh year as an assistant coach following his 13 seasons as a player under Noll. Kolb works with Dennis Fitzgerald in coaching the Steelers' special teams, and is also responsible for the offensive phase of video tape.

Kolb retired as a player on February 17, 1982, and joined Noll's staff that year as strength coach. He became the defensive line coach later that year and coached the defensive line through the 1986 season. In 1987 he took on duties in special teams and offense.

As an offensive tackle from Oklahoma State, Kolb was the third player drafted by Noll, two choices after Joe Greene, in 1969. He enjoyed a career which lasted 13 years, making him one of only 12 players to play 13 seasons for the Steelers. During that time he played in 177 games, a mark bettered by just five players. In his first 10 years, Kolb played in 156 of a possible 157 games, and from 1971-79 he started 112 consecutive contests. Kolb and Greene, both members of the Steelers' All-Time Team, are the only Noll assistants who played on all four Steeler Super Bowl teams.

At Oklahoma State, Kolb was twice named to the All-Big Eight team as a center and linebacker. He capped his college career, from 1966-68, by being named consensus second team All-America and by playing in all the major post-season bowl games. He was graduated from Oklahoma State with a bachelor's degree in physical education. In 1987, Kolb was inducted into the Western Pennsylvania Hall of Fame.

Jon and his wife Debbie live in the North Hills with sons Eric (8-28-71) and Tanner (10-26-80) and daughter Cyndi (7-6-71). Jon was born August 30, 1947, in Ponca City, Oklahoma.



TOM MOORE
Offensive Coordinator

Tom Moore enters his 12th year as a member of the Steeler coaching staff and his sixth as the team's offensive coordinator. He joined Noll's staff in 1977 as wide receiver coach, and was named offensive coordinator in 1983. Moore is one of two coaches remaining who was on Noll's staff during the Super Bowls (XIII, XIV).

This year Moore will be assisted by first-year receivers coach Dwain Painter. This will allow Moore to concentrate on the quarterbacks and the passing game.

Moore, 49, is the only Steeler assistant to have coached in the World Football League. He was with the New York Stars in 1974.

In 1961, following his college career as Iowa's quarterback, Moore began his coaching career. He was the freshman coach for two seasons at Iowa before coaching for the Army in 1963 in Korea and in 1964 at Ft. Benning, Georgia. In 1965 he began a four-year stint at Dayton as offensive backfield coach. He went to Wake Forest as offensive coordinator in 1969, and was offensive backfield coach for Georgia Tech in 1970-71.

In 1972 Moore was named offensive coordinator at Minnesota. He held that position for two years before going to the WFL in 1974. He returned as Minnesota's offensive coordinator for the 1975-76 seasons. Moore's quarterback at Minnesota in 1975 and '76 was Steeler defensive coordinator Tony Dungy, and the backup in 1976 was Cleveland Browns' quarterback coach Marc Trestman.

Moore was the quarterback at Iowa from 1957-60. He was graduated in 1961 with a bachelor's degree in history. In 1966 he received his master's in guidance from Dayton.

Tom and his wife Emily have two children: daughter Terry (8-31-64) and son Daniel (1-17-68). The Moore family lives in Upper St. Clair. Tom was born November 7, 1938, in Owatonna, Minnesota.



DWAIN PAINTER
Receivers Coach

Dwain Painter is the newest member of Noll's staff, joining the team on February 15 of this year to coach the wide receivers and assist offensive coordinator Tom Moore on the passing game.

Painter, a native of Monroeville, Pennsylvania, is in his 24th year of coaching. He is a veteran of 17 years as a college coach and six seasons at the high school level. A former quarterback and defensive back at Rutgers, he began as a coach in 1965 at Wall High School in Wall Township, New Jersey, where he coached through 1970.

Painter joined the college ranks in 1971 as offensive coordinator at San Jose State. He was named quarterbacks/receivers coach at the College of San Mateo in 1973, and in 1974-75 was offensive coordinator at Brigham Young.

From 1976-78, Painter coached the quarterbacks and receivers at UCLA, during which time Steeler linebacker coach Jed Hughes was a member of the UCLA staff.

Painter got his first head coaching position in 1979 at Northern Arizona. Over three seasons he had a record of 16-17. From 1982-85 he was assistant head coach at Georgia Tech, followed by stops as offensive coordinator at Texas in 1986 and at Illinois in 1987. His next coaching position was on Noll's staff.

Painter, 46, is a graduate of Gateway High in Monroeville. He played under Pete Antimarrino, who is still the head coach at that school. Painter was graduated in the school's first graduating class (1960).

He played defensive back and quarterback for Rutgers from 1961-64 and was graduated in 1964 with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He received his master's in education in 1966.

DICK HALEY
Director of Player Personnel

Dick Haley enters his 18th year as the Steelers' director of player personnel. A former Steeler defensive back, Haley oversees the detailed process of scouting, testing, evaluating, and drafting of college players. He is also involved in all personnel moves and player trades.

Since Chuck Noll's arrival in 1969, the Steelers have utilized the draft to build championship teams. Two of those early drafts, 1971 and 1974, are considered two of the most productive in NFL history, and were a primary rea-

son for the Steelers' four Super Bowl championships in the 1970s. Last year the Steelers saw nine of their 13 draft picks contribute, including two starters in the defensive secondary. The class of '87 is already considered one of the Steelers' most productive since the early 1970s.

Haley, a native of Midway, Pennsylvania, began his scouting career in 1966 with the BLESTO scouting combine. He was with BLESTO for five years before joining the Steelers in 1971.

Haley's six-year NFL playing career began in 1959, as a ninth-round draft choice of the Washington Redskins. After two seasons, he went to the Minnesota Vikings, at that time an expansion team, through the veteran draft pool. He was acquired by the Steelers later that season and played for the Steelers from 1961-64, ranking among the team's leading interceptors all four seasons.

Haley is a graduate of Pitt, where he played halfback from 1955-59. In his senior year he led the team in rushing and scoring, capping the season with an 86-yard punt return for a touchdown in the East-West Shrine game. Haley also played on the Panthers' Sugar Bowl and Gator Bowl teams.

In first game after player strike was perfect 3/3 and added 2 PATs for 11 points in 23-20 win over Cincinnati (10/25), providing 7 4th-quarter points including winner on 20-yard FG with 1:47 remaining. Slipped from 1st to 2nd for all-time NFL FG accuracy on that day, however, as Saints' Andersen converted his 100th career FG. Two weeks later hit game-winner again with 44-yard FG at Kansas City (11/8) with 4:02 left in game. That kick began streak of 7 FGs without a miss over four games. Hit only attempt the following week vs. Houston (11/15) before going 3/3 on FGs of 43, 52, and 46 yards at Cincinnati (11/22). Totalled 12 points in that game to equal season-high, and 52-yard FG was his longest in 2 years and 5th career FG of 50+ yards. Went 9/11 over final four games and scored 7 of team's 13 points vs. Seattle (12/6), provided winning margin in 20-16 win over San Diego (12/13), and accounted for 10 points in loss at Houston (12/20). Was voted alternate to Pro Bowl behind Colts' Dean Biasucci.

1986: Converted 21 of 32 FG attempts and added 32/32 on PATs to total 95 points. Got off to slow start with just 2 FG opportunities in first 3 weeks, but made 3 of 4 week 4 at Houston (9/28) including 45-yard FG to spark 1st win of season. Qualified as NFL's all-time leading FG kicker week 6 at Cincinnati (10/13) on 2nd FG, marking 100th of his career. Made 3 of 5 FG attempts over next two games but did not have another try until 3 weeks later when he hit from 40 yards at Cleveland (11/23) with 7 seconds remaining to force game into overtime with 31-31 score. Made just 9 of 15 attempts over final 5 weeks, capped by 4 of 5 performance and season-high 13 points in finale vs. Kansas City (12/21). Had 19-yard attempt blocked in that game, his first FG attempt blocked in 45 games (9/6/84 vs. N.Y. Jets).

1985: Broke 4 team records and won AFC scoring title for 3rd consecutive year, earning 2nd Pro Bowl appearance. Became 1st AFC player to win 3 straight scoring titles since Gino Cappelletti won 4 from 1963-66. Among team records broken were points (139), FGs (33), FGs in one game (5), and consecutive FGs made (18). Consecutive streak of 18 was 3rd-longest in NFL history, and 33 FGs made ties for 3rd-best in league history. Hit all 40 PAT attempts to extend string to 121 without a miss. Slow first half included 11 of 19 on FG attempts before catching fire week 9 to begin streak of 18 straight FG attempts without a miss, finishing 22 of 23 over final 8 weeks. Streak began on 25-yard FG with 9 seconds left to clinch 10-9 win over Cleveland (11/13). The next week made team-record 5/5 at Kansas City (11/10) for 18-point total to earn game ball. Was 3/3 in each of next 4 games to extend streak to 6 games. Streak ended vs. Buffalo (12/15) in week 15 when he missed 1st attempt, but bounced back to connect on next 3 in that game and only attempt in finale at New York Giants (12/21).

1984: Gained momentum as season progressed to finish 24 of 32 on FG attempts for 117 points and 2nd straight AFC scoring title. Broke Lou Michaels' team record with 53-yard FG at Indianapolis (10/21), and established new record 5 weeks later with 55 yarder vs. San Diego (11/25).

1983: Named team's MVP and NFL Alumni Association's kicker of the year after hitting 27 of 31 FG attempts and 38/39 PATs for 119 points and 1st AFC scoring crown. Team-record 87% success rate on FGs, which included streak of 13 without a miss, led to 1st Pro Bowl selection. Converted 25 of last 27 FG attempts including 14 straight at home. Only missed PAT of career came at Green Bay (9/11) when 2nd of 3 PAT attempts was blocked.

1982: Named to NFL all-rookie team after making 10 of 12 FG attempts and 22/22 PATs in strike-shortened campaign. Was claimed on waivers from Buffalo on September 7, five days before opening day. Steelers wanted to draft him in 7th round in 1982, but Buffalo took him with earlier pick in that round, 171st overall.

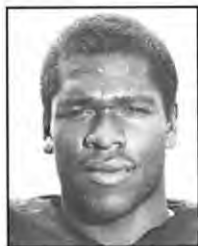

Chuck Noll became the fifth-winningest coach in NFL history with his 171st victory as the Steeler defense keyed the win with four turnovers. Rookie cornerback Delton Hall scored the first TD with a 50-yard return of a fumble forced by Mike Merriweather on the 49ers' second possession. The Steelers went up 14-3 at the half following an 11-play, 66-yard drive that ended with a Preston Gothard TD catch. Gary Anderson added a 50-yard field goal. Second-half interceptions by Hall and Merriweather set up Anderson's second and third field goals, which measured 41 and 44 yards. The 49ers outgained the Steelers 356 to 266, including Joe Montana's 34 completions on 49 attempts for 316 yards. Earnest Jackson's 103 yards rushing marked his fourth 100-yard outing in 14 games as a Steeler. Both 49er TDs came on long drives of 77 and 80 yards in the second half.

After an evenly-fought first half, the Browns capitalized on five second half interceptions to hand the Steelers their sixth straight loss in Cleveland. It was the Steelers' worst loss to Cleveland since 1966. The Steelers held slight half-time edges in total offense (156-146), rushing yards (55-42), and first downs (14-10), and had 101 passing yards to Cleveland's 104. Donnie Shell tied the score at 10-10 on the third play of the second half when he returned a fumble recovery 19 yards for a TD. Cleveland took over from there with interceptions on four consecutive Steeler possessions leading to all 24 second half points. Chris Rockins and Clay Matthews each had two thefts, with Matthews returning one 26 yards for a TD. The Steelers managed only 29 offensive yards in the second half. Bobby Brister came on in the middle of the fourth quarter and was intercepted on the last play of the game by Frank Minnifield, who returned the ball to the Steeler one-yard line as time expired.

On the first weekend of the NFLPA strike, the Steelers fielded a team with 43 newcomers and the replacements made big plays offensively and defensively. The offense rolled up 356 total yards while the defensive unit forced four turnovers and held the Atlanta replacements to 215 total yards. Joey Clinkscales caught six passes for 150 yards including bombs of 57 yards from starter Steve Bono and 49 yards from backup Reggie Collier. Bono completed 12 of 23 passes for 164 yards in his Steeler debut. The Steelers crossed the Atlanta 20-yard line five times and came away with four TDs, but lost a fumble inside the Atlanta 20 when Earnest Jackson was hit. JACK HAM

Pro Football Hall of Fame
Class of 1988

Former Steeler linebacker Jack Ham, one of the greatest outside linebackers in NFL history, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 30 in his first year of eligibility. Ham, a member of the "Steel Curtain" defense, the NFL's 1970s Team of the Decade, and the Pittsburgh Steelers' All-Time Team, is just the second player from the Steelers' four Super Bowl champion teams to be enshrined in the Hall of Fame. His former teammate, Joe Greene, was inducted last year, also in his first year of eligibility.

Ham's Steeler career was highlighted by eight appearances in the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl, nine consecutive All-Pro seasons, and his selection in 1975 as the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year. One of Ham's most impressive accomplishments, however, were his 32 regular season interceptions, which at the time of his retirement was the third-highest figure ever compiled by a linebacker in the history of the NFL. Twice in his career he led the league's linebackers, and his total still ranks fifth in the Steeler record book.

Ham began his career as the Steelers' second-round draft choice in 1971. He became a starter immediately and for the next 12 years set the standard for outside linebackers in the NFL, bringing a style of finesse to the position and nearly error-free performance. He was considered by many NFL people to be the prototype outside linebacker.

In Ham's 12-year career, which ended after the 1982 season when he announced his retirement, the Steelers played only 12 games without the Johnstown native in the lineup. In eight of his 12 campaigns Ham did not miss a single game, and he completed his career having played in 178 out of a possible 190 regular season and postseason games.

In addition to Ham's 32 interceptions, he owns the Steeler all-time record for fumble recoveries with 21, and ranks 10th in career quarterback sacks with 25½.

INSTANT REPLAY APPROVED FOR 1988

For the third consecutive year, NFL clubs have approved a limited system of Instant Replay on a one-year basis.

The system basically stays the same as in 1987 with the exception that the Replay Official will now be assigned to a regular officiating crew and will attend crew meetings the day before each game. League office personnel will no longer be used as Replay Officials. In 1987, there were 490 plays closely reviewed (defined as a contact to the field, but not necessarily stoppage of play). There were 57 reversals in 210 games for an average of one reversal in each four games. In 1986, there were 374 plays closely reviewed resulting in 38 reversals in 224 games.

In 1986, the system was approved by a 23-4-1 vote. In 1987, the vote was 21-7. In 1988, replay was cleared by a 23-5 margin.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks—an independent system using cameras, replay machines, and technicians separate from the network covering the game, and a “no frills” approach using existing television coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of nine nationally televised pre-season games to experiment with the basic system that later was adopted for 1986 and 1987. A total of 28 plays were examined closely in 1985 (17 confirmed call, 4 were inconclusive, 1 was reversed, and 6 had no replay shown).

What is the objective of this system?

The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has *indisputable visual evidence* available to him that warrants the change.

Is the television network carrying the game part of the review process?

No. Although the Replay Official will be viewing the live network feed, there is no communication to television personnel as to what plays to show or not to show.

What is the step-by-step procedure of play review?

The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other monitor continues to record the live feed.

The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues without interruption.

If the Replay Official believes an error may have been made, the Umpire will be contacted via a headset.

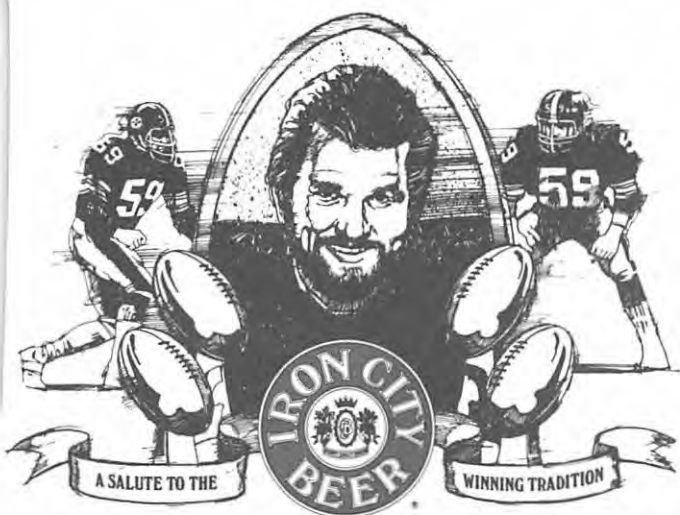
The Replay Official will watch replay(s) on one or both monitors and complete his review within a reasonable period after the play is over.

The Replay Official will inform the Umpire of his decision, and the Referee will make the appropriate announcement on the wireless microphone.

The limited Instant Replay system concentrates on plays of possession or touching (e.g., fumbles, receptions, interceptions, muffs) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines, and line of scrimmage (e.g., receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line).

However, the Instant Replay system will *not* include the following fouls: clipping; encroachment and offsides; grasp of facemask; false start; defensive pass interference; offensive pass interference; offensive holding and illegal use of hands; illegal batting or punching ball; illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick; illegal crackback; illegal motion; illegal use of forearm or elbow; illegal use of hands by defense; illegally kicking the ball; illegally snapping the ball; intentional grounding; member of the punting team downfield early; illegal formation; palpably unfair act; piling on; roughing the passer; running into or roughing the kicker; striking, kicking, or kneeling; unnecessary roughness; unsportsmanlike conduct; and use of the helmet as a weapon.
