
The task for Head Coach Jim Calhoun and his Huskies in 2004-05 appears to be a daunting one. The road ahead for a defending national champion is bound to be a bumpy one, especially when trying to replace three standout performers, 1,000-point scorers each, two of which were NBA lottery picks and the third is the school's all-time assist leader.

Despite those facts, UConn's run to the 2004 National Championship showed that the cupboard is certainly not bare in Storrs. Competition among the returnees will be fierce, including several players who played a significant role in the title run. Add in a group of players that includes multiple high school

All-Americans and players that have already proven themselves at the highest level of college basketball and it becomes clear that Coach Calhoun and his Huskies will again be a regular in the national rankings and well into tournament time in March and April.

Junior **Rashad Anderson** (Lakeland, Florida) returns to anchor the shooting guard spot for the Huskies. Anderson was one of the nation's best performers in the final month of last season and enhanced his reputation as one of the country's most explosive scorers. Anderson averaged 11.2 points per game on the year, reaching double figures in 12 of the last 15 contests and was the No. 2 scorer in the NCAA Tournament behind teammate Ben Gordon. Anderson was named to the NCAA Final Four All-Tournament team and also earned a spot on the Phoenix Regional All-Tournament team, along the way averaging 17.3 points in the NCAA Tournament and shooting 48.8% from long range in the six tourney games. Anderson has 142 three-point field goals in two seasons and is on pace to shatter the UConn record in that category.

Junior forward **Denham Brown** (Toronto, Canada), like Anderson, has appeared in 72 career contests, the most of any returning Husky. Brown got off to a scorching start in 2003-04, reaching double figures 12 times in the first 17 games. The second half of the year saw Brown reach double digits only three more times, a slump that saw him lose his starting position to Anderson. Once again, Brown has had a very productive summer, leading the Canadian National team in scoring at 13.8 per game during play in the Four Nations Tournament, a lead-in to the Olympic Games. This is the second consecutive summer that Brown has competed for his country's Senior National

team. He enters 2004-05 as a 40.2% career shooter from three-point range as a Husky.

Junior forward/center **Hilton Armstrong** (Peekskill, New York) has appeared in 67 contests in two seasons and has proven to be active on the boards and as a shot blocker at the defensive end of the floor. Armstrong will be part of a group looking to fill the void left by the graduation of National Player of the Year Emeka Okafor on the frontline. Armstrong has made 23 career starts, 22 of which came as a freshman.


Junior forward **Ed Nelson** (Fort Lauderdale, Florida) joins the Husky active roster after sitting out 2004-05 as a transfer from Georgia Tech. While at Tech, Nelson was the 2001-02 ACC Freshman of the Year, averaging 8.3 points and 6.7 rebounds in 62

games over his two seasons. He is a tenacious rebounder who gave Okafor fits in practice last season, and he also has an excellent shooting touch. Nelson will play a major role in the Husky frontcourt.

The final member of the junior class is forward **Ryan Thompson** (Gold Coast, Australia). Thompson sat out last season after transferring from Western Nebraska Community College. He is a solid shooter and excellent passer who will battle for playing time at the small forward and backcourt positions.

The sophomore class is made up of a foursome of talented performers, each of whom should see plenty of playing time in the coming season.

Sophomore forward/center **Josh Boone** (Mount Airy, Maryland) was a BIG EAST All-Rookie team selection a year ago and was one of the key performers in UConn's successful postseason run through the BIG EAST and NCAA Tournaments. Boone started 37 games and averaged 5.9 points and 5.8 rebounds, while also blocking just under two shots per contest.





Boone has enormous shoes to fill in Okafor's, but showed plenty of reasons as a freshman for Husky fans to be very comfortable in the center spot for several more years to come.


Sophomore **Charlie Villanueva** (Brooklyn, New York) came to UConn a year ago as the most heralded newcomer in the program's history. He proceeded to score in double figures in seven of his first eight contests and by year's end had earned a spot on the BIG EAST All-Rookie team. Villanueva is equally dangerous from the inside and the outside and spent the summer with the United States Under-21 National team, honing his skills against some of the best young players in the country and in the world. Villanueva has added both much-needed weight and strength and the key to a successful campaign will be the continued development of the toughness needed in the always rugged BIG EAST Conference.

Sophomore forward **Marcus White** (Chicago, Illinois) returns to the Husky line-up after missing 2003-04 due to a bulging disk in his back. White is the most tenacious Husky rebounder and, after off-season back surgery, is expected to make a healthy return to the frontcourt. White played in only four games a year ago, but averaged 4.1 points and 5.6 rebounds in 23 games as a freshman, grabbing seven or more boards in ten of the final 17 games.

Sophomore point guard **Marcus Williams** (Los Angeles, California) also returns to the Husky line-up after missing the final 14 regular season games and UConn's entire postseason run due to academic difficulties. Williams came off the bench in 16 games to average 2.9 points and 4.3 assists as a freshman, including a 13-assist effort in a win over Sacred Heart,

one assist off the school record. Williams will enter preseason as the front-runner to replace school assist leader Taliek Brown.

A talented trio of freshmen joins the Husky roster for 2004-05.

Freshman forward **Rudy Gay** (Baltimore, Maryland) is a consensus first-team All-American and widely regarded as the top-rated high school player to attend college this season. Gay has off-the-chart athletic ability and has yet to come across a play where a dunk is not a possibility. He is expected to make an immediate impact in the frontcourt.

Freshman guard **Antonio Kellogg** (Oakland, California) might be the least well-known of the Husky freshmen, but that may not be for long. Kellogg is an

explosive three-point shooter and tenacious defender. He averaged nearly 24 points per game over his final two seasons of high school.

Freshman guard **A.J. Price** (Amityville, New York) comes to UConn as one of the top prep guards in the country. He is an excellent long-range shooter, hitting on 130 three-pointers in his three prep seasons and scored 1,394 points in his career. Price has the ability to play either the point or shooting guard positions, giving Coach Calhoun the type of flexibility he has grown accustomed to in the backcourt.



During the past 18 years, University of Connecticut head basketball coach Jim Calhoun, a two-time National Champion and 2004 Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame Finalist, has steadily built UConn basketball into one of the elite college programs in the nation.

The move toward national prominence for the University of Connecticut basketball program began in May of 1986 when Jim Calhoun was named head coach.

Eighteen years later, UConn Basketball sits atop the college basketball landscape with a pair of National Championships, two Final Four appearances and a place among the elite programs in college basketball.

In February of 2004, Jim Calhoun was named one of 16 finalists for election in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. Despite narrowly missing election, Calhoun has cemented his place among the coaching greats and as a future member of the Hall by leading the Huskies to a second NCAA National Championship in the past six seasons and becoming only the third coach to win multiple national titles since the tournament field expanded to 64 teams in 1985.

In 32 seasons as a head coach on the NCAA Division I collegiate level, Jim Calhoun's overall collegiate head coaching record is 680-302 (69.2% winning effort). That includes a 248-137 (64.4%) record in 14 seasons as head coach at Northeastern (MA) University and a 432-165 (72.4%) mark in 18 seasons at Connecticut.

In 2003-04, the Huskies began the season as the consensus No. 1 team in the nation and was one of only two teams to spend the entire season in the top ten en route to the program's second national title. UConn finished the year with a 33-6 overall record, another top ten national ranking and the school's sixth

BIG EAST Tournament Championship. Coach Calhoun reached several milestones this season in addition to being a Hall of Fame finalist, notching his 650th career win vs. Sacred Heart and registering his 400th career victory at UConn in the season opener vs. Yale. With the win over Syracuse on February 2, Coach Calhoun passed John Wooden to move into the top 20 on the NCAA All-Time Division I Coaching Wins list and currently stands in 18th place in NCAA history with 680 career wins.

In 2002-03, Coach Calhoun faced the biggest challenge of his life and tackled it with the will and determination that college basketball followers have grown to expect from him and his program. On February 3, 2003, Jim Calhoun announced that he had been diagnosed with prostate cancer. He took an immediate leave of absence from the team and underwent surgery on February 6 to have his prostate removed. He was released from the hospital on February 9 and within days was back in the office, involved in the many day-to-day aspects of running the program. On February 22, Jim Calhoun remarkably returned to the sidelines for the team's match-up with St. John's at Gampel Pavilion, only 13 days after successful surgery to eliminate his prostate cancer.

UConn advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the 12th time under Coach Calhoun, making the program one of only five schools to advance to national postseason play for the last 17 straight seasons and the Huskies have advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16 ten times in 12 trips to the tourney under Coach Calhoun.

Under Coach Calhoun, UConn has captured a league record 14 BIG EAST Championships, eight regular season crowns and six tournament titles. The Huskies are 27-12 in BIG EAST Tournament play under Calhoun.

In his 18 seasons at Connecticut, Jim Calhoun has compiled a stunning 44-13 overall record in national postseason tournament competition (32-9 in NCAA play, 12-4 in NIT play). His 32 NCAA wins at UConn, all achieved in the past 15 years, far outdistances the entire total of four NCAA victories recorded at Connecticut before Coach Calhoun took over the Husky basketball program in the spring of 1986.

Jim Calhoun has led UConn to 12 NCAA bids in the past 15 years. Under Coach Calhoun's direction, UConn has never lost a NCAA First Round game and is 22-2 in the First and Second Rounds. The Huskies have earned ten NCAA Sweet 16 berths in the past 15 years, six Elite Eight appearances, two NCAA Final Four trips and two National Championships.

Born May 10, 1942 in Braintree, MA, Jim Calhoun and his wife Pat have two sons, James and Jeffrey. James and his wife Jennifer have two daughters, Emily (born 3/5/99) and Katie (born 12/29/00) and a son Samuel Patrick (born 6/8/03). Jeffrey and his wife Amy have two daughters Avery (born 1/26/02) and Reese (born 4/7/03).

Exceeding expectations has become a common occurrence in 18 seasons for Jim Calhoun and the University of Connecticut. But what happened during the 2003-04 college basketball season will be remembered for the fact that, even in meeting people's lofty expectations, these Huskies were still capable of exceeding them.

The Huskies entered the year as far-and-away the consensus choice as the country's best team. With the preseason national player of the year in Emeka Okafor and another of the nation's top ten players in Ben Gordon, UConn boasted an inside-outside combination not normally seen at the college level.

But the odds were against Connecticut in many ways. No team had gone wire-to-wire in college basketball in nine years and only three had turned the trick in the past 15 years.

Injuries would play a factor throughout the year and precocious and talented newcomers would work all year long to fit in with a mix of experienced returnees and trusted veterans. It was a delicate balance that Coach Calhoun and his staff managed all year, along with the runaway expectations that continually hovered.

And despite some doubters along the way, this group of UConn Huskies left a lasting impression, most especially when it counted most, putting together a dominating postseason run through New York City in the BIG EAST Tournament and continuing through Buffalo, Phoenix and finally San Antonio in an emphatic march to the national title.

So in the end, the Huskies did just what everyone thought they would, winning the school's second national championship in the past six seasons. But, as those who followed it know, it turned out to be so much more than that. The consensus was that UConn would reach the Final Four, but by a margin of 17.5 points per contest in the four games to get there? Once in San Antonio, the Huskies were again the popular pick. But coming back from down by eight points with under three minutes to go against Duke in the national semifinals? And by burying Georgia Tech in the title game, leading by as many as 25 points in the process? Once again, expectations met and exceeded.

UConn finished the year with a 33-6 mark, winning 30 or more games for the fifth time under Calhoun. The Huskies finished in the top ten in the national rankings for the eighth time in the past 15 seasons and reached national postseason play for the 17th consecutive season. In addition to winning the school's second NCAA National Championship, the Huskies also captured the BIG EAST Tournament Championship for the sixth time and in the process set a BIG EAST record for titles with the school's 14th BIG EAST crown.

Jim Calhoun finished his 32nd season as a collegiate head coach with an overall record of 680-302, ranking No. 7 in wins among active Division I coaches. He became only the third coach to win multiple national titles since the tournament field expanded to 64 teams in 1985. He has a record of 432-165 in 18 seasons at UConn, including stunning marks of 32-9 in the NCAA Tournament and 27-12 in the BIG EAST Tournament.

The Huskies' march towards San Antonio opened at Gampel Pavilion for the first round of the Preseason NIT. The Huskies matched up with intrastate foe Yale November 17 and struggled in the first half,

actually trailing the Bulldogs by a 31-28 count at intermission. UConn seized control of the contest on the strength of a 9-0 run in the second half and Connecticut held off its feisty opponent 70-60. Two nights later, UConn earned a trip to Madison Square Garden with a 93-79 victory over Nevada. Nevada swingman Kirk Snyder, who led the Wolf Pack to a NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 berth in March, scored 22 points. However, he was outdone by Ben Gordon, who established a new career high with 37 points en route to leading the Huskies past Nevada 93-79.

After a 111-64 drubbing of Sacred Heart on November 22, the Huskies traveled to the world's most famous arena for a Preseason NIT semifinal match up with ACC foe Georgia Tech. The Ramblin' Wreck led by as many as 17 in the final stages of the second half, taking advantage of Emeka Okafor's limited presence due to back spasms. Tech would defeat the No. 1 team in the land 77-61, but the Huskies would have their vengeance in April. In the meantime, UConn would vent some aggression at Utah's expense. The Huskies annihilated the Utes 76-44 in the Preseason NIT Consolation Game, handing Utah its worst loss in the Rick Majerus era.

UConn cruised through December, defeating six outmatched opponents; Lehigh, Army, Quinnipiac, Iona, Ball State, and UMass by an average margin of 32.3 points. December did include the debut of much heralded freshman Charlie Villanueva on December 6 against Army. Villanueva began his UConn career with a 16 point five rebound performance.

Next on the Huskies' slate was a January 2 trip to Houston for a match up with Rice. The game served as a homecoming for Okafor, but the Owls did their best to play spoiler. UConn's lead was only four midway through the second half, but turned the tide of the game with a 14-6 run over the next five minutes. Autry Court gave the Huskies a taste of life on the road before UConn opened up BIG EAST play against Rutgers at the RAC. Ben Gordon scored seven straight UConn points late in the second half, giving UConn its largest lead of the game, 72-66, with 2:20 to go. However, the Huskies could not close the deal at the foul line and needed a savvy play to end the game. UConn broke Rutgers' full court press and played keep away from Rutgers defense desperate to give a foul, allowing time to expire.

Next up was a match up against No. 6 and undefeated Oklahoma; a game that many viewed as a measuring stick for how good the Huskies really were. UConn was up to the challenge, stepping on the Sooners' throat early and never letting up. Okafor scored 21 points to lead five Huskies in double-figures as Connecticut dismantled Oklahoma 86-59 on CBS. Incidentally, Okafor was one block away from recording his second-career triple-double.

Connecticut remained perfect in BIG EAST play with a 94-70 decision over Georgetown and traveled to the Dean Dome

for a nationally televised showdown with No. 9 North Carolina. The Huskies trailed 50-36 at the half, but rallied to take an 81-80 edge on a Rashad Anderson baseline jumper with 2:20 to go. The Husky defense made a stop on UNC ensuing possession and Okafor dropped in his career-high 29th point of the game with 1:30 remaining. Those were the last points the Huskies would score though, and Rashad McCants broke UConn's heart for the second consecutive year with a pair of 3-pointers in the final 1:15 to give the Tar Heels an 86-83 win over then No. 1 Connecticut.

The Huskies looked to put that game in the past when they welcomed No. 9 Pittsburgh to Hartford for a Big Monday contest. UConn led by as many as 10 in the first half, but Pitt was able to battle back and took a 61-60 lead with 4:20 left in regulation. However, Okafor slammed home a Taliek Brown miss to give the Huskies the lead for good with 3:53 to play.

UConn was handed its first conference loss of the season when Providence came to Hartford and defeated the Huskies by a 66-56 count. Junior All-American Ryan Gomes scored 26 and snared 12 boards to lead the Friars to victory. The Huskies quickly rebounded and avenged last year's loss to Virginia Tech with a 96-60 outclassing of the Hokies on January 28 in Blacksburg. UConn remained on the road and improved to 5-1 in BIG EAST action with a hard fought 63-58 victory over a very tough Boston College team.

The Huskies then welcomed defending champion Syracuse to Hartford for the second consecutive year and drilled the Orange for the third consecutive time with an 84-56 victory. Taliek Brown blanketed Gerry McNamara, holding the Syracuse guard to only nine points on 2-of-17 shooting. West Virginia traveled to Storrs and the Huskies handled the Mountaineers easily with an 88-58 victory. Gordon and Okafor scored 24 and 23 points respectively.

Riding a wave of momentum after four consecutive conference wins, the Huskies had two very difficult road tests, at Notre Dame and at Pittsburgh, on the horizon. Chris Thomas erased a three point UConn lead at the half with a 31 point effort on 9-of-21 shooting including 6-of-10 from deep as the Irish defeated UConn 80-74 in South Bend. UConn traveled to Pitt and pulled to within four points of the Panthers several times in the second half. However, Pitt mounted an 11-0 run to seize control of the game and cruised to a 75-68 victory on February 15.

Three days later, the Huskies defeated Miami 76-63 in Hartford, giving Jim Calhoun his 14th 20-win season at Connecticut. Okafor and the Huskies were more than ready for a rematch with Notre Dame just 12 days after the Huskies fell to the Irish in Indiana. Okafor scored 14 points, corralled a career-high 22 boards and swatted seven shots to lead the Huskies past the Irish, 61-50 on CBS.

UConn then thumped an undermanned St. John's team by a 71-53 score. The Huskies held the Red Storm to just 9% shoot-

ing (3-of-32) in the first half and led by as many as 30 points en route to victory. The Huskies remained on the road to square off with Villanova in Philadelphia. The match up turned out to be one of Connecticut's classic regular season contest in the Jim Calhoun era. Gordon led all Huskies with 21 points but it was Rashad Anderson who hit the biggest shot of his career to date. The sophomore swingman drained a game-tying 3-pointer with seven seconds remaining in regulation to force overtime. That shot was the first of many clutch shots Anderson hit down the Huskies' stretch run. Hindered by back spasms yet again, Okafor recorded only two blocks, but one would be hard pressed to find any bigger than the two he blocked that afternoon. Okafor swatted a shot as time expired in regulation and as time expired in the first overtime, making a Josh Boone tip-in with time winding down in OT stand up.

In UConn's final regular season home game, the Huskies blitzed Seton Hall by an 89-67 score on national television. Okafor was honored as part of senior night festivities prior to the game and he lived up to the moment, recording 25 points, 15 rebounds and four blocks in his finale in Gampel. Taliek Brown was also honored prior to the game.

UConn traveled to Syracuse for the regular season finale for both teams. Syracuse would not lose a fourth straight game to the Huskies as the Orange were victorious, 67-56. But that was the last time UConn would be bested by an opponent for the remainder of the season.

The Huskies came into the 2004 BIG EAST Tournament as the No. 2 seed and were paired with No. 7 seed Notre Dame. The grudge match saw a dominating performance by Ben Gordon as the junior guard scored 29 points and chased down eight boards and Boone and Villanueva made up for Okafor's absence from the lineup. Boone scored eight points and grabbed 16 rebounds and Villanueva put together one of the finest performances of his young career with 16 points and 13 boards.

The Huskies next moved onto the BIG EAST Tournament semifinals on March 12 for a showdown with No. 11 seed Villanova. Gordon took his next step towards breaking Allen Iverson's BIG EAST Tournament scoring record with a clutch 29 point performance on 10-of-15 shooting. With Okafor still resting his ailing back, freshman Josh Boone also came up huge once again, dropping in 11 points and hauling down 15 caroms. Boone also swatted six shots.

That set up a rematch between Pittsburgh and UConn; the two squads that have played for the last three BIG EAST Tournament Crowns. Emeka Okafor returned to the lineup and scored 11 points and grabbed 13 rebounds and the Huskies jumped out to a 13-2 lead to start the game. However, Pitt was in control for the remainder of the first half and most of the second. But the game served as a microcosm for the Huskies season; a strong start was eclipsed by a bumpy middle of the contest. However, the Huskies saved the best for last, muster-

ing up the will to end the game on a 21-7 run to take home the hardware with a 61-58 triumph. Gordon scored 11 of the Huskies' final 21 points including an acrobatic runner in the lane with 30 seconds remaining to give the Huskies the lead for good. The Championship was UConn's sixth, tying Georgetown for the most in BIG EAST annals.

UConn was sent up to Buffalo for the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship as the Phoenix Regional's No. 2 seed. UConn squared off with No. 15 seed Vermont and fell behind 7-0 in the game's early goings. However, Anderson hit on a career-high six 3-point field goals to keep the Huskies in it early and then blew the game open later on as UConn cruised to a 72-55 win. Anderson finished with 22 points to lead four Huskies in double-figures. Okafor snared a game-high 14 boards.

As fate would have it, Jim Calhoun and the Huskies would face longtime assistant coach Dave Leitao who was in his third season as DePaul's head coach. Gordon scored 18 points and Okafor tallied 10 points and 12 boards to lead UConn out of the HSBC Center with a 72-55 victory and into the Sweet 16 for the 10th time under Calhoun.

If the Huskies were going to advance to their second final four in six years, they would have to go through two SEC schools. First on the Huskies slate was Matt Freije and a Vanderbilt team that upset No. 3 seed North Carolina State. The Commodores pulled to within seven with 12:00 remaining but Anderson hit a back-breaking 3-pointer to mount a decisive 8-0 run, ending Vandy's run.

The next SEC school the Huskies would face in Phoenix would be Alabama. Ben Gordon continued his hot streak with a 36 point effort on 11-of-19 shooting performance and Rashad Anderson looked like the next great swingman at Connecticut with a 28 point effort as the Huskies marched on to the Final Four with an 87-71 triumph over the Crimson Tide in the Phoenix Regional Final.

The Huskies traveled to San Antonio, looking to exorcise last year's demons at the Alamodome. The Huskies national semifinal match up with Duke was undoubtedly the game of the tournament. In almost a carbon copy of the Huskies' BIG EAST Tournament Final showdown with Pitt, UConn sprinted out to an early 15-4 lead on a Charlie Villanueva lay up at the 14:05 mark. However, Okafor picked up his second foul early and was limited to only two minutes of playing time in the first half and the Blue Devils took advantage and stormed out to a 41-26 halftime lead. However, Anderson, who seemed to hit a big shot every night down the stretch, drilled a 3-pointer at the 2:40 mark drawing the Huskies within five points. After the Husky defense stopped Duke, Gordon connected on a pair of free throws, bringing the Huskies within three, 75-72, with 2:07 to go. Okafor then scored five of the Huskies' final seven points including the lay up that put the Huskies up for good,

76-75, with 25 seconds to go. Anderson then made a pair of free throws with 11 seconds left, and Okafor made one of two with three seconds remaining to ice the game. Jim Calhoun improved to 4-2 against Duke in his career at UConn and has won the last four from the Blue Devils.

The Huskies trailed Georgia Tech 12-11 at the first half's 13:41 mark, but a jumper by Okafor at 12:46 gave Connecticut the lead it would not relinquish en route to its second National Championship. UConn outscored the Yellow Jackets 30-14 over the final 13 minutes of the first half to take a commanding 41-26 lead into the locker room. There would be no second half rally for the Ramblin' Wreck as Most Outstanding Performer Emeka Okafor poured in 24 points and snared 15 rebounds and classmate Ben Gordon dropped in 21 in their final game as a Husky. Rashad Anderson ended a sensational tournament with an 18-point effort. Jim Calhoun improved to 35-14 in NCAA Tournament play (32-9 at UConn) and is now a spotless 4-0 in his two appearances in the Final Four.

In addition to the collective accomplishments of the Huskies, several individuals achieved recognition throughout the course of the year.

Senior Taliek Brown completed his four-year career with a flourish, establishing UConn records for assists in a career (722) and in a single season (253). Brown was a 2003-04 All-BIG EAST Honorable Mention pick and earned a spot on the BIG EAST All-Tournament team. He is the only player in UConn history with 1,000 points and 700 assists.

Junior Ben Gordon finished his Husky career with 1,795 points, No. 6 all-time at UConn. He made himself eligible for the NBA Draft on April 14 and was taken with the No. 3 pick by the Chicago Bulls. He led the NCAA Tournament in scoring, earning a spot on the NCAA Final Four All-Tournament team, and was named the Phoenix Regional Most Outstanding Player and the Most Outstanding Performer of the BIG EAST Tournament. Gordon finished his career as the UConn leader in three-pointers made with 246.

Junior Emeka Okafor declared himself eligible for the NBA Draft on April 16 and was selected with the No. 2 pick by the Charlotte Bobcats, UConn's highest ever draft selection. Okafor was also selected for a spot on the 2004 United States Olympic team to compete in Greece in August. He is the first player in UConn history to earn National Player of the Year honors, earning top honors from the NABC and Sports Illustrated. He was the National Defensive Player of the Year as a junior and sophomore and led the nation in blocked shots both years. He was the 2004 National Scholar-Athlete of the Year and was a two-time Academic and Athletic All-American. He is the top shot blocker in the history of UConn and the BIG EAST and finished his career No. 7 in NCAA history in blocked shots and blocked shot average. He was named the Most Outstanding Performer at the 2004 Final Four and is the first player to earn the BIG EAST Player of the Year, Defensive Player of the Year and Scholar-Athlete of the Year awards.

Sophomore Rashad Anderson finished third on the team in scoring and earned a spot on the NCAA Final Four All-Tournament team and the Phoenix Regional All-Tournament team. He set a UConn record for three-pointers in the NCAA Tournament and finished No. 2 in the NCAA Tournament in scoring, behind Ben Gordon.

A pair of freshmen frontcourt performers also earned postseason recognition. Josh Boone and Charlie Villanueva were each named to the 2004 BIG EAST All-Rookie team.
