### IN THE POLLS

UCLA is unranked in the AP Top 25 and the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll. The Bruins received 36 votes in the coaches poll (Mar. 14) to come in at No. 28 and received three votes in the AP poll (Mar. 14) to rank 40th. Florida is ranked 15th in the AP and 12th in the Coaches Poll.

### HEAD COACH BEN HOWLAND ON THE NATIONAL CHARTS

Ben Howland earned his 300th victory of his career with the 72-54 win over DePaul in the 15th Annual John R. Wooden Classic (Dec. 13, 2008). He is currently 357-181 (.664), which ranks 32nd on the winningest active coaches list by percentage and 58th on the active list by victories. Howland's first career victory was his first game at Northern Arizona in 1994, a 71-69 victory over New Mexico Highlands. His 100th career victory came in his second season at Pittsburgh in the 77-65 win at home over Seton Hall (Jan. 13, 2001). His 200th win came in his third season at UCLA with the 56-37 home win over Delaware State (Nov. 19, 2005). Howland is 19-8 (.704) in the NCAA Tournament (15-5 (.750) at UCLA).

### BRUINS' INJURY REPORT

Junior guard Malcolm Lee is playing with a small cartilage tear in his left knee and after last night's win over Michigan State, received three staples in his head to close up a cut from an errant elbow. Freshman center Joshua Smith took a hard fall in last night's game as well and has a contusion on his right elbow. He'll play tomorrow when the Bruins face Florida.

# You Should Know ...

## YOU SHOULD KNOW ...

In the last six seasons, UCLA and Head Coach Ben Howland are 79-29 (.731) in Pacific-10 Conference play and 160-54 (.748) overall.

In the last six years in Pacific-10 Conference play, Head Coach Ben Howland is 35-19 (.648) on the road (35-13 everywhere, excluding Seattle) and 44-10 (.815) at home.

In the last six years, Head Coach Ben Howland and UCLA are 43-5 (.895) in the first game of a two-game Pac-10 weekend series and 29-19 (.604) in the second game (this doesn't include USC and non-conference weekends). The Bruins had won 32 consecutive games opening a Pac-10 weekend series until the loss at Arizona State (Feb. 12, 2009). Overall, UCLA is 53-11 (.828) in the opening game of a weekend series, but just 35-29 (.547) in the second game.

UCLA has four McDonald's All-Americans on its 2010-11 roster in junior guard Malcolm Lee (2008), sophomore forwards Travis and David Wear (2009) and freshman center Joshua Smith (2010).

UCLA saw its nation-leading streak of 13 straight years with an NBA Draft pick come to a halt with the 2010 NBA Draft on June 24, 2010 at the Theatre at Madison Square Garden in New York City. The streak began with Charles O'Bannon in 1997 and ended with Jrue Holiday and Darren Collison in 2009. In all, 20 UCLA Bruins were drafted in the 13-year span, including eight first-round picks. Additionally, 10 of those players drafted played for Head Coach Ben Howland (six first-round picks).

UCLA finished the 2008-09 season ranked No. 18 in both the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll and the Associated Press poll. The Bruins were unranked in both polls to start the 2009-10 campaign, snapping a streak of 75 straight weeks (since the 2005-06 preseason) in the Top 25 in the AP poll and a streak of 78 consecutive weeks in the Coaches Poll (since 2004-05 final poll), which was the longest streak in the nation. The Bruins haven't been ranked since.

UCLA has held 93 opponents under 60 points in the Ben Howland era (8th season) and is 90-3 (.968) in those contests.

Over the last six year's, UCLA's scoring defense of 66.1 in 2010-11 is the second highest only to last year's 68.6. UCLA allowed fewer than 60 points per game in the three seasons it reached the Final Four (59.0 in 2008, 59.9 in 2007 and 58.7 in 2006).

Ben Howland was the first UCLA coach since John Wooden to win three straight conference championships (2006-08) and is the only other coach at UCLA other than Wooden (nine) to make three straight trips to the Final Four.

UCLA set a school record for most wins in a three-year span with 97 from 2005-08 (35 in 2007-08, 30 in 2006-07 and 32 in 2005-06). UCLA compiled a record of 97-17 (.851) over that span (2005-06 to 2007-08). The previous high was 89 wins set in 1970-71 to 1972-73.

With its win over Texas A&M in the second round of the 2008 NCAA Tournament, UCLA won its 33rd game, which was the most in school history (UCLA ended the season with 35 wins). The old mark of 32 was set by the 1995 national championship team and was later tied in 2006.

# Notes and Streaks

UCLA became one of only three schools in the history of college basketball to win 30 or more games in three straight seasons (2006-08). The Bruins join Kentucky (1947-49/Adolph Rupp), Kentucky (1996-98/Rick Pitino (2)/Tubby Smith (1)) and Memphis (2006-08/John Calipari) as the only programs to accomplish that feat. This also means that head coach Ben Howland is just one of three coaches in college basketball history to win at least 30 games in three consecutive seasons (joining Rupp and Calipari).

UCLA became the Pacific-10 Conference's 7th No. 1 seed for the NCAA Tournament in 2008 and became the first one seed from the Pac-10 to reach the Final Four.

In 2008, UCLA became the first school to make three consecutive trips to the Final Four since Michigan State accomplished the feat from 1999-2001.

Since UCLA's 13-year streak ended, winning three straight league titles in the Pac-10 has occurred just five times – Oregon State in 1980-81-82, Arizona in 1988-89-90-91, UCLA in 1995-96-97, Stanford in 1999-00-01 and UCLA in 2006-07-08. Only three of those (Oregon State, UCLA and UCLA) had three straight outright titles.

## FOURTEEN FORMER BRUINS ON CURRENT NBA ROSTERS

There are 14 former UCLA Bruins currently on NBA rosters as of Mar. 18, 2011. The 14 Bruins in the NBA include: **Arron Afflalo**, Denver; **Trevor Ariza**, New Orleans; **Matt Barnes**, Los Angeles Lakers; **Darren Collison**, Indiana; **Baron Davis**, Cleveland; **Jordan Farmar**, New Jersey; **Dan Gadzuric**, New Jersey; **Jrue Holiday**, Philadelphia; **Ryan Hollins**, Cleveland; **Jason Kapon**, Philadelphia; **Kevin Love**, Minnesota; **Luc Richard Mbah a Moute**, Milwaukee; **Earl Watson**, Utah and **Russell Westbrook**, Oklahoma City. UCLA leads the nation with 14 former players on NBA payrolls. Duke and Kentucky are next with 13 apiece, and Kansas and North Carolina each can boast of 12 players in the NBA. Rounding out those teams with double-digit players in the NBA are Connecticut with 11 and Texas and Arizona with 10 each. The ACC heads the list of conferences with 56 active NBA players. That is good for an average of 4.7 former players per school, but it is not the best average this season. That distinction belongs to the Pac-10, with 48 total former players and 4.8 former players per school in the NBA. The Big 12 has 41 players in the NBA for a 3.4 average, the Big East has 54 former players in the NBA this season for a 3.4 average, and the SEC has 40 former players per school for a 3.3 average. The Big Ten brings up the rear of the BCS conferences with 29 players and an average of 2.6 former players per school.

## 2010-11 PACIFIC-10 CONFERENCE MEDIA POLL

UCLA was selected to finish third among the league's 10 schools in the 2010-11 Pac-10 Conference Men's Basketball Preseason Media Poll, as announced Thursday at the conference's annual media day.

Washington owned the preseason poll's top spot, securing 33 of 35 first-place votes. Arizona was picked to finish second and received one first-place vote. Picked to finish third, UCLA also received one first-place vote in the preseason poll.

Arizona State was picked to finish fourth, followed by Washington State and USC. California was tabbed seventh, and Oregon, Stanford and Oregon rounded out the 10 teams in the preseason poll.

UCLA was represented at the event by head coach Ben Howland and freshman center Joshua Smith. The Pac-10 Conference hosted its men's basketball media event at L.A. Live's Nokia Theatre in downtown Los Angeles.

## HONEYCUTT NAMED TO THE JOHN R. WOODEN AWARD PRESEASON LIST

Sophomore forward Tyler Honeycutt was among the 50 players on the John R. Wooden Award Preseason Top 50 list, announced by the Los Angeles Athletic Club on Oct. 4, 2010. Honeycutt led UCLA in rebounding (6.5 rpg), steals (1.5 spg) and blocks (1.2 bpg) last season while being named to the Pac-10's All-Freshman team. He averaged 7.2 points per game but only attempted five shots per contest. He also finished fourth on the squad in assists (2.7 apg). Other Pac-10 players on the Top 50 list include Ty Abbott (Arizona State), Isaiah Thomas (Washington), Klay Thompson (Washington State), Nikola Vucevic (USC) and Derrick Williams (Arizona).



The 2010-11 season is UCLA's 14th with Clear Channel and the games will again air on AM 570 KLAC in Southern California. The games will be produced by ISP, UCLA's corporate and media rights holder.

Chris Roberts (talk@chrisrobertsonline.net) is in his 19th year as the "Voice of the Bruins" and his 30th season broadcasting NCAA Division I sports in Los Angeles. Since 1982, Roberts has broadcast more NCAA Division One games in Los Angeles radio than anyone. Prior to joining the Bruins in the Fall of 1992, he served as the voice of the Long Beach State 49ers for 10 years and one with Cal State Fullerton. During that time, he was the sports director at KFI/KOST 103FM. A four-time Golden Mike winner, he also handles the play-by-play duties for UCLA football. He has also authored two books, Stadium Stories: UCLA Bruins and UCLA Football Vault, which he co-authored with Bill Bennett.

A five-time nominee for the Southern California Broadcasters Association "Play-by-Play Broadcaster of the Year" award, Roberts is a voter for both the Heisman Trophy and the Wooden Award.

Don MacLean, the all-time leading scorer in UCLA and Pac-10 history (2,608 points, 1989-92) and a nine-year NBA standout, will be in his ninth year as the color analyst. Tracy Murray, another former Bruin standout (averaged 18.3 ppg at UCLA) and a 12-year NBA veteran, will be in his third year serving as analyst when MacLean is fulfilling television obligations.

## UCLA SIGNS NORMAN POWELL

UCLA head coach Ben Howland announced on Nov. 10, 2010 the signing of Norman Powell to a National Letter of Intent to attend UCLA in the fall of 2011.

Powell, a 6-foot-3-inch, 200-pound guard out of San Diego, Calif., and Lincoln High School, was named to the first team Press-Telegram's 32nd Best in the West team and finished ninth in the voting with 231 points.

Powell helped the Hornets to a 29-2 overall record as a junior in 2009-10 for head coach Jason Bryant. Lincoln HS won the Western League with a 12-0 mark and won the final 24 games of the year, culminating in the 2010 CIF Division II Boys' State Championship. Powell led the Hornets in the title game, their first state title since 1994, scoring 24 points as his team defeated St. Francis of Mountain View, Calif., 74-59. The Hornets ended the year ranked No. 10 in the state and No. 75 in the nation.

"I'm really excited about Norman Powell joining our basketball program and family," Howland said. "He's one of the most athletic kids that we will have had in this program in a while and one of the most athletic kids since I've been here. He's very explosive and has outstanding quickness and will be an excellent defensive player.

"He's very good at making plays, both for himself and his teammates. He is an outstanding addition to

our program and is an outstanding young man and comes from a great family."

Powell averaged 19.7 points, 4.9 rebounds, 2.7 steals (led the team), 1.7 assists and 1.0 blocks per game last year as a junior. He scored a season-high 34 points twice on the year (in a 79-74 loss to Crenshaw HS and in an 84-72 win over Central HS (Fresno, Calif.)) He averaged 7.8 points and 2.0 rebounds per game as a sophomore during the 2008-09 campaign. He is rated as the No. 15 shooting guard in the nation and the No. 47 overall recruit in the country by ESPN. He was rated the No. 2 shooting guard in the state, the No. 15 shooting guard in the country and the No. 69 overall recruit by Scout.com. Powell was also rated the No. 3 guard in the state, the No. 16 shooting guard in the country and the No. 59 overall recruit by Rivals.com.

## RANKING UCLA

UCLA returned to the top of the Associated Press poll for the first time in 12 years on Nov. 27, 2006. Prior to that ranking, the last time the Bruins were ranked number one was in the final AP poll of the 1995 season, the year the Bruins won their 11th national title.

The Bruins have spent a total of 134 weeks ranked first in the AP poll (24 weeks longer than second-place Duke, 110 weeks at number one).

The UCLA Bruins are 21-12 (.636) against ranked teams in the last five seasons. UCLA was 11-2 against ranked teams in 2006-07, 7-2 versus ranked foes in 2007-08, 1-4 against ranked teams in 2008-09, 0-2 in 2009-10 and 2-2 in 2010-11.

## HONORING COACH WOODEN

UCLA is honoring its late legendary Coach John R. Wooden this season on the jerseys with a patch of his Pyramid of Success (seen in a close-up below on Joshua Smith's photo) with his initials JRW in white across the pyramid. Coach Wooden passed away this summer (June 4, 2010) at the age of 99. Wooden guided UCLA to 10 national championships including seven consecutive titles from 1967 to 1973.

# Head Coach Ben Howland



Ben Howland knows how to rebuild a collegiate basketball program. He did it at Northern Arizona and again at Pittsburgh. And Howland's done it at UCLA. In his eighth year as the Bruins' head coach in 2009-10, Howland led UCLA to back-to-back-to-back Pacific-10 titles (2006-08) and back-to-back-to-back Final Four appearances (2006-08). He also guided the Bruins to a school-record 35 victories in 2008. Additionally, he won more games in a three-year span (97 from 2006-08) than any other coach in UCLA history. In 2006, he guided the Bruins back to the NCAA Championship Game (for the first time since the Bruins' 1995 national title). UCLA also won the 2008 and 2006 Pac-10 Tournament Championships (first since 1987). He garnered two National Coach of the Year honors in 2006 – the Jim Phelan Award (CollegeInsider.com) and from Collegehoops.net. Howland was the 2006 Pac-10 Coach of the Year and earned numerous other Conference Coach of the Year honors as well as being named the USBWA Dist. IX and *Basketball Times* All-West Coast Coach of the Year.

In 2006, he guided UCLA to the NCAA Championship game and to an NCAA Regional Championship, 32 victories (tying the school record 32 wins set in 1995) and a 12-game winning streak (longest since 1997) entering the NCAA title contest. He just concluded his 16<sup>th</sup> year as a collegiate head coach (he's been a Conference Coach of the Year selection in three different leagues – 2006, Pac-10 Coach of the Year at UCLA/2002, Big East Coach of the Year at Pittsburgh/1997, Big Sky Coach of the Year at Northern Arizona) and his 28<sup>th</sup> season of collegiate basketball (as an assistant and head coach), he's 189-82 (.697, 271 games) at UCLA, including 160-54 (.748, 214 games) in the last five seasons as the Bruins' head coach.

He has led a team to the "Sweet 16" five times in the last nine years – Pittsburgh in 2002 and 2003 and UCLA in 2006, 2007 and 2008. Howland recorded his 100<sup>th</sup> Bruin win vs. Idaho State (Dec. 15, 2007), his 200<sup>th</sup> career win vs. Delaware State (Nov. 19, 2005) and won his 300<sup>th</sup> career win in the 72-54 victory over DePaul on Dec. 13, 2008. Howland's career mark is 357-181 (.664, 538 games).
