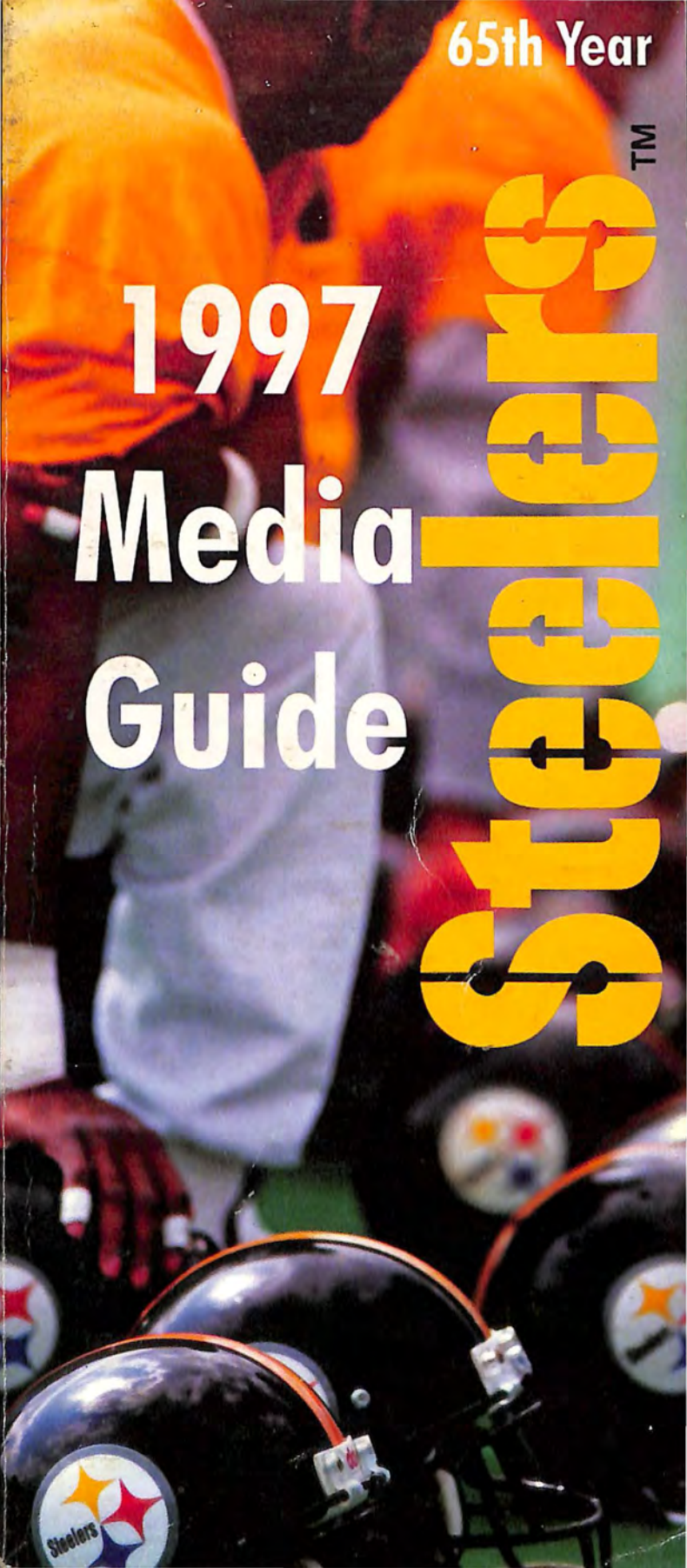

HISTORY OF THE STEELERS

The fifth-oldest franchise in the NFL, the Steelers were founded on July 8, 1933 by Arthur Joseph Rooney. Originally named the Pittsburgh Pirates, they were a member of the Eastern Division of the ten-team NFL. The other four current NFL teams in existence at that time were the Chicago (Arizona) Cardinals, Green Bay Packers, Chicago Bears and New York Giants.

One of the great pioneers of the sports world, Art Rooney passed away on August 25, 1988 following a stroke at the age of 87. "The Chief," as he was affectionately known, is enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame and is remembered as one of Pittsburgh's great people.

Born on January 27, 1901 in Coulterville, Pa., Art Rooney was the oldest of Daniel and Margaret Rooney's nine children. He grew up in Old Allegheny, now known as Pittsburgh's North Side, and until his death he still lived on the North Side just a short distance from Three Rivers Stadium.

Rooney attended St. Peter's Parochial School and Duquesne University Prep School. He studied collegiately at Indiana (Pa.) Normal, which is now Indiana University of Pennsylvania, as well as at Georgetown and Duquesne.

An exceptional all-around athlete, Rooney held middleweight and welterweight titles from the AAU Boxing Championships and was named to the U.S. Olympic Boxing Team in 1920, although he did not participate in the Olympic Games. He played minor league baseball from 1920-25 before a promising career was cut short by an arm injury. Rooney continued playing football for several semi-pro teams in the Pittsburgh area. He was married on June 11, 1931 to Kathleen McNulty, and the couple had five sons — Daniel, Art, Jr., Tim, John and Pat.

1930s After founding the Pirates in 1933, Rooney watched his club struggle through its first seven seasons with just 22 wins and five different head coaches. While home games were played at Forbes Field, Rooney often took his team to such cities as Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, New Orleans, and Louisville in the 1930s due to competition with baseball and college football.

In 1938 Rooney signed Colorado All-America Byron "Whizzer" White to a \$15,800 contract, making White the first "big money" player in the NFL. White led the league in rushing that year and is one of the NFL's most illustrious alumni. He retired in 1993 after serving 31 years as a Justice of the United States Supreme Court.

1940s In 1940 Rooney changed the team name to the Pittsburgh Steelers, representing the heritage of Pittsburgh. The first winning record in the organization's history came in 1942 when head coach Walt Kiesling led the Steelers to a 7-4 finish with the league-leading rushing of rookie Bill Dudley. But the next year Dudley joined the Armed Forces along with many other NFL players as the nation went to war. With rosters depleted, Rooney merged the Steelers with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1943 (Phil-Pitt "Steagles") and with the Chicago Cardinals (Card-Pitt) in 1944.

Rooney hired legendary Pitt coach Jock Sutherland in 1946, and Dudley returned from the war to earn NFL MVP honors, leading the league in rushing, interceptions, and punt returns. Today, Dudley is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Sutherland led the 1947 Steelers to an 8-4 record for a share of the Eastern division title, but they lost their first-ever postseason game, 21-0 to Philadelphia. Sutherland died suddenly the following spring while on a scouting trip.

1950s Succeeding Sutherland, John Michelosen was head coach for the 1948-51 seasons, compiling a 20-26-2 record. In 1952 Joe Bach returned for his second stint with the Steelers, having coached the team previously in 1935-36. The Steelers became the last team to abandon the single wing for the T-formation in 1952.

Bach resigned for health reasons following the 1954 season and was replaced by assistant coach Walt Kiesling, who had been the Steelers' head coach twice previously. Kiesling's three stints covered the 1939-40, 1941-44, and 1954-56 campaigns.

1960s Buddy Parker was named head coach in 1957 and over the next eight years he led the Steelers to five non-losing seasons. Hall of Fame quarterback Bobby Layne quarterbacked the team through three of those campaigns, leading the Steelers to a 9-5 mark and a playoff game vs. Detroit in 1962, which the Steelers lost 17-10. Parker completed his tenure with a 51-48-6 record and ranks second among all-time Steelers coaches for career wins.

Brief stints by Mike Nixon in 1965 and Bill Austin from 1966-68 preceded the hiring of the 37-year-old Noll on January 27, 1969. Noll began to rebuild the Steelers through the draft, starting with the defense when he selected defensive tackle Joe Greene with his first choice in 1969. Today Greene is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

1970s A 1-13 record in 1969 gave the Steelers the first overall choice in the 1970 draft, with which Noll addressed the offense by selecting quarterback Terry Bradshaw, another Hall of Famer, after the Steelers won the first selection by winning a coin toss with the Chicago Bears. Cornerback Mel Blount was added on the third round that year, followed by linebacker Jack Ham in 1971 and running back Franco Harris in 1972. In all, Noll drafted six players

who are now enshrined in the Hall of Fame including three in his first 20 picks and four of his first 38.

Two significant changes took place in 1970, when the Steelers moved from the NFL Century Division to the AFC Central with the merger of the American Football League and the NFL. The Steelers also moved into a new home as Three Rivers Stadium opened. Previously, the Steelers had played home games at Forbes Field from 1933-57 and at both Forbes Field and Pitt Stadium from 1958-63. From 1964-69 the Steelers played at Pitt Stadium until Three Rivers opened in 1970.

Gradual improvement in the early 1970s resulted in the team's first division title in 1972 with an 11-3 record. In the first playoff game at Three Rivers the Steelers defeated the Oakland Raiders 13-7 with Franco Harris' "Immaculate Reception" in the final minute. Despite a 21-17 loss the following week to the undefeated Miami Dolphins, the Steelers had reached a new plateau.

It took 40 years for the Steelers to finally win their first division title, but over the next decade they achieved a level of success unprecedented in professional football.

In 1973 the Steelers won a wild card playoff berth with a 10-4 record. Oakland avenged their loss from the previous year, however, with a 33-14 defeat of the Steelers in the playoffs.

The Steelers won their first of six consecutive AFC Central titles in 1974 and marched past Buffalo (32-14) and Oakland (24-13) en route to their first Super Bowl appearance in Super Bowl IX. The fierce Pittsburgh defense led the way to a 16-6 victory vs. the Minnesota Vikings, and Art Rooney was presented the Vince Lombardi Trophy for the first time.

In 1975 the Steelers won 11 straight games to finish 12-2 and claim their second consecutive division crown. After defeating Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10) in the playoffs the Steelers became the third team in NFL history, joining Green Bay and Miami, to win back-to-back Super Bowls with a 21-17 win vs. the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl X.

The 1976 Steelers struggled in a 1-4 start before reeling off nine straight victories including five shutouts to win the division with a 10-4 mark. They defeated Baltimore 40-14 in the playoffs, but could not get past Oakland in a 24-7 loss after both starting running backs, Harris and Rocky Bleier, were injured. The following year the Steelers dropped a 34-21 decision to Denver in the playoffs after posting a 9-5 regular season record.

In 1978 the Steelers made history after a league-best 14-2 regular season and playoff wins vs. Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5). Their 35-31 Super Bowl XIII win vs. Dallas made the Steelers the first team to win three Super Bowls.

Yet another standard was set the following year as the 1979 Steelers defeated the Los Angeles Rams 31-19 in Super Bowl XIV to make them the first team in history to win four Super Bowls and the only team to win back-to-back Super Bowls twice. The Super Bowl victory followed a 12-4 regular season and playoff wins vs. Miami (34-14) and Houston (27-13). With six consecutive AFC Central crowns, eight straight years of playoff appearances and four Super Bowl championships, the Steelers were tagged the "Team of the Decade" for the 1970s.

1980s As the 1980s opened the Steelers stumbled, failing to make the playoffs in 1980 and 1981 with records of 9-7 and 8-8.

In 1982 the Steelers celebrated the team's 50th anniversary by qualifying for the playoffs with a 6-3 finish in a strike-interrupted season. During the season an anniversary banquet was held to commemorate the team's first 50 seasons and to honor the Steelers' all-time team as selected by fan voting. Thousands of fans were attracted to Pittsburgh for a week of activities and exhibits before the anniversary season was ended by San Diego's 31-28 win in the playoffs. This would be the last playoff game at Three Rivers until the 1992 season, a span of 10 years.

The 1983 Steelers won their eighth division title with a 10-6 record, but fell in the postseason, 38-10 to the Raiders. The following year the Steelers won their ninth division crown and the team advanced to the AFC Championship game with a 24-17 playoff win at Denver. A 45-28 Miami assault in the AFC Championship game, however, prevented the Steelers from a fifth Super Bowl appearance.

The Steelers' streak of 13 consecutive non-losing seasons came to an end in 1985 with a 7-9 finish, followed by 6-10 in 1986. Playoff hopes remained alive in 1987 until the Steelers lost their last two games to finish 8-7.

In 1988 the team suffered through its worst campaign in 19 years with a 5-11 record. The next season got off to a similar start with losses of 51-0 and 41-10 in the first two games as the offense failed to score in the first month of the season. But the young team fought back to finish 9-7 and earn a wild card playoff berth on the season's final weekend. An exciting 26-23 overtime playoff win in Houston was followed by a heartbreaking 24-23 overtime playoff loss at Denver in which the Steelers led until the final minutes.

1990s A 9-7 finish in 1990 left the Steelers in a three-way tie for the AFC Central lead, but they were eliminated from playoff contention by a 2-4 division record. The 1991 team finished second in the division despite a 7-9 record, winning the last two games under Noll at home against the Cincinnati Bengals and Cleveland Browns.

On December 26, 1991 Noll announced his retirement from football after 39 consecutive seasons, the last 23 as the Steelers' head coach which made

him one of only four men to coach the same team for 23 consecutive years. He left as the fifth-winningest coach in NFL history with an overall record of 209-156-1, and as the only coach to win four Super Bowls. Noll was rewarded in 1993 with his election to the Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility.

A new era began in 1992 with the retirement of Noll and the arrival of Bill Cowher, the National Football League's youngest head coach at the time he assumed control. The first season of the new era saw the Steelers win the AFC Central division crown for the first time since 1984 with an 11-5 record. While the team enjoyed new-found success, Cowher was recognized by the Associated Press as the NFL's coach of the year and six Steelers played in the Pro Bowl, the most in more than a decade.

Under Cowher the Steelers became the first AFC team since the 1970 merger to claim its tenth division title. Their 11-5 record equaled the best in the conference and gave the Steelers the home field throughout the playoffs, but in the first postseason game at Three Rivers in exactly 10 years the Steelers were defeated by eventual AFC champion Buffalo, 24-3.

In 1993, the Steelers earned a wild card playoff berth, marking their first consecutive playoff appearances since the 1983-84 seasons. A 9-7 record was good for second place in the division, but the season ended in a 27-24 overtime loss in Kansas City in the wild card round of the postseason.

The 1994 Steelers won seven of their final eight regular-season games for their strongest finish since 1978. They captured their third division title in three years with the AFC's best record of 12-4. After a 29-9 victory over the Cleveland Browns in the first round of the playoffs, Pittsburgh hosted their first AFC Championship game since 1984. The game went down to the wire and the Steelers lost to the San Diego Chargers, 17-13.

At 38, Bill Cowher became the youngest head coach to lead his team to a Super Bowl. Along the way, Cowher's team captured their third AFC Central division title in four years, made their fourth straight playoff appearance, and won the Steelers' first AFC title since 1979. After a first-round bye, they defeated the Buffalo Bills (40-21) and the Indianapolis Colts (20-16), before losing to the Dallas Cowboys 27-17 in Super Bowl XXX in Tempe, Arizona.

In 1996, injuries forced Cowher to use 40 different starters during the course of the season. But the Steelers' "never-say-die" attitude led to a 10-6 finish and their fifth consecutive trip to the playoffs. Cowher earned his 50th regular-season win Nov. 3, 1996 in his 73rd game to become the eighth fastest to reach 50 wins. Bill ended the season with 57 career victories and now stands as the second winningest coach in team history, behind his predecessor Noll.

Steelers founder Art Rooney, who was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1964, had begun by that time to turn over much of the operation of the Steelers to his oldest son, Dan. A decade later, after having worked in every area of the organization since 1955, Dan Rooney was named president of the Steelers in 1975. Now in his 38th year in the organization, he is one of the most active NFL owners and one of Pittsburgh's most involved executives in civic affairs.

Among his community activities, Dan Rooney is a board member for The United Way of America, The American Ireland Fund, The American Diabetes Association, Presbyterian University Hospital, The Pittsburgh History and Landmarks Foundation, and Duquesne University.

Dan Rooney has also been a member of several NFL committees over the past 20 years. He has served on the board of directors for the NFL Trust Fund, NFL Films, and the Scheduling Committee. He was appointed chairman of the Expansion Committee in 1973, which considered new franchise locations and directed the addition of Seattle and Tampa Bay as expansion teams in 1976.

In 1976 Rooney was also named chairman of the Negotiating Committee, and in 1982 he contributed to the negotiations for the Collective Bargaining Agreement for the NFL and the Players' Association. He again played a key role in the labor agreement reached between NFL owners and players in 1993.

Rooney is currently a member of the eight-person Management Council Executive Committee, the Hall of Fame Committee, and the NFL Properties Executive Committee.

Daniel M. Rooney was born on Pittsburgh's North Side on July 20, 1932. He is a 1950 graduate of North Catholic High School, where he played quarterback on the varsity football team. He went on to graduate from Duquesne University in 1955 with a bachelor of arts degree in accounting. Dan and his wife Patricia live on the North Side.

STEELERS COACHES



BILL COWHER **HEAD COACH**

Bill Cowher, 40, replaced the legendary hall of fame coach Chuck Noll in 1992, and began to carve his own niche in the Steelers history books. Cowher ended his fifth season as a head coach with his fifth trip to the playoffs, a milestone matched by only two other coaches in NFL history. Cowher also earned his 50th regular-season win Nov. 3, 1996 in his 73rd game to become the eighth fastest head coach to reach 50 wins. Bill ended the season with 57 career victories and now stands as the second winningest coach in team history, behind his predecessor Noll.

Under Cowher's guidance the Steelers have featured a trademark running attack and a solid aggressive defense. During his five seasons as head coach, the team has averaged a league-leading 131 yards a game and stands eighth with an average of 327 yards a game in total offense. During that same period, the defense has allowed an average of 92 rushing yards a game and 211 yards passing. Their average total defense of 303 yards a game ranks second in the NFL, just seven yards behind league-leading Dallas.

While the 1996 outcome didn't compare to the Super Bowl appearance of the previous season, it might have been one of the best coaching jobs of Cowher's young career. For the second straight season, Cowher was forced to overcome losses of key starting personnel on a team that already featured a re-tooled offense. During the course of the season, the Steelers had 14 starters miss 64 starts due to injury. Those adjustments forced Cowher to play 40 different starters throughout the season. Despite the adversity, Cowher led the Steelers to their fifth consecutive playoff berth and their fourth AFC Central title in five seasons.

In 1995, at the age of 38, the Pittsburgh-area native became the youngest head coach to lead his team to a Super Bowl. Along the way, Cowher's team captured their third AFC Central division title in four years, made their fourth straight playoff appearance, and won the Steelers' first AFC title since 1979.

The Steelers' 11-5 regular season record was the second-best in the

AFC which exceeded the expectations of most. In the offseason, the team lost seven veterans through free agency and trades. They had to play four games without starting quarterback Neil O'Donnell and almost the entire season without 1994's starting cornerbacks Deon Figures and Rod Woodson, a perennial all-Pro. In addition, linebacker Chad Brown missed six games after a phenomenal start.

Despite the setbacks, Cowher was able to rally his team from a near-disastrous 3-4 start to an NFL-best eight-game winning streak and a bye in the first round of the playoffs. This was accomplished with a major change in both offensive and defensive strategies, as the Steelers made key adjustments to compensate for their personnel losses.

The 1995 Steelers led the AFC in scoring with 407 points and set eight new offensive team records. They led the NFL in time of possession (32:36/game). On defense, they established new team marks for fewest yards allowed rushing and fewest yards per game rushing (82.6/game). Their 22 interceptions were second highest in the NFL.

Cowher was introduced as the Steelers' head coach on January 21, 1992, 26 days after the retirement of Hall of Fame coach Chuck Noll. At the age of 34, Cowher was two years younger than Noll was upon becoming the Steelers' head coach in 1969.

Cowher returned to his hometown following seven years as an assistant under Marty Schottenheimer in Cleveland and Kansas City. His appointment as the Steelers' head coach immediately followed a three-year stint as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for the Chiefs.

Cowher has 17 years of NFL experience, including five as a player, seven as an assistant coach and five as a head coach. In his 12 years of coaching, Cowher has never been associated with a team that posted a losing record. In fact, in 11 of the 12 seasons he has been a coach, Cowher's team has advanced to the playoffs.

In his first year as head coach, Cowher was selected the 1992 National Football League's Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and The Sporting News. Cowher was also named Pittsburgh's Man of the Year in Sports by the Dapper Dan Club. He directed the Steelers to their first AFC Central division crown in eight years with an 11-5 record, which was the team's best mark since they last won a Super Bowl in 1979. One of four AFC teams to win 11 games in 1992, the Steelers shared the best record in the conference as Cowher became one of only 12 coaches in NFL history to win 11 games in his first season as head coach.

The 1993 Steelers got off to a slow start at 0-2, but six wins in the next seven games brought the team to a 6-3 mark and first place in the AFC Central division. On the final weekend of the regular season the Steelers claimed the final AFC wild card berth after winning three of the last five games. Offensively, the team finished with the exact same AFC rankings as the previous year, but it improved from 21st to 13th in NFL passing rankings. The defense jumped from eighth to first in NFL total defense rankings, and from 17th to third in NFL run defense.

Cowher began his coaching career in 1985 with the Cleveland Browns. At age 28, he was the league's second-youngest assistant coach. He served on Schottenheimer's staff as the Browns' special teams coach in 1985-86 and secondary coach in 1987-88. As secondary coach, Cowher saw his 1987 group make 23 interceptions to tie for third in the AFC, while in 1988 the Cleveland defense ranked fourth overall in the conference. The following year Cowher went with Schottenheimer to the Kansas City coaching staff.

In 1989, Cowher's first season as a 32-year-old defensive coordinator, the Kansas City defense led the AFC and ranked second in the NFL in total defense. The following year the unit led the league in three categories with 60 sacks, 25 fumbles recovered and 45 takeaways. In 1991 the Chiefs ranked third in the conference and fifth overall in the NFL en route to a 10-6 finish and a wild card playoff berth.

A former linebacker and special teams standout, Cowher enjoyed a five-year NFL playing career with the Browns (1980-82) and the Philadelphia Eagles (1983-84). He signed with Philadelphia in 1979 as an undrafted

free agent rookie, but was the last linebacker waived in training camp after playing in three preseason games. The following year he signed with Cleveland and earned a roster spot, playing in all 16 games including two starts at inside linebacker.

Cowher sat out the 1981 campaign after suffering a season-ending knee injury in the third preseason game. Returning in 1982 as special teams captain, he started at outside linebacker in two games while playing in all nine contests.

Cowher was traded to Philadelphia prior to the start of the 1983 season (Aug. 21) for a ninth-round draft pick. He was selected the Eagles' most valuable special teams player that year and played in all 16 games. In 1984, a knee injury kept him out of all but four games and ended his career as a player. Cowher returned to Cleveland the following season and began his coaching career as a member of Marty Schottenheimer's Browns staff.

Cowher grew up in the Crafton area west of Pittsburgh. He is a 1975 graduate of Carlynton High School, where he excelled in football, basketball and track. He was selected honorable mention all-state in football as a senior before moving on to North Carolina State, where he earned four letters and was a three-year starter at linebacker. As a senior in 1978, Cowher was selected the team's captain as well as most valuable player after leading the defense in tackles for the second straight year. He also received the 1978 Cary Brewbaker Award as the school's outstanding defensive lineman as selected by the coaching staff. In 1979 Cowher graduated with a bachelor of science degree in education.

William Laird Cowher was born in Pittsburgh on May 8, 1957. It was at North Carolina State that Cowher met his wife, Kaye. Also a graduate of North Carolina State, Kaye and her twin sister Faye played professional basketball for the New York Stars of the Women's Professional Basketball League. The Cowhers have three daughters: Meagan Lyn (11), Lauren Marie (9), and Lindsay Morgan (6).

MEASURE OF SUCCESS

With his fifth straight playoff berth, Cowher becomes the third head coach in NFL history to lead his team to the playoffs during his first five seasons as a head coach. The others were: Paul Brown, Cleveland (1950-54) and Chuck Knox, Rams (1973-77).

In 1996, Cowher became the eighth-fastest NFL coach to reach 50 wins. He earned his 50th regular-season win Nov. 3, 1996, in his 73rd game. The list of coaches faster to 50: George Seifert & Paul Brown 62, Chuck Knox 65, Vince Lombardi 66, Don Shula 69, George Halas 71, Joe Gibbs 72, Bill Cowher 73, and John Madden 74.

MIKE ARCHER
Linebackers Coach

Mike Archer joined the Steelers for his first NFL assignment March 6, 1996 to coach linebackers, following 19 years of coaching at the college level.

Archer, 44, previously served as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for Kentucky and was their assistant head coach in 1995. He joined UK in 1993 following two-years (1991-92) as linebackers coach at Virginia.

Archer served as head football coach at Louisiana State University from 1987-90. He led the Tigers to a 27-18-1 record with appearances in the 1987 Gator Bowl and 1989 Hall of Fame Bowl, and one Southeastern Conference Championship in 1988. As the nation's youngest Division I-A head football coach (34) in 1987, Archer led the Tigers to a 10-1-1 record and 30-13 Gator Bowl victory over South Carolina. A year later, Archer directed the Tigers to the SEC title with a 6-1 league record and finished 8-4 overall. In 1990, Archer was named coach for the East-West Shrine Game.

Archer, a native of State College, Pennsylvania, lettered three seasons (1973-75) in football at Miami where he started at free safety for two seasons and also punted. As a senior, Archer was named UM's Football Scholar-Athlete of the Year. He graduated from Miami in 1975 and began his coaching career as a graduate assistant for the Hurricanes in 1976 and served under Lou Saban from 1977-78.

Howard Schnellenberger named Archer defensive backs coach in 1979. During his five seasons, Archer's teams posted a 41-16 record, which included a 31-30 Orange Bowl victory over Nebraska and subsequent 1983 national championship.

Archer joined Bill Arnsparger as defensive backfield coach for LSU in 1984, and was named defensive coordinator 1985-86. During that period, LSU had a 26-8-2 record with appearances in three bowl games - 1985 Sugar, 1986 Liberty, and 1987 Sugar — and the 1986 Southeastern Conference championship.

Mike was born July 26, 1953 in State College, Pennsylvania. He and his wife Barbara have two children - Jeffrey Matthew, 16, and Betsy Anne, 13.



DAVID CULLEY
Wide Receivers Coach

David Culley brought 18 years of coaching experience to the Steelers February 13, 1996, when Bill Cowher assigned him to coach the wide receivers. For 16 seasons as a college coach, Culley tutored quarterbacks, running backs, wide receivers and also served as an offensive coordinator.

With Culley's guidance, receivers Andre Hastings and Charles Johnson had their best seasons in the NFL. Johnson finished with his first 1,000-yard season and set a personal best with 60 pass receptions. In 1997, Culley will be asked again to shape a young talented group and will also reunite with former Tampa Bay Buccaneers' receiver Courtney Hawkins.

Before joining the Steelers, Culley coached wide receivers for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1994-1995, where he was charged with molding the team's young group of receivers.

Prior to joining the Bucs, Culley served as the receivers coach at Texas A&M from 1991-93. Working under Head Coach R.C. Slocum, the Aggies dominated the Southwest Conference.

Culley was offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach for Texas-El Paso from 1989-90. While with the Miners, Culley coached Victor Bailey (Eagles) and Reggie Barrett (Seahawks). From 1985-88, he was the quarterbacks coach at Southwestern Louisiana after spending 1984 tutoring the wide receivers at Western Kentucky.

In 1983, Culley was the wide receivers coach at Tennessee-Chattanooga. He served as quarterbacks/running backs coach for Middle Tennessee in 1982. From 1979-81, Culley was Vanderbilt's wide receivers coach after breaking into the coaching ranks in 1978 as running backs coach at Austin Peay.

Culley was a quarterback at Vanderbilt where he earned his bachelor of science in health and physical education. Born September 17, 1955 in Sparta, Tennessee, David and his wife Carolyn, live in Pittsburgh with son Monty (9/5/74) and daughter Jessie (10/17/90).



CHAN GAILEY
Offensive Coordinator

Chan Gailey was named offensive coordinator on February 5, 1996, after spending two seasons as the Steelers wide receivers coach. This is Gailey's 10th NFL season and his 22nd year in coaching. He joined the Steelers on January 24, 1994 following one season as head coach at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama in 1993.

Under Gailey, the Steelers turned their best rushing performance (143.7 yards/game) since 1983. He also developed a new weapon in Charles Johnson, who finished with his first 1,000 yard season. The Steelers also had their third back-to-back 1,000-yard performers in team history (Thigpen, 1995).

The 45-year-old Gailey spent six seasons as an assistant coach with the Denver Broncos (1985-90). He was Denver's offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach (1989-90). During Gailey's six seasons, the Broncos won three AFC Championships and played in Super Bowls XXI, XXII and XXIV.

Gailey was a graduate assistant at Florida in 1974-75. He began his coaching career as defensive backfield coach at Troy State (1976-78), followed by four years at Air Force (1979-82), which included the last two seasons as defensive coordinator.

Gailey returned to Troy State as head coach for the 1983 and 1984 seasons. His 1984 team won the NCAA Division II national championship, and he was honored as conference coach of the year.

After leaving the Broncos, Gailey was named head coach of the World League's Birmingham Fire in 1991 and 1992. He led his team to 5-5 and 7-2-1 records and joined the Barcelona Dragons as the only two World League teams to earn a play-off berth in both years of World League play.

Gailey played quarterback for Florida from 1970-73 and received a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1974.

Chan was born in Gainesville, Georgia on January 5, 1952. He and his wife Laurie have two sons, Tate (21) and Andrew (17). The Gaileys live in Pittsburgh.



JIM HASLETT
Defensive Coordinator

Jim Haslett joined the Steelers as defensive coordinator on January 21 of this year, following one season as coordinator for the New Orleans Saints. He enters his fifth season in the NFL and his 10th year in coaching. At 41, the Pittsburgh native is the fourth-youngest defensive coordinator in the league.

Under Haslett, young Saints defense blossomed from a 25th and 22nd ranking in 1994 and 1995 respectively, to 13th in his first full season as defensive coordinator.

Prior to joining New Orleans, Haslett spent 1993-94 as linebackers coach with the Los Angeles Raiders, helping them to a top-ten ranking in the NFL in total defense during both seasons. From 1991-92, Haslett was the defensive coordinator for the Sacramento Surge of the World League. In 1992, the Surge won the WLAFF championship.

Haslett was the second-round draft choice of the Buffalo Bills in 1979. His playing career spanned nine seasons, including the first eight with the Bills. In 1979, Haslett was named all-Rookie and was the Associated Press Defensive Rookie-of-the-Year. He was voted to the Pro Bowl in 1980 and 1981. Haslett concluded his NFL career in 1987 with the New York Jets.

A year later, Haslett assumed his initial coaching post, handling the linebackers at the University of Buffalo. He was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1989, and served in that capacity for two years.

A three-time all-American as a defensive end at Indiana University of Pennsylvania (1975-78), Haslett graduated with a bachelor's degree in elementary education.

Jim was born December 9, 1955 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He and his wife, Beth, have two daughters, Kelsey and Elizabeth, and a son, Chase. The Hasletts live in Pittsburgh.



DICK HOAK
Running Backs Coach

Dick Hoak, the longest tenured coach in Steelers history, is in his 36th year with the Steelers and his 26th consecutive as a Steelers assistant coach. He served as offensive backfield coach for 20 seasons under Chuck Noll, before being named running backs coach by Bill Cowher on January 27, 1992 as the only coach retained from the previous Steelers' staff.

During Hoak's five seasons under Cowher, the team has averaged a league-leading 131 yards a game. Pittsburgh has ranked in the top five for rushing three out of the five seasons, including a number one ranking in 1994 and number two last year.

Hoak, 57, joined the Steelers' staff in 1972 under Noll after one year of coaching high school football and just two years after retiring from an outstanding playing career for the Steelers.

The Steelers' seventh-round draft choice out of Penn State in 1961, Hoak spent 10 seasons in the Pittsburgh backfield. He led the Steelers in rushing three times (1965, 1968, 1969) and played in one Pro Bowl (1969) after ranking fourth in the NFL in 1968 with 858 rushing yards.

When he retired following the 1970 season, Hoak had gained 3,965 rushing yards, to rank second in team history and today stands fourth behind Hall of Famers Franco Harris, John Henry Johnson and Frank Pollard.

Hoak also currently ranks ninth in Steelers history for career touchdowns with 33, is tied at fourth in rushing touchdowns with 25, and second in rushing attempts with 1,132. In addition to his rushing total, Hoak made 146 receptions for 1,452 yards and eight touchdowns in his career.

As a standout running back and quarterback for Penn State from 1958-60, Hoak was named his team's MVP as a senior. He graduated in 1961 with a bachelor's degree in social studies.

Dick was born on December 8, 1939 in Jeannette, Pennsylvania. He and his wife Lynn have three children—daughters Kelly and Katie and son Richard. The Hoaks live in Greensburg.



TIM LEWIS
Defensive Backs Coach

Tim Lewis enters his third season as the Steelers' defensive backs coach. Lewis, a standout player at Pitt, was selected 11th overall in the 1983 draft by the Green Bay Packers and was the second defensive back chosen that year. He returned to Pitt to coach defensive backs in 1993 and joined the Steelers on February 7, 1995.

Lewis, who lost Deon Figures and Rod Woodson to knee injuries in the 1995 season, is no stranger to adversity. He'll be charged with molding new starters at cornerback this season in a unit that ranked fifth in the NFL in pass defense last year.

Tim played 52 games for the Packers. He ended his career with 16 thefts and twice led or shared team honors for interceptions. His 99-yard interception return for a touchdown versus the Los Angeles Rams in 1984 still stands as a Packers' team record.

He suffered a career-ending neck injury in the fourth game of the 1986 season. Tim entered the coaching ranks in 1987 as a graduate assistant at Texas A&M where he remained for two years under his former college coach Jackie Sherrill. Three of his students found NFL success, including Dallas' 1992 first-round draft selection Kevin Smith.

Lewis coached defensive backs at Southern Methodist in 1989-92. His 1992 Mustang secondary led the Southwest Conference in pass defense, allowing just 182.3 yards passing per game. Starting cornerbacks Marcello Simmons (1993 4th-round, Cincinnati) and Cary Brabham (1993 free agent, Raiders) both headed to the NFL.

Lewis returned to the University of Pittsburgh in 1993 to coach the Panthers' secondary for two seasons before joining the Steelers.

A native of Quakertown, Pennsylvania, Lewis played for Pitt from 1979 through 1982 and was a starting cornerback for the Panthers in 1981 and 1982. Lewis was named an NEA all-American in 1982. He was also selected to the Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine Bowl that year.

Lewis received his bachelor's degree in economics from the University of Pittsburgh in 1983.

Tim was born on December 18, 1961 in Quakertown. He resides in the North Hills.



JOHN MITCHELL
Defensive Line Coach

John Mitchell joined the Steelers as defensive line coach on January 31, 1994, following three seasons coaching the defensive line for the Cleveland Browns. Mitchell is in his 25th season of coaching including 15 years at the college level and two in the United States Football League. This is his sixth season as an NFL coach.

A former all-America defensive end for Alabama, Mitchell's early years in coaching were spent studying under two of college football's greatest coaches.

John began his coaching career in 1973 as defensive line coach under Paul "Bear" Bryant at Alabama. After four years at Alabama (1973-76), Mitchell spent six seasons as defensive line coach at Arkansas (1977-82) on Lou Holtz's staff.

In 1983 Mitchell made his first move to the professional level. From 1983-85 he served as defensive line coach for the USFL Birmingham Stallions. In 1986 he returned to the college ranks as defensive ends coach at Temple.

In 1987 Mitchell began a four-year stint as linebackers coach at Louisiana State (1987-90). In his final season at Louisiana State, Mitchell was named defensive coordinator while continuing to coach the linebackers.

Mitchell, 46, joined the NFL ranks in 1991 with the Browns, where he tutored two Pro Bowl defensive tackles.

John played defensive end and was a two-time Junior College All-American at Eastern Arizona Junior College in 1969-70. He then transferred and played defensive end at Alabama from 1971-72.

He was named all-America in 1972, the year he graduated with a bachelor's degree in social work.

John was born October 14, 1951 in Mobile, Alabama. He and his wife Joyce live in Pittsburgh.



MIKE MULARKEY
Tight Ends Coach

Mike Mularkey, a former tight end for the Steelers in 1989-91, returned to Pittsburgh and joined Bill Cowher's staff February 8, 1996 as tight ends coach.

Mularkey, 35, was in charge of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' tight ends in 1995. Mularkey previously served as the team's quality control coach in 1994, where he was responsible for "breaking down" film of opponents and compiling coaching reports on their offensive/defensive tendencies. He also assisted with tight ends and special teams.

In addition to his coaching responsibilities, Mularkey also served as the Buccaneers' director of player programs. In that role, he assisted players in continuing their education, advised them in regards to off-season jobs and internships, provided financial education and offered family assistance.

Prior to joining the Buccaneers, Mularkey spent one year as the offensive line coach for Concordia (Minn.) College. He entered coaching after spending nine seasons in the NFL as a tight end, playing for the Minnesota Vikings from 1983-88 and the Pittsburgh Steelers from 1989-91. Originally a 1983 ninth-round draft choice of the San Francisco 49ers, Mularkey was waived prior to the season and was picked up by the Vikings. He joined the Steelers as a Plan B free agent. His career statistics included 102 receptions for 1,222 yards and nine touchdowns.

Mularkey attended the University of Florida and finished his Gator career with 55 receptions for 628 yards and three touchdowns. He is finishing his bachelor of science degree in kinesiology and sociology from the University of Minnesota.

Mularkey was born November 19, 1961 in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. He and his wife Betsy live in Pittsburgh with sons Patrick (2/15/86) and Shane (1/14/91).



KENT STEPHENSON
Offensive Line Coach

Kent Stephenson enters his 33rd season of coaching, his 13th in the NFL and his sixth with the Steelers. He was named offensive line coach on February 7, 1992, following seven years in the same capacity with the Seattle Seahawks.

Under Stephenson, the offensive line developed into one of the best in the NFL. In 1995, the unit allowed 24 sacks on the season and just 21 in 1996. The Steelers also join Buffalo and Dallas as one of only three teams to average over 2,000 yards a season since 1992 and lead the NFL with an average of 131 yards a game.

Four of Stephenson's players have earned Pro Bowl honors, including Dermontti Dawson, Carlton Haselrig and Duval Love. Two players, John Jackson and Will Wolford, were named alternates last season.

Stephenson's coaching career began in 1965 and includes 18 years at the college level and two in the USFL prior to his entering the NFL in 1985 with Seattle.

He coached at Wayne State from 1965-68 and spent the next 18 years at North Dakota (1969-71), Southern Methodist (1972-73), Iowa (1974-76), Oklahoma State (1977-78), and Kansas (1979-82).

Stephenson moved to the professional level in 1983 as offensive line coach of the USFL Michigan Panthers (1983-84). In 1983 the Panthers won the USFL championship.

In 1985, Stephenson entered the NFL as the Seahawks' offensive line coach under Chuck Knox. He was there for the 1985-91 seasons before joining the Steelers.

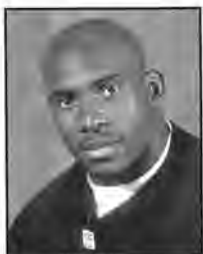

GAME 1

For the second straight season, the Steelers opened with a loss and suffered a major injury to an all-Pro defender. Pittsburgh's starting LB Greg Lloyd was lost for the season with a torn patella tendon in his left knee. The Jaguars controlled the game from their opening drive that covered 80 yards in eight plays. With just six minutes and 34 seconds elapsed in the 1st quarter, QB Mark Brunell hit Willie Jackson for a 38-yard TD pass to take the early lead. While the defense and special teams provided good field position, the offense struggled. Pittsburgh got on the board with a 48-yard Norm Johnson field goal to end the first quarter. Then they drove to the Jaguars' 11-yard line but were forced to settle with a second Norm Johnson field goal. Jacksonville added another TD with a six-play, 60-yard drive as time expired in the half and took a 14-6 lead to the locker room. Approximately five minutes into the third quarter, Lloyd was injured and Pittsburgh adjusted their defensive game plan. Chad Brown moved to ROLB and Jerry Olsavsky took over at RILB. A Rod Woodson interception yielded a third Johnson field goal, as Pittsburgh's "red-zone" troubles continued. With the fourth-quarter score at 14-9, Jacksonville added a 52-yard field goal and then used a Mike Tomczak interception to set up their final TD. Jacksonville captured their second home victory over the Steelers by a margin of 24-9.

GAME 2

With only memories of a storied rivalry that lasted for 93 meetings in 46 years, the Steelers opened this new series with the Baltimore Ravens on a positive note. The Steelers seemed in old form with a 31-17 victory over the visiting Ravens. Beset by injuries, Pittsburgh sent a revamped unit on the field. QB Mike Tomczak, making his first start of the season, led the Steelers to a 28-17 halftime lead. The Steelers running game gained 206 yards with the one-two punch of Jerome Bettis (116 yards) and Eric Pegram (60 yards). The defense set the tone on the Ravens' second offensive snap, when Rod Woodson returned a Vinny Testaverde pass 43 yards for a touchdown. It was Woodson's 5th-career interception return for a touchdown -- a new team record. The defense forced a second fumble in the second quarter to set up an Andre Hastings TD reception. In all, Pittsburgh scored TDs on their first three offensive possessions. The Ravens punted or had a turnover on 7 of their 10 possessions.

RB Jerome Bettis rushed for his first 100-yard game as a Steeler. LB Chad Brown made his first NFL career start at OLB after starting 36 games at ILB.

The Steelers entered Three Rivers Stadium for a football game and walked into a back-yard brawl. While the scoreboard showed a 14 point advantage, the game was much closer than the 30-16 final indicated. Pittsburgh used three Oiler miscues to take a 17-0 lead. A Mel Gray fumbled punt, recovered by Myron Bell, led to a 16-yard TD pass from Mike Tomczak to Kordell Stewart on the next play. Houston made two snaps on their next possession before Jason Gildon forced an Eddie George fumble that led to a Norm Johnson field goal. The Oilers marched to the Pittsburgh 30-yard line, but a 47-yard Al Del Greco field goal attempt was tipped by Brentson Buckner. It took Tomczak just one play to hit Charles Johnson for the 62-yard score. Pittsburgh added their second field goal before the half to take a 20-0 advantage. Hank Williams Jr. asked the Arrowhead Stadium fans if they "were ready for some football" and Pittsburgh answered with the first game in their 64-year history with a 300-yard passer, 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver. The first quarter was filled with mistakes and miscues, as two of the AFC top-rated teams made unscheduled exchanges of the football. Pittsburgh moved 61 yards on the opening drive before tossing an interception in the endzone. Five plays later Willie Williams took the ball back, but a Jerome Bettis fumble returned it to the Chiefs. Kansas City eventually struck first with a Marcus Allen TD. With long plays on third down to Charles Johnson for 32 yards and Andre Hastings for 38 yards on two separate drives, Pittsburgh added two field goals to make it a 7-6 ball game at the half. The Steelers defense and special teams turned the game into a battle of field position, and Pittsburgh capitalized with a third-quarter go-ahead touchdown by Jerome Bettis. Kansas City had one drive pass mid-field in the second half, while Pittsburgh added a 43-yard Norm Johnson field goal to close the scoring. Tomczak threw for his fifth career 300-yard game and averaged 22 yards on seven third down completions. The Steelers gained a season-best 436 yards of total offense.

GAME 6

The Pittsburgh offense didn't feature the aerial assault from a week earlier, but the ground game averaged almost four yards per play. The big plays were reserved for the defense, which sacked Jeff Blake 10 times to tie a team record. The star of the game was Chad Brown who had 4.5 of those sacks and added four pressures, one interception, one forced fumble and 11 tackles. Pittsburgh scored first with a 33-yard Norm Johnson field goal on its first drive. In five possessions, Cincinnati's best first-half drive was to the Steelers' 46-yard line. The Bengals opened the second half with an 86-yard drive to the Steelers' two-yard line, but settled for a 19-yard Doug Pelfrey field goal to tie the game at 3-3. Mike Tomczak responded with a 32-yard TD strike to Kordell Stewart on a screen pass. A Chad Brown interception in the third quarter led to a second Johnson field goal at the top of the fourth quarter to give Pittsburgh a 13-3 advantage. Levon Kirkland delivered the final blow when he sacked Jeff Blake and forced a fumble that Rod Woodson returned 42 yards for a touchdown. Brown's 4.5 sacks tied the second-best game in Steelers history and Bettis rushed for a career-best fifth consecutive 100-yard game. It was the fourth time in five games that the defense had scored.

The Houston Oilers ended the Steelers' five-game winning streak with a 23-13 win in the Astrodome. Despite mistakes, the Steelers virtually controlled the game for 55 minutes. The Oilers struck first, but Pittsburgh responded with a 70-yard TD reception from Mike Tomczak to Charles Johnson on the very next drive. A Norm Johnson field goal raised the score to 10-3. Houston added three Al DelGreco field goals and headed to the locker room down by just one point. Both teams breeched the opponents 30-yard line in the third quarter, but came up short. With just over five minutes remaining, Chris Chandler hit Willie Davis for a 34-yard touchdown pass to take a 16-13 lead. A Tomczak fumble on the ensuing drive gave the Oilers the ball at Pittsburgh's 5-yard line. Three plays later, Eddie Goerge found the end zone to give Houston a 23-13 advantage. For the second straight week, the Steelers needed 60 minutes to determine the ball game. This time, the Steelers came out ahead. Pittsburgh marched down the field on its opening drive, but stumbled in the "redzone" and settled for a field goal. The Falcons responded with a conventional set instead of their "run-and-shoot" offense, and moved the ball 77 yards on 8 plays to take a 7-3 lead. The Steelers had four more possessions before halftime, but their longest drive was 23 yards. Atlanta added a 41-yard Morten Andersen field goal to take a 10-3 lead. Quarterback Mike Tomczak led the Steelers second-half comeback, hitting 11 of 12 passes, including a 12-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Andre Hastings on their first possession. After forcing an Atlanta punt, Pittsburgh marched 75 yards on six plays, including a 24-yard Jerome Bettis run and a one-yard scoring rush to take a 17-10 third-quarter lead. A Deon Figures pass interference call gave the Falcons new life on a drive that led to a Bobby Hebert to Brett Emanuel TD to tie the game with just under six minutes to play. The Steelers drove 66 yards for the game-winning field goal behind the rushing of Bettis. He ran for more than 100 yards for the sixth time in the season, including 32 yards on seven carries in the game-winning drive. With no time remaining, Norm Johnson hit his ninth game-winner (20-yards) to give Pittsburgh a 20-17 win.

Bettis scored on runs of 3 and 50 yards, and gained 88 yards before the end of the first quarter. He piled up 110 yards on 14 carries before halftime. QB Mike Tomczak had completed six straight passes before suffering his first incomplection and a concussion that sent him to the sidelines. Jim Miller entered the game mid-way through the second quarter with the Steelers up 21-3. The Rams added a second Chip Lohmiller field goal in the third quarter, but Erric Pegram returned the ensuing kickoff 91 yards for his first KOR TD. The special teams delivered another blow on St. Louis' next possession, when Donta Jones forced Eddie Kennison to fumble. GAME 12

The Steelers earned their 10th win on MNF under Bill Cowher. The team overcame three turnovers, a 14-3 Miami lead, and a Dan Marino come-from-behind drive to seal a 24-17 victory. The Dolphins moved 76 yards on 15 plays, while consuming 9:45 on the game's opening drive. Marino found O.J. McDuffie in the endzone for a 7-0 lead. The Steelers responded with a 47-yard field goal by Norm Johnson to close the first quarter. Pittsburgh's next two possessions ended in turnovers, including a 61-yard interception return for a touchdown. The Steelers recovered to mount an 80-yard drive that ended with a five-yard Tim Lester TD to pull within four points. Both teams ended the half with missed field goals. Pittsburgh opened the second half with an 82-yard drive and took a 17-14 lead with a 1-yard Kordell Stewart rushing TD. Miami tied the score at 17 with a 41-yard Joe Nedney field goal. A Jerome Bettis fumble ended a Steelers drive near mid-field, but the defense held the Dolphins to four plays. Solid punting by Josh Miller punt and an Israel Raybon sack pinned the Dolphins at their 8-yard line. The ball-exchange moved Pittsburgh to the Dolphins 45 with just over six minutes remaining. On a third-down play from the Miami 20-yard line, Mike Tomczak found Ernie Mills for the go-ahead score. Miami wasn't finished. Dan Marino hit Randal Hill for a 45-yard gain to the Pittsburgh 16-yard line. With 1:20 remaining, the Dolphins went for the endzone. The turning play came on third down and two yards to go, when Deon Figures popped Bernie Parmalee one yard behind the first down marker. Due to an injury to Parmalee and no time outs remaining, 10 more seconds were removed from the clock. With 31 seconds remaining, Marino took one more shot to the endzone, but a pass to Scott Miller fell short. Bettis also became the first player in Monday Night Football history to rush for three 100-yard games in the same season. It was the first game of the season that the defense did not have an interception.

The Ravens grabbed their first win over the Steelers on a rain-soaked afternoon in Baltimore's Memorial Stadium. Bolstered by a 17-point second quarter and three Vinny Testaverde touchdowns, Baltimore captured a 31-17 win. Baltimore used a 46-yard Jermaine Lewis punt return to set up a one-yard touchdown on its second possession. The Steelers matched the effort with a 30-yard touchdown pass from Mike Tomczak to Andre Hastings. After a goal-line stand to start the second quarter, Pittsburgh settled for a 10-7 edge on a 22-yard Norm Johnson field goal. Then the Ravens scored 17 points in the final 3:30 minutes of the second quarter with drives of 72, 72 and 40 yards. Pittsburgh opened the second half with a 45-yard Erric Pegram kick return to set up a second Hastings touchdown reception to pull within seven points. Baltimore took advantage of a poor punt and a good return to earn the game's final score. The Steelers allowed their first 100-yard rusher of the season and their first since vs. New England (12/16/95), breaking a 14 regular-season games streak.

The Steelers clinched their fourth division title in five seasons in a game dominated by defense. The day began with clear skies and sunshine, before snow showers and swirling winds took over the second half. Through the course of the afternoon, both teams showed similar contrast. It was a game of big plays, but it also included eight turnovers (four by each team). In the end, Pittsburgh turned two thefts into field goals and kept the Chargers from capitalizing on Steelers' mistakes. Mike Tomczak hit Charles Johnson for a 46-yard gain on his first pass of the afternoon to set up the game's first points - a 49-yard field goal by Norm Johnson. In the third quarter, a Hastings fumbled punt return gave the Chargers new life at the Pittsburgh 27-yard line. A 25-yard John Carney field goal made the score 13-3. Chad Brown and Jason Gildon each sacked Sean Salisbury twice. Brown also forced a fumble to set up the Steelers' final field goal. But the defense wasn't done. With San Diego poised at the Steelers 5-yard line, Myron Bell forced a Leonard Russell fumble to preserve a 16-3 win. Cowher joined Chuck Knox who led the Rams to five straight playoff seasons from 1973-77, and Paul Brown who guided the Cleveland Browns to six consecutive playoff seasons from 1950-55.

For the 3rd straight year the Steelers found themselves in a season finale that meant more to the opponent than to Pittsburgh. And for the 3rd straight year the Steelers have taken that meaningless game to the wire. The Panthers scored on their opening possession and maintained a 7-0 lead heading into the 2nd quarter. An intentional grounding call on Mike Tomczak gave the Panthers a safety and fired up the home team. Darren Perry made it a ball game with two forced fumbles on Carolina's next two possessions. Perry's second FF, on the Panthers seven-yard line, led to an Andre Hastings touchdown reception. Norm Johnson executed a successful on-side kick. But Kordell Stewart, in relief of Tomczak, threw an interception. After a defensive stand, the Steelers lined up at their own 20-yard line and Stewart ran into the NFL record books with an 80-yard touchdown run. It was the longest scoring run by a quarterback in NFL history. The Steelers carried a 14-9 lead in to the locker room. The Panthers relied on the leg of John Kasay, who hit from 35 and 30 yards, to take a 15-14 advantage into the 4th quarter. Carolina added a third Kasay field goal to go up 18-14. But the feisty Steelers wouldn't quit as the defense allowed the Panthers just 2 yards in the 4th quarter on 2 possessions. Pittsburgh marched from their 41-yard line to the Panthers six, before a 4th-down pass fell short. They took the ball for the final time and advanced to the 1-yard line. A Brenden Stai false-start penalty moved the ball back the Panthers six, where a Stewart interception ended the final drive with 29 seconds remaining.

STEELERS 42, INDIANAPOLIS COLTS 14

December 29 at Pittsburgh, 58,078 (2:52)

The Steelers overcame two first-half turnovers to score the most points in Steelers playoff history and the team's most decisive postseason win in 18 years. The team scored the game's first 13 points and final 29, with a ground attack that ranked fourth in Steelers postseason history. The Steelers took a 10-0 lead with a Norm Johnson field goal and Kordell Stewart touchdown that was set up by a Jahine Arnold 31-yard punt return. Pittsburgh added a 50-yard Johnson field goal to start the second quarter. Then a Colts team forced to punt on their first five possessions found life when CB Eugene Daniel returned a Mike Tomczak pass 59 yards for a touchdown. On the Steelers next drive, a pass deflected off of Kirk Botkin's shoulder pads and into the hands of S Ray McElroy. Four plays later Jim Harbaugh found Aaron Bailey for a nine-yard TD strike to give Indy a one-point half-time lead. Pittsburgh stole the momentum back on the opening drive of the second half. Starting from its own nine-yard line, the Steelers marched 91 yards in 16 plays while consuming 9:30 off the clock. The drive ended with a Jerome Bettis touchdown and a Stewart to John Farquhar two-point conversion. The Steelers offense churned out 228 yards in the second half, while the defense held the Colts to 22 second-half yards and 2 first downs. Pittsburgh added touchdown runs by Bettis, Jon Witman and Stewart in the fourth quarter to seal the win. Witman's 31-yard rushing TD was his first NFL touchdown and longest postseason TD run in Steelers history. Five rushing TD's was a single-game postseason record. It was the fourth time in Steeler playoff history they had a 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver in a game. The Steelers' 42 points was their highest point total in the postseason.
