

HISTORY OF THE STEELERS

Arthur Joseph Rooney, the founder of the Pittsburgh Steelers, passed away on August 25, 1988, following a stroke at the age of 87. The man affectionately known as "The Chief" will always be remembered as one of the greatest men in sports. More importantly, he will be remembered by Pittsburghers as the common man's man.

Born on January 27, 1901 in Coulterville, Pa., Art Rooney was the oldest of Daniel and Margaret Rooney's nine children. He grew up in Old Allegheny, now known as Pittsburgh's North Side, and until his death still lived a short distance from Three Rivers Stadium.

Rooney was educated at St. Peter's Parochial School and Duquesne University Prep School. He went on to study at Indiana (Pa.) Normal, now known as Indiana University of Pa., Georgetown University, and Duquesne.

An outstanding athlete, Rooney held middleweight and welterweight titles from the AAU Boxing Championships. He was named to the 1920 U.S. Olympic Boxing team, though he did not participate in the Olympic games. From 1921 to 1925 Rooney played minor league baseball, but a promising career was ended by an arm injury. He continued playing semi-pro football for several teams in the Pittsburgh area.

Rooney was married to Kathleen McNulty on June 11, 1931. The Rooneys had five sons — Daniel, Art Jr., Tim, John, and Pat.

Art Rooney founded the Steelers on July 8, 1933, which makes them the fifth-oldest franchise in the NFL today. They were a member of the Eastern division of the 10-team NFL. Originally named the Pittsburgh Pirates, Rooney's club struggled through its first seven years with five different head coaches and just 22 victories. Home games were played at Forbes Field, but in the 1930s Rooney often took his team to such places as Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, New Orleans, and Louisville because of competition from baseball and college football.

In 1938 Rooney signed Colorado All-American Byron "Whizzer" White to a \$15,800 contract, making White the first big-money player in the league. White led the NFL in rushing his rookie year, and today is one of the NFL's most illustrious alumni as a U.S. Supreme Court Justice.

In 1940, Rooney changed his team's name to the Pittsburgh Steelers, representing the city's heritage, but the name change did not drastically change the team's losing ways. A 7-4 record in 1942 under head coach Walt Kiesling marked the Steelers' first winning season, due in part to the league-leading rushing of rookie Bill Dudley. But the following year Dudley joined the armed forces along with many other NFL players as the nation went to war. With rosters depleted, Rooney merged the Steelers with Philadelphia (Phil-Pitt) in 1943 and with the Chicago Cardinals (Card-Pitt) in 1944.

Rooney hired legendary Pitt coach Jock Sutherland in 1946, and Dudley returned to win NFL MVP honors after leading the league in rushing, interceptions, and punt returns. Today, Dudley is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

In 1947 Sutherland led the Steelers to an 8-4 finish to share the Eastern division title, but they lost their first-ever post season game, 21-0 to Philadelphia. That spring, Sutherland died unexpectedly while on a scouting trip.

John Michelosen succeeded Sutherland, and posted a 20-26-2 record while coaching the Steelers through the 1948-51 seasons.

In 1952, Joe Bach returned to coach the team he had previously coached in 1935-36. That year the Steelers became the last team to abandon the single wing for the T formation. When Bach resigned for health reasons in 1954, assistant Walt Kiesling began his third stint as the Steelers' head coach. Kiesling had coached the team in 1939-40 and 1941-44, with his third stint lasting from 1954-56.

In 1957 Buddy Parker was named head coach, and he directed the Steelers to five non-losing records in his eight seasons with the flamboyant Bobby Layne quarterbacking the team for three years. In Layne's last year with the Steelers, 1962, the team finished 9-5 to earn its second postseason berth before losing to Detroit, 17-10. Parker finished his stay with a 13-10-1 record, ranking third in team history today to Chuck Noll and Sutherland.

Brief stints by Mike Nixon in 1965 and Bill Austin from 1966-68 preceded the hiring of Noll in 1969. The 37-year-old Noll became the 14th man to coach the Steelers, and he brought with him a belief in building through the draft. His first selection in 1969 was All-America defensive tackle Joe Greene, the initial building block of the "Steel Curtain" defense and now a member of the Hall of Fame.

A 1-13 finish in Noll's first year gave him the opportunity to select first overall in the 1970 draft, so Noll tabbed quarterback Terry Bradshaw, around whom he would bring a dominating offensive attack.

In 1970 the Steelers made two significant changes, moving from the NFL's Century division to the new AFC's Central division with the merger of the NFL and AFL. They also moved into a new home as Three Rivers Stadium was opened. Prior to Three Rivers, the Steelers had played home games at Forbes Field from 1933-57 and from 1958-63 at both Forbes Field and Pitt Stadium. Pitt Stadium was the team's home from 1964-69 until Three Rivers was built in 1970.

The Steelers showed gradual improvement at the start of the 1970s, with 5-9 and 6-8 records in 1970 and '71. In 1972 the Steelers came of age with an 11-3 finish to win their first-ever division title. It had been 40 years since their birth before the Steelers won a championship, but once they did, they achieved a degree of success unprecedented and still unequalled in professional football.

The Steelers' first playoff game of 1972 was against the Oakland Raiders, and it marked the team's first postseason victory in its 40-year history when Franco Harris' "Immaculate Reception" in the final minute decided the 13-10 win. The Steelers' dream season ended the next week when Miami claimed the AFC Championship with a 21-17 decision, but the Steelers had risen to a new level which would continue to the end of the decade.

A 10-4 mark and wild card playoff berth in 1973 preceded a second post-season game against Oakland, but the Raiders avenged the previous year's loss, 33-14. In 1974 the Steelers won the division title with a 10-3-1 record and marched past Buffalo (32-14) and Oakland (24-13) on their way to Super Bowl IX. A fierce Pittsburgh defense posted the 16-6 victory over Minnesota to give the Steelers their first of an NFL-record four Super Bowl championships.

In 1975, the Steelers won 11 consecutive games to finish 12-2 for their second straight division title. They defeated Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10) in the playoffs, setting up their second straight Super Bowl win, this time over Dallas by a 21-17 margin. The victory made the Steelers the third team to win back-to-back Super Bowls.

Postseason losses after consecutive division titles ended the 1976 and 1977 seasons. In 1976 the Steelers rebounded from a 1-4 start to win nine straight and finish 10-4, but they lost to Oakland (24-7) in the second round after beating Baltimore (40-14) in the playoffs. In 1977, the Steelers dropped a playoff game to Denver (34-21) after completing the regular season with a 9-5 mark and their fourth straight AFC Central title.

Returning to make their third Super Bowl appearance in 1978, the Steelers rode the momentum of a league-best 14-2 record to get past Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5) en route to Super Bowl XIII and a rematch with Dallas. The 35-31 decision made the Steelers the first team to win three Super Bowls.

In 1979 history was made when the Steelers claimed Super Bowl win number four, marking the second time they won consecutive Super Bowls. They beat the Los Angeles Rams 31-19 following a 12-4 regular season and playoff wins over Miami (34-14) and Houston (27-13). With six consecutive AFC Central titles, eight straight years of playoffs, and four Super Bowl championships (IX, X, XIII, XIV), the Steelers were tagged the "Team of the Decade" for the 1970s.

The new decade was not as friendly as the Steelers failed to qualify for the playoffs after finishing 9-7 in 1980 and 8-8 in 1981.

In 1982 the Steeler organization celebrated its 50th anniversary by returning to postseason play with a 6-3 record in the strike-shortened campaign. An anniversary banquet was held during the season to commemorate the team's first 50 seasons and to honor the all-time team as selected by fan voting. Thousands of fans were attracted to Pittsburgh during the week of activities and exhibits, but the San Diego Chargers ended the Steelers' anniversary campaign with a 31-28 playoff win.

In 1983 the Steelers claimed their eighth AFC Central title with a 10-6 record, but once again fell short in the playoffs, 38-10 to the Los Angeles Raiders.

Moving a step closer to returning to the Super Bowl in 1984, the 9-7 Steelers won their 9th division championship and followed with a playoff win at Denver (13-7). In the AFC Championship game, however, Miami dominated with a 45-28 assault.

FRITO-LAY "CHALLENGE FOR CHILDREN"

Since the "Challenge For Children" program began in 1983, the Frito-Lay Corporation has donated \$211,100 to youth-related charities in the Tri-State area. In 1989, for the seventh consecutive season, Frito-Lay will contribute \$100 for every point the Steelers score in regular and post-season games.

Last year's total was \$33,600. In 1983 the amount was \$36,500, in 1984 it was \$43,900 as the Steelers advanced to the AFC Championship game, in 1985 the total was \$37,900, in 1986 the donation was \$30,700, and in 1987 the sum was \$28,500.

Charities which have been a part of this program are Children's Hospital, Ronald McDonald House, American Diabetes Youth Research, Cystic Fibrosis, Sickle Cell Society, National Society for Autistic Children, the Abraxas Foundation, Boys Clubs of Western Pennsylvania, Spina Bifida, and the Parental Stress Center. Grants were also provided to the Western Pennsylvania School for Blind Children, March of Dimes, Pittsburgh Rehabilitation Institute, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, the Lupus Foundation of America, and Make-A-Wish Foundation. This year the donations will go to Project Bundle-Up, Boy Scouts of America, Association for Retarded Citizens, and the Abraxas Foundation.

The Steelers' streak of 13 consecutive non-losing seasons came to an end in 1985 when they finished 7-9, followed by a 6-10 record in 1986. Losses in the last two games of 1987, another strike-shortened season, dropped the Steelers to 8-7 and out of playoff contention. Last year the team struggled through its worst campaign since Noll took over in 1969, finishing 5-11 with six- and four-game losing streaks. But three wins in the final four weeks got the Steelers pointed in the right direction entering 1989.

The patriarch of the Steelers, Art Rooney, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1964. At that time he had begun turning over much of the operation of the team to his oldest son, Dan. Having worked in every area of the organization since 1955, Dan Rooney was named president of the Steelers in 1975. Now in his 35th year with the Steelers, he is one of the most active NFL executives and one of Pittsburgh's most involved executives in civic affairs.

Among his community activities, Dan Rooney serves as vice president for The United Way, and is an officer and board member for The American Ireland Fund, The American Diabetes Association, The Pittsburgh History and Landmarks Foundation, and Duquesne University.

As a key member of several NFL committees over the past 16 years, Dan Rooney has served on the board of directors for NFL Properties, the NFL Trust Fund, NFL Films, the Scheduling Committee, and the Ring Committee. In 1973 he was appointed chairman of the Expansion Committee, which considered new franchise locations and directed the addition of Seattle and Tampa Bay as expansion clubs in 1976. That year Dan was also named chairman of the Negotiating Committee, and in 1982 he contributed to the negotiations for the Collective Bargaining Agreement for the NFL owners and the Players' Association. Rooney is currently a member of the six-person Management Council Executive Committee and is chairman of the Worldwide American Football League Committee.

Daniel M. Rooney was born on Pittsburgh's North Side on July 20, 1932. He is a 1950 graduate of North Catholic High, where he played quarterback. He went on to Duquesne University and was graduated in 1955 with a bachelor's degree in accounting. Dan and his wife Patricia live in Mt. Lebanon, where they raised nine children.

The Steelers' single game regular season home attendance record is 59,541 established September 30, 1985 vs. Cincinnati. The single game postseason mark is 53,546 vs. San Diego on January 9, 1983.

SELLOUT STRING ENDED AT 119

From November 5, 1972 until October 18, 1987, the Steelers had 119 consecutive sellouts for regular season and postseason games at Three Rivers Stadium. Entering the 1987 season it was at 118, the NFL's third-longest behind Washington (158) and Denver (126). The Steelers' 1987 home opener vs. San Francisco was consecutive sellout #119, but in the final week of the strike vs. Indianapolis the Steelers saw their first non-sellout at Three Rivers in 16 years.

Entering the 1989 season, the Steelers' last 13 home games have been sold out. In total, the Steelers have played before a sellout crowd at Three Rivers in 132 of their last 133 games, and 132 of the 150 played in Three Rivers.

STEELER COACHES



CHUCK NOLL

Head Coach

Entering his 21st season with the Steelers, Chuck Noll ranks as the second-winningest active coach in the National Football League. His overall career record of 183-132-1 (.581) also places him fifth in career wins among the league's all-time coaches, trailing only George Halas (325), Don Shula (277), Tom Landry (270), and Curly Lambeau (234).

The 57-year old Noll is also one of just four men who have coached the same team for 21 consecutive seasons, joining Lambeau (29), Landry (29), and Steve Owen (23). 1989 is his 37th consecutive year in professional football, a career that has included seven years as a player, nine as an assistant coach, and 21 as a head coach.

The most distinguishing among Noll's many accomplishments is his status as the only coach with four Super Bowl championships, and the only active coach who has won at least two Super Bowls without a loss. Just three former coaches — Bill Walsh (3-0), Vince Lombardi (2-0), and Tom Flores (2-0) — were undefeated in at least two Super Bowl appearances.

Noll also heads the list of the six all-time coaches with 15 or more postseason game appearances, owning a 15-7 record (.682), and he ranks second behind Joe Gibbs (11-3) among active coaches with 10 or more postseason games.

The Chuck Noll era in Pittsburgh began in 1969 when he was named the 14th head coach in the team's history. In the previous nine years as an assistant coach, Noll had developed his firm belief that champion teams are built through sound drafting. His first act with the Steelers was to select North Texas State All-America defensive tackle Joe Greene on the first round of the 1969 draft. After struggling through a 1-13 campaign, the Steelers won the rights to the first overall pick in 1970, which Noll used to tab Louisiana Tech quarterback Terry Bradshaw. With those two selections, Noll had begun building the foundation of what would become the most dominant dynasty in football. In fact, three of the first 20 and four of the first 38 players

Noll drafted — Greene, Bradshaw, cornerback Mel Blount, and linebacker Jack Ham — are now members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

The 1970 Steelers improved to 5-9 in their first season in Three Rivers Stadium. Continued improvement resulted in a 6-8 mark in 1971 before the Steelers turned the corner in 1972 with an 11-3 finish for their first division title in the 40-year history of the franchise. A 13-7 last-minute playoff win over Oakland marked the team's first postseason victory, and although that win was followed by a 21-17 loss to Miami in the AFC Championship game, Noll had elevated the Steelers to a new level and opened the door to a streak of eight years of postseason play.

In 1973 the Steelers qualified for a wild-card berth before losing to Oakland, 33-14. The following year Noll's troops stormed through a 10-3-1 season for the first of six consecutive Central division titles. They then marched by Buffalo (32-14) and Oakland (24-13) to reach Super Bowl IX, where they dominated Minnesota for a 16-6 win and Noll's first NFL title.

A repeat performance the next year, when the Steelers went 12-2 and beat Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10) in the playoffs before finishing off Dallas with a 21-17 decision in Super Bowl X, made Noll only the third coach in NFL history to win consecutive Super Bowls. Lombardi and Shula were the others.

In 1976 the Steelers stumbled through a 1-4 start, but Noll regrouped his team and they reeled off nine straight wins to finish 10-4. They victimized Baltimore (40-14) in the playoffs but could not get past Oakland, falling by a 24-7 margin. The next year the team finished 9-5 before losing to Denver (34-21) in the opening round of the playoffs.

History was made at the end of the 1978 campaign, when Noll led the Steelers through a team-record and NFL-best 14-2 regular season and playoff wins over Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5). Super Bowl XIII was a rematch against Dallas, and the Steelers prevailed with a 35-31 win to become the only team to win three Super Bowls.

The record books were rewritten again in 1979 when Noll claimed Super Bowl win number four in a 31-19 victory over the Los Angeles Rams following a 12-4 regular season and postseason victories over Miami (34-14) and Houston (27-13). With four Super Bowl wins in six years, the Steelers were tagged the 1970s "Team of the Decade."

In 1980 and 1981 the Steelers' playoff streak was broken after records of 9-7 and 8-8. 1982, which marked the Steelers' 50th season, saw the team return to postseason action after going 6-3 in a strike-interrupted year. The Steelers lost to San Diego (31-28) in the Super Bowl tournament, but they were back on track as they claimed the division title each of the next two years.

In spite of a 10-6 finish in 1983, the Steelers bogged down in the playoffs and lost to the Los Angeles Raiders (38-10). The next year they gained momentum at the end, claiming the division crown on the final weekend with a 13-7 win over the Raiders. They traveled to Denver for a 24-17 playoff victory, but were outgunned by Miami in the AFC Championship (45-28) in their last postseason appearance.

In 1985 Noll's Steelers began their current playoff drought of four years, their longest since Noll took over in 1969. But a return to sound drafting has given the Steelers a nucleus of young talent that will improve with experience. The Steelers' 1-6 start in 1988 was their worst since Noll began in 1969, but he brought his team back to win three of their final four games and get them headed in the right direction once again entering the 1989 season.

After his college playing career at Dayton, where he was team captain, Noll was drafted by the Cleveland Browns on the 21st round in 1953. He played guard and linebacker for seven seasons (77 games), during which the Browns made the playoffs five times with four Eastern conference championships (1953-55, '57) and two NFL titles (1954, '55).

Noll retired as a player following the 1959 season at the age of 27, and embarked upon his coaching career in 1960 as an assistant to Sid Gilman with the Los Angeles (later San Diego) Chargers. In Noll's six seasons with the Chargers (1960-65), the team went to the playoffs five times with five Western conference titles (1960, '61, '63, '64, '65), and won the AFL Championship in 1963.

In 1966 Noll joined Shula's Baltimore Colts staff for three campaigns, during which the Colts lost a total of seven games and played in Super Bowl III against the New York Jets. Following the Super Bowl, Noll was named head coach of the Steelers.

In his 36 years of pro football, a career which has spanned four decades, Noll has been involved with a winning team 27 times and participated in post-season play 22 times. As one of the NFL's most respected coaches, Noll was asked by Commissioner Pete Rozelle to serve a two-year term on the league's competition committee in 1984-85.

Charles Henry Noll was born in Cleveland, Ohio, on January 5, 1932. He attended Holy Trinity School and Benedictine High in Cleveland prior to enrolling at Dayton, where he was captain of the football team. He was graduated from Dayton in 1953 with a bachelor of science degree in education. Chuck and his wife Marianne have one son, Chris, who is a teacher at Proctor Academy in Andover, New Hampshire. The Nolls live in Upper St. Clair.

RON BLACKLEDGE
Offensive Line Coach

Ron Blackledge begins his eighth year on the Steeler coaching staff and takes on the responsibility of the entire offensive line. Employing more pulling and trapping than any other NFL team, the Steelers' blocking schemes are among the most complex in the league.

Blackledge started with the Steelers on Aug. 31, 1982 as an offensive assistant, and was named offensive line coach two days later when Rollie Dotsch left for the USFL. From 1984-88 Blackledge shared the offensive line coaching duties, focusing on the tackles and tight ends.

Blackledge's 31-year coaching career includes 9 years at the high school level, 14 in college, and 8 in the NFL.

A native of North Canton, Ohio, Blackledge started his coaching career at Canton South High in 1960. He coached at Timken (1963-65) and Glenwood (1966-67) High Schools in Canton before breaking into the college ranks when he moved to Ashtabud College in 1968 as offensive line coach.

Stops as offensive line coach for Cincinnati (1970-72), Kentucky (1973-75), and Princeton (1976) followed.

In 1977 Blackledge was named offensive coordinator at Kent State, and was head coach from 1979-81 before joining Noll's staff the next year.

As a player, Blackledge starred as a tight end and defensive end for Bowling Green from 1957-59, and was later inducted into the school's Hall of Fame. He was graduated in 1960 with a bachelor's degree in physical education, and in 1967 received his master's in guidance and physical education from Ohio University.

Ron and his wife Linda have three children — daughters Michelle (6-13-84) and Traci (8-17-71) and son Todd (2-25-61), who is a Steelers quarterback. Ron was born April 15, 1938 in North Canton, Ohio. The Blackledge family lives in the North Hills.



DAVE BRAZIL
Linebacker Coach

Dave Brazil joined the Steeler coaching staff on Feb. 9 of this year as the team's new linebacker coach. He arrived with new defensive coordinator Rod Rust after both spent the 1988 season with the Kansas City Chiefs. Brazil was a defensive coach for the Chiefs for the past five years.

Brazil is a veteran of 19 years of coaching at the collegiate and professional levels. In 1989 he celebrates his 30th season of coaching, including 10 years at the high school level in Michigan. In 10 seasons (1958-67) of high school coaching his teams enjoyed a streak of eight years during which they never lost more than two games. From there Brazil held offensive or defensive coordinator positions at five different colleges.

In 1968 Brazil joined the college ranks at Holy Cross, where he spent two seasons as offensive and defensive coordinator. Two years as defensive coordinator at Tulsa (1970-71) were followed by three seasons (1972-74) as offensive and defensive coordinator for Eastern Michigan.

In 1975 Brazil got his first position at the professional level as defensive coordinator for the World Football League's Detroit Wheels. The next year he held the same post for the WFL Chicago Fire.

In 1978 Brazil returned to college coaching with two years as Boston College's defensive coordinator, followed by three (1980-82) at Kent State.

Brazil's first NFL position was as a defensive assistant with the Kansas City Chiefs (1984-86). In 1987 he coached the secondary and in 1988 the team's linebackers.

Brazil was graduated from the University of Detroit in 1958 with a business administration degree.

Dave and his wife Bridget have six children — daughters Kathleen and Mary Ann, and sons Michael, Daniel, Thomas, and Patrick. Dave was born in Detroit, Michigan, on March 25, 1936. The Brazils live in Pittsburgh.



JOHN FOX
Defensive Backs Coach



JOE GREENE
Defensive Line Coach

John Fox was named the Steelers' defensive backs coach last Feb. 10 after three years as defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of Pittsburgh. This is the first NFL coaching position for the 34-year old Fox.

In taking over the Steeler secondary, Fox inherits a very talented yet very young group of players. But his track record in working with youth is impressive, having his Pitt defense ranked among the top 10 in the nation for pass defense each of his three seasons there.

A veteran of 10 years of coaching defensive backs at seven different colleges, Fox began in 1979 at U.S. International University. Following were one-year stops at Boise State (1980), Long Beach State (1981), Utah (1982), Kansas (1983), and Iowa State (1984).

In the summer of 1985 Fox took the defensive backs coaching position for the United States Football League's Los Angeles Express. He returned to the college ranks that fall, and to Kansas, joining Mike Gottfried's staff.

In 1986 Fox went with Gottfried from Kansas to Pittsburgh as defensive coordinator, where he had been the past three years. In his first season, Fox's defense ranked ninth in the country, yielding 276.9 yards per game. The following year they jumped to fourth, with 233.0 yards per game, and last season they finished fourth again with a 254.2-yard-per-game average including second in pass defense with 118.9 yards per game. Three of Fox's Pitt-players were taken in the NFL draft in 1988 — Quintin Jones, Gary Richard, and Billy Owens.

Fox was a standout defensive back at San Diego State from 1975-77, and was graduated in 1977 with a bachelor's degree in physical education as well as a teaching certificate.

John and his wife Robin have one son, Matthew (6-5-87). John was born Feb. 8, 1955 in Virginia Beach, Virginia. The Fox family lives in Upper St. Clair.

Joe Greene embarks upon his third year of coaching the Steeler defensive line, where he is still remembered as one of the greatest players ever to play the position. He joined Chuck Noll's staff on Feb. 19, 1987, just five months before being inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility.

Greene, one of three assistants who also played under Noll, was the first player drafted by Noll into the NFL. A perennial All-Pro defensive tackle for the Steelers for 13 seasons, his career, spanning 1969-1982, included 10 Pro Bowl appearances at the top of a long list of honors. He retired following the 1982 season.


After being the fourth player selected overall in the 1969 draft, Greene won NFL defensive rookie of the year honors and played in the first of eight consecutive Pro Bowls following his first season. As the heart of the famed "Steel Curtain" defense of the 1970s, Greene was considered the most dominating defensive lineman in the league. He accumulated 66 career quarterback sacks, which still ranks second in team history, seven years after his retirement.

In 1982 Greene was named to the Steelers' All-Time team, and in 1987 was presented the first Walter Camp Football Foundation Alumni Award.

A native of Temple, Texas, Greene attended Dunbar High prior to developing into a consensus All-American at North Texas State. The head coach for Greene's final two seasons (1967-68) was Steeler defensive coordinator Rod Rust.

Greene was graduated from North Texas State in 1968 with a bachelor's in physical education, and now serves on the university's board of trustees.

Joe and his wife Agnes have three children — sons Major (7-29-68) and Delon (10-13-69), who both attend North Texas State and daughter JoQuel (10-13-73). Joe was born in Temple, Texas on Sept. 24, 1946.



DICK HOAK
Offensive Backfield Coach

Dick Hoak is in his 28th year with the Steeler organization and his 18th on the coaching staff. He is the longest-tenured Chuck Noll assistant and one of three who also was a player under Noll. Hoak's last year as a player (1969) was Noll's first as the team's head coach.

Hoak was named the Steelers' offensive backfield coach in 1972 after one year of coaching high school football. He is the only remaining assistant from all four Steeler Super Bowl staffs.

As a seventh-round draft choice out of Penn State in 1961, Hoak enjoyed an outstanding 10-year career as a running back for the Steelers. He amassed 3,965 career rushing yards, and upon his retirement following the 1970 season Hoak was the second-leading ballcarrier in team history behind Hall of Famer John Henry Johnson. Today, 20 years after the end of his career, Hoak still ranks fourth behind Franco Harris, Johnson, and Frank Pollard. He led the team in rushing in 1965, '68, and '69. In 1968 Hoak's career-best 858 yards ranked fourth in the NFL and led him to the Pro Bowl that season. He was also honored as the Dapper Dan 1968 man of the year in sports.

Hoak's name still appears in the Steeler record book, ranking eighth in career TDs (33), fourth in rushing TDs (25), and second in career rushing attempts (1,132). He added 145 receptions for 1,152 yards and eight TDs and had a 77-yard TD run in 1968 which is the fourth-longest in team history.

A native of Jeannette, Pa., the 49-year old Hoak was a standout running back and quarterback for Penn State, receiving MVP honors his senior year. He was graduated from Penn State with a degree in social studies in 1961.

Dick and his wife Lynn have three children — daughters Kelly (5-18-65) and Katie (7-23-68), and son Richard (7-5-72). Dick was born in Jeannette Dec. 12, 1939. The Hoak family lives in Greensburg.



TOM MOORE
Offensive Coordinator

Tom Moore is in his seventh year as the Steelers' offensive coordinator and his 13th as a member of Chuck Noll's staff. He originally joined the Steelers as wide receivers coach in 1977, taking over as offensive coordinator in 1983 after six seasons. Other than Dick Hoak, Moore is the only remaining coach from the Steelers' Super Bowl teams, having been on the staff for Super Bowls XIII and XIV.

Moore oversees the Steelers' offense, focusing on the team's quarterbacks and the passing game. A veteran of 27 years of coaching, his career includes 12 years at the college level, two in the military, one in the World Football League, and 12 with the Steelers.

Moore began his coaching career in 1961 at his alma mater, Iowa. He started with two years as freshman coach before coaching for the Army in 1963 and 1964. In 1963 he was stationed in Korea and the following year at Ft. Benning, Georgia.

A four-year stint as offensive backfield coach at Dayton (1965-68) preceded stops at Wake Forest as offensive coordinator in 1969 and Georgia Tech as offensive backfield coach in 1970-71.

In 1972 Moore was named offensive coordinator at Minnesota. He left the next year to coach one season for the WFL's New York Stars in 1974, returning to Minnesota for the 1975 and '76 seasons as offensive coordinator. In 1976, Moore's quarterbacks were the Kansas City Chiefs' defensive backs coach and former Steeler defensive coordinator Tony Dungy, and the Cleveland Browns' quarterback coach, Marc Trestman.

As a player, Moore quarterbacked Iowa from 1957-60. He was graduated with a bachelor's degree in history in 1961, and earned his master's in guidance from Dayton in 1966.

Tom and his wife Emily have two children — daughter Terry (8-31-64) and son Daniel (1-17-68). Tom was born Nov. 7, 1938 in Owatonna, Minnesota. The Moores live in Upper St. Clair.



DWAIN PAINTER
Receivers Coach

Dwain Painter is in his second season with the Steelers after joining the team Feb. 15, 1988. Painter celebrates his 25th year of coaching this season, including six at the high school level, 17 in college, and two with the Steelers.

In overseeing the Steelers' wide receivers, Painter works closely with offensive coordinator Tom Moore in mapping the team's passing game.

A native of nearby Monroeville, Pa., Painter began his coaching career at Wall High School in Wall Township, New Jersey. He coached there from 1965-70 before breaking into college coaching.

In 1971 he moved into the college ranks as offensive coordinator at San Jose State, and two years later was named quarterbacks/receivers coach at the College of San Mateo. In 1974-75 Painter served as offensive coordinator at Brigham Young.

For three seasons, 1976-78, Painter handled the quarterbacks and receivers at UCLA, which led to his first head coaching position in 1979 at Northern Arizona. After compiling a record of 16-17 in three seasons at Northern Arizona, Painter served as assistant head coach for four years (1982-85) at Georgia Tech.

Two more stints as offensive coordinator, at Texas (1986) and Illinois (1987), were followed by his move to Pittsburgh and the Steelers.

The 47-year old Painter attended Gateway High in Monroeville. He played under the successful Pete Antimario, who is still coaching at that school. Painter was a member of the school's first graduating class in 1960.

From 1961-64 Painter played defensive back at Rutgers. He was graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1964. Painter also received his master's in education in 1966.

Dwain and his wife Diane have two children, daughter Deborah (12-23-62) and son, Doug (10-21-71). Dwain was born in Monroeville, Pa. on Feb. 13, 1942. The Painters live in Wexford, Pa.



ROD RUST
Defensive Coordinator

Rod Rust, a veteran of 11 years as a defensive coordinator in the NFL, was named the Steelers' defensive coordinator on Jan. 25 of this year. He joined the Pittsburgh staff after a year as defensive coordinator for the Kansas City Chiefs.

Rust has established a widely respected track record in his 14 NFL seasons. He started with the Philadelphia Eagles under Dick Vermeil in 1976-77 after 13 years of coaching at the college level.

Rust, 60, embarked upon a coaching career in 1960 at New Mexico. After three seasons he began a four-year stint at Stanford (1963-66).

In 1967 Rust was named head coach at North Texas State. His star player for his first two seasons was Steeler defensive line coach Joe Greene. Rust coached at North Texas State until 1973, when he moved to the Canadian Football League's Montreal Alouettes for three campaigns.

Rust got his start in the NFL as Philadelphia's linebackers coach, coaching there in 1976-77. In 1978 he was hired as Marv Levy's defensive coordinator with the Kansas City Chiefs, where he spent five seasons (1978-82).

In 1983 Rust was named defensive coordinator for the New England Patriots. He held that position for five seasons, during which New England finished in first or second place in the AFC East every year. Rust's 1985 defensive unit ranked third in the AFC as the team won the AFC Championship and advanced to Super Bowl XX.

Rust returned to Kansas City for the 1988 season under Frank Gansz, and joined the Steelers after Gansz was replaced by Marty Schottenheimer.

Rust played center and linebacker at Iowa State from 1947-49.

Rod and his wife Jean have four children — sons Jeff and Greg and daughters Kris and Amy. Rod was born Aug. 2, 1928 in Webster City, Iowa. The Rusts live in Bethel Park, Pa.



GEORGE STEWART
Special Teams Coach

George Stewart is the newest member of Chuck Noll's staff, having joined the Steelers last March 3 to coach the special teams. Stewart has been an assistant coach at the college level for the past six years. This is his first NFL coaching position.

Stewart, a former All-America guard at Arkansas under Lou Holtz, began his coaching career in 1983 as a graduate assistant at Arkansas. The following year, when Holtz was hired

as head coach at Minnesota, Stewart joined him as offensive line coach.

After two seasons at Minnesota, Stewart became a member of Holtz's staff at Notre Dame in 1986 as tight ends coach. He coached the tight ends and special teams for two seasons, and the defensive ends in 1988.

Stewart starred as a guard at Arkansas from 1977-80. As a junior he was named to the All-Southwest Conference team, representing the 10-2 Razorbacks. For his senior year he was appointed team captain. A knee injury four weeks into the season, however, ended his college career which included appearances in the Fiesta, Sugar, and Hall of Fame Bowls his last three years.

In 1981 Stewart signed a free agent contract with the Kansas City Chiefs. After the injury put an end to his playing career, he went into business in his native Little Rock, Arkansas. He returned to Arkansas as a graduate assistant two years later.

Stewart, 30, attended Parkview High School in Little Rock, where he was a prep All-America.

George and his wife Cindy have a daughter, Tiffany, and a son, Christopher. Cindy's brother is NBA standout Sidney Moncrief. George was born in Little Rock on Dec. 29, 1958. The Stewarts live in Allison Park, Pa.

MEDICAL & TRAINING STAFF



JON KOLB
Conditioning & Training
Coordinator

Jon Kolb brings a wealth of football experience to his role as the team's conditioning & training coordinator. Now in his eighth year as a Steeler assistant and his 21st with the organization, he is one of three men on Chuck Noll's staff who was previously a player for Noll. Kolb is also one of the 22 players who were on all four Steeler Super Bowl champion teams.

Kolb's career with the Steelers began in 1969, when he was the third player chosen in Noll's original draft class, two choices after Joe Greene

For the next 13 seasons Kolb helped pave the way to four Super Bowl championships from his offensive tackle position. He played in 177 games, sixth-most in team history, including 156 of a possible 157 in his first 10 seasons with 112 consecutive starts. He is one of only 12 men to have played at least 13 years for the Steelers.

On Feb. 17, 1982, Kolb announced his retirement and joined the coaching staff as conditioning coach. He took over as defensive line coach later that year when George Perles left, and coached the defensive line from 1982-86. In 1987-88 he coached special teams and was an offensive assistant prior to returning to the weight room this year to oversee the team's conditioning and training program.

A two-time All-Big Eight center and linebacker for Oklahoma State, Kolb was a second-team All-America selection his senior year and played in every major postseason bowl game. He was graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education.

In 1982 Kolb was honored by being named a member of the Steelers' All-Time team, and in 1987 he was inducted into the Western Pennsylvania Hall of Fame.

Jon and his wife Debbie have two sons, Eric (8-28-71) and Tanner (10-26-80), and a daughter, Cyndi (7-6-71). Jon was born Aug. 30, 1947 in Ponca City, Oklahoma. The Kolbs live in the North Hills.



RALPH BERLIN

Trainer

Ralph Berlin is in the 30th year of his training career, his 22nd as trainer for the Steelers.

Berlin began as a student trainer at Iowa State after his playing career there was ended by a knee injury. He continued as a trainer until his graduation in 1962 with a bachelor's in physical education. That year Berlin began a three-year stint as head trainer at DePauw University. He held the same position at the University of Kentucky from 1964-67. While at Kentucky, he earned his master's degree in health and safety from Indiana, graduating in 1965.

Berlin is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association and the American College of Sports Medicine.



Director of Player Personnel

Dick Haley begins his 19th season as the Steelers' director of player personnel this year. It is also his 24th season with the organization including four years as a player.

Haley was named director of player personnel in 1971 to oversee the scouting, testing, evaluating, and drafting of college players, as well as personnel moves and trades.

Finished with 118 points to rank 3rd in NFL and mark 1st 100-point campaign since 1985, 4th overall. Made 8 of 1st 12 FG attempts, with only misses coming from 46, 48, 49, and 47 yards. Week 4 at Phoenix (10/9) had FG try blocked for 1st time in 36 straight attempts. The Steelers held a nine-point lead over the defending Super Bowl champion twice in the second half and were in position to win until a 19-yard field goal by Chip Lohmiller with 12 seconds left gave the Redskins a 30-29 edge. Redskin QB Doug Williams picked up where he left off as the Super Bowl MVP by completing 30 of 52 passes for 430 yards and two touchdowns. Bobby Brister threw the first two touchdown passes of his career on strikes of 80 yards to Louis Lipps and 72 yards to Dwight Stone as the teams combined for 856 total offensive yards and 680 passing yards. The deciding point proved to be a failed PAT try by the Steelers in the third quarter when Harry Newsome mishandled the snap. Washington's 515 total yards and 83 plays were the third-most ever allowed by a Steeler team.

Cardinal QB Neil Lomax threw for three touchdowns and completed 65% of his passes in 94-degree heat and Todd Blackledge made his first start as a Steeler in the team's first-ever visit to Phoenix. The Cardinals' win, their first over the Steelers since 1969, was built by holding Pittsburgh to season-lows in possession time, first downs, and rushing yards. The Steelers' four first quarter possessions resulted in two fumbles, a punt, and a blocked field goal, but KR Rod Woodson kept the score even at 7-7 with a 92-yard kickoff return for a touchdown, the first by a Steeler since 1978. The Steelers snapped their six-game skid by utilizing a no-huddle offense, reverses by WR Louis Lipps, a halfback pass, and a record-setting performance by PK Gary Anderson. QB Todd Blackledge and RB Rodney Carter accounted for all three Pittsburgh touchdowns and Anderson made all six of his field goal attempts and accounted for a career-high 21 points. Carter broke off right tackle on the third play from scrimmage for a 64-yard scoring run, leading the Steelers to 256 rushing yards with 105 of his own. All four Denver turnovers were converted for 16 points, and the Steelers capitalized on all seven drives that penetrated the Denver 20-yard line. The Steelers drove 80 yards to battle back after letting an 11-point third quarter lead evaporate, scoring the winning touchdown with 20 seconds left in a wide-open game that saw the lead change hands five times. Bubby Brister threw for 311 yards with three touchdown passes for the first time in his career, with bombs of 80 and 65 yards going to Louis Lipps. Dwight Stone's 92-yard kickoff return in the second quarter gave Pittsburgh its first lead. Lipps' second touchdown catch put the Steelers ahead 24-13, but Lorenzo White raced 90 yards with the next kickoff to close to within four. QB Warren Moon and RB Merrill Hoge each scored twice in the second half to cap the scoring. PK Gary Anderson made his first four PATs to extend his streak to 202, the fourth-longest in league history, but his final kick hit the left upright for his first miss since 1983. The Steelers' 426 total yards and 332 passing were season-highs, and the win was their only road victory and the Oilers' only loss at home. Lipps turned in 166 receiving yards and CB Dwayne Woodruff had two interceptions for the fifth time.

Pro Football Hall of Fame, Class of 1989

Former Steeler greats Mel Blount and Terry Bradshaw were inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on August 5 of this year, both in their first year of eligibility. They are the third and fourth members of the Steelers' four Super Bowl champion teams to be enshrined in the Hall of Fame.

Blount roamed the Steeler defensive secondary for 14 seasons after becoming the team's third-round draft choice in 1970. At 6-3, 205 pounds, Blount was an intimidating physical force, but it was his ability to cover receivers that set him apart. His bump-and-run style prompted rule changes in the 1970s which gave receivers an advantage, but Blount adapted and continued to dominate. Upon his retirement following the 1983 season, Blount had 57 interceptions in his career, a figure that still stands as a team record and tied for seventh in NFL history. He played in 200 regular season games over 14 seasons, missing only one, played in five Pro Bowls, and was named the NFL's most valuable defensive player in 1975.

Bradshaw also joined the Steelers in 1970, as the first overall selection in the draft, and played 14 record-breaking seasons for the Steelers. The three-time Pro Bowl player and two-time Super Bowl Most Valuable Player finished his career with 3,901 pass attempts and 2,025 completions for 27,989 yards, 12 touchdowns, and 210 interceptions. In postseason play, where Bradshaw really shined, he completed 261 of 456 passes (57.2%) for 3,833 yards, 10 touchdowns, and 26 interceptions. That includes his four Super Bowl winning performances, which totalled 49 completions on 84 passes (58.3%) for 1,032 yards, nine touchdowns, and just three interceptions. Bradshaw is the only quarterback ever to lead his team to a Super Bowl title four times.
