# THE BIG TEN'S 10 BIG TITLE GAMES IN CHICAGO

**This week marks the 11th time the House that Jordan Built will host the Big Ten's showcase. Here's a look at each of the previous "big 10" instances of the Big Ten conference tournament. | By Tim Schmitt**

**H**ome is where the heart is. It's also a place where a family works through its differences. In the case of the Big Ten men's basketball tournament, Chicago's United Center certainly feels like home, even if it has been on consistent vacation in recent years. The nation's premier conference event has been back in the venue just once since 2015, but it's still

recognized as the birthplace of the championship. Although the Big Ten got a bit of a late start to the conference tournament party, it made up for lost time by hosting its first four events in the Windy City, starting in 1998. The Chicago theme has been woven throughout its history ever since, hosting in alternating years with Indianapolis through 2007 and three more times since.

## 1998: TRACTOR TRAYLOR LEADS MICHIGAN TO TITLE

Although violations later wiped this result from the official record books, there's little doubt that the first conference tournament made a huge splash with Big Ten fans. Top-seeded Michigan State was upset by Minnesota in the quarterfinals, opening an opportunity for the fourth-seeded Wolverines to push their way through to a final against Brad Miller and the Purdue Boilermakers. Traylor, who was named the inaugural event's MVP, had 24 points and grabbed 13 rebounds in leading Michigan to a 76-67 win.

He also left an indelible mark on the event when he searched for his grandmother after the final buzzer sounded.

"It just feels so good to win the first-ever Big Ten tournament," Traylor said. "I just wanted to go see her. I love her so much. Sometimes, when you win something like this, you do things out of the ordinary."

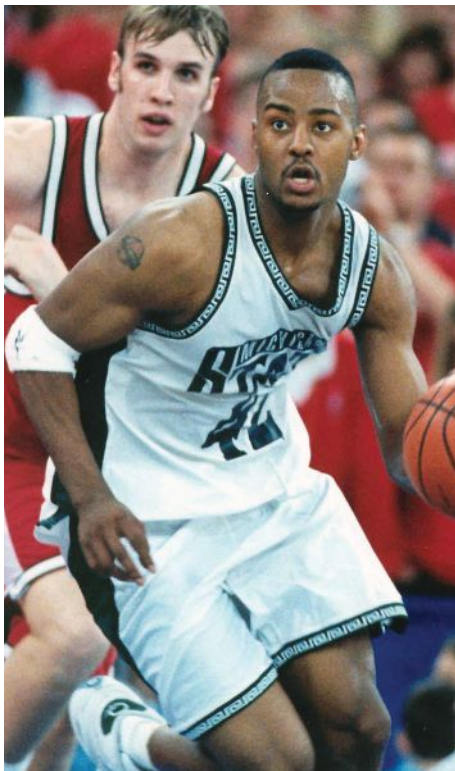
## 1999: CLEAVES SHINES AS SPARTANS KNOCK OFF CINDERELLA ILLINOIS

After dominating the league by winning 15 of 16 conference games, Mateen Cleaves and the Michigan State Spartans did much of the same in the conference tournament. After a scare in the quarterfinals, edging No. 8 seed Northwestern by a bucket, Tom Izzo's team rolled past Wisconsin and then secured a 17-point win over Illinois in the title game.

But although the Spartans' almost pre-ordained tournament victory went into the record books, Illinois' run to the final was the most fascinating storyline. After a difficult 3-13 regular season, Cory Bradford led the young 11th-seeded Illini to surprise wins over accomplished (and ranked) Minnesota and Indiana squads, and then pulled off one of the biggest upsets in the event's existence, topping a second-seeded Ohio State team anchored by Scoonie Penn and Michael Redd.

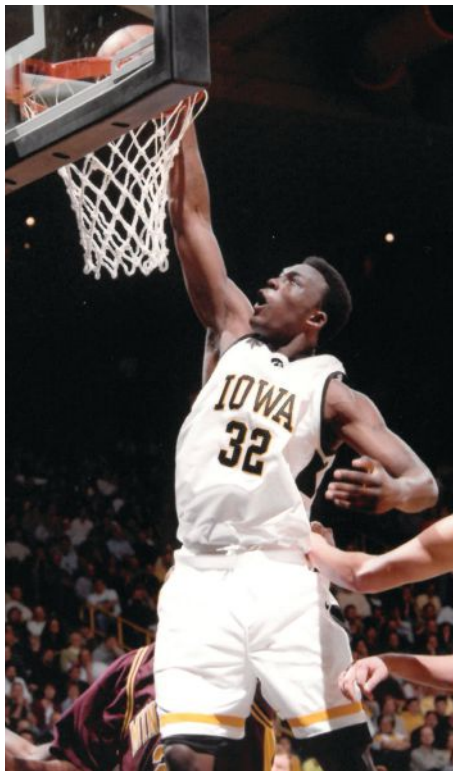

## 2000: PETERSON LEADS MSU TO CONSECUTIVE TITLES

The Big Ten tournament fell into a groove in its third year as the same two teams (Michigan State and Illinois) met in the final while highly seeded Ohio State was again upset before the final. This time, ninth-seeded Penn State knocked off the Buckeyes, 71-66, in the quarterfinals.

In the end, though, everyone struggled to keep pace with Michigan State, which rolled past Iowa, Wisconsin and then Illinois with relative ease. Morris Peterson was named the most outstanding player, finishing the final game with 14 points, four rebounds and three steals while A.J. Granger led the Spartans with 17 points. The Spartans followed by rolling their way to a national championship.



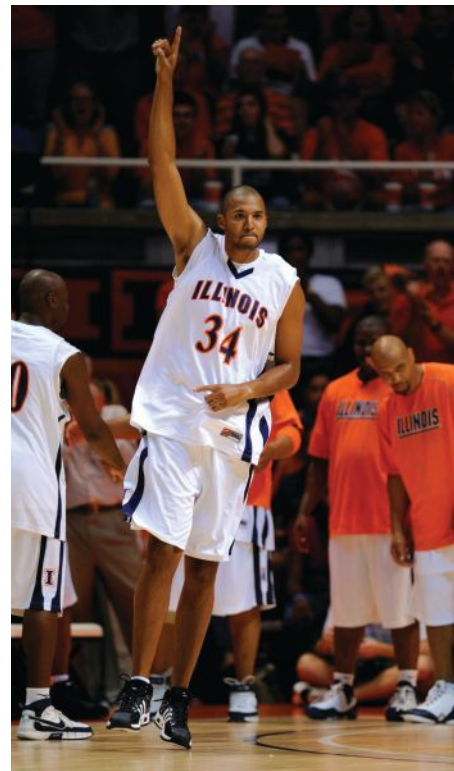

## 2001: IOWA, ALFORD TAKE TITLE FROM INDIANA

You can only beat the teams you play. The Iowa Hawkeyes avoided the top two seeds as both Illinois and Michigan State were upset in the earlier rounds, but scored a big win over No. 3 seed Ohio State and then knocked off Penn State in the semifinals and fourth-seeded Indiana in the final.

Reggie Evans blocked a shot just before the final buzzer and was named most outstanding player while Brody Boyd had a huge 22-point effort in the win, giving coach Steve Alford a win over his alma mater.

"I've got great memories from there," Alford said. "I'm just happy we were able to win it. Regardless of who the opponents were along the way, to win a Big Ten title is very special."

## 2003: ILLINOIS FINALLY GETS TOURNAMENT TITLE

After failing in two previous chances to win a title before Chicago fans, Illinois rolled to a win in the final, topping Ohio State, 72-59. Roger Powell led the Illini with 16 points while Big Ten regular season player of the Year Brian Cook added 15 points and seven rebounds. Cook was subsequently named the most outstanding player of the tournament.

For Illinois head coach Bill Self, who left after the season to take the job at Kansas, it marked the culmination of an impressive three-year ascension that had seen the Illini make the Elite Eight, the Sweet Sixteen and then win a Big Ten tournament in consecutive years.

## 2005: NEW COACH, SAME RESULT FOR ILLINOIS

Although the head coach was different, the result was the same for the University of Illinois as Bruce Weber guided the Illini to their second Big Ten tournament victory in Chicago.

The Illini breezed through league play, winning their first 15 games before dropping the final game of the year to Ohio State, but then quickly reheatated in the tournament behind stars Dee Brown, Deron Williams, Luther Head and most outstanding player James Augustine. Illinois topped Northwestern, Minnesota and Wisconsin to take the title.

Among the other highlights of the tournament were Wisconsin's Alando Tucker banking in a 3-pointer to beat Iowa in a thriller and the Hawkeyes' upset of second-seeded Michigan State in a quarterfinal.

## 2007: POWERFUL OHIO STATE ROLLS TO TOURNAMENT WIN

Entering the 2007 tournament with 15 straight victories, it came as no surprise that powerful Ohio State rolled through to a Big Ten tournament title. In fact, the three wins over Michigan, Purdue and Wisconsin came in the middle of a 23-game roll that saw the Buckeyes reach the national championship game.

Greg Oden played just six minutes in the first half of the final for Ohio State, but finished with a dozen points and four blocks for the winners. Mike Conley added a team-high 18 points for the Buckeyes while Ron Lewis scored 17.

## 2013: BUCKEYES USE STIFLING DEFENSE TO WIN AGAIN

In a classic Big Ten slugfest, Ohio State used an impressive defensive showing to top Wisconsin, 50-43, for the Buckeyes' third tournament title in four years and fourth in the past eight under head coach Thad Matta.

OSU had been in fifth place in the conference a month prior after a 22-point loss at Wisconsin. The tournament title game marked their eighth straight victory and their squad needed to come back from a nine-point deficit with an 8-0 run to close the first half.

Deshaun Thomas led all scorers with 17 points, but it was a series of plays off the bench by LaQuinton Ross that finally enabled the Buckeyes to gain separation in a second half in which the teams were within two points of each other for the first 15 1/2 minutes. Aaron Craft was named the most outstanding player.

"As I told the team afterward, I don't know if I've ever been prouder of a basketball team," Matta said.

## 2015: WISCONSIN TAKES FIRST-EVER OT TITLE GAME

In a special season that would see the Badgers go all the way to the NCAA Championship game, Nigel Hayes scored 25 points, Frank Kaminsky added 19, and Wisconsin outscored Michigan State 11-0 in overtime Sunday for an 80-69 victory.

This marked the first time the conference tournament title game went to overtime, as Kaminsky was named the most outstanding player.

"We've done it before and we've been down all tournament," Wisconsin's Sam Dekker said of overcoming an 11-point deficit in the second half. "So, I guess we just kind of had to ride it out and know that we were going to make a run and we started hitting some shots."

## 2019: WINSTON'S LAYUP CAPS MICHIGAN STATE RIVALRY SWEEP

Cassius Winston's driving layup with 29.1 seconds left gave Michigan State the lead for good as the Spartans rallied to overcome an injury to Kyle Ahrens to add a Big Ten tournament title to a regular-season crown with a 65-60 victory over Michigan.

It marked the first time in rivalry history that either team won three games over the other in one season. MSU swept the regular-season series and beat Michigan on the final game of the regular season to win a share of the other title.

"Any time you beat your rival, it's good," MSU coach Tom Izzo said. "But anytime you win a championship, it's better. So this is one time when it superseded the win over Michigan. I know they went together, but the battle cry was to win a championship."



## UNITED CENTER

In 1988, William Wirtz, owner of the Chicago Blackhawks, and Jerry Reinsdorf, majority owner and Team Chairman of the Chicago Bulls, formed a new partnership to create an arena that would take sports and entertainment into the 21st century.

The United Center, home to the Chicago Blackhawks and Chicago Bulls, is the largest arena in the United States. Construction was begun in April of 1992, with the ribbon cutting ceremony being held on August 18, 1994.

Since opening, the United Center has hosted over 200 events each year. Some of the events the United Center has been proud to host include the 1996 Democratic National Convention, The Rolling Stones, Eric Clapton, Bruce Springsteen and the E Street Band, Paul McCartney, U2, The Who, The 3 Tenors, Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus, Disney on Ice, the Big Ten Men's Basketball Tournament, the Men's NCAA Basketball Tournament, the Great Eight Classic, Illinois College Basketball, and Champions on Ice.

The United Center has hosted over forty million guests since its opening in 1994.

Since its inception in 1896, the pursuit and attainment of academic excellence has been a priority for every Big Ten member institution. But maintaining the conference's standard of competing at the highest level in athletics also endures as an important component of the Big Ten experience. Striking that balance between academics and athletics is integral to the Big Ten's identity. Recognized as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten strives for success from its students not only on the field and in the classroom, but around the world as well.

## PREMIER ACADEMIC INSTITUTIONS

The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all 14 Big Ten universities, which is widely considered to be the model for effective and voluntary collaboration among top research universities.

Every Big Ten Academic Alliance institution ranks among the top 70 universities in the nation according to the 2022 Academic Ranking of World Universities, including six in the top 30.

The Big Ten leads all conferences with more than 1,900 Academic All-Americans, including 48 honorees during the 2021-22 academic year.

Big Ten Academic Alliance schools annually conduct \$10 billion in funded research, \$5 billion more than any other conference.

## A HISTORY OF ATHLETIC SUCCESS

Big Ten schools have won at least five national championships in 24 of the last 28 years, averaging nearly seven per year during that span.

Since the 2005-06 academic year, current Big Ten institutions have claimed 109 team national championships in 26 different sports.

## BROAD-BASED PROGRAMMING

The Big Ten will administer more than \$240 million in direct financial support to more than 9,800 students competing in intercollegiate athletics for more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams in 42 different sports.

The Big Ten sponsors 28 official conference sports, 14 for men and 14 for women, including the addition of men's ice hockey and men's and women's lacrosse in this decade.

The Big Ten leads the nation in total students competing in intercollegiate athletics and participation opportunities, and sponsors more official sports than all conferences except the Ivy League.

More than 1,500 Big Ten competitors have participated in the Olympics, winning more than 500 medals, including more than 200 gold. The Big Ten Conference enjoyed its finest performance at a single Olympic Games during the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo, Japan, as athletes with Big Ten ties set conference records by earning 51 total medals and 22 gold medals during the 17-day competition. All 14 Big Ten member schools had an athlete win at least one medal in Tokyo, also a first in conference history. Big Ten Olympians collected nearly 80 medals in the most recent games in PyeongChang and Beijing.

## PASSIONATE FOLLOWING

The Big Ten leads all conferences with 6.4 million alumni and nearly 580,000 students.

Each year more than 11 million patrons attend Big Ten home contests, as the conference has led the nation in attendance for men's basketball, ice hockey, volleyball and wrestling.

## LEADERS IN INNOVATION

Took part in the nation's first bowl game, winning the 1902 Rose Bowl Game, and signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl with permanent conference affiliations.

Awarded the first Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915, honoring outstanding seniors who demonstrated excellence in academics and athletics.

Formed the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, enlisting former students that competed in conference athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

Became the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

Implemented the first collegiate football system of instant replay in 2004, which the NCAA approved for use among all conferences in 2006.

Launched the Big Ten Network (BTN) in 2007, the first national conference-owned television network.

Began partnering with the Ivy League to study the effects of head injuries in sports in 2012.

Accepted Johns Hopkins University as the conference's first sport affiliate members in men's and women's lacrosse in 2013 and 2015, respectively, and added Notre Dame as a sport affiliate member in men's ice hockey in 2017.

## EXTENSIVE TELEVISION EXPOSURE

Through the Big Ten's current media agreements with BTN, ABC/ESPN, CBS and FOX, more than 2,000 Big Ten events are produced and distributed nationally and globally on an annual basis.

BTN is in almost 60 million homes across the United States and Canada, and is also available via the Fox Sports App, delivering live and on-demand programming to computers, smartphones and tablets. B1G+ streams hundreds of additional events each season.

## COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

For more than 30 years, through the Big Ten's SCORE (Success Comes Out of Reading Everyday) program, the conference has partnered with Chicago elementary schools to improve reading performance.

Surrounding the Big Ten Football Championship Game and Basketball Tournaments, the conference has held numerous community initiatives, partnered with the College Football Playoff Foundation and other events such as the Big Ten Career Expo, SaturDAY of Service and Youth Football Clinics. In addition, the Big Ten has hosted a downtown 5K, collaborated with a local breast cancer awareness group and provided unique event experiences for military veterans.

# WAYNE DUKE POSTGRADUATE AWARD

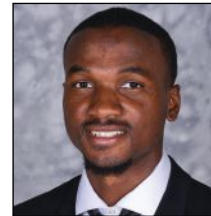

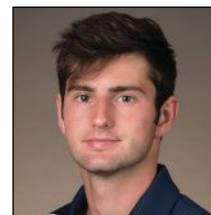
