2024-25 Historic Season

For the first time in program history, the High Point University Panthers were crowned the Big South Tournament Champions! The Panthers erased a 15-point deficit in the second half to come back and beat Winthrop 81-69.

Bobby Pettiford Jr. was named the Tournament MVP winning HPU's first-ever MVP award.

HPU finished with an overall record of 29-6, which tied for the most wins in Big South program history (Winthrop, 2006-07) and the most wins in HPU program history.

High Point became the first team in the Big South since 2011 (Coastal Carolina) to win back-to-back outright regular season titles.



1st Ever NCAA Tournament Appearance

After winning HPU's first-ever Big South Tournament title, the Panthers earned an automatic bid to the 2025 Men's Basketball NCAA Tournament as the No. 13 seed.

High Point hosted Selection Show Sunday at the Oubein Center on March 16, 2025 and welcomed 4,500 fans to watch with the team.

The arena erupted when High Point's name was selected to play No. 4 seed Purdue.

Leading up to the game, the Panthers received various national attention from the NCAA, CBS, the Pat McAfee Show, and many more. Trae Benham's "Mean Mug" was trending, the Selection Show turnout was causing a buzz and the student radio reaction at the Big South Tournament was going viral on Good Morning America.

High Point played Purdue in the First Round of the NCAA Tournament on Thursday, March 20 in Providence, Rhode Island at the Amica Mutual Pavilion.

The Panthers battled through 40 minutes of action with the Boilermakers but fell short 75-63.

WELCOME TO THE QUBEIN CENTER

First announced in the Spring of 2016, the Nido and Mariana Qubein Arena and Conference Center opened as the new home of the High Point University men's and women's basketball teams in 2021. It is one of the most prominent and ambitious capital projects to date on the campus of High Point University. For its stately architecture, lavish appointments, and first-class accommodations, no other site in the state - or even the region - surpasses this impressive, multi-purpose facility.

The new building not only became the home for both of HPU's basketball programs, but it also serves as a venue for major events, speakers, concerts, entertainment, academic symposiums, and recreational activities. The arena seats 4,500 spectators and includes amenities such as: luxury suites, locker rooms, staff offices, concessions stands, a merchandising arena, media suite, film room, press conference room, weight room, athletic training room, hospitality area, state-of-the-art audio and video equipment, a ticket office and practice gym.

The Qubein Center is home to the second-largest video board in the state of North Carolina. It has screens on all four sides and provides very clear graphics no matter where you are in the seating bowl. It can project game statistics and replays all at the same time. The video board can also project images down onto the playing court, a feature typically found only in professional sports arenas. The seating bowl also includes not one, but two levels of ribbon boards that continuously carry updates throughout the game. High atop the arena and the seating bowl is a dome ceiling constructed totally of wood, giving the facility a very classic, Madison Square Garden look. The court below the videoboard is known as the Tubby and Donna Smith Court. Tubby Smith is a graduate of High Point University and coached the High Point University basketball team for several years.





GAME DAY EXCITEMENT

The Qubein Center has been quite a draw with both the students at the school, as well as the local population of High Point. Sell-outs are becoming the norm, and season tickets continue to sell at a brisk pace.

HPU brings in major acts for its halftime show, including the famous Red Panda, K9's in Flight, Rolla Bolla and many more.

The student section at the Panthers games is known as Purple Reign. They are vocal and attend home games in large numbers, making it one of the toughest places to play in the Big South.



IMPROVEMENTS

Prior to the 2023-24 season, the Qubein Center only featured one ribbon board in the upper section of seats. Ahead of the 2023-24 season the arena added another level of ribbon boards to project livestats throughout the game.

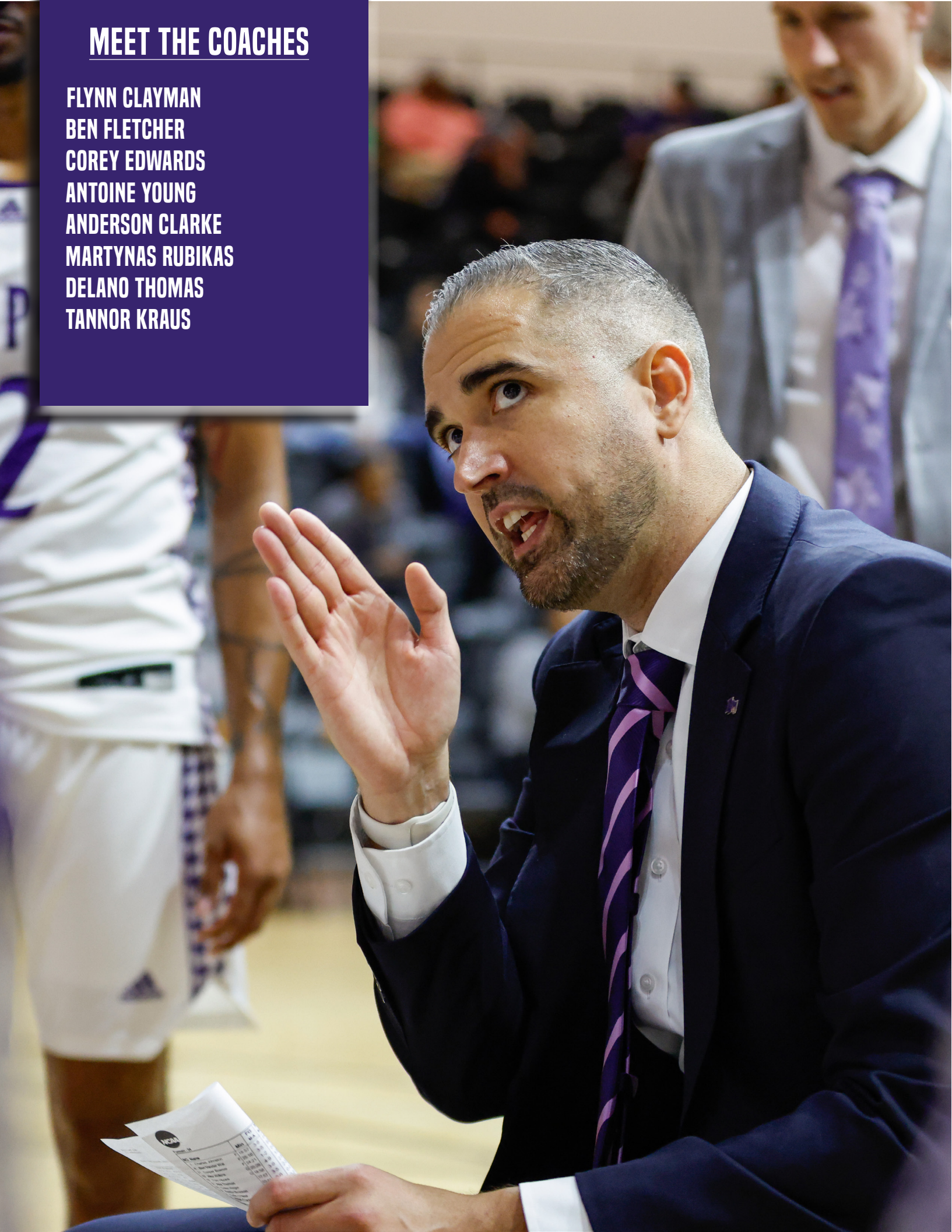

HEAD COACH FLYNN CLAYMAN



Clayman spent the last two seasons as the associate head coach and offensive coordinator at High Point University and has helped compile an overall record of 56-15 with a 27-5 Big South record. Clayman helped lead the Panthers to their first ever-NCAA tournament appearance as the No. 13 seed and matched up against No. 4 seed Purdue. Clayman helped turn around an under .500 program and guided the Panthers to back-to-back outright Big South Regular Season titles for the first time in program history. High Point became the first team in the Big South since 2011 (Coastal Carolina) to win back-to-back outright regular season titles.

Clayman helped the program post two back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time in the DI era and the sixth 20-win season in program history. On the home court, the Panthers have protected the extraordinary Qubein Center with only three losses, posting a record of 31-3. In back-to-back seasons, the Panthers set the non-conference win record since becoming Division I in 1999, recording 11 wins in 2023-24 and 12 wins in 2024-25.

Clayman helped lead an offense that finished 3rd in the NCAA in KenPom rankings for raw offensive efficiency, trailing only Duke and Gonzaga, and ahead of 2025 NCAA National Champion Florida. Clayman directed the top two offenses in Big South history the past two seasons and has been a part of five straight twenty win seasons, the last three as Associate Head Coach. Clayman has been an assistant coach for 123 wins at High Point and Southern Utah the last five seasons, which is the 13th most in the country.

During the 2024-25 season, HPU finished with an overall record of 29-6, which ties for the most wins in Big South program history (Winthrop, 2006-07) and the most wins in HPU program history. The Panthers finished the regular season with a 26-5 record and a 14-2 league record. The 26 regular-season wins is the most in program history and tied the Big South regular-season wins record with Coastal Carolina's 2010-11 season (26-4).

Since cracking the Collegeinsider.com Mid-Major Top 25 on December 22, 2023, the Panthers remained in the Top 25 for 34 consecutive weeks which ranks as the second longest streak in Big South history. High Point reached as high as No. 5 on February 5, 2024 and finished the 2024-25 regular season on March 17, 2025 ranked No. 8. High Point also received votes in the Associated Press poll four times during the 2024-25 season, receiving as many as four votes in the poll on March 3, 2025.

Prior to High Point University, Clayman was the Associate Head Coach at Southern Utah and spent six seasons at Southern Utah University. In the summer of 2022, Clayman was promoted to Associate Head Coach after serving as the assistant coach from 2019-2022 and a special assistant from 2017-2019. Clayman finished out the 2022-23 season as the interim head coach where he led the Thunderbirds to a 2-1 record at the College Basketball Invitational (CBI) postseason tournament.

During the 2022-23 season, Clayman helped guide the Thunderbirds to a 24-13 record with a 12-6 record in the inaugural season in the Western Athletic Conference (WAC). The team finished third overall in the WAC regular season, earning a No. 3 seed in the conference tournament. The Thunderbirds advanced to the conference championship game and finished as the runner-up. The Thunderbirds received a bid to the CBI post-season tournament as the No. 4 seed, and advanced to the CBI semifinals before getting knocked out by Eastern Kentucky in double overtime. For the third straight season, Southern Utah posted the programs highest NET and KenPom ranking with multiple weeks in Mid-Major Top-25.

In the summer of 2022, Clayman was named one of the "Most Impactful Assistant Coaches in Mid Major College Basketball" by Silver Waves Media. Prior to the 2021-2022 season, he was selected for the Big Sky Conference Big Sky U Aspiring Head Coaches development program, as selected by administrators across the conference.

Clayman played an integral role in the programs recruiting and player development, resulting in the programs first and only three First Team All-Big Sky players, Tevian Jones (2021 & 2023) and John Knight III (2022). Clayman's additional responsibilities included game planning and academic liaison.

Prior to coaching at the collegiate level, Clayman was the AUSA Hoops head coach in Sydney, Australia from 2015-2017. He helped 30 players from Australia make it to NCAA Division I programs such as LSU, Creighton, Stanford, TCU, and USC among many other schools.

While still playing professionally, Clayman's first coaching experience came as an assistant coach for BTI Basketball Club in the summer of 2015, an AAU club out of the Los Angeles, coaching former Utah Jazz Player, current OKC Thunder player, and 2019 Ivy League Player of the Year, Miye Oni.

Before diving into coaching, Clayman played professionally for four years overseas from 2012-2016, making stops at the Republic of Georgia, Brazil, and Israel. While playing with the Republic of Georgia, he was named the Eurobasket.com Rookie of the Year and an All-Star Selection. Clayman was amongst the top three in the Ecuadorian League in three-point field goals and points per game average.

Clayman started his collegiate career at Colorado State University and played under head coach Tim Miles from 2007-2009. He transferred to Troy University in 2009 where he played two seasons for 500-win head coach Don Maestri. In 2010, the Trojans won the Sun Belt Regular Season Championship and played in the NIT. He went on to play a final season (2011-12) at the University of the Cumberlands in Kentucky where his team won the Mid-South Conference Championship and reached the National Tournament in Kansas City. During that season he led the NAIA in three-point field goal percentage at 48.1%.

Clayman earned his Bachelor of Social Science in 2016 and a Master of Interdisciplinary Studies in Sports Conditioning and Performance, Communications, and Leadership in 2022.

A native of Los Angeles, California, Clayman attended Venice High School where he played for two-time NBA champion assistant coach for the Los Angeles Lakers, Rasheed Hazzard, who served under Phil Jackson. Flynn is married to HPU women's basketball assistant coach Katie Clayman, and they have a son, Quinn.

ASSISTANT COACH BEN FLETCHER



Ben Fletcher joins the Panthers after spending the past two seasons at the University of South Florida while offering 20 years of coaching experience.

Fletcher was named the interim head coach at South Florida for the 2024-25 season on October 29th following the tragic passing of Amir Abdur-Rahim. South Florida finished the 2024-25 season with a 13-19 overall record and a 6-12 record in league play. Two players were named to the All-AAC Teams.

Fletcher, who served as assistant head coach during the 2023-24 season, was promoted to associate head coach in June 2024. He brings a wealth of coaching experience, mentorship, and a steadfast commitment to the men's basketball program both on and off the court. Known for his dedication to player development, Coach Fletcher was instrumental in guiding the Bulls to success last season.

During the 2023-24 season, USF saw an incredible transformation, with a focus on competitive excellence, community engagement, and the development of a strong team culture. The Bulls compiled a 25-8 record and won their first regular-season conference championship. They were also ranked in the top 25 for the first time in program history.

Prior to his time at USF, Fletcher spent four seasons as an assistant coach under Abdur-Rahim during their rebuild at Kennesaw State that saw the Owls go from one win in 2019-20 to a school-record 26 wins in 2022-23 and the program's first Division I NCAA Tournament appearance.

At Kennesaw State (2019-23), Fletcher helped guide the Owls to the fastest turnaround from a one-win team to an NCAA Tournament team, accomplishing the feat in just three seasons. Kennesaw State posted a 26-9 record in 2022-23, won the ASUN regular season and tournament championships, and advanced to the NCAA Tournament. It marked the Owls' first winning record as an NCAA Division I program and first ASUN conference titles.

Kennesaw State was picked to finish eighth in the ASUN preseason poll but tallied a 15-3 league record. KSU's 15 conference wins were five more than the program's previous record of 10, while the Owls tied for fourth in the nation with 10 road wins, four more than the 2016-17 team's program record of six.

The Owls went on to post three wins in the conference tournament, downing Liberty (67-66) in the final to earn the tournament title and automatic bid to the NCAA Division I Tournament, the program's first-ever. KSU scored 75.0 points per game and shot 46.1 percent from the field and 36.5 percent from three to nearly double the program's previous high wins mark in Division I. The 14th-seeded Owls took No. 3-seed Xavier to the limit in the 2023 NCAA Tournament, nearly pulling off the first-round upset in what was a one-point game in the final seconds before eventually falling 72-67.

Star guard Chris Youngblood was named a first-team All-Conference and All-District selection and became the first KSU player to be named Georgia Men's Player of the Year by the Atlanta Tipoff Club. Meanwhile, guard Terrell Burden earned second-team All-Conference and All-District honors, marking the first time in program history the Owls received district accolades of any kind. Further, Brandon Stroud was named the ASUN Defensive Player of the Year.

Prior to Kennesaw State, Fletcher spent 14 seasons as an assistant coach at Troy University (2005-19).

The 2016-17 season was one of the most successful in Troy's history. The Trojans had their most wins (22) since the 2003-04 season, and the largest wins improvement in program history (9 wins in 2015-16). Troy won the Sun Belt tournament championship that season and advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

Fletcher was instrumental in the Trojans' rise in the Sun Belt Conference, culminating in Troy's first Sun Belt title in 2010 and second straight postseason berth. He helped guide the Trojans to a 14-4 league record during the 2008-09 campaign, highlighted by wins over every member of the Sun Belt Conference, the only team to accomplish the feat that year.

After playing in the College Basketball Invitational (CBI) in 2009, the Trojans went on to win the Sun Belt regular season championship in 2009-10 and a National Invitation Tournament (NIT) berth.

Under Fletcher's guidance in 2013-14, Hunter Williams made 98 3-pointers, setting the Troy single-season record, which was previously held by Fletcher.

Prior to joining the coaching ranks, Fletcher was one of the greatest players in Troy's Division I history. Fletcher played for the Trojans from 2001-03, averaging 13.4 points per game during his career.

He was named first-team All-Atlantic Sun his senior year (2002-03), helping the Trojans to their first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance at the Division I level. During that season, he made a Troy Division I single-season record 92 three-pointers, eventually broken by Hunter Williams, who was coached by Fletcher. Fletcher finished his career with 160 made three-pointers, the sixth most in Troy's Division I history.

Fletcher earned a B.S. in sport and fitness management from Troy in 2003. He served as a student assistant at Troy for two seasons before being named assistant coach in 2005.

Originally from Selma, Ala., Fletcher has the distinction of being a member of both Trojan squads that reached the NCAA Tournament, first as a player on the 2002-03 team and then as a coach with the 2016-17 team.



ASSISTANT COACH COREY EDWARDS



Corey Edwards joined the High Point University Men's Basketball coaching staff as an assistant coach on April 10, 2023, under head coach Alan Huss. Bringing a strong background of experience in player development, recruiting, and championship level culture building. Edwards plays a pivotal role in coaching the Panthers' backcourt players while also contributing to game strategy and practice planning.

Since joining High Point, Edwards has been an integral part of the program's rapid rise, helping the Panthers secure back-to-back outright Big South regular season championships in 2023-24 and 2024-25 for the first time in program history. He also played a pivotal role to help High Point win its first-ever Big South Tournament title and earn a spot in the NCAA Tournament in the 2024-25 season.

Before arriving at High Point, Edwards spent the 2022-23 season as an assistant coach at Drake University, where he helped orchestrate a 27-8 overall record, culminating in a second place finish in the Missouri Valley Conference and an NCAA Tournament appearance. While Edwards was at Drake, he played a key role in the development of standout guard Roman Penn who was All-MVC First Team, led the MVC in assists (5.4 Avg) and assist to turnover ratio (2.8). Coach Edwards also helped with the development of freshman point guard Connor Enright who was selected to the all-freshman team in the Missouri Valley Conference. Prior to that, Corey was a graduate assistant at Creighton during the 2021-22 season, under Greg McDermott, helping the Bluejays to the NCAA Tournament Round of 32.

Edwards has also made a profound impact at both the high school and grassroots level. He was an assistant at Christ the King Regional High School in New York during the 2017-2018 season, where he continued to build his reputation as a skilled developer of young talent. Before that, he coached at New Heights from 2015-17, working with some of the top up and coming prospects at the grassroots level. He also spent time as an assistant coach at The Patrick School in New Jersey during the 2020-21 season and previously worked at Montverde Academy in 2019-20, contributing to the team's MaxPreps National Championship.

At Montverde, he played a key role in the development of several future NBA standouts, including Cade Cunningham, Scottie Barnes, Moses Moody, Caleb Houston, Day'Ron Sharpe, Dariq Whitehead, and Ryan Nembhard. Edwards has also spent several summers developing and training multiple other professional basketball players.

A native of New York City, Edwards played collegiate basketball at George Mason University from 2011-15, where he started 62 games and served as a two-time team captain. He earned his bachelor's degree in sport management before transitioning into coaching.



ASSISTANT COACH ANTOINE YOUNG



The High Point University men's basketball team added Assistant Coach Antoine Young to the staff during the summer of 2024.

Over the past season with the Panthers, he helped the staff lead the Panthers to their first ever-NCAA tournament appearance as the No. 13 seed and matched up against No. 4 seed Purdue. He helped the staff turn around an under .500 program and guided the Panthers to back-to-back outright Big South Regular Season titles for the first time in program history. High Point became the first team in the Big South since 2011 (Coastal Carolina) to win back-to-back outright regular season titles.

HPU finished with an overall record of 29-6 during the 2024-25 season, which tied for the most wins in Big South program history (Winthrop, 2006-07) and the most wins in HPU program history. The Panthers finished the regular season with a 26-5 record and a 14-2 league record. Young joined the High Point staff after spending six seasons as an assistant coach with the Nebraska-Kearney men's basketball program. He became interim head coach in November 2023 and joined the Lopers in the summer of 2018.

Young helped the Lopers to a winning season in 2019-20, UNK went 16-13, defeating NCAA Tourney qualifiers Rogers State and Colorado School of Mines. The Lopers qualified for the MIAA Tournament, had three seniors tabbed All-MIAA and posted an 11-3 mark in the Health & Sports Center.

In a COVID shortened 2020-21 season, the Lopers went 8-14 with nearly every game decided in the last five minutes. UNK knocked off NCAA Tournament qualifier Missouri Western, swept Central Missouri and saw senior forward Austin Luger earn All-MIAA honors. UNK upped its' win total in 2021-22 as transfer guard David Simental came in at 18.8 points per game. The team shot nearly 50% from the field and scored the same number of points (2,057) as its' opponents. During the 2022-23 season, forward Darrian Nebeker reached 1,000 points despite being at UNK for just three seasons.



The former Bellevue West and Creighton star came to UNK after spending two years at as the graduate assistant coach at MIAA-member Pittsburg State. He worked under head coaches Kim Anderson and Kevin Muff, helping Pitt win 22 games and reach the 2018 league tournament. Young also coached two All-MIAA players.

Young began his coaching career at NAIA Concordia University in Seward, Nebraska. During the 2015-16 season the Bulldogs went 18-12 and had four players named to the All-GPAC (Great Plains Athletic Conference) team.

Holding a B.A. in Journalism from Creighton and a master's from Pittsburg State, Young played professional basketball in Amsterdam, Switzerland and Mexico before entering the coaching ranks. At Creighton, Young was a two-time All-Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) selection who scored 1,342 points from 2008-12. His play helped the Bluejays win 97 games and reach the 2012 NCAA Tournament.

During his days at Bell West, Young was named first-team all-state three times and made the all-state tournament squad three times. He finished his career with 1,726 points thanks to averaging 18.5 points over his final three seasons. Finally, the Thunderbirds were Class A state runners up in both 2007 and 2006.

In the summer of 2023, he married UNK Associate Head Athletic Trainer Whitney Ryan. They welcomed a baby girl in the Fall of 2024.

ASSISTANT COACH ANDERSON CLARKE



Anderson Clarke joined the High Point staff in May of 2025 after spending seven seasons with the Montana University men's basketball program.

While at Montana, Clarke was an assistant coach for two seasons, the director of operations for two seasons and a graduate manager for his first three seasons.

He served as Montana's first director of operations since 2017, but filled much of those roles during his first three seasons while he was a graduate manager. In addition to operations duties, such as travel, meals, hotels and more, Clarke also took on the majority of Montana's scouting and film prep.

During Clarke's time with the Grizzlies, Montana has posted a winning record each season. The Grizzlies won the 2025 & 2019 Big Sky Conference regular-season and tournament titles while advancing to the NCAA tournament. In 2019-20, they were again a conference-title contender, entering the Big Sky tournament as the No. 3 seed before it was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2020-21, Montana found its form late, winning a pair of games in the Big Sky tournament and advancing to the semifinals as the No. 6 seed.

The Grizzlies enjoyed more winning seasons with Clarke's help, winning 18 games in 2021-22 and 17 games in 2022-23.

During the 2024-25 season, the Grizzlies had one of the most efficient offenses in the country, shooting nearly 50 percent on the season to rank 4th in the NCAA. Montana went on one of the best runs of play in the programs recent years, going 14-1 over the final months of the regular season and the Big Sky Tournament. The team finished the year 25-10 overall, reaching the 25-win mark for the 8th time in program history and first time since 2019. The .833 winning percentage was the 7th best in program history. Four players earned All-Big Sky postseason honors.

In 2023-24, the Grizzlies won 24 games and a postseason game for just the second time in program history, reaching the quarterfinals of the CBI. Montana finished tied for second in the conference and reached the Big Sky Championship game. In 2024-25, the Grizzlies posted 25 wins with a Big Sky regular season and tournament title to advance to the NCAA Tournament. Two players earned All-Big Sky honors. The Grizzlies set a program record for both total points (2,768) and free throw percentage (79.2) in 2023-24.

Prior to going to Montana, Clarke played collegiately for Division II Concordia University Irvine. The Eagles went 86-36 during Clarke's four seasons (2014-15 through 2017-18), with Clarke totaling 15 points, 25 rebounds, eight assists, four steals and one block. He made seven of his nine career shot attempts.

He has helped Montana establish a pipeline to Australia with at least one Australian player on the roster in all but one year during his time.

Clarke is a native of Tasmania, Australia, where he played for Campolindo High School. His father, Marty, formerly served as the associate head coach for St. Mary's College in California. He is now the technical director of the NBA Global Academy in Canberra, Australia.

Clarke and his wife, Shelby, were married in 2020. They welcomed a son, Booker, in 2023.



ASSISTANT COACH MARTYNAS RUBIKAS



Martynas Rubikas joined the High Point staff as a graduate assistant in the summer of 2023. Over the past two seasons with the Panthers, he helped High Point compile an overall record of 56-15 with a 27-5 Big South record. He helped the staff lead HPU to its first ever-NCAA tournament appearance as the No. 13 seed and matched up against No. 4 seed Purdue. He helped the staff turn around an under .500 program and guided the Panthers to back-to-back outright Big South Regular Season titles for the first time in program history. High Point became the first team in the Big South since 2011 (Coastal Carolina) to win back-to-back outright regular season titles.

From 2018-2021, Rubikas spent three seasons as an assistant coach at St. Louis Christian Academy. Rubikas was a student manager with the men's basketball program at the University of Cincinnati from 2015-2018.



SPECIAL ASSISTANT DELANO THOMAS



Delano Thomas joined the 2025-26 men's basketball staff in early June of 2025 after spending the past two seasons at Florida Memorial University.

During the past two seasons (2023-2025), Thomas was the Head Coach at Florida Memorial University where he compiled an overall record of 47-15 with a Sun Conference league record of 21-9. He helped guide the team to a 2024 Sun Conference Tournament title for an automatic bid to the National Tournament.

Thomas returned to his alma mater at Shawnee State in 2014 as an assistant coach for the Bears before being promoted to head coach in 2017. The NAIA National Coach of the Year and the Don Meyer Coach of the Year had one of the best runs in the history of NAIA men's basketball. Thomas constructed one of the greatest turnarounds in college basketball history during his tenure at Shawnee State. During the 2020-21 season, he led the Shawnee State men's basketball program from worst-to-first in their best season ever as a program, going 31-2 overall en route to its first-ever Men's Basketball NAIA National Championship.

During the title run, the Bears started the season off 4-2 before winning 27 straight games, including the trifecta of a Mid-South Regular Season and Tournament Championship as well as an NAIA Tournament crown. The Bears generated one of the nation's longest winning streaks, totaling 31 games over consecutive seasons. That year, Thomas earned the Mid-South Coach of the Year, NAIA Coach of the Year Award, the Don Meyer Coach of the Year Award and the HoopDirt.com NAIA Coach of the Year Award. Under Thomas' tutelage, he coached three NAIA-All-Americans, eight all-conference selections, and guided nine of his players as they achieved professional basketball status overseas.

He also has a player actively playing professionally in the NBA G-League.

Thomas spent two seasons on the men's basketball team at Shawnee State from 2002-2004, ranking among the best in several categories in the program. A first-team NAIA All-American during the 2003-04 campaign and AMC Player of the Year recipient, Thomas ranks first in the program in blocked shots (148), first in rebounds per game average (11.5), 14th in scoring average per game (13.6) and 14th in assists per game (2.1). He was inducted into Shawnee State's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2017.

A Columbus, Ohio, native, Thomas propelled his successful college campaign into a professional career spanning nine years and six countries across South America, Asia and Europe. In 2008-09, he was part of a Norwegian squad that won the BLNO Championship in Norway's top professional basketball league. Thomas has also spent seasons in Portugal, Syria, Brazil, Uruguay and Germany.

During his time overseas, Thomas also gained valuable coaching experience. In 2007, he was the head coach of Montevideo High School in Uruguay where he led the squad to a 22-10 record. The following year, he was the head coach of Ulriken Elite in Norway for the U21, U18, and U14 boys, as well as the U14 girls' squad.

From 2012-14, Thomas was the head coach for the U15 boys and girls of Ulriken Ung., in Norway. During his time there, he led the girls' squad to a second place finish in the Bergen Region and a silver medal in the Hansa Cup. The boys' side finished as the bronze medalists.

Thomas resides in High Point with his wife and two kids.

Alumni Gym Dedicated

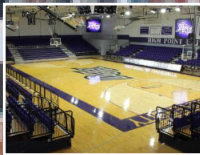
