**March 23 — Iowa State 80, UCLA 56 (NCAA Midwest Region Semifinal)** —

Before 21,214 at The Palace at Auburn Hills in Auburn Hills, MI, UCLA's season ended with an 80-56 loss in the NCAA Sweet 16. The Bruins led early, 12-11 but trailed at the half, 40-28. The Hawkeyes built the lead to 16, but UCLA cut the margin to 11, 54-43, with 10:55 remaining but could get no closer.

Jerome Moiso recorded his 10th double-double of the year, finishing with 15 points (5-12, 5-5) and 10 rebounds, both team highs. Jason Kapon and Earl Watson (five assists) each scored eight points while JaRon Rush, Ryan Bailey and Dan Gadzuric added six each.

UCLA shot 33.9 from the floor, 23.5 from three-point range and 76.9 from the free throw line, with 32 rebounds, eight assists, seven steals, eight blocked shots and 15 turnovers.

Iowa State, which was led by Stevie Johnson, Marcus Fizer and Michael Nurse — all with 16 points, shot 51.7 from the floor, 60.0 (6-10) from three-point range and 70.6 (12-17) from the line, with 43 rebounds, 18 assists, nine steals, three blocked shots and 12 turnovers.

**March 18 — UCLA 105, Maryland 70 (NCAA Second Round)** —

Before 26,358 at The Metrodome in Minneapolis, MN, UCLA advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16 by defeating Maryland, 105-70. The Bruins 105 points rank sixth highest in school history for the NCAA Tournament and the 35-point margin of victory ranks fourth in UCLA Tournament history. The 105 points also ties UCLA's highest scoring total for the 1999-2000 season. UCLA jumped out to a 12-2 lead, was tied at 19, led by three (34-31) with 5:25 remaining and then outscored Maryland 15-2 to take a 49-33 halftime lead, shooting 72.4 (21-29) from the field. The Bruins outscored the Terps 16-2 in the first three-plus minutes of the second

half to build the lead to 30 with 16:42 remaining in the game.

The Bruins had five players in double figures, led by Earl Watson's 17 points (6-7, 5-6, 0-0) and school-record 16 assists to go with zero turnovers in 26 minutes. He scored 14 of UCLA's first 16 points of the second half, draining four three-point field goals in that span. Jerome Moiso (nine rebounds) and JaRon Rush (six boards) each scored 14 points, Dan Gadzuric added 13 points and six rebounds and Jason Kapon scored 11 points and passed for five assists. Rico Hines added nine points off the bench and Matt Barnes added eight. All 12 Bruins played and scored at least two points.

UCLA shot 62.5 from the floor (second-highest this season), 56.0 (a school record 14 three-point field goals on 25 attempts) from three-point range and 61.1 (11-18) from the free throw line, with 39

rebounds, a season-high 28 assists, 12 steals, five blocked shots and 16 turnovers.

Maryland, which was led by Lonny Baxter (22 points and 10 rebounds), shot 37.1 from the floor, 27.3 (6-22) from three-point range and 57.1 (12-21) from the line, with 36 rebounds, 16 assists, 10 steals, four blocked shots and 18 turnovers.

**March 16 — UCLA 65, Ball State 57 (NCAA First Round)** —

Before 20,127 at The Metrodome in Minneapolis, MN, UCLA rebounded from a 26-22 halftime deficit to win its NCAA Midwest Region first round game, 65-57. UCLA led 18-9 with 8:35 remaining in the first half but was outscored 17-4 the rest of the way. The Bruins trailed by six points early in the second half but outscored the Cardinals 25-5 in just over eight minutes to take a 47-33 lead. Ball State cut the lead to four points with just over three minutes remaining in the game but could get no closer.

The win was UCLA's 20th, giving the Bruins a streak of 12 straight years with at least 20 victories.

Jason Kapon led the Bruins with 17 points (4-10, 4-9, 5-6) — all in the second half. Dan Gadzuric recorded his third double-double in five games with 10 points and 12 rebounds. JaRon Rush contributed 14 points and seven rebounds off the bench and Jerome Moiso chipped in with 12 points and seven boards. Earl Watson had 12 assists, four steals, four points and three rebounds and Matt Barnes had six points, five rebounds and four assists off the bench. UCLA shot 45.5 from the floor, 35.0 (7-20) from three-point range and 44.4 (8-18) from the free throw line, with 46 rebounds (second-highest total of the season), 19 assists, 10 steals, four blocked shots and 18 turnovers.

Ball State, which was led by Duane Clemens (16 points) and Cedric Moodie (15 points), shot 35.8 from the floor, 40.0 (8-20) from three-point range and 25.0

(1-4) from the line, with 34 rebounds, 13 assists, 13 steals, four blocked shots and 12 turnovers.

**March 11 — at UCLA 90, Washington 64** — Before 10,305 at Pauley Pavilion, UCLA built a 20-point halftime lead (47-27), extended it to 29 early in the second half and cruised to its sixth straight win, 90-64. UCLA's six-game winning streak (all conference games) is its longest since 1996-97, when it won 12 in a row. The six-game league winning streak is the Bruins' longest since winning the last eight in 1997.

UCLA, which trailed 9-3 early in the contest, still trailed by five points (15-10) with 13:17 remaining in the first half. The Bruins then outscored the Huskies 29-5, including 12-0 and 15-0 runs, in 8:14 to take a 39-20 lead en route to the 47-27 halftime score. UCLA scored 12 of the first 15 points in the second half to extend the lead to 29 (59-30) and Washington never got closer than 21 points the rest of the way.

Jason Kapono led UCLA with 18 points, making seven of nine shots, including four of six from three-point range. He scored eight of UCLA's first 10 points in the second half with two three-point field goals and a dunk. JaRon Rush chipped in with 15 points, all in the first half, making seven of nine shots. He scored 11 straight points for the Bruins during the 29-5 run in the first half.

Earl Watson contributed 10 points, six assists, four rebounds and two steals. Matt Barnes came off the bench to contribute nine points, four rebounds and two steals, Jerome Moiso and Dan Gadzuric added eight points each and Billy Knight, starting for the second straight game, added seven points and a team-high six rebounds. Sean Farnham played 16 minutes in his last home game and ran his two-year record as a starter to 14-1 (14-0 in the regular season).

UCLA shot 50.6 from the floor, 44.4 (8-18) from three-point range and 50.0 (4-8) from the free throw line, with 39 rebounds, 22 assists, a season high-tying 19 steals, three blocked shots and 16 turnovers.

Washington, which was led by Michael Johnson (11 points) and Marlon Shelton (10 points), shot 43.1 from the floor, an opponent season-low 7.1 (1-14) from three-point range and 68.4 (13-19) from the line, with 34 rebounds, 11 assists,

eight steals, six blocked shots and 26 turnovers.

**March 9 — at UCLA 65, Washington State 58** — Before 9,614 at Pauley Pavilion, UCLA outscored Washington State 12-3 in a three-minute span, breaking a 52-52 tie en route to a 65-58 victory over the Cougars.

UCLA, which trailed 7-1 early in the contest, led 29-25 at halftime and built an 11-point lead, 44-33, with 10:20 remaining in the game. The Cougars then outscored the Bruins 18-5 to take a 51-49 lead with 4:28 remaining, setting the stage for the Bruins' final surge.

Jason Kapono led UCLA with 17 points, 15 in the second half. In the final 4:10, he made seven of eight free throws and scored nine of UCLA's final 16 points. Dan Gadzuric came off the bench to

record his second double-double in three games, finishing with 12 points and a team-high 12 rebounds. JaRon Rush, in his second game back, chipped in with seven points and a season-high 11 rebounds, Jerome Moiso contributed nine points and five rebounds, Earl Watson had seven points, four assists and three steals and Matt Barnes added seven points and four boards.

UCLA shot 40.4 from the floor, 31.3 (5-16) from three-point range and 58.1 (18-31) from the free throw line, with 42 rebounds, 11 assists, nine steals, six blocked shots and 20 turnovers.

WSU, which was led by Chris Crosby (15 points) and Eddie Miller (14 points and eight rebounds), shot 41.7 from the floor, 40.0 (6-15) from three-point range and 60.0 (12-20) from the line, with 28 rebounds, 10 assists, six steals, two blocked shots and 18 turnovers.

**March 4 — UCLA 94, at No. 1 Stanford 93 (OT)** — Before 7,391 at Maples Pavilion in Stanford, UCLA rallied from a 15-point first half deficit to stun the No. 1 ranked Cardinal, 94-93, in overtime. The win was UCLA's first at Maples since the 1995 NCAA title season. The Bruins trailed 19-4 just 6:02 into the contest. They then outscored the Cardinal 10-0 and 23-8 to tie the contest at 27. Stanford never led by more than five the rest of the half and Billy Knight's third three-point field goal cut the deficit to two, 43-41, at the half. UCLA led by three early in the second half but the Cardinal built a five-point lead, 70-65, with 4:13 remaining in regulation. Jerome Moiso scored eight of UCLA's next 15 points, including a short hook with one second on the clock to tie the game at 80 and send it into overtime.

During the extra period, JaRon Rush, playing for the first time since Dec. 1, scored eight of UCLA's 14 points, including the game-winning basket on a jumper from the left baseline with three seconds remaining in the game. He also hit a long three-pointer with 48 seconds remaining to cut Stanford's four-point lead to one, 93-92, and set the stage for his final basket.

Rush led the Bruins with a season-high 19 points, making seven of 10 shots, including three of five from three-point range. Moiso recorded his ninth double-double of the season with 17 points (7-11, 3-5) and 12 rebounds and added

three assists and three blocked shots. Earl Watson enjoyed a superlative game with 15 points (6-10, 3-6, 0-0), a then career-high 13 assists and five rebounds while playing a career-high 45 minutes. Jason Kapono contributed 12 points and seven rebounds, while Dan Gadzuric and Matt Barnes both came off the bench to contribute 10 points. Knight added nine points on three of five shooting from three-point range, all in the first half.

UCLA shot 54.5 from the floor, an opponent season high against Stanford, which entered the game allowing teams to shoot just 34.0 from the field (the previous high was 45.2 by the Bruins in Pauley). The Bruins shot 60.0 in the second half and overtime. UCLA tied its season-high with 12 three-point field goals and shot 52.2 from the arc and 66.7 from the line. The Bruins also had 34 rebounds, outrebounding the Cardinal by two, 23 assists, four steals, four blocks and 14 turnovers.

Stanford shot 50.0 from the floor, 42.1 from three-point range and 69.0 from the line, with 32 rebounds, 19 assists, three steals, one block and 11 turnovers. The Bruins had eight more field goals than the Cardinal (four more three-pointers), but Stanford outscored UCLA by 19 points from the line, attempting 27 more free throws.

**March 2 — UCLA 83, at California 62** — Before 12,172 at Haas Pavilion in Berkeley, UCLA staged one of the great comebacks in school history, coming from 19-points down in the first half (31-12 and 33-14, 6:30) to trail 35-30 at halftime, then outscored the Bears 53-27 in the second half (holding Cal to 28.6, 8-28 from the field) to seal the 83-62 victory. UCLA outscored Cal 71-31 in the game's final 26 minutes.

The Bruins were led by Dan Gadzuric and Jason Kapono. Gadzuric, off the bench (he was slowed for the past week with tendinitis in his right knee), scored a career-high 22 points with 16 rebounds (his career high, 17, vs. Colorado State) and a career-high tying four blocked shots. Kapono scored 20 points, including 5-7 from three-point range, with seven rebounds. Earl Watson also added 12 points and eight assists.

UCLA shot 54.5 from the field, 47.1 from the three-point line and 75.0 from the foul line, with 45 rebounds and 17 turnovers. Cal shot 35.9 from the field,

40.0 from three-point range and 57.1 from the foul line, with 29 rebounds and nine turnovers.

**Feb. 26 — UCLA 69, Oregon State 59** — Before 9,759 at Pauley Pavilion, UCLA broke a 39-39 tie with a 15-0 run en route to the 69-59 victory. The Beavers closed the gap to within five points (58-53) with

3:31 remaining but never got closer. The Bruins made seven of 10 free throws in the final 1:42 to help preserve the victory. For UCLA, it marked the first time this year it swept a Pac-10 week and its first back-to-back victories since defeating Arizona State at home and Oregon State on the road.

Earl Watson once again led the Bruins. The junior guard scored a team-high 19 points (6-10, 2-5, 5-7) and added four rebounds, two steals and one assist. Jerome Moiso came off the bench to contribute 16 points (7-13, 2-4), a team-high eight rebounds, a team-high (tied) three assists, a team-high two blocks and one steal. Ryan Bailey played one of the best games of his career, finishing with 11 points (4-4, 2-2, 1-2), three rebounds, one assist and one steal. He scored the first seven points of UCLA's 15-0 second half run with two three-point field goals and a free throw. Ray Young scored nine points off the bench and Jason Kapono added seven points (only his third single-digit scoring effort all year) and four rebounds.

UCLA shot 53.2 on its field goal attempts (57.1 in the second half), 35.7 (5-14) from three-point range and 66.7 (14-21) from the free throw line, with 31 rebounds, 12 assists, four steals, three blocked shots and just 11 turnovers.

Oregon State was led by Josh Steinthal with 15 points (only five in the second half), Jason Heide with 13 points (all in the first half), Brian Jackson with 13 points and Clifton Jones (12 points and 10 rebounds). Deandra Tanner did not score in 15 minutes off the bench. Oregon State shot 36.7 on its field goal attempts, 25.0 (5-20) from three-point range and 71.4 (10-14) from the free throw line, with 38 rebounds, 12 assists, three steals, two blocked shots and 15 turnovers. OSU's 36.7 shooting percentage is the lowest by a Bruin Pac-10 opponent and the lowest since Purdue shot 35.9 on Dec. 30.

**Feb. 24 — UCLA 75, Oregon 69** — Before 7,672 at Pauley Pavilion, UCLA built a seven-point halftime lead, extended it to 12 points with just under nine minutes to go and held off a late run by Oregon to defeat the Ducks, 75-69, breaking its three-game losing streak.

Earl Watson played one of his best games of the season. He led the Bruins with a season-high tying 22 points (5-10, 2-3, 10-14), a career-high 10 rebounds and five assists. He scored 18 of his points in the first half. Jason Kapono, who played just five minutes in the first half due to foul trouble, scored all 15 of his points (6-7, 1-1, 2-4) in the final 20 minutes. He added four rebounds and two assists. Dan Gadzuric scored all of his 11 points

(5-14, 1-6) in the first half and also grabbed seven rebounds. Jerome Moiso came off the bench for only the second time this year and contributed nine points (3-5, 3-6) and nine rebounds.

UCLA shot 47.2 on its field goal attempts, 57.1 (4-7) from three-point range and 56.8 (21-37) from the free throw line, with 45 rebounds, 15 assists, six steals, four blocked shots and 16 turnovers.

Oregon was led by A.D. Smith with 23 points and six rebounds. Oregon shot 41.7 on its field goal attempts, 19.0 (4-21) from three-point range and 65.2 (15-23) from the free throw line, with 29 rebounds, 12 assists, two steals, zero blocked shots and 11 turnovers.

**Feb. 19 — Arizona 99, UCLA 84** — Before 14,532, the Bruins suffered a 99-84 loss to Arizona at the McKale Center. The Bruins trailed 51-30 at halftime en route to their third straight loss and sixth in seven games.

Jason Kapono once again led the Bruins with a career-high tying 27 points (10-20, 5-9, 2-3). The last time a UCLA freshman scored more points was in 1994-95, when J.R. Henderson tallied 28 at Washington State. He also became only the second freshman in school history to score at least 27 points twice in the same season (Don MacLean did it in 1988-89). Kapono also grabbed six rebounds.

Dan Gadzuric scored 17 points (8-11, 1-5) and a team-high nine rebounds and Billy Knight came off the bench to score 14 points (5-8, 3-5, 1-3), one shy of his career best. Earl Watson added eight points and five assists and Ryan Bailey led the team with six assists.

UCLA shot 51.6 on its field goal attempts, 52.2 (12-23) from three-point range and 35.3 (season-low, 6-17) from the free throw line, with 36 rebounds, 23 assists, six steals, two blocked shots and 21 turnovers. At the time, the 12 three-point field goals were the most ever by a Bruin team, breaking the record of 11, set in 1987 (vs. Oregon) and tied in 1999 (vs. Stanford).

Arizona was led by Gilbert Arenas with 23 points, Michael Wright with 22 points and six rebounds and Jason Gardner with 16 points and 11 assists. Arizona shot 51.7 on its field goal attempts, 35.3 (6-17) from three-point range and 84.6 (33-39) from the free throw line, with 30 rebounds, 22 assists, 10 steals, one

blocked shot and 11 turnovers.

**Feb. 17 — Arizona State 104, UCLA 75** — Before 10,036, the Bruins suffered a 104-75 loss to Arizona State at the Wells Fargo Arena. ASU shot an opponent season-high 56.1 from the floor and scored an opponent season-high 104 points. The loss ended a 22-game winning streak vs. ASU.


Jason Kapono led the Bruins with 24 points, six rebounds, four assists and two steals. He made six of nine three-point field goals, one shy of UCLA's single-game record. Earl Watson added 12 points and Dan Gadzuric contributed eight points and six rebounds. Ray Young and Billy Knight contributed eight and seven points, respectively, off the bench.

UCLA shot 48.2 on its field goal attempts, 36.8 (7-19) from three-point range and 66.7 (14-21) from the free throw line, with 31 rebounds, 18 assists, eight steals, four blocked shots and 24 turnovers.

Arizona State was led by Eddie House, whose 40 points were the most by a Bruin opponent since Wyoming's Fennis Dembo scored 41 in the second round of the 1987 NCAA Tournament. ASU shot an opponent-high 56.1 on its field goal attempts, an opponent season-high 72.7 (tying ASU single-game record, 8-11) from three-point range and 78.6 (22-28) from the free throw line, with 37 rebounds, 29 assists (an opponent season high), 12 steals, zero blocked shots and 11 turnovers.

**Feb. 13 — No. 4 Syracuse 71, UCLA 67** — Before 29,731, the second-largest crowd ever to see a regular-season Bruin game, UCLA played the fourth-ranked Orangemen tough for 40 minutes before dropping a 71-67 decision at the Carrier Dome.

The Bruins trailed by as many as seven in the first half and by six in the second half.

UCLA had a few one-point leads in the final 20 minutes but couldn't get closer than two points in the final minutes. UCLA outrebounded Syracuse by 11 (42-31) and outshot the home team, 51.9 to 43.1.

Dan Gadzuric, despite problems with both thumbs, played his best game in weeks. He recorded his fourth double-double of the year with a then career-high 18 points (7-9, 4-10) and 12 rebounds. Jerome Moiso just missed a double-double with nine points (3-9, 3-6), 10 rebounds and two blocks and Jason Kapono chipped in with 13 points (5-12, 1-6, 3-5), four assists, three rebounds and two steals. In the backcourt, Earl Watson had 11 points (5-9, 1-3, 0-0), eight assists, five rebounds and two steals while Ryan Bailey had a career-high seven assists, a career-high tying seven rebounds, two points and two steals with just one turnover.

UCLA shot 51.9 on its field goal attempts,

19.2 (2-11) from three-point range and 42.9 (9-21) from the free throw line, with 42 rebounds, 21 assists, seven steals, two blocked shots and 16 turnovers.

Syracuse was led by Jason Hart and Preston Shumpert with 18 points each. Syracuse shot 43.1 on its field goal attempts, 28.0 (7-25) from three-point range and 57.1 (8-14) from the free throw line, with 32 rebounds, 21 assists (an opponent season high), five steals, four blocked shots and an opponent season-low eight turnovers.

**Feb. 9 — UCLA 83, USC 78** — Before 11,076 at Pauley Pavilion, UCLA rallied from a 10-point first-half deficit and defeated the USC Trojans, 83-78. UCLA

points to take the lead for good. They led by as many as seven (69-62) and USC never got closer than two points the rest of the way. In the final minute, UCLA made eight of 12 free throws to preserve the victory.

Jason Kapono led the Bruins with a career-high 27 points (10-14, 2-6, 5-9) and added seven rebounds. In the second half, he made nine of 10 shots en route to 25 points. Kapono's 27 points are the most by a Bruin true freshman since J.R. Henderson scored 28 at Washington State during the 1994-95 season. That total also ranks fourth (tied) on UCLA's freshman list behind Don MacLean's 41 vs. North Texas in 1988-89, Rod Foster's

28 vs. Arizona in 1979-80 and Henderson's 28 at WSU in 1994-95. MacLean also scored 27 against California in 1994-95. Earl Watson, starting at the wing guard, scored a season-high 22 points (8-12, 1-3, 5-6) and added seven assists, two rebounds and one steal with no turnovers. Jerome Moiso recorded his eighth double-double of the year with 15 points and 12 rebounds and added three steals and two assists. Ryan Bailey, starting at point guard, played a career-high 34 minutes and contributed seven points and three assists.

UCLA shot 59.3 on its field goal attempts (68.0 in the second half), 31.3 (5-16) from three-point range and 51.9 (14-27) from the free throw line, with 29 rebounds, 17 assists, 14 steals, one blocked shot and 17 turnovers.

USC, which had four players with at least 14 points, was led by Jeff Trepagnier (21 points), Brian Scalabrine (20 points) and David Bluthenthal (19 points and 15

rebounds). USC shot 45.6 on its field goal attempts (36.7 in the second half), 32.0 (8-25) from three-point range and 81.8 (18-22) from the free throw line, with 34 rebounds, 16 assists, three steals, no blocked shots and 17 turnovers.

**Feb. 5 — California 73, UCLA 70** — Before 9,596 at Pauley Pavilion, UCLA battled back from an eight-point second-half deficit but couldn't hold it and lost to the Golden Bears, 73-70. It marked the first time the Bruins had been swept at home on a conference weekend since the 1989-90 season.


UCLA trailed by eight points, 48-40 but used a 12-0 run to take a 52-48 lead with 11:27 remaining. California scored the next six points and although the Bruins tied the game a couple of times, they never led again. Cal led 71-67 with 1:41 remaining, but a Jason Kapono free throw and a Dan Gadzuric rebound basket cut the lead to one with 1:00 remaining. However, on its next two possessions, Kapono had a shot blocked and Gadzuric rebounded but missed and Jerome Moiso had a shot blocked. Cal added two free throws with seven seconds remaining but the Bruins turned the ball over on its next possession.

Kapono led the Bruins with 19 points, including eight during the 12-0 run. Moiso recorded his seventh double-double of the year with 16 points and 10 rebounds and added four steals and three blocks and Earl Watson contributed 10 points, six assists and three steals. Dan Gadzuric added nine points and seven rebounds and Ryan Bailey contributed eight points, five rebounds and four assists off the bench.

UCLA shot 36.9 on its field goal attempts, 25.0 (4-16) from three-point range and 66.7 (18-27) from the free throw line, with 39 rebounds, 12 assists, 13 steals, three blocked shots and 15 turnovers.

California, which had four players in double figures, was led by Shantay Legans (15 points and three assists), Dennis Gates (13 points) and Nick Vander Laan (10 rebounds). The Golden Bears shot 43.4 on their field goal attempts, 47.1 (8-17) from three-point range and 76.0 (19-25) from the free throw line, with 41 rebounds, 14 assists, four blocked shots, three steals and 23 turnovers.

**Feb. 3 — Stanford 78, UCLA 63** — Before 11,692 at Pauley Pavilion, UCLA trailed by 16 points (38-22) at halftime, cut the

trailed by four points (52-48) with 13:31 remaining and outscored USC 12-4 to take a 60-56 lead. USC tied the contest at 60 but the Bruins scored the next five

deficit to eight midway through the second half but could get no closer and dropped a 78-63 decision to the Cardinal. Jason Kapono led the Bruins with 21 points (8-14, 0-4, 5-6). Jerome Moiso and Matt Barnes scored 12 each and Moiso added a team-high seven rebounds. Earl Watson contributed 11 points and six assists.

UCLA shot 45.2 on its field goal attempts, 0.0 (season-low, 0-14) from three-point range and 58.3 (7-12) from the free throw line, with a season-low 22 rebounds, 13 assists, seven steals, five blocked shots and 13 turnovers.

Stanford, which had five players in double figures, was led by Casey Jacobson (17 points and three assists) and Jarron Collins (15 points and five rebounds). The Cardinal shot 54.9 on its field goal attempts, 42.9 (9-21) from three-point range and an opponent season-high 92.9 (13-14) from the free throw line, with 37 rebounds, 15 assists, four blocked shots, one steal and 23 turnovers.

**Jan. 29 — Oregon 73, UCLA 58** — Before 9,087 at McArthur Court, UCLA squandered a 12-point first half lead and dropped a 73-58 decision to Oregon at Eugene.

The Bruins, who led 31-29 at halftime, were outscored 44-27 and outshot 57.7 to 36.7 in the final 20 minutes. Billy Knight, making his first start of the year, tied for the team lead with 13 points (6-7, 1-2, 0-0) and grabbed a career-high six rebounds. Jerome Moiso also tied for the team lead with 13 points (5-10, 3-3) and led the Bruins with seven rebounds. Jason Kapono scored 12 points on four three-point field goals, Dan Gadzuric grabbed six rebounds to go with six points and Earl Watson finished with six points, five assists, four rebounds and three steals. Matt Barnes added eight points off the bench.

UCLA shot 39.3 on its field goal attempts, 33.3 (6-18) from three-point range and 66.7 (4-6) from the line with 33 rebounds, 10 assists, four blocked shots, six steals and 19 turnovers.

Oregon was led by A.D. Smith (18 points and six rebounds) and Darius Wright (17 points and nine assists). The Ducks shot 49.0 from the floor, 20.0 (3-7) from the three-point line and 83.3 (20-24) from the free throw line with 26 rebounds, 16 assists, 10 steals and 13 turnovers.

**Jan. 27 — UCLA 85, Oregon State 74** — Before 6,014 at Gill Coliseum, UCLA used a 31-5 spurt in the second half to defeat Oregon State, 85-74, at Corvallis. Sophomore Ray Young came off the bench to enjoy the best game of his career. He scored a career-high 22 points, making eight of 11 field goal attempts (5-6 from three-point range) and also had a career-high six assists. Sophomore Jerome Moiso recorded his third double-double in four games with 12 points and 11 rebounds. Junior Earl Watson chipped in with 15 points, nine rebounds and three assists, freshman Jason Kapono added 16 points and five assists and sophomore Dan Gadzuric contributed 13 points and seven

rebounds.

UCLA shot 50.0 on its field goal attempts (third highest of the year), 42.9 (9-21) from three-point range and 50.0 (20-40)

from the line with 41 rebounds, 18 assists, four blocked shots, four steals and a season-low 10 turnovers.

Oregon State was led by Deandra Tanner (17 points and six assists) and Brian Jackson (14 points). The Bruins held the Beavers to just 32.3 shooting in the second half. On the game, OSU shot 37.1 from the floor, 26.7 (8-30) from the three-point line and 69.0 (20-29) from the free throw line with 40 rebounds, 17 assists, five steals, four blocks and 11 turnovers.

**Jan. 22 — No. 25 UCLA 83, Arizona State 77** — Before 9,557 at Pauley Pavilion, UCLA rallied from a 42-39 halftime deficit to defeat the Sun Devils, 83-77. It was UCLA's 22nd consecutive victory over the Sun Devils.

The Bruins still trailed by three (65-62) with 8:32 remaining but they scored seven straight points to take the lead for good. UCLA built the lead to six, saw ASU close to within one (78-77) with 50 seconds remaining, and then hit five of six free throws in the final 20 seconds for the six-point victory.

Jason Kapono led the Bruins with 24 points (8-12, 4-6, 4-4), four rebounds and three assists. Jerome Moiso scored a season-high 22 points (7-13, 8-10) for the second straight game (15 in the second half) and added a team-high seven rebounds and a career-high five blocked shots. Matt Barnes (a career-high 17 points, with six rebounds) and Ray Young (10 points) gave the Bruins a spark off the bench.

UCLA shot 56.9 on its field goal attempts (third highest of the year), 58.3 (7-12) from three-point range (second highest of the year) and 69.2 (18-26) from the line with 36 rebounds, 19 assists, 11 blocked shots (most since getting 12 vs. Maryland in 1995 Wooden Classic), three steals and 17 turnovers.

Arizona State was led by Awvee Storey (21 points and eight rebounds) and Eddie House (18 points on 5-17 shooting). The Bruins, especially Ray Young, did an outstanding job on House, the Pac-10's leading scorer, who tallied the team's first 12 points and scored just six in the final 34 minutes. The Sun Devils shot 37.5 from the floor (33.3 in the second half), 43.5 (10-23) from the three-point line and 81.3 (13-16) from the free throw line with 35 rebounds, 17 assists, seven steals, three blocks and nine turnovers.

**Jan. 20 — No. 2 Arizona 76, No. 25 UCLA 61** — Before 12,202 at Pauley Pavilion, Arizona outscored UCLA 46-33 in the second half en route to a 76-61 victory. The Bruins trailed 30-28 at halftime and were tied at 32 early in the second half. The Wildcats built an 11-point lead (50-39) with 9:54 remaining and extended it to 15 (60-45) with 5:41 left. UCLA outscored Arizona 12-3 to close to within six points (63-57) with 3:55 remaining but could get no closer.

Jerome Moiso led the Bruins with a season-high tying 22 points and a career-high 14 rebounds. It was his fifth double-double of the year. Earl Watson contributed 12 points, seven rebounds and five assists and Jason Kapono added 10 points and five rebounds. UCLA shot 44.4 on field goal attempts, 14.3 (season-low, 3-21) from three-point range and 50.0 (2-4, season-lows) from the line with 38 rebounds, 14 assists, seven steals, six blocks and a season-high 26 turnovers. Arizona, led by Michael Wright's 22 points and eight rebounds and Jason Gardner's 20 points and six assists, shot 47.4 from the floor, 33.3 (3-9) from three-point range and 65.5 (19-29) from the free throw line with 31 rebounds, 14 assists, 10 steals, two blocks and 15 turnovers.

**Jan. 15 — UCLA 71, at No. 13 North Carolina 68** — Before 21,572 at the Smith Center at Chapel Hill, NC, UCLA surged to an early 24-12 lead and defeated North Carolina, 71-68 on two free throws by Ryan Bailey with 14 seconds remaining. It was UCLA's first-ever win in Chapel Hill and it snapped North Carolina's four-game winning streak vs. the Bruins.

UCLA became only the fourth non-ACC school to defeat the Tar Heels in the 14-year history of the Smith Center. It was also the first time since the 1943-44 season that North Carolina has lost two non-conference home games.

The Bruins, who led 38-37 at halftime, built an 11-point lead in the second half, saw the lead cut to two points with 4:02 remaining. Two baskets by Jerome Moiso, a follow shot by Dan Gadzuric and an Earl Watson free throw built the lead to six points (69-63) with 38 seconds remaining. The Tar Heels cut the lead to one but with 14.9 seconds remaining, Bailey hit two free throws to give the Bruins their final three-point margin.

For the first time, Moiso and Gadzuric

recorded double-doubles in the same game. Moiso finished with 19 points (9-15, 1-2), and 11 rebounds and added three blocks, two steals and two assists in a career-high 40 minutes. Gadzuric finished with 10 points (4-10, 2-4) and 10 rebounds (seven offensive) while tying his career high by playing 35 minutes. In addition, they did a fine job on the interior of the UCLA 2-3 zone defense. North Carolina shot just 39.3 in the second half and UCLA won the battle of the boards, 38-30.

Jason Kapono, playing just 22 minutes due to foul trouble, had 14 points and five rebounds and Earl Watson had a solid game with 11 points, six assists and two steals. Rico Hines, starting for the first time since the Gonzaga contest, energized the defense and contributed six points, four rebounds, three steals and two assists.

UNC was led by Jason Capel with 21 points and Joseph Forte with 13 points, five assists, four rebounds and four steals. The Tar Heels shot 49.1 from the floor, 41.2 (7-17) from three-point range and 58.3 (7-12) from the line with 30 rebounds, 18 assists, 10 steals, eight blocks and 17 turnovers.

UCLA which won for the first time when being outshot from the field, shot 44.4 on field goal attempts, 41.7 (5-12) from three-point range and 62.5 (8-16) from the line with 38 rebounds, 13 assists, 10 steals, three blocks and 15 turnovers.

**Jan. 12 — at USC 91, UCLA 79** — Before 10,001 at the Sports Arena, UCLA's 10-game winning streak over USC came to a halt when the Trojans took a 47-34 lead at halftime and went on to defeat the Bruins 91-79.

All five USC starters scored in double figures, led by Jeff Trepagnier's game-high 26 points. The Bruins had four players in double figures, led by Jason Kapono's 21 points. Earl Watson had 18 points and six assists and Matt Barnes (10) and Ryan Bailey (nine) tied their season-bests in points.

The Bruins were outshot and outrebounded for only the second time this season. UCLA shot 45.7 from the field, 46.7 (7-15) from three-point range and 44.4 (8-18) from the foul line, with 35 rebounds and 15 turnovers. USC shot an opponent season-high 49.3 from the field, 18.2 (2-11) from three-point range and 74.2 (23-31) from the foul line, with

45 rebounds and 14 turnovers.

**Jan. 8 — No. 24 UCLA 86, Washington State 64** — Before 3,189 at Friel Court in Pullman, WA, the Bruins had several players achieve career highs during the 22-point win in Pullman. The margin of victory was UCLA's largest in a Pac-10 road game since the 1988-89 season when it defeated Oregon 97-66 (31 points) in Eugene.

Forward Jason Kapono led the Bruins with 20 points and also passed for a career-high six assists. Center Dan Gadzuric tallied 16 points and added a team-high seven rebounds and guard Rico Hines scored a career-high 12 points to go with five assists and two steals. Guard Billy Knight also came off the bench to score 14 points, one shy of his career high, making four three-point field goals. Earl Watson played a fine all-around game, running the offense and finishing with eight points, six assists, five rebounds and two blocks.

The Bruins shot 58.9 from the field, 50.0 from three-point range and 57.1 from the foul line, with 33 rebounds, 22 assists (three players had at least five) and 15 turnovers.

The Cougars, led by Mike Bush's 19 points and Chris Crosby's 17 points, shot 41.5 from the field, 40.0 from three-point range and 80.0 from the foul line, with 28 rebounds, eight assists and 18 turnovers.

**Jan. 6 — Washington 63, No. 24 UCLA 62** — Before 9,012 at Key Arena in Seattle, WA, UCLA lost a late four-point lead and fell one point shy in the Pac-10 opener for both schools. The Bruins held a two-point lead when Washington's Deon Luton hit a three-point field goal from the left corner to give the Huskies a 61-60 lead. Following a Bruin miss, Luton added two free throws to give his team a three-point lead with 11 seconds remaining. On UCLA's ensuing possession, Jerome Moiso grabbed the rebound of Earl Watson's missed three-point attempt and passed it to Jason Kapono, who hit a jumper at the buzzer. However, it was ruled that his foot was on the three-point line and thus brought the Bruins to within one point, rather than forcing the game into overtime.

Kapono led the Bruins with 19 points. Jerome Moiso recorded his third double-double of the year (13 points, 10 rebounds) and Dan Gadzuric added 13 rebounds.

On the night, UCLA shot 42.1 from the field, 41.7 from three-point range and 47.4 from the free throw line, with 41 rebounds, 16 assists and 19 turnovers. Washington, led by Luton's 26 points, shot 39.3 from the field, 33.3 from three-point range and 52.4 from the free throw line, with 38 rebounds, 17 assists and 13 turnovers.

**Dec. 30 — No. 23 UCLA 55, Purdue 53** — Before 10,290 in Pauley Pavilion and with just several seconds left on the clock, Bruin freshman Jason Kapono drove the length of the court and scored a layin with one second left to seal UCLA's 55-53 victory over Purdue. The Bruins led 32-29 at halftime.

Kapono led all scorers with 19 points and was joined in Bruin double figures by Matt Barnes' 10 points and six rebounds. The Bruins shot 53.5 from the field, 36.4 from three-point range and 50.0 from the foul line, with 31 rebounds and 20 turnovers.

The Boilermakers, led by Jaraan Cornell's 14 points, shot 35.4 from the field, 28.6 from three-point range and 78.9 from the foul line, with 23 rebounds and 13 turnovers.

**Dec. 28 — No. 23 UCLA 68, Pepperdine 66** — Before 8,244 in Pauley Pavilion, UCLA sophomore Jerome Moiso scored the Bruins' final five points and Pepperdine's Kelvin Gibbs' put-back was ruled no good (time expired) as the Bruins held on for a 68-66 win over Pepperdine. UCLA led 37-32 at halftime.

Moiso's layin with 1:28 left tied the score at 65-all, his short jumper with 43 seconds left gave the Bruins a 67-66 lead and his first of two free throws (missed the second of a one-and-one) with 23 seconds left gave UCLA a 68-66 advantage.

Along with Moiso's game-high 15 points, the Bruins had three other players in double figures, led by Jason Kapono's first ever double-double (13 points, a season-high 11 rebounds). The Bruins shot 44.4 from the field, 33.3 from three-point range and 43.8 from the foul line, with 44 rebounds and 16 turnovers.

Pepperdine, led by Tezale Archie's 14 points, shot 35.9 from the field, 36.4 from three-point range and 85.7 from the foul line, with 38 rebounds and 15 turnovers.

**Pearl Harbor Classic (Dec. 21-23, Laie, Hawaii)** — The Bruins placed third at The Pearl Harbor Classic, beating Maine

83-62 in the first round, losing to eventual champion Colorado State 55-54 in a semi-final contest and beating South Florida in the third-place game, 103-98 (OT). Bruin junior guard Earl Watson was named to the All-Tournament team.

**Dec. 21 — No. 18 UCLA 83, Maine 62** — In a first-round contest, the Bruins were led by three players in double figures and the victory marked the return of sophomore Matt Barnes, who missed UCLA's first five games because of academic probation. Leading UCLA were Jerome Moiso (15 points/nine rebounds), Jason Kapono (15/6) and Dan Gadzuric (14/8). Barnes added eight points and a career-high 10 rebounds. Earl Watson also had 10 assists.

The Bruins shot 49.3 from the field, 53.8 from three-point range and 72.7 from the foul line, with a season-high 48 rebounds and 18 turnovers. The Black Bears shot 43.6 from the field, 26.1 from three-point range and 61.5 from the foul line, with 23 rebounds and 21 turnovers.

**Dec. 22 — Colorado State 55, No. 18 UCLA 54** — In a semi-final matchup, the Rams led 29-20 at halftime. The score was tied at 54-all with 1:59 left to play when Ray Young scored on a three-pointer. But with 19 seconds remaining, Young fouled CSU's John Ford who made the first free throw and missed the second, to give CSU a 55-54 lead. With just seconds remaining, UCLA's Jason Kapono missed a 20-footer from the left side and the Rams advanced to the championship game.

UCLA had three players in double figures, led by Dan Gadzuric's 14 points and career-high 17 rebounds. The Bruins shot 37.7 from the field, 33.3 from three-point range and 66.7 from the foul line, with 38 rebounds and 12 turnovers. CSU shot 46.3 from the field, 47.1 from three-point range and 69.2 from the foul line, with 26 rebounds and 14 turnovers.

**Dec. 23 — No. 18 UCLA 103, South Florida 98 (OT)** — Earl Watson hit two three-pointers, he had three for the game, that proved to be big shots in UCLA's third-place win over South Florida. With the score tied 85-85 with 47 seconds left in regulation, Watson scored on a three-pointer to give the Bruins an 88-85 lead. But with seven seconds remaining in regulation, South Florida's B. B. Waldon answered with a three to tie the score (88-88) and force the overtime. In the OT,

Watson hit another three-point shot with 3:18 left to give the Bruins a 94-91 advantage.

The Bruins had four players in double figures, led by 20 points each from Watson and Jerome Moiso.

UCLA shot 55.1 from the field, 36.4 from three-point range and 61.3 from the foul line, with 41 rebounds and 15 turnovers. South Florida shot 46.9 from the field, 47.8 from three-point range and 71.1 from the foul line, with 35 rebounds and 18 turnovers.

**Dec. 18 — at No. 18 UCLA 76, No. 19 DePaul 58** — Before 10,024 in Pauley Pavilion, the Bruins overcame a 26-24 halftime deficit by outscoring DePaul 23-5 in the first eight minutes of the second-half to defeat the Blue Demons, 76-58.

The Bruins had four players in double figures, led by freshman Jason Kapono's 20 points, including 3-6 from three-point range and Dan Gadzuric's first season double-double, 15 points and 14 rebounds.

UCLA shot 42.2 from the field, 22.2 from three-point range and 62.1 from the foul line, with 43 rebounds and 14 turnovers. DePaul shot an opponent season-low 30.1 from the field, an opponent season-low 13.6 from three-point range and 57.9 from the foul line, with an opponent season-high 55 rebounds and 21 turnovers. The Blue Demons were led by Quentin Richardson's 22 points and 15 rebounds.

**Dec. 11 — No. 24 Gonzaga 59, at No. 11 UCLA 43** — Before 9,951 in Pauley, No. 24 Gonzaga limited No. 11 UCLA to just 17 second half points to defeat the Bruins 59-43 (season-low). UCLA had led 26-21 at halftime (Gonzaga outscored UCLA 38-17 in the second half).

The Bruins only had eight players available for the game (Ryan Bailey, injured right foot; JaRon Rush, suspended; Matt Barnes, academic suspension).

The loss equaled UCLA's worst home nonconference defeat in Pauley (16 points, 84-68 vs. DePaul, 1983-84); it was the lowest UCLA point-production in Pauley (old mark, 44 in a 46-44 loss to USC, 1968-69, first Bruin loss in Pauley) and it was the worst UCLA field goal shooting percentage in Pauley (season-low 26.2, 16-61).

The Bruins leading scorer was freshman

Jason Kapono, 10 points, with Earl Watson contributing nine points and eight rebounds.

UCLA shot a season-low 26.2 (16-61 from the field, including just 24.1, 7-29) from the field, 15.4 (4-26, including just 9.1, 1-11) from three-point range and a season-high 87.5 (7-8) from the foul line, with 43 rebounds and 16 turnovers.

The Bulldogs shot 40.4 from the field, 38.1 (8-21) from three-point range and an opponent season-low 29.4 (5-17) from the foul line, with 46 rebounds and 11 turnovers. Ryan Floyd had a game-high 17 points vs. Gonzaga.

**Dec. 1 — at No. 12 UCLA 100, Morgan State 39** — In one of its most convincing wins in years, UCLA, before 6,531 in Pauley, turned up the defensive intensity and defeated Morgan State 100-39, after leading 49-21 at halftime.

UCLA's margin of victory was the fifth greatest in school history and Morgan State's 39 points was the least scored by a Bruin opponent since 1981-82 when the Bruins won at Stanford, 42-34 and the least scored by a Bruin opponent in Pauley Pavilion since 1972-73, when UCLA beat Bradley, 73-38, in the second game of the season.

The Bruins have now scored at least 100 points in the last two games, for the first time since the NCAA Championship season of 1994-95 (UCLA 104-@ California 88 and UCLA 100-Duke 77 in Pauley).

Morgan State scored 18 points in the second half. The Bears trailed 69-34 with 11:24 left in the game and didn't score again until there were 50 seconds left in the game (UCLA 98-Morgan State 36, a 29-point UCLA run). MSU shot 30.4 (14-46) from the field, including just 19.4 (6-31) in the second half and 23.5 from three-point range (4-17), including just 18.2 (2-11) in the second half, with an opponent season-low 23 rebounds.

UCLA was led by five players in double figures. Sophomore Billy Knight came off the bench to equal his career-high of 15 points and added four rebounds and three steals.

The Bruins shot a season-high 67.9 (38-56) from the field, a season-best 62.5 (10-16) from three-point range and 58.3 (14-24) from the foul line.

**Nov. 27 — at No. 13 UCLA 105, Iona 73** — Before 7,261 in Pauley Pavilion and after leading 43-34 at halftime, the Bruins

outscored Iona 62-39 in the second half for a convincing 105-73 victory. The 105 points were a season-high for the Bruins. UCLA had five players in double figures, led by Earl Watson's 18 points, with seven assists and three steals, Ray Young's 17 points, including 5-6 from three-point range and Jerome Moiso's second-consecutive double-double (14 points, 10 rebounds).

The Bruins shot 50.0 from the field, 44.4 (8-18) from three-point range and 71.9 from the foul line, with 42 rebounds and 17 turnovers.

The Gaels shot 40.3 from the field, 25.0 (5-20) from three-point range and 75.0 from the foul line, with 35 rebounds and 28 turnovers. Iona was led by Tariq Kirksay's 24 points and eight rebounds.


**Nov. 23 — at No. 13 UCLA 76, Fairfield**

**57** — Before 7,273 in Pauley Pavilion and after leading 29-25 at halftime, the Bruins outscored Fairfield 47-32 in the second half for a 76-57 season-opening victory.

The Bruins had four players in double figures, led by Jerome Moiso's game-high 20 points and team-high 10 rebounds and freshman Jason Kapono, in his first start in a Bruin uniform, getting 16 points and seven rebounds.

UCLA shot 45.9 from the field, only 29.4 in the first half, 22.2 (4-18) from three-point range and 55.2 from the foul line, with 39 rebounds and 22 turnovers.

Fairfield shot 44.0 from the field, 20.0 (4-20) from three-point range and 39.1 from the foul line, with 38 rebounds and an opponent season-high 32 turnovers. Chris Rivers led Fairfield with 10 points.
