



# HISTORY OF THE STEELERS

The Pittsburgh Steelers celebrate their 60th season in the National Football League in 1992. With the most dramatic off-season changes in the last 24 years, the Steelers begin a new era in 1992 under 35-year-old head coach Bill Cowher.

The fifth-oldest franchise in the NFL, the Steelers were founded on July 8, 1933 by Arthur Joseph Rooney. Originally named the Pittsburgh Pirates, they were a member of the Eastern Division of the ten-team NFL. The four other current NFL teams in existence at that time were the Chicago (Phoenix) Cardinals, Green Bay Packers, Chicago Bears and New York Giants.

One of the greatest pioneers of the sports world, Art Rooney passed away on August 25, 1988 following a stroke at the age of 87. "The Chief," as he was affectionately known, is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame and is remembered as one of Pittsburgh's great people.

Born on January 27, 1901 in Coultersville, Pa., Art Rooney was the oldest of Daniel and Margaret Rooney's nine children. He grew up in Old Allegheny, which is now Pittsburgh's North Side, and until his death still lived a short distance from Three Rivers Stadium.

Rooney attended St. Peter's Parochial School and Duquesne University Prep School. He studied collegiately at Indiana (Pa.) Normal, which is now Indiana University of Pa., as well as at Georgetown and Duquesne.

An exceptional all-around athlete, Rooney held middleweight and welterweight titles from the AAU Boxing Championships and was named to the U.S. Olympic Boxing Team in 1920, although he did not participate in the Olympic Games. He played minor league baseball from 1920-25 before a promising career was cut short by an arm injury. Rooney continued playing football for several semi-pro teams in the Pittsburgh area. He was married on June 11, 1931 to Kathleen McNulty, and the couple had five sons — Daniel, Art, Jr., Tim, John and Pat.

After founding the Pirates in 1933, Rooney watched his club struggled through its first seven years with just 22 wins and five different head coaches. While home games were played at Forbes Field, Rooney often took his team to such towns as Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, New Orleans, and Louisville in the 1930s due to competition with baseball and college football.

In 1938 Rooney signed Colorado All-America Byron "Whizzer" White to a \$15,800 contract, making White the first "big money" player in the NFL. White led the league in rushing that year and today is one of the NFL's most illustrious alumni as a Justice of the United States Supreme Court.

In 1940 Rooney changed the team name to the Pittsburgh Steelers, representing the heritage of Pittsburgh. The first winning record in the organization's history came in 1942 when head coach Walt Kiesling led the Steelers to a 7-4 finish with the league-leading rushing of rookie Bill Dudley. But the next year Dudley joined the Armed Forces along with many other NFL players as the nation went to war. With rosters depleted, Rooney merged the Steelers with Philadelphia in 1943 (Phil-Pitt "Steagles") and with the Chicago Cardinals (Card-Pitt) in 1944.

Rooney hired legendary Pitt coach Jock Sutherland in 1946, and Dudley returned from the war to earn NFL MVP honors, leading the league in rushing, interceptions, and punt returns. Today Dudley is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Sutherland led the 1947 Steelers to an 8-4 record for a share of the Eastern division title, but they lost their first-ever postseason game, 21-0 to Philadelphia. Sutherland died suddenly the following spring while on a scouting trip.

Succeeding Sutherland, John Michelosen was head coach for the 1948-51 seasons, compiling a 20-26-2 record. In 1952 Joe Bach returned for his second stint with the Steelers, having coached the team in 1935-36. The Steelers became the last team to abandon the single wing for the T-formation in 1952.

Bach resigned for health reasons following the 1954 season and was replaced by assistant coach Walt Kiesling, who had been the Steelers' head coach twice previously. Kiesling's three stints covered the 1939-40, 1941-44, and 1954-56 campaigns.

Buddy Parker was named head coach in 1957 and over the next eight years he led the Steelers to five non-losing records. Hall of Fame quarterback Bobby Layne quarterbacked the team through three of those campaigns, leading the Steelers to a 9-5 mark and a playoff game vs. Detroit in 1962, which the Steelers lost 17-10. Parker completed his tenure with a 51-48-6 record and ranks second among all-time Steelers coaches for career wins.

Brief stints by Mike Nixon in 1965 and Bill Austin from 1966-68 preceded the hiring of 37-year-old Chuck Noll on Jan. 27, 1969. Noll began to rebuild the Steelers through the draft, beginning with defense when he selected Joe Greene with his first choice in 1969. Today Greene is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

A 1-13 record in 1969 gave the Steelers the first overall choice in the 1970 draft, with which Noll addressed the offense by selecting quarterback Terry Bradshaw, another Hall of Famer. Cornerback Mel Blount was selected on the third round that year, followed by linebacker Jack Ham in 1971, and running back Franco Harris in 1972. In all, Noll drafted six current Hall of Famers including three in his first 20 picks and four of his first 38.

Two significant changes took place in 1970, when the Steelers moved from the NFL Century Division to the AFC Central with the AFL-NFL merger. The Steelers also moved into a new home as Three Rivers Stadium opened. Previously, the Steelers had played home games at Forbes Field from 1933-57 and at both Forbes Field and Pitt Stadium from 1958-63. From 1964-69 the Steelers played at Pitt Stadium until Three Rivers opened in 1970.

Gradual improvement in the early 1970s resulted in the team's first-ever division title in 1972 with an 11-3 record. In the first playoff game at Three Rivers the Steelers defeated the Oakland Raiders 13-10 with Franco Harris' "Immaculate Reception" in the final minute. Despite a 21-17 loss the following week to the undefeated Miami Dolphins, the Steelers had reached a new plateau.

It took 40 years for the Steelers to finally win their first division title, but over the next decade they achieved a level of success unprecedented in professional football.

In 1973 the Steelers won a wild card playoff berth with a 10-4 record. Oakland avenged their loss from the previous year, however, with a 33-14 playoff win.

The Steelers won their first of six consecutive AFC Central titles in 1974 and marched past Buffalo (32-14) and Oakland (24-13) en route to their first Super Bowl appearance in Super Bowl IX. The fierce Steelers defense led the way to a 16-6 victory vs. the Minnesota Vikings, and Art Rooney was presented the Vince Lombardi Trophy for the first time.

In 1975 the Steelers won 11 straight games to finish 12-2 and claim their second consecutive division crown. After defeating Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10) in the playoffs the Steelers became the third team in NFL history, joining Green Bay and Miami, to win back-to-back Super Bowls with a 21-17 win vs. the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl X.

The 1976 Steelers struggled to 1-4 before reeling off nine straight victories including five shutouts to win the division with a 10-4 mark. They defeated Baltimore 40-14 in the playoffs, but could not get past Oakland in a 24-7 loss after both running backs, Harris and Rocky Bleier, were injured. The following year the Steelers dropped a 34-21 decision to Denver in the playoffs after posting a 9-5 regular season record.

In 1978 the Steelers made history after a league-best 14-2 regular season and playoff wins vs. Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5). Their 31-19 Super Bowl XIII win vs. Dallas made the Steelers the first team to win three Super Bowls.

Yet another standard was set the following year as the 1979 Steelers defeated the Los Angeles Rams 31-19 in Super Bowl XIV to make them the first team in history to win four Super Bowls and the only team to win back-to-back Super Bowls twice. The Super Bowl victory followed a 12-4 regular season and playoff wins vs. Miami (34-14) and Houston (27-13). With six consecutive AFC Central crowns, eight straight years of playoffs and four Super

Bowl championships, the Steelers were tagged the "Team of the Decade" for the 1970s.

As the 1980s opened the Steelers stumbled, failing to make the playoffs in 1980 and 1981 with records of 9-7 and 8-8.

In 1982 the Steelers celebrated the team's 50th anniversary by qualifying for the playoffs with a 6-3 finish in a strike-interrupted season. During the season an anniversary banquet was held to commemorate the team's first 50 seasons and to honor the Steelers' all-time team as selected by fan voting. Thousands of fans were attracted to Pittsburgh for a week of activities and exhibits before the anniversary season was ended by San Diego's 31-28 win in the playoffs.

The 1983 Steelers won their eighth division title with a 10-6 record, but fell in the postseason, 38-10 to the Raiders. The next year was the Steelers' last division crown, the ninth overall, as the team advanced to the AFC Championship game with a 13-7 playoff win at Denver. A 45-28 Miami assault, however, prevented the Steelers from a fifth Super Bowl appearance.

The Steelers' streak of 13 consecutive non-losing seasons came to an end in 1985 with a 7-9 finish, followed by 6-10 in 1986. Playoff hopes remained alive in 1987 until the Steelers lost the last two games to finish 8-7.

In 1988 the team suffered through its worst campaign in 19 years with a 5-11 record. The next season got off to a similar start with losses of 51-0 and 41-10 in the first two games as the offense failed to score in the first month of the season. But the young team fought back to finish 9-7 and win a wild card playoff berth. An exciting 26-23 overtime playoff win in Houston was followed by a heart-breaking 24-23 loss at Denver in which the Steelers led until the final minutes.

A 9-7 finish in 1990 left the Steelers in a three-way tie for the AFC Central lead, but they were eliminated from playoff contention by a 2-4 division record. The 1991 team finished second in the division despite a 7-9 record, winning the last two games under Noll at home against the Cincinnati Bengals and Cleveland Browns.

On Dec. 26, 1991 Noll announced his retirement from football after 39 years, the last 23 as the Steelers' head coach, which made him one of only four men to coach the same team for 23 consecutive seasons. He left as the fifth-winningest coach in NFL history with an overall record of 209-156-1, and as the only coach to win four Super Bowls.

Back in 1964, when he was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, Art Rooney had begun to turn over much of the operation of the Steelers to his oldest son, Dan. A decade later, after having worked in every area of the organization since 1955, Dan Rooney was named president of the Steelers in 1975. Now in his 38th year with the Steelers, he is one of the most active NFL executives and one of Pittsburgh's most involved executives in civic affairs.

Among his community activities, Dan Rooney is a board member for The United Way of America, The American Ireland Fund, The American Diabetes Association, Presbyterian University Hospital, The Pittsburgh History and Landmarks Foundation, and Duquesne University.


Dan Rooney has also been a member of several NFL committees over the past 20 years. He has served on the board of directors for the NFL Trust Fund, NFL Films, and the Scheduling Committee. He was appointed chairman of the Expansion Committee in 1973, which considered new franchise locations and directed the addition of Seattle and Tampa Bay as expansion teams in 1976. That year he was also named chairman of the Negotiating Committee, and in 1982 he contributed to the negotiations for the Collective Bargaining Agreement for the NFL and the Players' Association. Rooney is currently a member of the six-person Management Council Executive Committee, the Hall of Fame Committee, the Super Bowl Ring Committee, the NFL Properties Executive Committee, and vice chairman of the board of the World League.

Daniel M. Rooney was born on Pittsburgh's North Side on July 20, 1932. He is a 1950 graduate of North Catholic High School, where he played quarterback on the varsity football team. He went on to graduate from Duquesne University in 1955 with a bachelor of arts degree in accounting. Dan and his wife Patricia live in Mt. Lebanon.

## STEELERS COACHES



### **BILL COWHER**

#### **Head Coach**

Bill Cowher was named the 15th head coach in the Steelers' 60-year history on January 21, 1992. In introducing Cowher to the Pittsburgh media, Steelers president Dan Rooney said, "Bill is a very capable young man, with the experience and intelligence to be a successful coach in the National Football League. I am impressed with his strength, character, and enthusiasm, and his appreciation for the game."

At age 35 Cowher is the second-youngest head coach in the NFL, younger than all except Cincinnati's David Shula. He is two years younger than the man he replaced, Chuck Noll, when Noll was named the Steelers' head coach in January of 1969. This is Cowher's 13th year in the league, including five seasons as a player and seven as an assistant coach.

In being presented as the Steelers' new head coach, Cowher stated, "The task at hand is clear and simple. What we must do is take the credibility and stability of the front office and the wealth of young, improving players, and we are going to unite them through commitment, through dedication, and through a great work ethic. We will bring the pride and tradition that has long been associated with the Pittsburgh Steelers and, more importantly, the people of Pittsburgh."

A Pittsburgh-area native, Cowher returned to his hometown after three seasons as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for the Kansas City Chiefs under Marty Schottenheimer. In 1989, Cowher's first season as a 32-year-old defensive coordinator, the Kansas City defense led the AFC and ranked second in the NFL in allowing an average of 268.3 yards per game. The following year the unit led the league in three categories with 60 sacks, 25 fumbles recovered, and 45 takeaways. Last season Kansas City's defense ranked third in the conference and fifth overall in the NFL as the Chiefs went 10-6 and qualified for a wild card playoff berth.

Cowher's move to Kansas City in 1989 followed four years of coaching in Cleveland, where he served as the Browns' special teams coach in 1985-86 and secondary coach in 1987-88 under Schottenheimer. As secondary coach, Cowher saw his 1987 group make 23 interceptions to tie for third in the AFC, while in 1988 the Cleveland defense ranked fourth overall in the conference.

A former linebacker and special teams standout, Cowher enjoyed a five-year playing career with Cleveland (1980-82) and the Philadelphia Eagles (1983-84). He signed with Philadelphia in 1979 as a free agent rookie, but was waived after playing in three preseason games. The following year he signed with Cleveland and played in all 16 games including two starts at inside linebacker.

Cowher sat out the 1981 campaign after suffering a season-ending knee injury in the third preseason game, returning in 1982 as special teams captain and starting at outside linebacker in two games while playing in all nine contests.

Cowher was traded to Philadelphia prior to the start of the 1983 season (Aug. 21). He was selected the Eagles' most valuable special teams player that year and played in all 16 contests. In 1984 a career-ending knee injury kept him out of all but four games. Cowher returned to Cleveland the following year, at age 28, as a member of Schottenheimer's staff.

Cowher grew up in the Crafton area west of Pittsburgh. He is a 1975 graduate of Carlynton High School, where he excelled in football, basketball, and track. He went on to North Carolina State, where he earned four letters as a three-year starter at linebacker. As a senior in 1978 Cowher was selected the team's captain as well as most valuable player after leading the defense in tackles for the second consecutive year. He also received the 1978 Cary Brewbaker Award as the school's outstanding defensive lineman as selected by the coaching staff, and was graduated in 1979 with a degree in education.

Cowher was born in Pittsburgh on May 8, 1957. It was at North Carolina State that Cowher met his wife, Kaye. Also a graduate of North Carolina State, Kaye and her twin sister Faye played professional basketball for the New York Stars of the Women's Professional Basketball League. The Cowhers have three daughters — Meagan Lyn (6), Lauren Marie (4), and Lindsay Morgan (1).

## WHO'S WHO IN COWHER'S FOOTBALL CAREER

**MARION CAMPBELL**, former Philadelphia Eagles head coach — Was Philadelphia Eagles head coach and defensive coordinator when Cowher played for Eagles in 1983-84.

**PAUL HACKETT**, University of Pittsburgh head coach — Was on Cleveland Browns staff as quarterbacks coach in 1981-82 while Cowher played for Browns.

**LOU HOLTZ**, University of Notre Dame head coach — Recruited Cowher to North Carolina State as Wolfpack head coach in 1975.

**RICH KOTITE**, Philadelphia Eagles head coach — Was on Cleveland Browns staff as receivers coach while Cowher played for Browns in 1980-81.

**DICK MacPHERSON**, New England Patriots head coach — Coached Cowher as Cleveland Browns linebackers coach in 1980.

**TED MARCHIBRODA**, Indianapolis Colts head coach — Was on Philadelphia Eagles staff as offensive coordinator when Cowher played for Eagles in 1984.

**DOM CAPERS**  
Defensive Coordinator

Dom Capers became defensive coordinator on January 30 of this year and begins his 18th season of coaching, his seventh in the NFL. Capers, 42, came to the Steelers following six years as the New Orleans Saints defensive backs coach.

Under Capers the New Orleans defense ranked among the NFL's top five for interceptions three times (1986, 1987, 1991). Last year the Saints were second in the league only to Philadelphia in total defense, rushing defense, and pass defense, allowing an average of 245.8 yards per game including 75.8 rushing and 170.0 passing. They also led the NFL with 29 interceptions and ranked third with 50 sacks.

Capers' 18 years of coaching experience includes nine seasons at the college level and two in the USFL. He was a graduate assistant at Kent State (1972-74) and Washington (1975) prior to beginning fulltime coaching in 1975.

Capers' first coaching position was as defensive backs coach at Hawaii, where he spent two years (1975-76). He then coached at San Jose State (1977), California (1978-79), Tennessee (1980-81), and Ohio State (1982-83).

In 1984 Capers joined head coach Jim Mora's staff with the USFL Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars. In both the 1984 and 1985 seasons the Stars won the USFL championship. Capers then went with Mora to the New Orleans Saints in 1986 as defensive backs coach.

Capers is a graduate of Mount Union College in Alliance, Ohio, where he played defensive back from 1968-71 and also played baseball. He received a bachelor of arts degree in 1972 and his master's in administration in 1974.

Dom was born on August 7, 1950 in Cambridge, Ohio. He lives in Pittsburgh.



**RON ERHARDT**  
Offensive Coordinator

Ron Erhardt was named offensive coordinator on January 27. This marks his 20th season in the NFL and his 36th year of coaching. Erhardt spent the past 10 years with the New York Giants.

A veteran of 36 years in coaching, Erhardt was the Giants' offensive coordinator from 1982-90, a span that included the Giants' victories in Super Bowls XXI and XXV. He was named assistant head coach for the 1991 season.


Erhardt, 62, began his coaching career with seven seasons at the high school level in North Dakota. He coached at Williston High in 1956 followed by six years as head coach at St. Mary's and Bishop Ryan, posting a 45-9-2 record as a head coach.

In 1963 Erhardt moved into the college ranks at North Dakota State (1963-72). He was head coach from 1966-72 and had a 62-7-1 record over seven seasons including two consecutive College Division national championships. His .884 winning percentage makes him one of the winningest coaches ever in the College Division.

Erhardt joined the NFL in 1973 as offensive backfield coach for the New England Patriots. After four years in that capacity he was offensive coordinator for two seasons (1977-78) before being named head coach in 1979. As Patriots head coach from 1979-81 Erhardt's teams had records of 9-7, 10-6, and 2-14. In 1982 he began his 10-year stint with the Giants.

Erhardt was an all-conference quarterback for Jamestown (N.D.) College. He also lettered in baseball and basketball. Following college he served three years in the military.

Ron was born on February 27, 1931 in Mandan, North Dakota. He and his wife Anita have four children — Jan, Rob, Jim, and Jill.



**STEVE FURNESS**  
Defensive Line Coach

Steve Furness returned to the Steelers this year, 12 years after his nine-year career as a defensive tackle for the Steelers. He was named defensive line coach on January 27 and is entering his 11th year of coaching, his second in the NFL.

Furness, 41, served as defensive line coach for the Indianapolis Colts last season following eight years of coaching at the college level. He began his coaching career in 1982 with the USFL Philadelphia Stars under head coach George Perles.

In 1983 Furness went with Perles to Michigan State, where he coached the defensive line from 1983-90. The Spartans made six bowl appearances in those eight seasons.

Furness' NFL career began as a fifth-round draft choice of the Steelers in 1972. Over the next nine seasons (1972-80), in which he started 49 games, Furness accumulated 32 sacks, which still ranks seventh in team history. In 1977 he led the team with a career-high eight and a half sacks.

Furness is one of 22 players who were on all four Steelers Super Bowl teams. He was traded to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in August of 1981 and then signed as a free agent with the Detroit Lions, where he spent the 1981 season.

A graduate of Rhode Island, Furness was inducted into the school's hall of fame in 1987. He received his bachelor's degree in 1972 and earned a master's degree in athletic administration from Michigan State in 1987. He is currently working towards a Ph.D. in higher education and administration.

Steve was born on December 5, 1950 in Warwick, Rhode Island. He and his wife Deborah, who also hails from Warwick, have two sons — Zachary and Zaban.



**JOHN GUY**  
Special Teams Coach

John Guy embarks upon his first season of coaching in the NFL in 1992, his 20th year as coach. He was named special teams coach on February 12 after two years as assistant head coach at Kentucky.

While he is new to the Steelers coaching staff, Guy is not a new face to the Steelers. Through the NFL Minority Coaching Fellowship Program, in which each NFL team sponsors a minority college coach during training camp, Guy spent parts of the last two training camps with the Steelers working primarily with the linebackers. When he was hired on February 12 Guy became the eighth coach to join an NFL team fulltime through the Minority Coaching Fellowship Program, which began in 1987. Among the other current NFL coaches who came through this program are Cincinnati's Ron Meeks, Dallas' Robert Ford, Atlanta's Ollie Wilson, and the Rams' Rod Perry.

Guy, 41, spent the past 19 years coaching at colleges in the East. He began his coaching career in 1973 under head coach Bill Dooley at North Carolina, where he spent five years (1973-77). Following were stops at Virginia Tech (1978), Duke (1978-80), Georgia Tech (1981-86), Alabama (1987-89), and Kentucky (1990-91).

The last two years Guy was assistant head coach/football operations in addition to coaching the outside linebackers and kickers at Kentucky.

Guy attended North Carolina A&T, where he was an All-MEAC defensive back and kicker. A 1972 academic All-MEAC selection as well, he received his sociology and psychology degree from North Carolina A&T in 1973 and a master's from North Carolina in 1974.

**BOB HARRISON**  
Wide Receivers Coach

Bob Harrison begins his second NFL coaching job in 1992 as the Steelers' wide receivers coach. He joined the staff on February 6 and is in his 25th year of coaching.

Harrison's previous experience in the NFL was as receivers coach for the Atlanta Falcons. He spent four seasons with Atlanta, from 1983-86.

Harrison, 50, has coached at the high school, collegiate, and professional levels. He began his coaching career in 1964 at his alma mater, John Adams High in Cleveland, Ohio. He was an assistant coach at John Adams from 1964-66 and head coach from 1967-68 in addition to serving as academic instructor.

In 1969 Harrison moved to the college ranks, where he spent the next 14 years. He was a defensive coach at Kent State (1969-70), receivers coach at Iowa (1971-73), offensive coordinator at Cornell (1974), tight ends and tackles coach at North Carolina State (1975-76), and receivers coach under Johnny Majors at Tennessee (1977-82).

In Harrison's six years at Tennessee, where he coached Willie Gault, the Volunteers played in three bowl games.

Harrison was then named receivers coach of the Atlanta Falcons in 1983 and coached there through the 1986 season.

In 1988 Harrison joined the staff at Georgia, where he spent the last three years as the team's receivers coach.

Harrison attended Kent State, where he was an All-MAC receiver as well as team captain. He was graduated in 1964 with a bachelor's degree in history and political science.

**DICK HOAK**  
Running Backs Coach

Dick Hoak enters his 31st year with the Steelers in 1992 and his 21st consecutive as a Steelers assistant coach. He was offensive backfield coach for 20 seasons under Chuck Noll before being named running backs coach by Bill Cowher on January 27 this year. He is the only assistant retained from the previous Steelers staff.

Hoak, 52, joined Noll's staff in 1972 after one year of coaching high school football and just two years after retiring from an outstanding playing career for the Steelers.

Drafted by the Steelers on the seventh round in 1961, Hoak spent the next 10 seasons in the Pittsburgh backfield. He led the Steelers in rushing three times (1965, 1968, 1969) and played in one Pro Bowl after ranking fourth in the league in 1968 with 858 rushing yards. When he retired following the 1970 season Hoak had gained 3,965 career rushing yards, which at that time was second in team history. Today Hoak still ranks fourth behind Hall of Famers Franco Harris and John Henry Johnson, and Frank Pollard.

Hoak also currently ranks eighth in Steelers history for career touchdowns with 33, fourth in rushing touchdowns with 25, and second in rushing attempts with 1,132. In addition to his rushing total, Hoak made 145 receptions for 1,152 yards and eight touchdowns.

As a standout running back and quarterback for Penn State, Hoak was selected the team MVP as a senior. He graduated in 1961 with a bachelor's degree in social studies.

Dick was born on December 8, 1939 in Jeannette, Pennsylvania. He and his wife Lynn have three children — daughters Kelly and Katie and son Richard. The Hoaks live in Greensburg.



**PAT HODGSON**  
Tight Ends Coach

Pat Hodgson became the fifth member of Bill Cowher's staff when he was named tight ends coach on February 3. This will be Hodgson's 22nd year of coaching and his 11th in the NFL. He spent 11 years coaching in the college ranks prior to 10 seasons in the NFL.

Hodgson inherits one of the Steelers' strongest positions with Eric Green and Adrian Cooper. Both players are young and talented and will play a large role in the Steelers offense.

A former NFL tight end himself, Hodgson spent two years as a player with the Washington Redskins (1966) and Minnesota Vikings (1967). He began his coaching career the following year and coached at Georgia (1968-70, 1972-77), Florida State (1971), and Texas Tech (1978).

In 1978 Hodgson returned to the NFL as the San Diego Chargers receivers coach. He then coached the New York Giants' tight ends from 1979-87. During his last six years with the Giants, which included the team's Super Bowl XXI victory, Hodgson worked under offensive coordinator Ron Erhardt.

Hodgson, 48, returns to coaching after four years away from football. Since leaving the Giants following the 1987 season he worked as the director of marketing for Richard A. Stevens, a construction management firm in Whippany, New Jersey.

Hodgson played tight end from 1963-65 at Georgia, where he was the team MVP, co-captain, and honorable mention All-America in 1965. He was also an All-SEC selection in both 1963 and 1965. He received a B.A. degree in general business in 1966.

Pat was born on January 30, 1944 in Columbus, Georgia. He and his wife Mary Ann have two sons — Pat, Jr. and Chris.



**DICK LEBEAU**  
Defensive Backs Coach

Dick LeBeau begins his 34th year in the NFL in 1992, his 20th in coaching. He was named defensive backs coach for the Steelers on February 7 following 12 years with the Cincinnati Bengals, the last eight as defensive coordinator.

LeBeau spent his first 14 NFL seasons as a standout cornerback for the Detroit Lions from 1959-72. After being drafted by the Cleveland Browns on the fifth round in 1959 he was waived and signed with Detroit. LeBeau played in 171 consecutive games for the Lions and was voted to the Pro Bowl in 1965, 1966, and 1967.

LeBeau's 62 career interceptions, which included a career-high nine to lead the NFC in 1970, ranked third in NFL history at the time of his retirement and currently ties him for fifth place on the NFL all-time list. He trails only Paul Krause, Emlen Tunnell, Dick "Night Train" Lane, and Ken Riley, sharing fifth place with Dave Brown.

LeBeau retired following the 1972 season and began his coaching career as special teams coach for the Philadelphia Eagles (1973-75). He also served four seasons as defensive backs coach for the Green Bay Packers (1976-79) before taking the same position with Cincinnati in 1980. In 1984 LeBeau was promoted to defensive coordinator, a position he held through the 1991 season, in addition to coaching the Bengals' defensive backs.

LeBeau, 54, attended Ohio State, where he played offensive and defensive back. He was a member of the Buckeyes' 1957 national champion team and was graduated in 1959 with a bachelor's degree in education.

Dick was born on September 9, 1937 in London, Ohio. He and his wife Nancy have one son, Brandon Grant.



**MARVIN LEWIS**  
Linebackers Coach

Marvin Lewis was named linebackers coach on February 6 of this year. This is his first NFL coaching position following 11 years of coaching at the college level.

Lewis, 33, is a native of nearby McDonald, Pennsylvania. He returned to the Pittsburgh area two years ago to coach the University of Pittsburgh outside linebackers for the last two seasons.

In 1981 Lewis began his coaching career at his alma mater, Idaho State, where he was linebackers coach from 1981-84. In Lewis' first season on the Idaho State staff the team finished 12-1 and won the NCAA Division I-AA championship.

Lewis then coached the outside linebackers at Long Beach State for two seasons (1985-86), followed by three years at New Mexico (1987-89), where his duties were the inside linebackers in 1987 and 1988 and outside linebackers in 1989. He also served the dual role of recruiting coordinator his last two years at New Mexico before returning to Pittsburgh in 1990.

After graduating from McDonald's Fort Cherry High, where he was an all-conference quarterback and safety and also lettered in wrestling and baseball, Lewis attended Idaho State. He earned All-Big Sky Conference honors in 1978, 1979, and 1980 as a linebacker and also played quarterback and free safety during his college career.

Lewis received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Idaho State in 1981. In 1982 he received a master's in athletic administration.

Marvin was born on September 23, 1958 in McDonald, Pennsylvania. He and his wife Peggy have two children — daughter Whitney and son Marcus.



**KENT STEPHENSON**  
Offensive Line Coach

Kent Stephenson begins his 28th year of coaching in 1992 and his eighth season in the NFL. On February 7 he was named offensive line coach, a position he held for the Seattle Seahawks for the last seven years.

In taking over the Steelers' offensive line, Stephenson will tutor a relatively young group of players. It is a position that could find several new faces in the mix with a new emphasis on larger linemen and more power blocking schemes than in the past.

Stephenson's coaching career includes 18 years at the college level and two in the USFL prior to his entering the NFL in 1985 with Seattle.

In 1985 Stephenson entered the NFL as the Seattle Seahawks' offensive line coach under Chuck Knox. He spent the past seven years in that capacity.

A graduate of Northern Iowa, Stephenson was an all-conference selection as a two-way lineman. He earned his undergraduate degree in history and physical education from Northern Iowa in 1965. Stephenson later received a master's in education from Wayne State in 1966.
