

### 1992 NCAA Tournament | Final Four (sanctioned)

Michigan entered the 1992 NCAA Tournament as the No. 6 seed in the Southeast Region after going 20-8 in the regular season, but the Wolverines, led by their famed "Fab Five" freshmen, also entered with momentum, having won the final three games of the regular season, including a victory over second-ranked Indiana.

Temple, the No. 11 seed, was the opening round opponent for the Maize and Blue who began the tournament at the Omni in Atlanta, Ga., just as Steve Fisher's team had during the magical tournament run of 1989.

The Wolverines used a strong first half in which they shot 60.7 percent (17-of-28) from the field to take a nine-point halftime lead on their way to a 73-66 victory. Jalen Rose scored a game-high 19 points to go along with eight assists, while Chris Webber posted a double-double with 11 points and 12 rebounds. Juwan Howard and Jimmy King both had 15 points in the first round win.

U-M met No. 14 seed East Tennessee State in the second round and the Wolverines overwhelmed the underdogs in the opening 20 minutes, building a 54-34 halftime lead. Chris Webber scored 30 points and Jalen Rose had a double-double with 19 points and 10 rebounds as the Maize and Blue downed ETSU, 102-90.

Juwan Howard added 23 points and Jimmy King chipped in 13 as Michigan moved on to the Sweet 16 for the first time since 1989.

Michigan met No. 2 seed Oklahoma State in the Sweet 16 at Rupp Arena in Lexington, Ky., in a game that would go down to the wire. A Jalen Rose free throw with 7.3 seconds left put the Wolverines in front by a pair, 74-72, but Oklahoma State would have the final possession with a chance to win or tie.

The Cowboys turned the ball over however with a second left to play and Juwan Howard iced the game at the free-throw line. Rose finished with a game-high 25 points and 11 rebounds, King added 15 points, as did Eric Riley from off the U-M bench, while Howard chipped in 13 points.



The Southeast Regional Final would match the Wolverines against top-seeded rival Ohio State, who got the better of the Maize and Blue twice during the regular season. The result would be a classic as Webber scored a game-high 23 points to pace U-M to a 75-71 victory over the Buckeyes.

In the final minute of regulation, Michigan was down by a pair, 63-61, when a Webber putback drew the Wolverines even and force overtime. U-M built an eight-point lead in the final minute of overtime as the Maize and Blue punched its ticket to the Final Four.

Rose scored 20 points in the regional final victory, King added 15 and Howard scored 10. Rose was named the Most Outstanding Player of the Southeast Regional and Webber was also named to the All-Tournament Team.

U-M met No. 4 seed Cincinnati at the Metrodome in Minneapolis, Minn., in the national semifinals and scored a 76-72 victory over the Bearcats to move on to the national championship game.

Cincinnati led by three at the half, 41-38, but the Maize and Blue held the Bearcats to just 30 percent (9-of-30) shooting from the field in the second half on their way to the victory. King netted a team-high 17 points while Webber posted a double-double with 16 points and 11 rebounds.

Rose finished just shy of a double-double with 13 points and nine boards while Howard added 12 points and eight rebounds.

The defending national champions from Duke were the final hurdle between Michigan and its second national championship, but the Blue Devils would prove to be one hurdle too many as they topped the Wolverines, 71-51 in the title game.

Christian Laettner scored a game-high 19 points and Grant Hill added 18 points and 10 rebounds to lead Duke; Webber had 14 points and 11 rebounds for the Maize and Blue while Rose added 11 points, both were named to the Final Four All-Tournament Team.



## 1993 NCAA Tournament | Final Four (sanctioned)

Michigan's "Fab Five" entered their second NCAA Tournament as the No. 1 seed in the West Region after going 26-4 in the regular season. The Wolverines were never ranked lower than seventh during the year and went into the NCAA Tournament on a seven-game win streak.

No. 16 seed Coastal Carolina was no match for U-M in the first round at the McKale Center in Tucson, Ariz., as the Maize and Blue raced to an 84-53 victory.

Ray Jackson scored a game-high 19 points, Juwan Howard had a double-double with 16 points and 10 rebounds and Chris Webber chipped in 11 points in an easy opening round win that saw Michigan hold Coastal Carolina to just 27.7 percent (18-of-65) shooting for the contest.

A much stiffer test met U-M in the Round of 32 as the Wolverines needed overtime to dispatch of No. 9 seed UCLA, 86-84. Michigan led by a pair, 77-75, in the final seconds of regulation but Tyus Edney made two free throws with 6.3 seconds left to force overtime. Tied at 84 in the overtime, Jimmy King made a putback with 1.5 seconds left to give Michigan its first all-time win over UCLA.

All five starters scored in double figures for the Wolverines, led by 27 points and 14 rebounds from Webber. Jackson had 19 points, Howard scored 14, Jalen Rose netted 12 and King finished with 11 points.

The Wolverines traveled to the site of their 1989 national championship triumph for the Sweet 16 as they met No. 12 seed George Washington. Just as they had in the second round, all five Michigan starters scored in double figures as the Maize and Blue downed the Colonials, 76-64.

Howard led the way with 17 points and 10 rebounds, Rose added 16 points, Webber scored 14 with nine boards while King and Jackson each scored 11. U-M held George Washington to just 33.8 percent (24-of-71) shooting as it advanced to the Elite Eight.

Temple, the team Michigan beat to begin its run to the 1992 Final Four, was all that stood in the way of U-M returning to the Final Four as the Wolverines met the Owls in the West Regional Final.



The No. 7 seed from the Atlantic 10 built an eight-point half-time lead, 35-27, before the Wolverine defense held Temple to just 37 percent (10-of-27) shooting in the second half to come from behind for the 77-72 victory. For the third consecutive game, all five of Michigan's starters scored in double figures, led by 17 points from Rose. Webber had a double-double with 13 points and 12 rebounds as he was named the West Regional Most Outstanding Player.

King scored 14, Howard had 11 points and nine rebounds while Jackson added 10 points. Howard and Rose joined Webber on the All-Regional Team.

In the national semifinals in the Superdome in New Orleans, Michigan would once again need overtime to advance in the NCAA Tournament as the Wolverines toppled Kentucky, 81-78, in a matchup of two No. 1 seeds.

A pair of Wildcat free throws with 10 seconds left in regulation forced overtime and Kentucky was in front by one, 78-77, in the final minute of overtime before a layup by Webber.

After an empty possession for Kentucky, Rose closed out the game at the free-throw line as U-M advanced to its second consecutive national championship game. Webber finished with 27 points and 13 rebounds, Rose added 18 points, Howard had 17 and Jackson scored 11 points in the victory.

Michigan's dreams of a national championship fell one win short for the second consecutive year as the Maize and Blue fell to North Carolina, 77-71, in the final.

Webber was named to the Final Four All-Tournament Team as he recorded another double-double with 23 points and 11 rebounds, King scored 15 points and Rose had 12.

North Carolina led by six at the half and shot 61.9 percent (13-of-21) from the field in the second 20 minutes, while holding U-M to just 1-of-7 from three after halftime. Donald Williams scored a game-high 25 points to lead the Tar Heels.

# NCAA Vacated | 1997 NIT

## 1997 NIT Championship (NCAA Sanctioned)

After five straight losses to close the regular season, Michigan saw its NCAA chances fall. However, the Wolverines met as a team and elected to stay in the postseason heading to the NIT. Following a double-digit wins over Miami, Fla. (76-63) and Oklahoma State (75-65) at Crisler Arena, the Maize and Blue headed to Notre Dame for a chance to return to New York. After a sluggish first half, U-M held a four-point lead heading into the break. With both squads shooting over 60 percent in the second half, the Irish (69.6% 2nd half) rallied and took a one-point lead, 66-65, with under 10 second left. With the Irish focusing on Robert Traylor (26 points, 14 rebounds), Brandon Hughes drained a free throw line jumper to give U-M the victory, 67-66. With 19 points and 15 rebounds, Maurice Taylor led the Wolverines to the title game with a 77-62 defeat over Arkansas. In the championship game, Traylor's 26 points and Maceo Baston's 20 helped the Wolverines close the season with five straight wins and the NIT title, 82-73, over Florida State.



# NCAA Vacated | 1998 Big Ten Tournament

## 1998 Big Ten Tournament (vacated)

In the inaugural Big Ten Tournament, Michigan earned the No. 4 seed and a first-round bye. In its opening half in Chicago, the Wolverines shot 63.0 percent and built a 10-point lead against No. 5 Iowa. With all five starters closing in double figures, including Robert Traylor's 10-point, 16-rebound effort, U-M was able to move on with a 76-66 victory. U-M's red-hot shooting continued in its semifinal win over No. 8 Minnesota. Shooting nearly 54 percent, draining 13 three-pointers and using a second straight game with all five starters in double figures, the Wolverines cruised to the title game with an 85-69 win. After trailing at the half, 33-31, Most Outstanding Player Traylor finished 12-for-16 for 24 points and added 13 rebounds as he guided the Wolverines to a second-half comeback and a 76-67 to capture the first-ever championship.
