ICHIRO SUZUKI ELECTED TO THE NATIONAL BASEBALL HALL OF FAME

Ichiro joins fellow Mariners Hall of Famers Edgar Martinez, Ken Griffey Jr. in Cooperstown

SEATTLE, Wash. - National Baseball Hall of Fame President Josh Rawitch announced this afternoon on the MLB Network that Mariners legend Ichiro Suzuki was among three players elected today into the National Baseball Hall of Fame as part of the Class of 2025.

"Ichiro is truly one of a kind. His commitment, legendary work ethic, physical endurance, mental toughness, attention to detail and passion for the game are all on a different level," Mariners President of Baseball Operations Jerry Dipoto said. "His on-field accomplishments and career achievements put him among the all-time greats, but it's his impact on the game from a global perspective that will forever set him apart.'

Ichiro becomes the 3rd Mariners player to be elected to the Hall of Fame – joining 2016 inductee Ken Griffey Jr. and 2019 inductee Edgar Martinez - and joins CC Sabathia and Billy Wagner in being elected today, as well as Dave Parker and Dick Allen, who

were voted in by the Classic Baseball Era committee, in this year's class. The Kasugai, Japan native is the first Asian-born player to be inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame.

"Congratulations, Ichiro, on your first-ballot election today," Mariners Senior Director of Hitting Strategy and Baseball Hall of Fame Class of 2019 member Edgar Martinez said. "It's great to see you every day at the ballpark, but I am really looking forward to seeing you in Cooperstown in July."

"Ichiro, congratulations on being named to the Baseball Hall of Fame. It is an unbelievable honor," Baseball Hall of Fame Class of 2016 member Ken Griffey Jr. said. "Edgar and I couldn't be more proud of you. We met in '95 and we've been good friends ever since then. Just want to let you know that it is a privilege and an honor to share the Hall with you.'

In his first year on the ballot, Ichiro earned 99.7% of votes, tied for the second-highest voting percentage in history and first among position players. Hall of Fame voters consist of members of the Baseball Writer's Association of America with at least 10 consecutive years covering baseball. This year's induction will take place on Sunday, July 27 at the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown, NY.

Ichiro was one of the best hitters of his generation - and in the history of professional baseball - combining his unique hitting style with dynamic speed, incredible defense and a one-of-a-kind dedication to the sport that made him an international superstar.

Ichiro played 28 professional seasons: 9 with the Orix Blue Wave of the Japanese Nippon Professional Baseball Organization (1992-2000) and 19 Major League seasons with the Seattle Mariners (2001-12, '18-'19), New York Yankees (2012-14) and Miami Marlins (2015-17). In 19 MLB seasons, Ichiro played in 2,653 games, collecting 3,089 hits (2,514 singles, 362 doubles, 96 triples and 117 home runs), scoring 1,420 runs, collecting 780 RBI and going 509-for-626 in stolen base attempts. He finished his career with a .311 batting average (3089x9934), a .355 on-base percentage and a .402 slugging percentage (.757 OPS).

The left-handed hitting outfielder was an American League Most Valuable Player (2001), American League Rookie of the Year (2001) and the 2007 All-Star Game Most Valuable Player. He was a 10-time All-Star (2001-10), 10-time Gold Glove Award Winner (2001-10), a 3-time Silver Slugger (2001, 2007 and 2009) and a 2-time batting champion (2001 and 2004). He set the Major League record for most hits in a single season, collecting 262 hits in his historic 2004 season, earning the 2005 Commissioners Historic Achievement Award for his efforts. He became the 30th member of the 3,000-hit club on Aug. 7, 2016 while he was a member of the Miami Marlins. During his 28 year playing career, he collected 4,367 hits - more professional hits than any other player in baseball history.

Ichiro was an integral part of the Mariners historic 2001 team that won a record-tying 116 games, winning both the AL MVP and Rookie of the Year awards, only the second player in MLB history to accomplish the feat in the same season (also: Fred Lynn-BOS in 1975). He also was an American League All-Star, a Rawlings Gold Glove Award Winner and a Silver Slugger that season.

A veteran of two postseason runs (2001 with Seattle and 2012 with New York-AL), Ichiro combined to hit .346 (27x78) in 19 career playoff games. He also helped lead Team Japan to back-to-back World Baseball Classic titles in 2006 and 2009, being named to

the All-Tournament team in the inaugural WBC in 2006. Ichiro was inducted into the Mariners Hall of Fame on Aug. 27, 2022, becoming the 10th member of the Mariners Hall of Fame, joining Alvin Davis (1997), Dave Niehaus (2000), Jay Buhner (2004), Edgar Martinez (2007), Randy Johnson (2012), Dan Wilson (2012), Ken Griffey Jr. (2013), Lou Piniella (2014) and Jamie Moyer (2015). Suzuki has since been joined by Félix Hernández, who was inducted during the 2023 season. Ichiro ranks among the franchise leaders in nearly every offensive category, including owning the franchise records for at-bats (7,907), hits (2,542), triples (79), batting average (.322) and stolen bases (438).



Following his retirement in 2019, Ichiro has served as the Mariners Special Assistant to the Chairman, where he continues to work with the Major League players and staff.
