# THE CITY OF CLARKSVILLE™

TENNESSEE'S TOP SPOT



Clarksville is a vibrant community located in Middle Tennessee, directly off of Interstate 24, 40 miles northwest of Nashville and Nashville International Airport (BNA).

The fifth-largest city in Tennessee, Clarksville is the ninth-fastest growing city in the nation.

### The Land

Between the Lakes national recreation area is located 40 miles west of Clarksville and offers a wide range of recreational activities.

Clarksville is located within 300 miles of Atlanta, Birmingham, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Louisville, Memphis, Nashville and St. Louis and it is less than 500 miles from the sandy shores of the Gulf Coast.



Austin Peay State University is a comprehensive, state-assisted university with a distinguished tradition in liberal and professional education. The institution is named in honor of Austin Peay, Tennessee's governor from 1924 until 1927, the year APSU was founded.

The university is located in Clarksville, Tenn., just 45 minutes northwest of Tennessee's capital, Nashville, on Interstate 24. One of the South's most historic cities, Clarksville also is Tennessee's fastest growing city and one of the 10 fastest growing cities in the United States according a 2013 U.S. Census Bureau Report.

Situated on gently rolling terrain near picturesque downtown Clarksville, Austin Peay's main campus consists of 68 buildings on 169 acres. The classical Georgian architecture of the Austin Peay campus is combined with newer buildings. This blend provides a link with the past while reflecting the academic excellence and dignity of an institution of higher learning.

The newest building additions to the main campus are the Hemlock Semiconductor Building, Foy Fitness and Recreation Center, Sundquist Science Complex and the Morgan University Center, each opening for

use since 2001. The Hemlock Semiconductor Building houses the chemical engineering technology (CET) associate degree program and laboratory. The \$11-million Foy Center, features a rock-climbing wall and 10,000 square feet of fitness space and other amenities for the student body. The Sundquist Complex is one of the South's premier science education facilities and represents the largest capital appropriation ever in Tennessee for a single classroom building. The new Morgan University Center is located in the heart of the campus and features a cybercafe, meeting rooms, a food court, coffee shop, ballroom and lounges for Austin Peay students.

Austin Peay's campus has been the site of seven educational institutions since 1806. The campus was occupied by Southwestern Presbyterian University (now Rhodes College) for 50 years until 1925 when the school moved to Memphis. Austin Peay was founded two years later as a two-year normal school to train teachers for the region. Austin Peay has grown over the years to take its place among the finest mid-sized four-year universities in the nation.

Austin Peay Normal School became a four-year college in 1941-42, and university status was conferred Sept. 1, 1967.

Austin Peay currently enrolls more than 10,000 students from every region of Tennessee, most of the 50 states and several foreign countries.

Those students can choose from more than 50 majors in associate, bachelor's, master's and education specialist's degrees with additional areas of concentration. Courses are offered in arts and sciences, business, education, engineering technology, nursing and human services. Graduate studies also are offered in several areas. In addition, numerous online courses are offered each semester.

A state leader in public service, Austin Peay State University has more than 750 employees. Engaged in the most modern teaching techniques and research are nearly 280 full-time faculty members, 90 percent of whom hold the earned doctorate or appropriate terminal degrees in their disciplines.

## OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP

For the first time the Ohio Valley Conference Men's and Women's Basketball Championships presented by VisitMyrtleBeach.com, will be held at the Ford Center in Evansville, Indiana. It marks just the second time over the past 25 years that the event has not been held in Nashville.

The Ford Center, which opened in 2011, is a 10,000-seat arena located in the core of Evansville's downtown district. The 290,000-square foot facility serves as home of the University of Evansville's men's and women's basketball teams as well as the Evansville Thunderbolts of the Southern Professional Hockey League. The Ford Center has served as host to numerous sporting events and concerts on an annual basis.



For the eighth year in a row all eight men's and all eight women's teams that qualify for the tournament field gather at a single site for the entire tournament (instead of first round games being played on campus sites).

Future OVC Basketball Tournament dates include March 6-9, 2019 and March 4-7, 2020.



# MATT FIGGER

**Position:** Head Coach • **Alma Mater:** Eastern Kentucky, 1995

Thursday, April 6, 2017, Matt Figger was introduced as the 12th head men's basketball coach in Austin Peay State University history.

Figger came to Austin Peay on the heels of a whirlwind Final Four run as the associate head coach and recruiting coordinator under Frank Martin at South Carolina. The Gamecocks were the East Region champion, taking down Marquette, Duke, Baylor and Florida on the way to Phoenix.

After arriving at South Carolina in 2012, Figger assisted Martin in the revival of a program that hadn't enjoyed a 20-win season since 2008-09, had not advanced to an NCAA Tournament since 2003-04 and had not won an NCAA Tournament game since 1973. After winning 14 games the first two seasons in Columbia, Figger and Co. broke .500 for the first time in 2014-15, finishing 17-16, then won 25 games and reached as high as No. 19 in the Associated Press Top-25 poll last season.

In case you somehow missed it, the Gamecocks became NCAA Tournament darlings in March 2017. After bowing out to Alabama in the SEC Tournament quarterfinals, the seventh-seeded Gamecocks thrashed Marquette, 93-73, in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament, erased a double-digit lead to score a mighty upset of second-seeded Duke to advance to the Sweet 16 and toppled Baylor 70-50 to advance to the East Region championship game against fellow SEC foe Florida.

Trailing at halftime for the third time during the NCAA Tournament, the Gamecocks shut down the Gators three-point assault in the second half and fed SEC Player of the Year Sindarius Thornwell—a find of Figger's in his capacity as Martin's recruiting coordinator—for a game-high 26 points and East Regional Most Outstanding Player honors. The Gamecocks were finally knocked out of the tournament by West top seed and top-ranked Gonzaga in the Final Four.

Two players on the Gamecocks Final Four squad got their NBA chance in June 2017—Thornwell, the 48th overall selection in the NBA Draft, with the Los Angeles Clippers via draft night trade with Milwaukee, and PJ Dozier, who inked a free-agent deal with the Los Angeles Lakers.

Figger served on Martin's staff dating back to 2007, Martin's first season at Kansas State. In his decade on Martin's staff, Figger served in a variety of roles, assuming the associate head coach role in 2013-14 upon Brad Underwood's departure for Stephen F. Austin.

At Kansas State, Figger was on a staff that secured at least 21 wins and finished fifth or better in the Big 12 each season. In his first season on staff, Kansas State won its first NCAA Tournament game since 1988 after posting a 20-win season—just its fourth since 1990. The 2009-10 team won a school-record 29 games and appeared in the programs first Elite Eight in over two decades, defeating six ranked opponents along the way and finishing the year ranked seventh in both the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today Coaches Top-25 polls.

At both Kansas State and South Carolina, Figger served as recruiting coordinator. He inked two McDonald's All-Americans at Kansas State, including Michael Beasley, who would earn National Freshman and Player of the Year in 2008 before becoming a first-round pick in the NBA Draft. Beasley was one of four All-Americans—along with Denis Clemente, Jacob Pullen and Bill Walker—tutored by Figger at Kansas State.

Figger's first Division I coaching experience came with John Pelphrey at South Alabama, helping lead the Jaguars to a Sun Belt Tournament title in 2006 and a regular-season championship in 2007. After building through recruiting the first three years under Pelphrey, the Jaguars broke through in 2006 with 24 wins, a 14-game improvement that was the biggest turnaround in the NCAA that season. Figger helped the Jaguars advance to their first NCAA Tournament since 1998, where they bowed out to eventual national champion Florida in the first round.

Figger joined Pelphrey for three months at Arkansas in 2007 as director of operations before signing on at Kansas State as an assistant coach.

In his Division I stops at South Carolina, Kansas State and South Alabama, Figger made three NIT and six NCAA Tournament appearances, including two Sweet 16 and two Elite Eight appearances, in addition to the 2017 Final Four.

Figger earned his coaching stripes in the junior college ranks, breaking into coaching at Wabash Valley Community College in 1993-94, helping lead the Warriors to a 29-3 record, before heading to Vincennes (Ind.) College for five seasons, where he coached Clarksville native and future NBA All-Star Shawn Marion for two seasons, as well as future NBA player Tyrone Nesby. The Trailblazers went 132-39 during Figger's time on NJCAA Hall of Famer Dan Sparks' staff, advancing to three NJCAA National Tournaments and capturing four straight Region XII titles (1995-98); the 1998 Vincennes squad went 31-5 and finished fifth at the national tournament.

He capped his junior college coaching career with a three-year stop at Odessa College, helping the Wranglers to a 27-7 mark and NJCAA National appearance in 2001.

In all, Figger advanced to the NJCAA National Tournament four times. He coached five NJCAA All-Americans—Marion, Mitchell Dunn, DeShay Jones, Tarone Barker and Janavor Weatherspoon—and had 35 players sign Division I scholarships.

# RICK CABRERA

**Position:** Assistant Coach • **Experience:** First Season

**Alma Mater:** Tennessee Tech, 2001

After serving on the staff of his alma mater since 2012-13, Rick Cabrera joins Matt Figger's staff at Austin Peay, where he will be an instrumental member of Figger's inaugural coaching staff.

A former guard for Ohio Valley Conference foe Tennessee Tech, Cabrera spent five seasons on the sidelines in Cookeville, ascending to associate head coach duties in 2015-16 under Steve Payne. Cabrera spearheaded recruiting during his second tenure on the sidelines for Tennessee Tech, helping land All-OVC performers such as Ryan Martin and Torrance Rowe.

Cabrera got his coaching start at his alma mater, spending a season as a graduate assistant under Jeff Lebo and earning his master's in instructional leadership in 2001. From there, Cabrera spent a season as head coach at Miami (Fla.) Killian High School and two seasons as an assistant at Keystone College before ascending to the head coaching job at Lackawanna Junior College.

During his time at Lackawanna, Cabrera accumulated a 100-28 record and two region titles, earning two region Coach of the Year honors (2005-06); he coached three NJCAA All-Americans and eight All-Region performers.

He joined John Shulman's staff at Chattanooga in 2008, serving four seasons under the former Tennessee Tech assistant. He got his first taste of NCAA success with the Mocs, winning Southern Conference North Division titles in 2009 and 2011 and reaching the 2011 NCAA Tournament with a SoCon Tournament win.

As a player, Cabrera spent his first two seasons at Vincennes University, where Figger was an assistant coach, playing alongside future pros Tyrone Nesby and Clarksville native Shawn Marion. He finished up his collegiate career at Tennessee Tech, earning Team MVP as a senior and his multidisciplinary studies degree in 1999. He added a master's degree in Instructional Leadership from Tennessee Tech in 2001.

His father, Hugo Cabrera, Sr., was voted as the Dominican Republic's "Player of the Century" and is in that country's Basketball Hall of Fame. Rick has also played professional basketball in the Dominican Republic



# DALONTE HILL

**Position:** Assistant Coach • **Experience:** First Season

**Alma Mater:** Charlotte, 2001

A former staffer at Maryland who earned a reputation as one of college basketball's finest recruiters, Dalonte Hill will reunite with new APSU head coach Matt Figger on Austin Peay's coaching staff.

Hill earned a reputation as an ace recruiter during his time at Kansas State and Maryland, helping the Terrapins rebuild with back-to-back top-25 signing classes (2012-13)

He joined the collegiate coaching ranks in 2003 at his alma mater Charlotte after two seasons as head coach for highly-regarded AAU program DC Assault. Under Bobby Lutz, Hill helped guide Charlotte to a 61-30 mark and three consecutive postseason appearances, including back-to-back NCAA Tournament trips (2004-05). Hill coached two All-Americans and a Conference USA Player of the Year during his time in Charlotte.

Hill and Figger served on staff at Kansas State from 2006-11 for Bob Huggins and Frank Martin, aiding Martin as he built the Wildcats from a lightly-regarded squad to a Big 12 power; after Huggins left following Hill's first season, Martin promoted him to associate head coach.

During Hill's time on campus, Kansas State won 20 games in four of five seasons. Hill helped land a pair of national top-10 recruits in Michael Beasley and Bill Walker in 2006, earning the nation's top-rated signing class by Scout.com and Rivals.com. During his time at Kansas State, Hill brought four McDonald's All-Americans to Manhattan.

He worked his magic back home at Maryland as well, pulling in local standouts such as Melo Trimble to help Mark Turgeon bring the Terrapins back to prominence.

Hill had recently returned to the AAU ranks but was lured to Clarksville with the promise of helping Figger rebuild Austin Peay into an OVC power.

As a player, Hill helped Charlotte to three postseason appearances—the 49ers advanced to the NCAA Tournament Round of 32 during Hill's freshman season. He played his senior season at Bowie State before returning to Charlotte to complete his bachelor's degree in sociology in 2001.



# SERGIO ROUCO

**Position:** Assistant Coach • **Experience:** First Season

**Alma Mater:** Nova Southeastern, 1987

As Austin Peay State University head men's basketball coach Matt Figger rounded out his coaching staff, an important piece to the puzzle was added in Sergio Rouco, who became the third full-time assistant to join Figger's first staff at APSU.

Rouco was last at South Florida, where he spent three seasons as an assistant for Orlando Antigua and Murry Bartow. It was just the latest stop in a 25-year career spanning the prep, collegiate and international professional scene.

Rouco broke into collegiate coaching at Florida International as an assistant, serving four seasons (1987-91) and returning to FIU as an assistant from 2000-2003.

He spent a season with Billy Gillespie at UTEP in 2003-04, helping the Miners win 24 games and advance to the NCAA Tournament.

Rouco parlayed that success into a return trip to Miami for the head coaching position at FIU, which he held from 2004-09. During Rouco's tenure as the head coach of the Panthers, FIU made a semifinal appearance in the Sun Belt Championship, the program's longest postseason run since 1998, and mentored four All-Sun Belt players.

Prior to his tenure at South Florida, Rouco spent three seasons at Ole Miss (2011-14), helping lead the Rebels to a school record-tying 27 wins and an SEC Tournament title in 2012-13. Rouco's tutelage turned Marshall Henderson into SEC Player of the Year, while Murphy Holloway (first-team All-SEC) and Reginald Buckner (All-Defensive Team) also garnered postseason honors.

In his first season with Ole Miss, Rouco helped the Rebels win 20 games and earn an NIT bid. Long known for preaching defensive tenacity, Ole Miss became one of the SEC's stingiest squads in 2011-12, ranking third in the league in field-goal percentage defense (.405), while Buckner was named to the SEC All-Defensive Team.

Born in Cuba and raised in Miami, Rouco was a successful prep coach in the Miami area at Loyola (1986-87) and Norland (1991-95); he led Miami Norland to 29 victories and spot atop the state rankings for a portion of the 1994-95 campaign.

He boasts professional head coaching experience for Club Mauricio Baez (1995) and Los Minas (1996) in the Dominican Republic, helping both squads reach the semifinals of the playoffs. In 1996-97, he was the head coach of the Trotamundos de Carabobo in Venezuela, and he returned to that country in 2010 to coach Marineros de Anzoategui.

He also spent three years as an associate director at the Boys & Girls Club of Miami, where his duties included supervising athletic programs, 30 employees and 8,000 youth, as well as spearheading fund-raising efforts and payroll budgeting.

A 1987 graduate of Nova Southeastern with an education degree, Rouco and his wife, Kelly, have two sons - Sergio Alessandro and Fabian.



# RYAN MCINTYRE

**Position:** Director of Operations • **Experience:** First Season

**Alma Mater:** West Virginia, 2016

Ryan McIntyre, who was with Austin Peay State University head coach Matt Figger as a graduate assistant at South Carolina during last season's Final Four run, has joined Figger's staff at Austin Peay as Director of Basketball Operations.

A 2016 graduate from West Virginia, where he worked as student manager and ascended to head manager for Bob Huggins, McIntyre will oversee the day-to-day operations of the program, coordinating travel schedules, assisting in community service initiatives, overseeing student managers and serving as director of video services and basketball camps.

At South Carolina, McIntyre served in a variety of roles, helping the Gamecocks to the program's first Final Four in 2017-18. He also aided in the development of Sindarius Thornwell, the 48th-overall selection in the 2017 NBA Draft by the Milwaukee Bucks before a draft-night trade to the Los Angeles Clippers, and PJ Dozier, who inked a free-agent deal with the Los Angeles Lakers.

In addition to serving under Huggins and eventually ascending to the head managerial role at West Virginia, McIntyre has learned at the feet of some of the nation's finest coaches via the summer camp circuit. He served on the camp staffs for Mark Turgeon (Maryland), Shaka Smart (VCU), John Thompson (Georgetown), Josh Pastner (Memphis), Fred Hoiberg (Iowa State) and John Groce (Illinois).



# HAYDEN MCCLAIN

**Position:** Special Assistant to the Head Coach • **Experience:** Sixth Season

**Alma Mater:** Austin Peay, 2016

In his ever-evolving capacity with the Austin Peay men's basketball program, Hayden McClain is staying on as special assistant to new head coach Matt Figger.

After five seasons as a manager for the men's basketball program, McClain remained with the Governors for the 2016-17 season as a graduate assistant. He assisted the Governors in a variety of ways that season, including locker room and equipment responsibilities, help with on-campus recruiting, operations, study hall and film breakdown.

The hard-working and highly energetic Trezevant, Tenn., native became a valuable asset to both the players and the coaching staff in his role as the program's head manager, largely because of his loyalty and reliability. During practice he often could be found helping coaches run halfcourt drills on one end of the floor or challenging players and the other managers to shooting contest.

McClain's love of basketball was natural in that his grandfather once played for APSU before a knee injury sidetracked his promising career. McClain was a three-time all-district selection and all-region as a senior at West Carroll High School after averaging 15 points per game, including a career-best 29-point effort.

# ANTHONY WINCHESTER

**Alma Mater:** Western Kentucky, 2006

Anthony Winchester joins Austin Peay State University men's basketball as Director of Player Development.

Winchester will be responsible for assisting Austin Peay basketball players in personal, academic and athletic success. Additionally, he'll assist the coaching staff in breaking down game film and analyzing statistics and in the on-campus recruitment process for potential student-athletes.

A 2006 graduate from Western Kentucky, Winchester was the 2006 Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year and Associated Press Honorable Mention All-American after averaging 18.6 points per game. He was the 2003 Sun Belt Freshman of the Year and remains eighth in Hilltopper history in scoring (1,732 points) and second in three-pointers (247).

Upon graduation, he embarked on a journey that saw him spend most of seven seasons playing professionally in Spain and Puerto Rico, including a 2012-13 campaign for CB Breogan Lugo which saw him average 15.3 ppg and earn league Guard of the Year honors.

When injuries interrupted parts of his professional career, Winchester was able to return to Bowling Green, first as a graduate assistant in 2008-09, then following that up the next season as Director of Basketball Operations.



# JOE CRONN

**Alma Mater:** Kansas State, 2006

Late of Kansas State, Joe Cronn will serve as the men's basketball strength and conditioning coach.

Cronn served a variety of roles during his time in Manhattan. Since joining the Wildcat strength and conditioning staff in 2006, Cronn assisted with football, men's and women's basketball, cheerleading and women's tennis and served as the interim head of women's basketball strength and conditioning from June-Aug. 2012.

A 2006 graduate of Kansas State with a degree in Nutrition and Exercise Science, Cronn is a National Strength and Conditioning Association Member, Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and Certified USA Weightlifting Club Coach. He also is certified in CPR, AED and First-Aid.



# JONI JOHNSON

**Position:** Head Athletic Trainer • **Experience:** 27th Season

**Alma Mater:** Evansville, 1991

Joni Johnson is in her 27th year working in APSU's athletic training room and tenth as head athletic trainer.

She officially became head trainer in May 2007 after serving six months as interim trainer following the retirement of Chuck Kimmel. In doing so she became only the third fulltime athletic trainer in APSU history.

The Advance, Ind., native has been a part of the APSU training staff since 1991-92 when she served as graduate assistant. Johnson was elevated to a full-time position the following year. She is responsible for treatment, prevention and rehabilitation of APSU athletes in all sports. Johnson manages a team of four full-time staff athletic trainers, two intern athletic trainers and three graduate assistants. She also oversees the department's drug-education and testing programs.

Johnson specifically has worked with the men's basketball team in the winter months and tennis in the spring, but also worked directly in the past with softball and soccer while also assisting with football for 12 seasons. She also has served in no less than secondary contact in the remaining sports. She also oversaw athletics insurance claims for 10 years.

Johnson came to APSU in 1991 after attaining her undergraduate degree in sports studies with a specialty in management along athletic training and business minors from the University of Evansville. While at Evansville, she received the Catherine Wolfe Scholarship for the Health and Physical Education students. She received her Master's of Science in Health and Physical Education with a Public and Community Health Emphasis in May 1992.

She is a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA). For the past 14 years she has volunteered for the NATA Office at the NATA Annual Symposium, assisting with on-site meeting coordination. She served as drug testing site coordinator for the first and second rounds of the 2000 NCAA Division I men's basketball tournament in Nashville.

In 1995-96 she was awarded the Southeast Athletic Trainers Association (SEATA) Backbone of the Year Award, annually presented to the top assistant trainer of the year.

In addition, she received the Order of Nanook Award, presented to the outstanding trainer at the 2000 Top of the World Men's Basketball Classic in Fairbanks, Alaska.

Johnson formerly was a member of the health and human performance faculty, teaching public and community health for 11 years.



# TREIS HUGGINS

**Alma Mater:** South Carolina, 2017

A longtime asset to head coach Matt Figger at South Carolina, Treis Huggins will serve as Austin Peay's graduate assistant coach for the 2017-18 campaign.

Huggins spent the previous two seasons as the head student manager at South Carolina, supervising 10 other managers and assisting the coaching staff with camps, recruiting visits, film, gameplans, travel and practice operations. Huggins was part of the staff that went to the 2017 NCAA Tournament and advanced to the Final Four, working with Gamecock standouts Sindarius Thornwell, PJ Dozier and Michael Carrera, among others.

On the summer camp circuit, was on the camp staff at South Carolina, Syracuse, North Carolina State and Georgia State, assisting campers and learning from Division I head coaches.

Was one of the SWAC's dominant talents a year ago for Grambling State, nearly averaging a double-double for the season with 13.0 ppg to go along with a league-best 9.7 rebounds per contest... finished third in the league in shooting (141-for-254, 55.5 percent) and eighth in blocked shots, (22, 0.7/g), leading Grambling State to a 10-8 league record and an appearance in the SWAC Tournament semifinals... posted 12 double-doubles during the 2016-17 campaign, including a 26-point, 20-board effort in the season's fourth game, against UT Rio Grande Valley... earned SWAC Player of the Week honors with 22 points and 14.5 rebounds for the week of Feb. 10, pouring in 26 points and grabbing 17 boards against Southern and following that with 18 points and 12 rebounds against Alcorn State... prior to his time at Grambling State, was an NJCAA Division II National Champion at Richard Bland College in 2014-15, earning Second-Team All-Region X as a sophomore after averaging 13.9 points on 58.3 percent shooting to go with 10.5 rebounds, 1.7 steals and 1.2 blocks per contest... led the way with 16 points and 13 boards in the National Championship game against John Wood Community College and had 26 points and 17 rebounds in the double-overtime semifinal thriller against Phoenix College to take tournament Most Outstanding Player honors... in addition to 11.2 points in 18.4 minutes per game, largely as a reserve, averaged 9.2 rebounds per game, which ranked 23rd in NJCAA Division II as a freshman, and was fifth in the nation in shooting (106-for-161, 65.8 percent).
