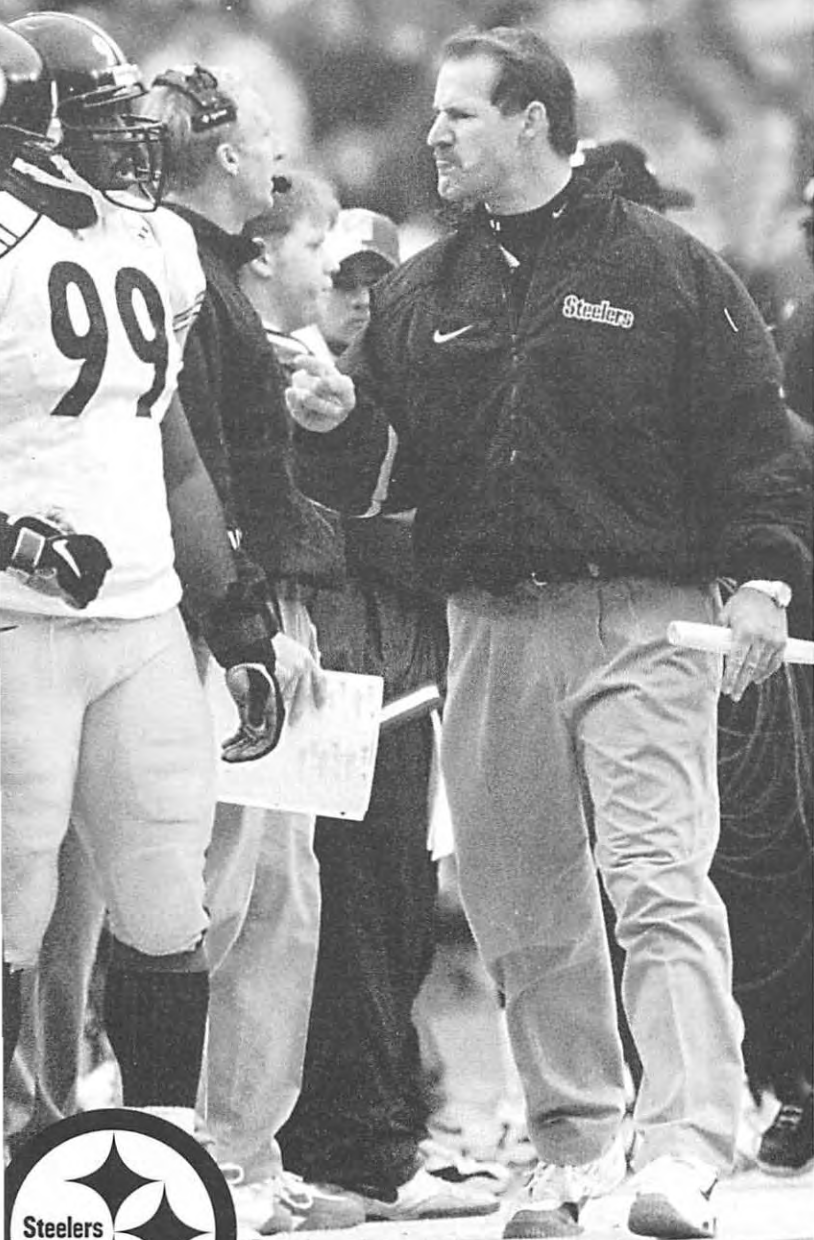

BILL COWHER

Head Coach

Bill Cowher, 41, replaced legendary Hall of Fame coach Chuck Noll in 1992, and began to carve his own niche in the NFL and the Steelers history books.

In 1997 Cowher joined the famed Paul Brown with his sixth straight trip to the playoffs in his sixth season as the team's head coach. Cowher's regular-season winning percentage (64-32, .667) ties Green Bay's Mike Holmgren as the best among the NFL's active coaches

with more than one season of experience, while his career record 69-38 (.645) ranks second to Holmgren (73-36, .670).

Cowher earned his 50th regular-season win Nov. 3, 1996 in his 73rd game to become the eighth-fastest coach in NFL history to reach 50 wins. He also moved into second in team victories behind Noll with 57 wins during his fifth season. Last season, Cowher surpassed Ray Parker's 105 games for the second-most games (107) as the Steelers' head coach. Only Noll (366 games) guided the Steelers for a longer period.

Under Cowher's guidance, the Steelers have featured a trademark running attack and a solid aggressive defense. During his six seasons as head coach, the team has averaged a league-leading 135 rushing yards a game and stands fifth with an average of 331 yards a game in total offense. In that same period, the offense churned out 48 100-yard rushing games—second only to Detroit's 51—and gained more than 12,000 yards rushing (12,969) to second-ranked Buffalo (11,886).

Cowher has built a defense that mirrors his fiery attitude. In the 96 regular-season games since becoming head coach, the defense has allowed an average of 95 rushing yards a game and 192 yards passing. Their average total defense of 283 yards a game ranks second in the NFL, just two yards a game behind league-leading Dallas. During that same period, Pittsburgh has allowed only 12 running backs to surpass the 100-yard mark and ranks third in the NFL with only seven 300-yard passing games allowed.

The elements heading into 1997 didn't favor the Steelers. Ten key players departed from the previous season. A new defensive coordinator was hired. A first-year quarterback took control of the offense. Nevertheless, the Steelers overcame these obstacles to post an 11-5 record, and Cowher led his team to their third home AFC Championship game in four seasons. The Steelers' season ended with a 24-21 loss to the eventual-Super Bowl Champion Denver Broncos.

While the 1996 outcome didn't compare to the Super Bowl appearance of the previous season, it might have been one of the best coaching jobs of Cowher's young career. For the second straight season, Cowher was forced to overcome losses of key starting personnel on a team that already featured a re-tooled offense. During the course of the season, the Steelers had 14 starters miss 64 starts due to injury. Those adjustments forced Cowher to play 40 different starters throughout the season.

Despite this adversity, Cowher led the Steelers to their fifth consecutive playoff berth and their fourth AFC Central title in five seasons.

In 1995, at the age of 38, the Pittsburgh-area native became the youngest head coach to lead his team to a Super Bowl. Along the way, Cowher's team captured their third AFC Central Division title in four years, made their fourth straight playoff appearance, and won the Steelers' first AFC title since 1979.

The Steelers' 11-5 regular-season record was the second best in the AFC which exceeded the expectations of most. In the offseason, the team lost seven veterans through free agency and trades. They had to play four games without starting quarterback Neil O'Donnell and almost the entire season without 1994's starting cornerbacks Deon Figures and Rod Woodson, a perennial All-Pro. In addition, linebacker Chad Brown missed six games after a phenomenal start.

Despite the setbacks, Cowher was able to rally his team from a near-disastrous 3-4 start to an NFL-best eight-game winning streak and a bye in the first round of the playoffs. This was accomplished with a major change in both offensive and defensive strategies, as the Steelers made key adjustments to compensate for their personnel losses.

The 1995 Steelers led the AFC in scoring with 407 points and set eight new offensive team records. They led the NFL in time of possession (an average of 32:36). On defense, they established new team marks for fewest yards allowed rushing and fewest yards per game rushing (82.6/game). Their 22 interceptions were second most in the NFL.

Cowher was introduced as the Steelers' head coach on January 21, 1992, 26 days after the retirement of Hall of Fame coach Chuck Noll. At the age of 34, Cowher was two years younger than Noll was upon becoming the Steelers' head coach in 1969.

Cowher returned to his hometown following seven years as an assistant under Marty Schottenheimer in Cleveland and Kansas City. His appointment as the Steelers' head coach immediately followed a three-year stint as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for the Chiefs.

Cowher has 18 years of NFL experience, including five as a player, seven as an assistant coach and six as a head coach. In his 13 years of coaching, Cowher has never been associated with a team that posted a losing record. In fact, in 12 of the 13 seasons he has been a coach, Cowher's team has advanced to the playoffs.

In his first year as head coach, Cowher was selected the 1992 National Football League's Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and *The Sporting News*. Cowher was also named Pittsburgh's Man of the Year in Sports by the Dapper Dan Club. He directed the Steelers to their first AFC Central Division crown in eight years with an 11-5 record, which was the team's best mark since they last won a Super Bowl in 1979. One of four AFC teams to win 11 games in 1992, the Steelers shared the best record in the conference as Cowher became one of only 12 coaches in NFL history to win 11 games in his first season as head coach.

The 1993 Steelers started slowly at 0-2, but six wins in the next seven games brought the team to a 6-3 mark and first place in the AFC Central division. On the final week-end of the regular season the Steelers claimed the final AFC wild-card berth after winning three of the last five games. Offensively, the team finished with the exact same AFC rankings as the previous year, but it improved from 21st to 13th in NFL

passing rankings. The defense jumped from eighth to first in AFC total defense rankings, and from 17th to third in NFL run defense.

Cowher began his coaching career in 1985 with the Cleveland Browns. At age 28, he was the league's second-youngest assistant coach. He served on Schottenheimer's staff as the Browns' special teams coach in 1985-86 and secondary coach in 1987-88. As secondary coach, Cowher's 1987 group produced 23 interceptions to tie for third in the AFC, while in 1988 the Cleveland defense ranked fourth overall in the conference. The following year Cowher joined Schottenheimer on the Kansas City coaching staff.

In 1989, Cowher's first season as a 32-year-old defensive coordinator, the Kansas City defense led the AFC and ranked second in the NFL in total defense. The following year the unit led the league in three categories with 60 sacks, 25 fumbles recovered and 45 takeaways. In 1991 the Chiefs ranked third in the conference and fifth overall in the NFL en route to a 10-6 finish and a wild card playoff berth.

A former linebacker and special teams standout, Cowher enjoyed a five-year NFL playing career with the Browns (1980-82) and the Philadelphia Eagles (1983-84). He signed with Philadelphia in 1979 as an undrafted free-agent rookie, but was the last linebacker waived in training camp after playing in three preseason games. The following year he signed with Cleveland and earned a roster spot, playing in all 16 games including two starts at inside linebacker.

Cowher sat out the 1981 campaign after suffering a season-ending knee injury in the third preseason game. Returning in 1982 as special teams captain, he started at outside linebacker in two games while playing in all nine contests.

Cowher was traded to Philadelphia prior to the start of the 1983 season (Aug. 21) for a ninth-round draft pick. He was selected the Eagles' most valuable special teams player that year and played in all 16 games. In 1984, a knee injury kept him out of all but four games and ended his career as a player. Cowher returned to Cleveland the following season and began his coaching career as a member of Schottenheimer's Browns staff.

Cowher grew up in the Crafton area west of Pittsburgh. He is a 1975 graduate of Carlynton High School, where he excelled in football, basketball and track. He was selected honorable mention All-State in football as a senior before moving on to North Carolina State, where he earned four letters and was a three-year starter at linebacker. As a senior in 1978, Cowher was selected team captain and Most Valuable Player after leading the defense in tackles for the second straight year. He also received the 1978 Cary Brewbaker Award as the school's outstanding defensive lineman as selected by the coaching staff. In 1979 Cowher graduated with a bachelor of science degree in education.

William Laird Cowher was born May 8, 1957 in Pittsburgh. It was at North Carolina State that Cowher met his wife, Kaye. Also a graduate of North Carolina State, Kaye and her twin sister Faye played professional basketball for the New York Stars of the Women's Professional Basketball League. The Cowhers have three daughters: Meagan Lyn (12), Lauren Marie (10), and Lindsay Morgan (7).

JIM HASLETT

Defensive Coordinator

Jim Haslett joined the Steelers as defensive coordinator Jan. 21, 1997, following one season in the same position for the New Orleans Saints.

He enters his sixth season in the NFL and his 11th year in coaching. At 42, the Pittsburgh native is the fourth-youngest defensive coordinator in the league.

Last year under Haslett, the Steelers were once again a dominating unit and finished first in the NFL in rushing defense (82.4 yards a game). During his tenure at New

Orleans, Haslett guided a young defensive unit that blossomed from a 25th and 22nd ranking in 1994 and 1995, respectively, to 13th in his first full season as defensive coordinator.

Prior to joining New Orleans, Haslett spent 1993-94 as linebackers coach with the Los Angeles Raiders, helping them to a Top 10 ranking in the NFL in total defense during both seasons. From 1991-92, Haslett was the defensive coordinator for the Sacramento Surge of the World League. In 1992, the Surge won the WLAF championship.

Haslett was the second-round draft choice of the Buffalo Bills in 1979. His playing career spanned nine seasons, including the first eight with the Bills. In 1979, Haslett was named All-Rookie and was the Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year. He was voted to the Pro Bowl in 1980 and 1981. Haslett concluded his NFL career in 1987 with the New York Jets.

A year later, Haslett assumed his initial coaching post, handling the linebackers at the University of Buffalo. He was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1989 and served in that capacity for two years.

A three-time All-American as a defensive end at Indiana University of Pennsylvania (1975-78), Haslett graduated with a bachelor's degree in elementary education.

Born Dec. 9, 1955 in Pittsburgh, Pa., Haslett and his wife, Beth, have two daughters, Kelsey and Elizabeth, and a son, Chase. The Hasletts live in Pittsburgh.



RAY SHERMAN

Offensive Coordinator

Ray Sherman is the newest member of the Steelers coaching staff, joining the team Feb. 23 as the offensive coordinator.

Known for his development of young quarterback talent, Sherman, 46, is regarded as one of the bright offensive minds in the NFL. He spent the past three seasons as the quarterbacks coach at Minnesota, where he helped groom quarterback Brad Johnson into one of the most-improved passers in the NFL.

In his first eight pro starts, Johnson, who replaced an injured Warren Moon, threw for more yards (1,899) than many of the elite quarterbacks in NFL history, including Dan Marino, Brett Favre, Joe Montana and John Elway. Additionally, only Marino (16) threw more TD passes in his first eight starts than Johnson, who had 15 TD passes.

During his nine seasons as an NFL assistant coach, Sherman has helped guide offenses that finished among the league's top 10 in points seven times and in total yardage six times. In his first year with the Vikings in '95, the offense set team season records and finished fourth in the league in total yards (5,938) and points (412).

Under Sherman in '95, Moon set a team season mark and tied a career high with 33 touchdown passes, which also were good for second in the NFL. He also led the league in completions (377) and placed third in the NFL in passing yards (4,228). Moon threw 193 consecutive passes without an interception in '95 to set a team record and establish a career-high. In addition he completed a career-best 12 straight passes against Tampa Bay (10/15).

As offensive coordinator for the New York Jets in '94, Sherman guided a unit that produced some of its best results in several seasons.

In three seasons (1991-93) with San Francisco, Sherman worked two seasons (1992-93) as wide receivers coach, and one year (1991) as running backs coach. Sherman served as the assistant head coach/offense with the Atlanta Falcons in 1990. Sherman began his pro coaching career as a running backs coach in 1988 and then wide receivers coach with the Houston Oilers (1989).

Prior to entering the NFL, Sherman held several college coaching jobs at Georgia (1986-87), Purdue (1982-85), California (1981), Wake Forest (1978-80) and Michigan State (1976-77). He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at San Jose State in '74, when the school went 8-3-1, its best mark since '49. He then joined California's staff as secondary coach in '75.

After two seasons (1969-70) as an All-America wide receiver at Laney Junior College in Oakland, Calif., Sherman played defensive back and wide receiver for two years (1971-72) at Fresno State.

Born Nov. 27, 1951, in Berkeley, Calif., Sherman starred at Oakland High School. He earned his degree in education from San Jose State in 1975. He and wife Yvette have three children: Ray II (8/29/88), Erica (7/20/91) and Alana (3/19/98).



MIKE ARCHER

Linebackers Coach

Mike Archer joined the Steelers March 6, 1996 to coach the linebackers, following 19 years of coaching at the college level.

Archer, 45, previously served as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for Kentucky and was their assistant head coach in 1995. He joined UK in 1993 following two years as linebackers coach at Virginia (1991-92).

Prior to his Kentucky appointment, Archer served as the head football coach at Louisiana State University from 1987-90. He led the Tigers to a 27-18-1 record with appearances in the 1987 Gator Bowl and 1989 Hall of Fame Bowl, and one Southeastern Conference Championship in 1988. As the nation's youngest Division I-A head football coach in 1987, Archer, then 34, led the Tigers to a 10-1-1 record and 30-13 Gator Bowl victory over South Carolina. A year later, Archer directed the Tigers to the SEC title with a 6-1 league record and finished 8-4 overall. In 1990, he was named coach for the East-West Shrine Game.

Archer, a native of State College, Pennsylvania, lettered three seasons (1973-75) in football at Miami (Fla.) where he started at free safety for two seasons and also punted. As a senior, Archer was named UM's Football Scholar-Athlete of the Year. He graduated from Miami in 1975 and began his coaching career as a graduate assistant for the Hurricanes in 1976 and served under Lou Saban from 1977-78.

Howard Schnellenberger named Archer defensive backs coach in 1979. During Archer's five seasons, the Hurricanes posted a 41-16 record, which included a 31-30 Orange Bowl victory over Nebraska and subsequent 1983 national championship.

Archer joined Bill Arnsparger as defensive backfield coach for LSU in 1984, and was named defensive coordinator 1985-86. During that period, LSU had a 26-8-2 record with appearances in three bowl games — 1985 Sugar, 1986 Liberty and 1987 Sugar — and the 1986 Southeastern Conference championship.

Born July 26, 1953, Archer and his wife Barbara have two children, Jeffrey Matthew and Betsy Anne.



DAVID CULLEY

Wide Receivers Coach

David Culley brought 18 years of coaching experience to the Steelers Feb. 13, 1996, when Bill Cowher appointed him wide receivers coach.

For 16 seasons as a college coach, Culley tutored quarterbacks, running backs, wide receivers and also served as an offensive coordinator.

In Culley's first season with the Steelers, he guided receivers Andre Hastings and Charles Johnson to their best seasons in the NFL. Johnson finished with his first

1,000-yard season and set a personal best with 60 pass receptions. With the loss of All-Pro receiver Yancey Thigpen, Culley will be charged once again with developing a young, talented receiving corps led by veteran Charles Johnson and Courtney Hawkins, whom Culley coached when he was a member of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Before joining the Steelers, Culley coached wide receivers for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1994-1995, where he molded the team's young group of receivers.

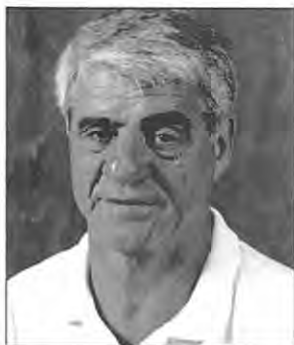
Prior to joining the Bucs, Culley served as the receivers coach at Texas A&M for R.C. Slocum from 1991-93 during which time the Aggies dominated the Southwest Conference.

Culley was offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach for Texas-El Paso from 1989-90. While with the Miners, Culley coached Victor Bailey (Eagles) and Reggie Barrett (Seahawks). From 1985-88, he was the quarterbacks coach at Southwestern Louisiana after spending 1984 tutoring the quarterbacks and wide receivers at Western Kentucky.

In 1983, Culley was the wide receivers coach at Tennessee-Chattanooga. He served as quarterbacks/running backs coach for Middle Tennessee in 1982. From 1979-81, Culley was Vanderbilt's wide receivers coach after breaking into the coaching ranks in 1978 as running backs coach at Austin Peay.

Culley was a quarterback at Vanderbilt where he earned his bachelor of science in health and physical education.

Born Sept. 17, 1955 in Sparta, Tenn., Culley and his wife Carolyn, live in Pittsburgh with son Monty (9/5/74) and daughter Jessie (10/17/90).



DICK HOAK

Running Backs Coach

Dick Hoak, the longest tenured coach in Steelers history, is in his 37th year with the team and his 27th consecutive season as a Steelers assistant coach.

He served as offensive backfield coach for 20 seasons under Chuck Noll, before being named running backs coach by Bill Cowher on Jan. 27, 1992, the only coach retained from the previous Steelers' staff.

During Hoak's six seasons under Cowher, the team has averaged a league-leading 130 yards a game.

Pittsburgh has been the league's leading-rushing team in two of the past four years (1994 and 1997) and has been ranked in the top five in four of the past six seasons. In 1996, the team was second in rushing.

Hoak, 58, joined the Steelers' staff in 1972 under Noll after one year of coaching high school football and just two years after retiring from an outstanding playing career for the Steelers.

The Steelers' seventh-round draft choice out of Penn State in 1961, Hoak spent 10 seasons in the Pittsburgh backfield. He led the Steelers in rushing three times (1965, 1968, 1969) and played in one Pro Bowl (1969) after ranking fourth in the NFL in 1968 with 858 rushing yards.

When he retired following the 1970 season, Hoak had gained 3,965 rushing yards, to rank second in team history and today stands fourth behind Hall of Famers Franco Harris and John Henry Johnson, and Frank Pollard.

Hoak also currently ranks ninth in Steelers history for career touchdowns with 33, is tied for fourth in rushing touchdowns with 25, and second in rushing attempts with 1,132. In addition to his rushing totals, Hoak had 146 receptions for 1,452 yards and eight touchdowns in his career.

As a standout running back and quarterback for Penn State from 1958-60, Hoak was named his team's MVP as a senior. He graduated in 1961 with a bachelor's degree in social studies.

Born Dec. 8, 1939 in Jeannette, Pa., Hoak and his wife Lynn have three children, daughters Kelly and Katie, and son Richard. The Hoaks live in Greensburg.



TIM LEWIS

Defensive Backs Coach

Tim Lewis enters his fourth season as the Steelers' defensive backs coach.

Lewis, a standout player at Pitt, was selected 11th overall in the 1983 draft by the Green Bay Packers and was the second defensive back chosen that year. He returned to Pitt to coach defensive backs in 1993 and joined the Steelers on Feb. 7, 1995.

Lewis is no stranger to adversity. He'll be charged with molding new starters at cornerback this season for the second consecutive season. His prize project for 1997 was rookie Chad Scott, who by the end of the season developed into one of the top cornerbacks in the NFL. Lewis may lose Scott for the entire 1998 season because of a knee injury.

Lewis played 52 games for the Packers. He ended his career with 16 thefts and twice led or shared team honors for interceptions. His 99-yard interception return for a touchdown versus the Los Angeles Rams in 1984 still stands as a Packers' team record.

After suffering a career-ending neck injury in the fourth game of the 1986 season, Lewis entered the coaching ranks in 1987 as a graduate assistant at Texas A&M, where he remained for two years under his former college coach Jackie Sherrill. Three of his students found NFL success, including Dallas' 1992 first-round draft selection Kevin Smith.

Lewis coached defensive backs at Southern Methodist in 1989-92. His 1992 Mustang secondary led the Southwest Conference in pass defense, allowing just 182.3 yards passing per game. Starting cornerbacks Marcello Simmons (1993 4th-round, Cincinnati) and Cary Brabham (1993 free agent, Raiders) both headed to the NFL.

Lewis returned to the University of Pittsburgh in 1993 to coach the Panthers' secondary for two seasons before joining the Steelers.

He played for Pittsburgh from 1979 through 1982 and was a starting cornerback for the Panthers in 1981 and 1982. Lewis was named an NEA All-American in 1982. He was also selected to the Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine Bowl that year.

Lewis received his bachelor's degree in economics from Pittsburgh in 1983.

Born Dec. 18, 1961 in Quakertown, Lewis and his wife Shawn reside in the North Hills.



JOHN MITCHELL

Defensive Line Coach

John Mitchell joined the Steelers as defensive line coach on Jan. 31, 1994, following three seasons coaching the defensive line for the Cleveland Browns.

Mitchell is in his 24th season of coaching, including 15 years at the college level and two in the United States Football League. This is his seventh season as an NFL coach.

A former All-America defensive end for Alabama, Mitchell's early years in coaching were spent studying

under two of college football's greatest coaches.

Mitchell began his coaching career in 1973 as defensive line coach under Paul "Bear" Bryant at Alabama. After four years at Alabama (1973-76), Mitchell spent six seasons as defensive line coach at Arkansas (1977-82) on Lou Holtz's staff.

In 1983, Mitchell made his first move to the professional level. From 1983-85 he served as defensive line coach for the USFL Birmingham Stallions. He returned to the college ranks in 1986 as defensive ends coach at Temple.

Mitchell began a four-year stint in 1987 as linebackers coach at Louisiana State (1987-90). In his final season at Louisiana State, Mitchell was named defensive coordinator while continuing to coach the linebackers.

Mitchell, 47, joined the NFL ranks in 1991 with the Browns, where he tutored two Pro Bowl defensive tackles.

He played defensive end and was a two-time Junior College All-American at Eastern Arizona Junior College in 1969-70. Mitchell then transferred and played defensive end at Alabama from 1971-72.

Named All-America in 1972, Mitchell earned a bachelor's degree in social work in 1977.

Born Oct. 14, 1951 in Mobile, Ala., Mitchell and his wife Joyce live in Pittsburgh.



MIKE MULARKEY

Tight Ends Coach

Mike Mularkey, a former tight end for the Steelers from 1989-91, returned to Pittsburgh and joined Bill Cowher's staff as tight ends coach Feb. 8, 1996.

Prior to his Steelers' appointment, Mularkey, 36, was in charge of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' tight ends in 1995. He previously served as the team's quality control coach in 1994, where he was responsible for "breaking down" film of opponents and compiling coaching reports on their offensive and defensive tendencies. He

also assisted with tight ends and special teams.

In addition to his coaching responsibilities, Mularkey also served as the Buccaneers' director of player programs. In that role, he assisted players in continuing their education, advised them in offseason jobs and internships, provided financial education and offered family assistance.

Prior to joining the Buccaneers, Mularkey spent one year as the offensive line coach for Concordia (Minn.) College. He entered coaching after spending nine seasons in the NFL as a tight end, playing for the Minnesota Vikings from 1983-88 and the Pittsburgh Steelers from 1989-91. Originally a 1983 ninth-round draft choice of the San Francisco 49ers, Mularkey was waived prior to the season and was picked up by the Vikings. He joined the Steelers as a Plan B free agent. His career statistics included 102 receptions for 1,222 yards and nine touchdowns.

Mularkey attended the University of Florida and finished his Gator career with 55 receptions for 628 yards and three touchdowns. He has bachelor of science degrees in both kinesiology and sociology from the University of Minnesota.

Born Nov. 19, 1961 in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., Mularkey and his wife Betsy live in Pittsburgh with sons Patrick (2/15/86) and Shane (1/14/91).



KENT STEPHENSON

Offensive Line Coach

Kent Stephenson enters his 34th season of coaching, his 14th in the NFL and his seventh with the Steelers. He was named offensive line coach on Feb. 7, 1992, following seven years in the same capacity with the Seattle Seahawks.

Under Stephenson, the offensive line has developed into one of the best in the NFL. In 1995, the unit allowed 24 sacks during the season and just 21 in 1996. The Steelers also join Buffalo and Dallas as one of only three

teams to average more than 2,000 yards a season since 1992 and lead the NFL with an average of 131 yards rushing a game.

Four of Stephenson's players have earned Pro Bowl honors, including Dermontti Dawson, Carlton Haselrig and Duval Love. Two players, John Jackson and Will Wolford, were named alternates last season.

Stephenson's coaching career began in 1965 and includes 18 years at the college level and two in the USFL prior to his entering the NFL in 1985 with Seattle.

He coached at Wayne State from 1965-68 and spent the next 14 years at North Dakota (1969-71), Southern Methodist (1972-73), Iowa (1974-76), Oklahoma State (1977-78) and Kansas (1979-82).

Stephenson moved to the professional level in 1983 as offensive line coach of the USFL Michigan Panthers (1983-84). In 1983 the Panthers won the USFL Championship.

In 1985, Stephenson entered the NFL as the Seahawks' offensive line coach under Chuck Knox. He was there for the 1985-91 seasons before joining the Steelers.

Stephenson was an All-Conference selection as an offensive and defensive lineman at Northern Iowa. He graduated with a degree in history and physical education in 1965, and received his master's degree in education from Wayne State in 1966.

Born Feb. 4, 1942 in Anita, Iowa, Stephenson and his wife Shirley have two children, daughter Heidi and son Kyle.



RON ZOOK

Special Teams Coach

Ron Zook begins his third season as the Steelers' special teams coach after a distinguished 18-year coaching career at the collegiate level.

For five years, Zook served on the University of Florida coaching staff. He spent his last season as the associate head coach and defensive coordinator. From 1991-1993, Florida was the only SEC school to rank among the league's top four run defenses in all three seasons, rating second in 1993, fourth in 1992 and first in 1991.

They ranked fifth in the nation in 1991 and 1994.

Appointed special teams coordinator in 1994, Zook's 1994 special teams unit set a school record with five blocked punts, two of which were returned for touchdowns.

Before joining Florida, Zook coached defensive backs for Ohio State from 1988-90. He was defensive coordinator/assistant head coach for Virginia Tech in 1987, defensive backs coach for Tennessee from 1984-86, defensive coordinator for Kansas in 1983 and was the University of Cincinnati defensive coordinator from 1981-82. He began his collegiate coaching career as the defensive backs coach at Murray State from 1978-80.

Zook played defensive back for Miami of Ohio (1972-75), where he earned three letters and was selected team captain in 1975. During his playing career, Miami posted a 34-1-1 record from 1973-75, captured the Mid-American Conference title in each of those three seasons and won three bowl games.

Zook received his bachelor's degree in comprehensive science in 1976 and received his first coaching assignment at Orrville (Ohio) High that year, remaining through 1977. Zook has tutored several NFL players during his career, including first-round draft selections Vinny Clark (Green Bay, 1990) and Terry McDaniel (Raiders, 1987).

Born April 28, 1954 in Ashland, Ohio, Zook and his wife Denise have two daughters Jacquelyn (6/13/83) and Casey (10/9/86). The Zooks reside in Pittsburgh.



CHARLES BAILEY

Pro Personnel Coordinator

Charles Bailey begins his 10th season with the Steelers, his 18th in scouting, and his seventh as pro personnel coordinator.

He joined the Steelers in June of 1989 after eight years as an eastern scout with National Football Scouting. His responsibilities include the scouting of Steelers opponents in the NFL and evaluating pro players.

Louis Spanos is in his fifth season with the Steelers and his fourth year as an administrative assistant for the coaching staff.

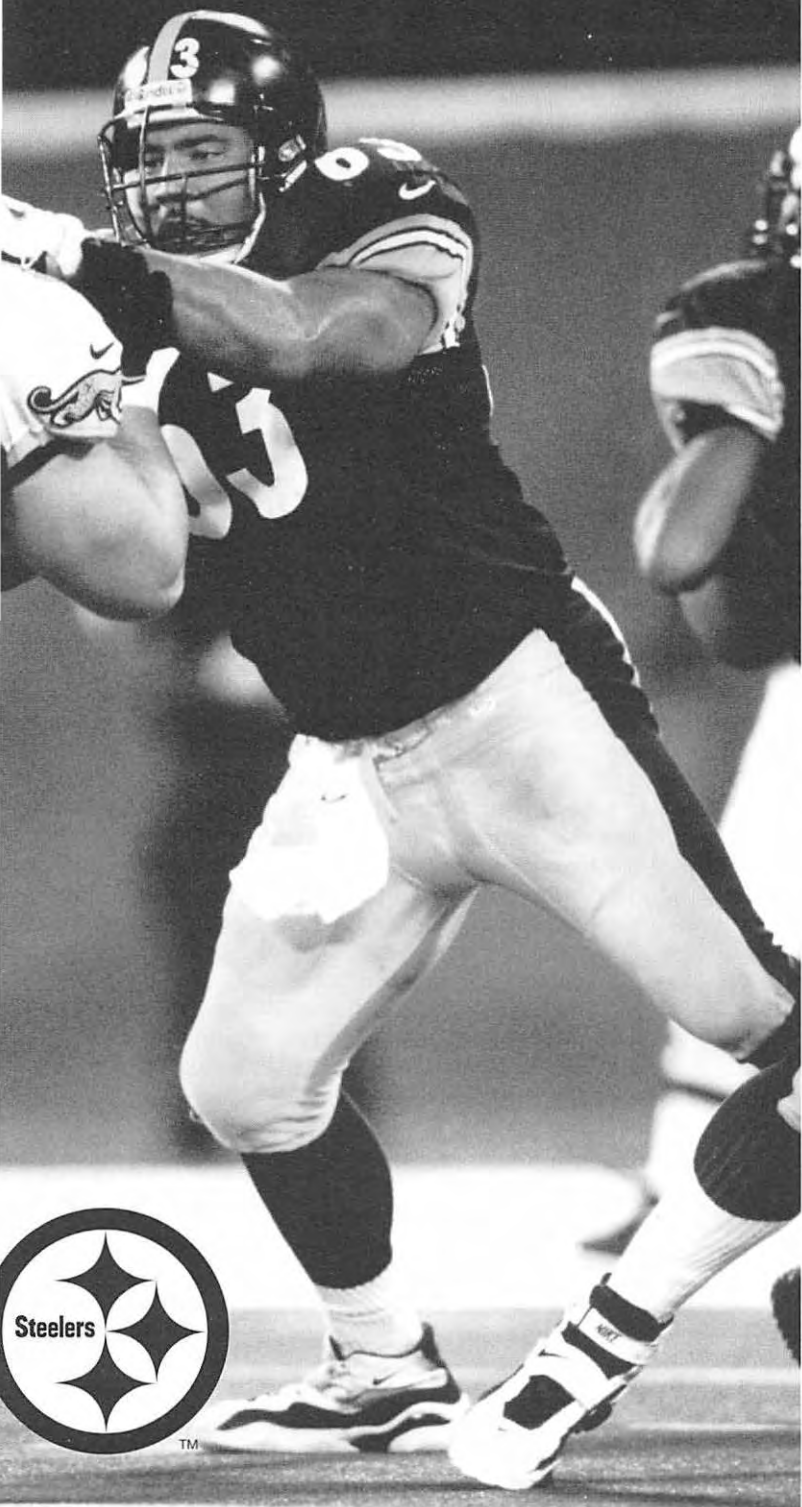
As an administrative assistant, Spanos helps mainly with the defense, but assists the entire coaching staff with video analysis and scouting of Steelers' opponents.

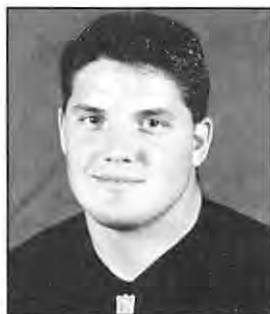

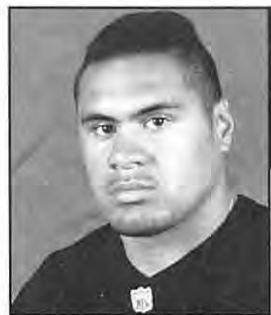

PITTSBURGH — The Pittsburgh Steelers never got their offense going as they fell to the visiting Dallas Cowboys 37-7 on opening day. The Cowboys built a 17-0 halftime advantage and led 37-0 after three quarters. Dallas outgained the Steelers, 248-93, in the first half, and 380-174, overall. Aikman threw for four touchdown passes, including two to wide receiver Michael Irvin. Anthony Miller and Daryl Johnston also caught touchdown passes for the Cowboys, who handed Pittsburgh its worst defeat since a 41-10 loss to Cincinnati in 1989, when the team was coached by Chuck Noll. Dallas added a 52-yard field goal by Richie Cunningham with two seconds left in the first half. The Cowboys turned two second-half Pittsburgh turnovers into 10 points. The Steelers'

only points came on a fourth-quarter touchdown strike from Kordell Stewart to Mark Bruener. Stewart completed 13 of 28 passes for 104 yards in his debut as starting quarterback. The Steelers defense limited the Cowboys to just 85 yards on the ground.

PITTSBURGH — The Steelers used what they do best to defeat the Washington Redskins 14-13...They rode the "Bus" to the endzone. The Steelers churned up 222 yards on the ground and had a sound stand from the defense. Will Blackwell returned the opening kickoff 35 yards. The Steelers took advantage of the field position and marched 61 yards in nine plays to take the early lead. The Redskins responded with three drives inside the 20-yard line. The first ended with Darren Perry's 27th career interception. The Redskins advanced to the 12-yard line in their next possession to add a field goal. The third resulted in a Levon Kirkland interception before the half. The Steelers' lead didn't last past the second-half kickoff. Brian Mitchell returned a Norm Johnson kick 97 yards to give Washington a 10-7 advantage. Scott Blanton extended the Washington lead by six points with a 28-yard field goal. On Pittsburgh's next possession, the "Bus" put the game away. The Steelers marched 72 yards in nine plays, relying on Bettis' six carries for 37 yards, including his one-yard touchdown plunge. The Redskins mounted a 14-play drive before being forced to punt. Then, in the closing minutes of the game, Chris Oldham hauled in a Gus Frerotte pass that was tipped by Jason Gildon to end Washington's efforts.

GAME NOTES: Pittsburgh's 222 yards rushing were the most by the offense since gaining 248 yards versus the St. Louis Rams (11/3/96)...The Steelers are 14-0 (12-0 regular-season) in the 90s when they rush for 200 or more yards. They are 71-4 in regular-season games since 1970 when they gain more than 200 yards (78-4 overall)...QB Kordell Stewart had his second-best rushing day of his career with 70 yards. His career-best is 102 yards at Carolina (12/22/96)...RB Jerome Bettis rushed for his 22nd career 100-yard game (11th as a Steeler)...His 134 yards were his most as a Steeler and his second-best career game...FS Darren Perry had his 27th career interception and is one shy of Jack Lambert for eighth place on the Steelers' all-time list...The last time the Steelers gave up a touchdown on a kickoff was on Nov. 11, 1996 against Cincinnati...K Norm Johnson's kickoff average was 71.0 yards, which was his second-best performance as a Steeler...The three interceptions by the defense were the most since the Steelers had four interceptions versus Buffalo (9/16/96) and tied a three-interception performance at Cincinnati (11/10/96).

JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS 30, STEELERS 21

73,016 (2:58)



JACKSONVILLE, Fla. —The Pittsburgh Steelers lost a heartbreaker under the Monday Night lights in Jacksonville. A defensive penalty and a bad snap contributed to a 30-21 loss before a record crowd of 73,016 in Alltel Stadium. The Steelers, who trailed 17-7 at halftime, rallied to take a 21-20 lead in the fourth quarter before falling short. The teams traded long drives in the first quarter with scores by Jaguars' Natrone Means and Pittsburgh's Kordell Stewart. Quarterback Mark Brunell, making his first start of the season, threw for 181 yards in the first half and guided the Jaguars on two more scoring drives. Brunell found Jimmy Smith in the end zone for an 11-yard strike and kicker Mike Hollis added a 20-yard field goal. Stewart found Yancey Thigpen at the end of an 80-yard drive to open the second half to pull within three points. Bettis, who finished with 114 yards on the day, ran the ball seven times for 44 yards on the drive. Jacksonville widened their lead to six points with a 45-yard Hollis field goal. The Steelers used a 52-yard Will Blackwell kick return to set up the go-ahead touchdown. Using good field position, a 19-yard run by Bettis and a 26-yard Charles Johnson reception, the

Steelers pulled ahead, 21-20. Jacksonville then began their march. Twice it seemed the Jaguars were stopped, but Steelers misfortune kept the drive alive. A near interception by Randy Fuller was dislodged by teammate Darren Perry. A personal foul by Nolan Harrison kept the Jaguars moving after a third-down failure. The end result was an eventual 27-yard game-winning field goal. Stewart brought the Steelers to the Jaguars' 22-yard line for one last chance. But a Norm Johnson field goal was blocked and returned for a touchdown as time ran out.

PITTSBURGH —The Pittsburgh Steelers sacked Tennessee quarterback Steve McNair seven times and Greg Lloyd and Jason Gildon combined for a 73-yard fumble return for a touchdown as the Steelers defeated the Oilers 37-24. The Oilers challenged the Steelers to pass and Kordell Stewart responded with his best game as a pro. He passed for 244 yards and figured in all but one of the Steelers four touchdowns. Stewart found Will Blackwell for 46 yards on a third-down play. Then on third-down and seven yards, Stewart rushed for his first score. The Steelers next possession led to a 48-yard Norm Johnson field goal. The two teams exchanged turnovers to start the second quarter, then Pittsburgh exploded with 21 points that began with the Gildon return. Stewart used a 44-yard pass to Yancey Thigpen and an 18-yard touchdown reception by Mark Bruener to give the Steelers a 24-3 lead. McNair was intercepted by Levon Kirkland on the Oilers' next play and Pittsburgh turned it into seven more points to take a commanding 31-3 advantage. The Oilers, who entered the game as the NFL's top running team, only had two running plays in the second half. The teams traded field goals in the third quarter, before Pittsburgh built a 37-9 lead with Johnson's third kick. Tennessee mounted TD drives of 73 and 65 yards to close the scoring.

BALTIMORE, Md. — The Pittsburgh Steelers were down 21-0 as a result of three Kordell Stewart interceptions, before rallying to match the greatest comeback in team history. Vinny Testaverde converted the Steelers' miscues into scoring passes of 22 yards to Eric Green and 24 yards to Brian Kinchen and a one-yard Bam Morris run. Chris Oldham sparked the team when he sacked Testaverde and forced a fumble 6½ minutes before halftime. Joel Steed recovered the ball and Stewart ended the series with a one-yard touchdown run. The Ravens commanded a 24-7 halftime lead, but Will Blackwell cut the margin in half with a 97-yard kick return for a touchdown. The Steelers defense kept Baltimore off the board and the Steelers added a 90-yard drive and a Charles Johnson reception to pull within three points to close the third quarter. Mike Vrabel forced a second Testaverde fumble at the Ravens' 23-yard line. Stewart found Mark Bruener for a four-yard pitch to take a 28-24 lead. Pittsburgh used a 63-yard Yancey Thigpen third-down reception to construct an 89-yard drive that ended with Johnson's second touchdown. Baltimore, aided by a Donnell Woolford pass interference call on third down, responded with a Derrick Alexander touchdown. The game stood at 35-32 in Pittsburgh's favor before Kordell Stewart sealed the victory with a 74-yard touchdown run just

after the two-minute mark. The Ravens managed just 131 yards of offense in the second half, with 69 coming after the Steelers had scored 28 unanswered points and taken a 35-24 lead.

PITTSBURGH — The Pittsburgh Steelers overcame six turnovers, injuries to several key players and a 10-point deficit to pull off a 24-22 win against the winless Indianapolis Colts. Steelers' miscues kept the Colts within striking distance to the end as Cary Blanchard sent a 42-yard field goal wide left with 2:44 remaining. It was his first miss in a team-record 14 tries. The Colts came back from 11 points down with 7:31 left, but the Steelers defense stopped two chances at a two-point conversion. The first ended with a Darren Perry interception that was negated by a holding call. The second attempt ended with a Chris Oldham pass defense. Jerome Bettis, who had his second-best career day with 164 yards, lost his second fumble to give the Colts the ball at the Steelers' 23-yard line. The stout defensive stand with stops behind the line of scrimmage by Greg Lloyd and Levon Kirkland pushed the Colts backwards before the failed field-goal attempt. The Steelers moved the ball and ground out the clock, but the Colts had one more chance with 18 seconds remaining, but their efforts fell short.

GAME 8 — OCTOBER 26 at PITTSBURGH STEELERS 23, JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS 17 57,011 (3:24)



PITTSBURGH — The Steelers buried the Jaguars in overtime with a "shovel," en route to their fifth consecutive win. Jerome Bettis caught a Kordell Stewart shovel pass and raced 17 yards for the game-winning touchdown 5:47 into sudden death. The victory was the fourth consecutive time the Steelers overcame a double-digit lead by their opponent. Pittsburgh was behind 10-0 at halftime after a touchdown catch by Willie Jackson and a Mike Hollis field goal. The Steelers pulled within three points when Stewart tossed Courtney Hawkins a 28-yard rainbow pass. The defense solidified and held Jacksonville on a four-play goal-line stand and kept the Jaguars out of the endzone. The Steelers marched from their two-yard line with the aide of three Yancey Thigpen first-down catches. Stewart closed the drive with his seventh rushing touchdown on the season to give Pittsburgh its first lead. A Steelers' victory was in sight, but a Bettis fumble on Pittsburgh's 17-yard line put the Jaguars back in the game. It took Brunell just four plays to capitalize with a Pete Mitchell touchdown reception. Pittsburgh fell two yards shy of the end zone on the next possession, but Norm Johnson tied the game at 17 with a 19-yard field goal. Josh Miller used a career-long 72-yard punt to pin Jacksonville at their 10-yard line with just over a minute remaining. A Chad Scott interception ended the regulation play to send the game into overtime.

season-high seven receptions for 71 yards...K Norm Johnson tied Minnesota's Eddie Murray with an NFL record 238 consecutive PAT's...CB Cornell Lake made his second forced fumble in two games...WR Curtis Marsh made his first reception as a Steeler for 8 yards...P Josh Miller set a career mark with his 72-yard punt in the fourth quarter. KANSAS CITY, Kan.—The Steelers, who had come from behind to win four consecutive games, couldn't hold on to a first quarter lead and fell 13-10 to the Chiefs. Pittsburgh jumped out to a 10-0 first-quarter lead, scoring on its second and third possessions in the quarter. Kordell Stewart found Courtney Hawkins at the 15-yard line and Hawkins broke two tackles on his way to the end zone for a 44-yard score. The Steelers moved inside the Chiefs 10-yard line, before settling for a 27-yard Norm Johnson field goal and a 10-0 advantage. The Chiefs owned the second quarter, scoring on all three of their possessions. Kansas City held the ball for more than 11 minutes in the quarter...The Chiefs scored with two Pete Stoyanovich field goals then got the go-ahead touchdown after a Stewart interception. Jerome Woods returned the theft almost to mid-field. Marcus Allen hit Danan Hughes on a halfback option for the 14-yard score, giving Kansas City a 13-10 lead. The defense held the Chiefs on a goal-line stand at the three-yard line. Levon Kirkland forced a Kimble Anders fumble to end Kansas City's next drive. Neither drive yielded points. With just under four minutes remaining in the game the

Steelers faced a fourth down and two yards, decided to punt. A Greg Lloyd penalty sustained the Chiefs drive. Rich Gannon, who replaced an injured Elvis Grbac, put the game away with a 13-yard scramble for a first down as the Chiefs let the clock run out.

Bengals' quarterback Jeff Blake lost three fumbles to end drives to Pittsburgh's 39-, 42- and 26-yard lines. Pittsburgh converted the first fumble into a 34-yard Norm Johnson field goal. The Steelers drove 85 yards in 6:50 to add three more points by Johnson to close the half. The Steelers mounted an 84-yard, ball-control drive to make the score 13-0 midway through the third quarter. Kordell Stewart found Yancey Thigpen for a 34-yard gain, before hitting him in the end zone on a 20-yard score. The Bengals avoided a shutout with a 25-yard Doug Pelfrey field goal late in the third quarter. Pittsburgh came right back with their second touchdown of the night, a five-yarder to Mark Bruener.

PHILADELPHIA — Struggling through another first half, the Steelers had a fumble, an interception and two punts. They managed just two Norm Johnson field goals while the Eagles took an 11-point lead into the locker room for halftime. Philadelphia increased its lead to 20-6 on their first drive in the third quarter, before the Steelers offense got in gear. Jerome Bettis accounted for 35 yards of a 66-yard drive, including a 19-yard touchdown reception that pulled Pittsburgh within seven points. The Eagles were able to take advantage of a pass interference call on Donnell Woolford to move the ball to Pittsburgh's 15-yard line and added a Chris Boniol field goal. The Steelers crossed mid-field on their next two possessions, but could not capitalize as one drive ended on downs and the second on Stewart's third interception. Stewart hit Will Blackwell with 10 ticks left on the clock to make the score, 23-20. An onside kick failed and the Eagles ran out the clock.

GAME 13 — NOVEMBER 30 at TEMPE STEELERS 26, ARIZONA CARDINALS 20 66,341 (3:11)



TEMPE, Ariz. —The Steelers rode the "Bus" to a victory in Sun Devil Stadium when Jerome Bettis rushed for three scores, including a 10-yard game-clinching TD with 9:26 to play in overtime. After forcing the first of four straight punts, the Steelers marched 67 yards in 13 plays on their opening drive, while erasing over seven minutes from the clock. The drive ended with a two-yard touchdown run by Bettis, who had his ninth 100-yard game of the year (36-142). The Cardinals scored their first points on a Joe Nedney field goal midway through the second quarter, but Pittsburgh held a 10-3 advantage at halftime. The score was tied at 10 and again at 17 during the third quarter before Norm Johnson added his second field goal at the top of the fourth. With 4:20 remaining, Arizona tied the game at 20-20. After a bold fourth-down conversion, Pittsburgh's next drive stalled. The Cardinals took possession with 1:45 on the clock and advanced from their 13-yard line to the Pittsburgh 25. A Nolan Harrison sack moved Arizona back to the 28-yard line, and Nedney's potential game-winning kick into a 46-yarder that sailed wide right. Arizona won the coin toss in overtime but punted after five plays. Yancey Thigpen, who left the game earlier due to injury, made catches of 22 and 12 yards before yielding to the "Bus." Bettis finished the drive with his third score.

PITTSBURGH — The Steelers got their win the hard way, overcoming a 14-point second-quarter deficit. Kordell Stewart threw three touchdown passes and ran for two more scores, leading the Steelers to their seventh consecutive home win, 35-24, over the Broncos. The Broncos turned a George Jones fumble into a 37-yard Rod Smith touchdown reception. Stewart connected with Yancey Thigpen for a 33-yard score, but Denver came right back with a 72-yard drive that ended with a Terrell Davis rushing touchdown. It was the first rushing touchdown allowed in Three Rivers Stadium in 60 quarters. Denver scored on their third straight possession when Rod Smith added a second touchdown reception to extend the Denver lead to 21-7. Stewart tossed a 69-yard pass to Thigpen to pull the Steelers within 21-14 with 6:35 left in the second quarter. With just 65 seconds left in the first half, Stewart capped an eight-play 50-yard drive with a 21-yard pass to Thigpen to tie the score, 21-21. Denver regained the lead on the first possession of the third quarter when Jason Elam's 35-yard field goal capped a 14-play, 53-yard drive. On the next possession, the Steelers marched 78 yards in 11 plays with Stewart's four-yard run up the middle giving them the lead for good, 28-24, with 2:16 left in the third. Pittsburgh marched to the Denver four-yard line before Darrien Gordon intercepted Stewart in the end zone. Denver's next possession ended with a 53-yard field goal attempt. Taking advantage of the short field, Pittsburgh put the game away with Stewart's nine-yard run to cap the scoring

with 1:57 remaining. Stewart kept the nine-play, 57-yard drive going when he ran 19 yards up the right sideline to the Denver 15 on a fourth-and-two.

GAME 15 — DECEMBER 13 at FOXBORO STEELERS 24, NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS 21 60,013 (3:16)



FOXBORO, Mass. — Ten days shy of the 25th anniversary of the "Immaculate Reception", the Steelers used an equally exciting play to overcome improbable odds to defeat New England in overtime, 24-21. Pittsburgh, which trailed 14-0 in the second quarter, faced a 21-13 deficit late in the fourth quarter when Kevin Henry intercepted Drew Bledsoe at the Patriots 41-yard line. Henry was getting dragged down at the 18 when he lateraled to fellow defensive end Orpheus Roye, who took it into the end zone with two minutes remaining. But officials ruled that Henry's lateral was an illegal forward pass, giving Pittsburgh possession at the 18. On 4th-and-7, Stewart threw along the right sideline for Yancey Thigpen, who made a diving grab while barely keeping both feet in bounds at the 4 with a minute to go. Two plays later, Stewart rolled right and tossed a one-yard touchdown pass to tight end Mark Bruener, cutting the deficit to 21-19 with 38 seconds remaining. Stewart rolled right again on the conversion attempt and lofted a pass for Thigpen, who made the sliding grab in the back of the end zone. After getting called for a penalty on first down, the Patriots opted to run out the clock. That was the last time they touched the ball as Pittsburgh won the overtime toss and drove down the field for the game-winning score. The Steelers faced a 3rd-and-15 deep in their own territory when Stewart completed a pass to Courtney Hawkins, who

avoided numerous tacklers and turned a short gain into a 41-yard play to the Patriots 38. Two plays later, Stewart connected with Bruener for a 16-yard gain to the 20. After two short runs by Jerome Bettis, Johnson kicked his third field goal of the game at 4:43 of overtime to give Pittsburgh (11-4) its third straight win.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Even in losing, the Steelers won. Despite falling to the Oilers, 16-6, Pittsburgh wrapped up its fourth consecutive AFC Central title by avoiding a loss of more than 64 points. Each team went three and out to start the game before Tennessee linebacker Joe Bowden picked off a Kordell Stewart pass and returned it nine yards to the Steelers 16. The Oilers lost a yard on three plays and Del Greco converted a 34-yard field goal with 9:11 left in the quarter. The Steelers answered on their next drive, traveling 70 yards on 16 plays to set up Norm Johnson's 23-yard field goal with 64 seconds to go in the period. Pittsburgh fumbled on the kickoff before the drive and on a pass play to Yancey Thigpen, but recovered both times. Tennessee was forced to punt on its next series, but got the ball back four plays later when

defensive lineman Henry Ford scooped up a fumble by Stewart and rumbled 13 yards to the Steelers 38. The Oilers then gained 28 yards on three passes and were backed up 12 yards thanks to an unnecessary roughness call on tackle Jon Runyan before Thomas ran 25 yards around right end to make it 10-3 with 8:57 left in the half. The lead was padded to 10 points 11 seconds before the intermission when Del Greco's 29-yard field goal capped a 12-play, 80-yard drive. Del Greco's third kick of the game, a 26-yarder with 2:57 left in the third quarter, extended the gap to 16-3. Johnson capped the scoring with a 36-yard field goal 3:29 into the fourth period. The Steelers could have made it closer at the end, but Fred McAfee fumbled at the Tennessee 7 with 66 seconds remaining.

PITTSBURGH — The Steelers defeated the Patriots for the second time in three weeks. Pittsburgh forced four turnovers, including two in the last one minute, 44 seconds, and advanced to the AFC Championship for the third time in four years. The Steelers struck early when Kordell Stewart scampered around left end and raced for a 40-yard touchdown on the team's opening possession with 9:49 left in the first quarter. The drive began after rookie cornerback Chad Scott intercepted quarterback Drew Bledsoe and returned it 27 yards to the Steelers 38. The Steelers made it stand up in a 7-6 victory over the Patriots in the AFC Divisional Playoffs. New England was limited to a pair of field goals by Adam Vinatieri and fell two games short of a return to the Super Bowl. Linebacker Jason Gildon recovered a pair of fumbles for the Steelers. The second recovery came after backup left end Mike Vrabel stripped Bledsoe of the ball and Gildon pounced on it at the Pittsburgh 34 with 1:44 to play. The Patriots got back the ball in the final seconds before linebacker Levon Kirkland intercepted a long pass by Bledsoe to seal the win.



GAME NOTES: CB Chad Scott had his first postseason interception (27-yard return) of his career...QB Kordell Stewart's 40-yard touchdown run was the longest postseason run in team history. It was the longest rush of his postseason

career and his third rushing touchdown in the playoffs. It was also the fourth-longest run from scrimmage in Steelers' postseason history. AFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME JANUARY 11 at PITTSBURGH

PITTSBURGH — John Elway passed for two touchdowns in the final 1:47 of the first half to help Denver build a 24-14 lead, while the Broncos defense forced four turnovers by Pittsburgh quarterback Kordell Stewart to propel Denver to a 24-21 victory against the Steelers in the AFC Championship Game. The Steelers, who were hosting the AFC Championship for the third time in four years under coach Bill Cowher, had a 14-7 lead after a 33-yard run by Stewart and a one yard score by Jerome Bettis. Then Denver struck back to take a 24-14 lead to the locker room at halftime. Stewart, who scored on a 33-yard run in the first quarter, was 6-of-17 for 69 yards with two interceptions in the first half. He finished 18-of-36 for 201 yards with three

interceptions and a fumble. The only score of the second half was a 15-yard touchdown pass from Stewart to Charles Johnson that pulled the Steelers within 24-21 with 2:46 left in the fourth quarter. The touchdown capped a 10-play, 79-yard drive in just 2:57. Since Pittsburgh had all three timeouts left, Cowher opted not to attempt an on-side kick. But just after the two-minute warning on a third-and-six play Elway drilled an 18-yard pass to tight end Shannon Sharpe to the Denver 33 with Jason Gildon in coverage. On the next play, Elway rolled right and flipped a 10-yard pass to Ed McCaffrey. Davis then broke off a 19-yard run with less than 50 seconds remaining to seal the win.

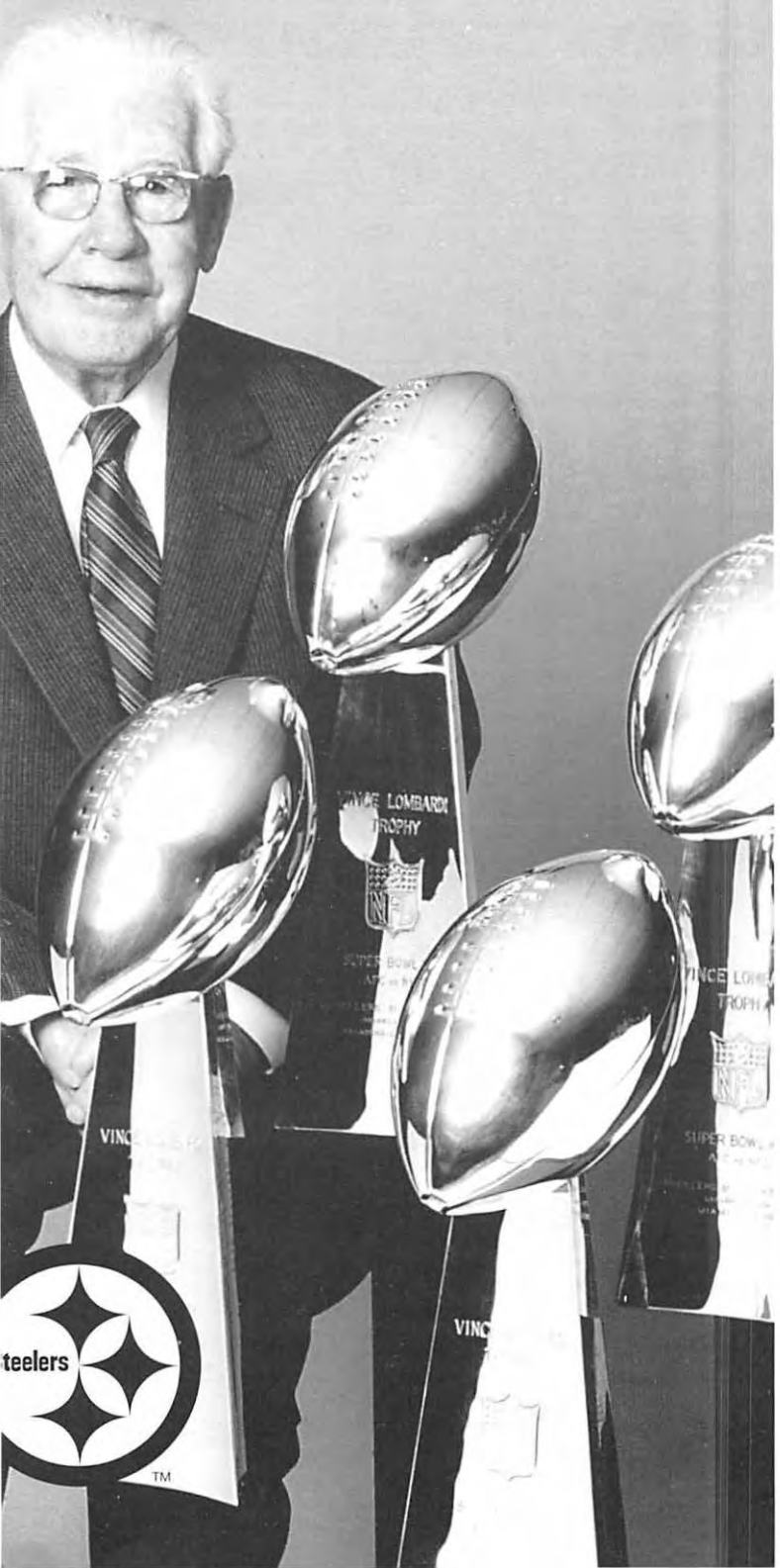

STEELERS HISTORY



The fifth-oldest franchise in the NFL, the Steelers were founded on July 8, 1933 by Arthur Joseph Rooney. Originally named the Pittsburgh Pirates, they were a member of the Eastern Division of the 10-team NFL. The other four current NFL teams in existence at that time were the Chicago (Arizona) Cardinals, Green Bay Packers, Chicago Bears and New York Giants.

One of the great pioneers of the sports world, Art Rooney passed away on August 25, 1988 following a stroke at the age of 87. "The Chief," as he was affectionately known, is enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame and is remembered as one of Pittsburgh's great people.

Born on January 27, 1901 in Coulterville, Pa., Art Rooney was the oldest of Daniel and Margaret Rooney's nine children. He grew up in Old Allegheny, now known as Pittsburgh's North Side, and until his death he still lived on the North Side just a short distance from Three Rivers Stadium.

Rooney attended St. Peter's Parochial School and Duquesne University Prep School. He studied collegately at Indiana (Pa.) Normal, which is now Indiana University of Pennsylvania, as well as at Georgetown and Duquesne.

An exceptional all-around athlete, Rooney held middleweight and welterweight titles from the AAU Boxing Championships and was named to the U.S. Olympic Boxing Team in 1920, although he did not participate in the Olympic Games. He played minor league baseball from 1920-25 before a promising career was cut short by an arm injury. Rooney continued playing football for several semi-pro teams in the Pittsburgh area. He was married on June 11, 1931 to Kathleen McNulty, and the couple had five sons — Daniel, Art Jr., Tim, John and Pat.

1930s: After founding the Pirates in 1933, Rooney watched his club struggle through its first seven seasons with just 22 wins and five different head coaches. While home games were played at Forbes Field, Rooney often took his team to such cities as Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, New Orleans, and Louisville in the 1930s due to competition with baseball and college football.

In 1938 Rooney signed Colorado All-America Byron "Whizzer" White to a \$15,800 contract, making White the first "big money" player in the NFL. White led the league in rushing that year and is one of the NFL's most illustrious alumni. He retired in 1993 after serving 31 years as a Justice of the United States Supreme Court.

1940s: In 1940 Rooney changed the team name to the Pittsburgh Steelers, representing the heritage of Pittsburgh. The first winning record in the organization's history came in 1942 when head coach Walt Kiesling led the Steelers to a 7-4 finish with the league-leading rushing of rookie Bill Dudley. But the next year Dudley joined the Armed Forces along with many other NFL players as the nation went to war. With rosters depleted, Rooney merged the Steelers with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1943 (Phil-Pitt "Steagles") and with the Chicago Cardinals (Card-Pitt) in 1944.

Rooney hired legendary Pitt coach Jock Sutherland in 1946, and Dudley returned from the war to earn NFL MVP honors, leading the league in rushing, interceptions, and punt returns. Today, Dudley is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Sutherland led the 1947 Steelers to an 8-4 record for a share of the Eastern division title, but they lost their first-ever postseason game, 21-0 to Philadelphia. Sutherland died suddenly the following spring while on a scouting trip.

1950s: Succeeding Sutherland, John Michelosen was head coach for the 1948-51 seasons, compiling a 20-26-2 record. In 1952 Joe Bach returned for his second stint with the Steelers, having coached the team previously in 1935-36. The Steelers became the last team to abandon the single wing for the T-formation in 1952.

Bach resigned for health reasons following the 1954 season and was replaced by assistant coach Walt Kiesling, who had been the Steelers' head coach twice previously. Kiesling's three stints covered the 1939-40, 1941-44, and 1954-56 campaigns.

1960s: Buddy Parker was named head coach in 1957 and over the next eight years he led the Steelers to five non-losing seasons. Hall of Fame quarterback Bobby Layne quarterbacked the team through three of those campaigns, leading the Steelers to a 9-5 mark and a playoff game vs. Detroit in 1962, which the Steelers lost 17-10. Parker completed his tenure with a 51-48-6 record and ranks third among all-time Steelers coaches for career wins.

Brief stints by Mike Nixon in 1965 and Bill Austin from 1966-68 preceded the hiring of the 37-year-old Noll on January 27, 1969. Noll began to rebuild the Steelers through the draft, starting with the defense when he selected defensive tackle Joe Greene with his first choice in 1969. Today Greene is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

1970s: A 1-13 record in 1969 gave the Steelers the first overall choice in the 1970 draft, with which Noll addressed the offense by selecting quarterback Terry Bradshaw, another Hall of Famer, after the Steelers won the first selection by winning a coin toss with the Chicago Bears. Cornerback Mel Blount was added on the third round that year, followed by linebacker Jack Ham in 1971 and run-

ning back Franco Harris in 1972. In all, Noll drafted six players who are now enshrined in the Hall of Fame including three in his first 20 picks and four of his first 38.

Two significant changes took place in 1970, when the Steelers moved from the NFL Century Division to the AFC Central with the merger of the American Football League and the NFL. The Steelers also moved into a new home as Three Rivers Stadium opened. Previously, the Steelers had played home games at Forbes Field from 1933-57 and at both Forbes Field and Pitt Stadium from 1958-63. From 1964-69 the Steelers played at Pitt Stadium until Three Rivers opened in 1970.

Gradual improvement in the early 1970s resulted in the team's first division title in 1972 with an 11-3 record. In the first playoff game at Three Rivers the Steelers defeated the Oakland Raiders 13-7 with Franco Harris' "Immaculate Reception" in the final minute. Despite a 21-17 loss the following week to the undefeated Miami Dolphins, the Steelers had reached a new plateau.

It took 40 years for the Steelers to finally win their first division title, but over the next decade they achieved a level of success unprecedented in professional football.

In 1973 the Steelers won a wild card playoff berth with a 10-4 record. Oakland avenged their loss from the previous year, however, with a 33-14 defeat of the Steelers in the playoffs.

The Steelers won their first of six consecutive AFC Central titles in 1974 and marched past Buffalo (32-14) and Oakland (24-13) en route to their first Super Bowl appearance in Super Bowl IX. The fierce Pittsburgh defense led the way to a 16-6 victory vs. the Minnesota Vikings, and Art Rooney was presented the Vince Lombardi Trophy for the first time.

In 1975 the Steelers won 11 straight games to finish 12-2 and claim their second consecutive division crown. After defeating Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10) in the playoffs the Steelers became the third team in NFL history, joining Green Bay and Miami, to win back-to-back Super Bowls with a 21-17 win versus the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl X.

The 1976 Steelers struggled to a 1-4 start before reeling off nine straight victories including five shutouts to win the division with a 10-4 mark. They defeated Baltimore 40-14 in the playoffs, but could not get past Oakland in a 24-7 loss after both starting running backs, Harris and Rocky Bleier, were injured. The following year the Steelers dropped a 34-21 decision to Denver in the playoffs after posting a 9-5 regular season record.

In 1978 the Steelers made history after a league-best 14-2 regular season and playoff wins versus Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5). Their 35-31 Super Bowl XIII win versus Dallas made the Steelers the first team to win three Super Bowls.

Yet another standard was set the following year when the 1979 Steelers defeated the Los Angeles Rams, 31-19, in Super Bowl XIV to make them the first team in history to win four Super Bowls and the only team to win back-to-back Super Bowls twice. The Super Bowl victory followed a 12-4 regular season and playoff wins versus Miami (34-14) and Houston (27-13). With six consecutive AFC Central crowns, eight straight years of playoff appearances and four Super Bowl championships, the Steelers were tagged the "Team of the Decade" for the 1970s.

1980s: As the 1980s opened the Steelers stumbled, failing to make the playoffs in 1980 and 1981 with records of 9-7 and 8-8.

In 1982 the Steelers celebrated the team's 50th anniversary by qualifying for the playoffs with a 6-3 finish in a strike-interrupted season. During the season an anniversary banquet was held to commemorate the team's first 50 seasons and to honor the Steelers' all-time team as selected by fan voting. Thousands of fans were attracted to Pittsburgh for a week of activities and exhibits before the anniversary season was ended by San Diego's 31-28 win in the playoffs. This would be the last playoff game at Three Rivers until the 1992 season, a span of 10 years.

The 1983 Steelers won their eighth division title with a 10-6 record, but fell in the postseason, 38-10 to the Raiders. The following year the Steelers won their ninth division crown and the team advanced to the AFC Championship game with a 24-17 playoff win at Denver. A 45-28 Miami win in the AFC Championship game, however, prevented the Steelers from a fifth Super Bowl appearance.

The Steelers' streak of 13 consecutive non-losing seasons came to an end in 1985 with a 7-9 finish, followed by 6-10 in 1986. Playoff hopes remained alive in 1987 until the Steelers lost their last two games to finish 8-7.

In 1988 the team suffered through its worst campaign in 19 years with a 5-11 record. The next season got off to a similar start with losses of 51-0 and 41-10 in the first two games as the offense failed to score in the first month of the season. But the young team fought back to finish 9-7 and earn a wild card playoff berth on the season's final weekend. An exciting 26-23 overtime playoff win in Houston was followed by a heartbreaking 24-23 divisional playoff loss at Denver in which the Steelers led until the final minutes.

1990s: A 9-7 finish in 1990 left the Steelers in a three-way tie for the AFC Central lead, but they were eliminated from playoff contention by a 2-4 division record. The 1991 team finished second in

the division despite a 7-9 record, winning the last two games under Noll at home against the Cincinnati Bengals and Cleveland Browns.

On December 26, 1991 Noll announced his retirement from football after 39 consecutive seasons, the last 23 as the Steelers' head coach which made him one of only four men to coach the same team for 23 consecutive years. He left as the fifth-winningest coach in NFL history with an overall record of 209-156-1, and as the only coach to win four Super Bowls. Noll was rewarded in 1993 with his election to the Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility.

A new era began in 1992 with the retirement of Noll and the arrival of Bill Cowher, the National Football League's youngest head coach at the time he assumed control. In the first season of the new era, the Steelers won the AFC Central division crown for the first time since 1984 with an 11-5 record. While the team enjoyed new-found success, Cowher was recognized by the Associated Press as the NFL's Coach of the Year and six Steelers played in the Pro Bowl, the most in more than a decade.

Under Cowher the Steelers became the first AFC team since the 1970 merger to claim its 10th division title. Their 11-5 record equaled the best in the conference and gave the Steelers the home field throughout the playoffs, but in the first postseason game at Three Rivers in exactly 10 years the Steelers were defeated by eventual AFC champion Buffalo, 24-3.

In 1993, the Steelers earned a wild card playoff berth, marking their first consecutive playoff appearances since the 1983-84 seasons. A 9-7 record was good for second place in the division, but the season ended in a 27-24 overtime loss in Kansas City in the wild-card round of the postseason.

The 1994 Steelers won seven of their final eight regular-season games for their strongest finish since 1978. They captured their third division title in three years with the AFC's best record of 12-4. After a 29-9 victory over the Cleveland Browns in the first round of the playoffs, Pittsburgh hosted their first AFC Championship game since 1984. The game went down to the wire and the Steelers lost to the San Diego Chargers, 17-13.

At 38, Bill Cowher became the youngest head coach to lead his team to a Super Bowl. Along the way, Cowher's team captured their third AFC Central division title in four years, made their fourth straight playoff appearance, and won the Steelers' first AFC title since 1979. After a first-round bye, they defeated the Buffalo Bills (40-21) and the Indianapolis Colts (20-16), before losing to the Dallas Cowboys 27-17 in Super Bowl XXX in Tempe, Arizona.

In 1996, injuries forced Cowher to use 40 different starters during the course of the season. But the Steelers' "never-say-die" attitude led to a 10-6 finish and their fifth consecutive trip to the playoffs. Cowher earned his 50th regular-season win Nov. 3, 1996 in his 73rd game to become the eighth fastest to reach 50 wins. Bill ended the season with 57 career victories and now stands as the second winningest coach in team history, behind his predecessor Noll.

The Steelers captured their sixth consecutive AFC Central title in 1997, while posting an 11-5 record. They were one play away from earning their sixth Super Bowl appearance and lost to Denver, 24-21, in the AFC Championship game.

Steelers founder Art Rooney, who was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1964, had begun by that time to turn over much of the operation of the Steelers to his oldest son, Daniel M. A decade later, after having worked in every area of the organization since 1955, Dan Rooney was named president of the Steelers in 1975. Now in his 39th year in the organization, he is one of the most active NFL owners and one of Pittsburgh's most involved executives in civic affairs.

Among his community activities, Dan Rooney is a board member for The United Way of America, The American Ireland Fund, The American Diabetes Association, Presbyterian University Hospital, The Pittsburgh History and Landmarks Foundation and Duquesne University.

Dan Rooney has also been a member of several NFL committees over the past 20 years. He has served on the board of directors for the NFL Trust Fund, NFL Films and the Scheduling Committee. He was appointed chairman of the Expansion Committee in 1973, which considered new franchise locations and directed the addition of Seattle and Tampa Bay as expansion teams in 1976.

In 1976 Rooney was also named chairman of the Negotiating Committee, and in 1982 he contributed to the negotiations for the Collective Bargaining Agreement for the NFL and the Players' Association. He again played a key role in the labor agreement reached between NFL owners and players in 1993.

Rooney is currently a member of the eight-person Management Council Executive Committee, the Hall of Fame Committee, and the NFL Properties Executive Committee.

Daniel M. Rooney was born on Pittsburgh's North Side on July 20, 1932. He is a 1950 graduate of North Catholic High School, where he played quarterback on the varsity football team. He went on to graduate from Duquesne University in 1955 with a bachelor of arts degree in accounting. Dan and his wife Patricia live on the North Side.
