MEDIA INFORMATION

This media guide has been prepared with the hope it will assist you in your 2002-03 Governors basketball coverage.

The Winfield Dunn Center/Dave Aaron Arena has a press row on the west side of the floor designed to accommodate newspaper representatives, radio broadcasters and scouts. It is opposite the table housing the official scorer, official timer, the public address and scoreboard operators. It is also opposite team bench areas.

An additional for film crew area is located on the west side's third level. TV crews normally are located near floor level on the west side near midcourt.

Press Credentials: All media pass requests--by name--must be directed to Brad Kirtley, Box 4515, Austin Peay State University, Clarksville, Tenn. 37044. Only those individuals with official Austin Peay media passes will be admitted to the press areas. Newspaper passes and sideline/floor passes will not be honored. Each pass will entitle the authorized staff member to full courtesies and complete press row services. Passes are non-transferable. Spouses, dates and nonworkers are not permitted in the press row working areas.

Picking Up Credentials: No press row or floor passes for APSU basketball games will be mailed as they must be reserved in advance. Credentials may be secured at the Will-Call area at the north entrance.

Parking: Parking is available to working media along the fence area on the football practice field's south end (northeast of the Dunn Center). Special permits are required and may be obtained by contacting the Sports Information Office a week in advance. Please note the area immediately outside the back (north) entrance is only for APSU personnel and special contributors. However, media personnel can use that area to drop off/pick up equipment.

Photo Coverage: Photographers requiring press row space will need a media pass. Media passes will be issued to authorized personnel representing news media on the floor and must be displayed at all times. No unauthorized free-lance photographers will be admitted to floor level.

Radio Coverage: Radio broadcast permission should be obtained in advance in writing. Press row reservations should be made in advance of games. Besides the Austin Peay Sports Network and the visiting team's official designated outlet, arrangements for additional broadcast line installation must be made in advance with APSU telephone services/computer services at (931) 221-7758.

Television Coverage: Live television coverage is prohibited unless permission is granted by the Athletics Director well in advance.

Scouts: Professional scouts will be allocated space on a first-come first-served basis. Requests for scouting credentials should be made directly to the APSU Sports Information Office.

Telephones: APSU will provide three telephones on press row for the convenience of individuals staffing the game to file their respective stories.

Press Row Services: Pre-game information packets will be distributed prior to each contest. In addition, the press row staff will distribute complete statistical information to persons staffing the game. Please use the phones along press row to transmit game stories. Soft drinks will be available in the media area before each home game and at halftime.

Telephone Numbers: APSU's Sports Information Office telephone number is (931) 221-7561. The basketball press row number is (931) 221-7191. The fax number is (931) 221-7562.

Special Requests: Anyone desiring additional or special information should make arrangements in advance with the Sports Information Office.

Interview Policy: The best time to reach head coach Dave Loos in his office is between 9 a.m.- noon daily. If further assistance is needed, please contact the Sports Information Office, (931) 221-7561. Game-week player interviews should be arranged before practice--1-1:30 p.m.--through the Sports Information Office or basketball office. They should be conducted outside the dressing room.

Attending Practice: On most occasions, practices will be open to the media. When the north bleachers are open, the media is welcome to view practice from that location. In the event the bleachers are not available, the media is requested to sit in second-level seating.

Post-Game Interviews: Following the game, after a short meeting with his players, Coach Loos will be available for interviews outside the Governors' dressing room. In most cases, the Governors' dressing room will remain closed until every player is fully clothed. If a player(s) interview is requested, a sports information representative or team manager will bring that individual from the locker room. Please be advised Coach Loos has a commitment to conduct a post-game radio interview following the contest, so we ask for your cooperation and patience. The APSU Sports Information Office is aware of newspaper deadline problems. If the SID office can aid in post-game interviewing, please inform us.

G OVERNORS OUTLOOK

A U S T I N P E A Y S T A T E U N I V E R S I T Y

For three years, it was the Trenton Hassell-Nick Stapleton Show at Austin Peay.


However, Stapleton, the two-time second-team All-Ohio Valley Conference guard, often times deferred to his teammate as the Govs rolled up 40 wins over the last two seasons.

It now will be a solo act. With Hassell off to the NBA's Chicago Bulls, Stapleton no longer be content to stay in the shadows—it is his time and his team to lead. More than any other year, Stapleton will have to assert himself both offensively and defensively...and from a leadership standpoint.

The 6-1 former academic non-qualifier returns for a fourth season after graduating last spring. He averaged a career-best 17.8 ppg, hitting a team-best 68 three pointers, and 3.4 apg.

In 2001-02, he will have to find that delicate balance of being the "go-to" guy from a scoring and distributing standpoint.

"It's his team in a number of different ways," APSU coach Dave Loos said. "I think everyone is aware of his ability to score—we are going to have expect much more from him than just scoring.

"He needs to be one of the prime leaders, if not the prime leader on this team. Nick has to set the tone for us on both ends of the floor and set the tone off the floor as well.

"And he seems more willing to accept that responsibility."


Stapleton is APSU's only returning full-time starter...Sophomore Adrian Henning (3.6 ppg, 2.3 rpg), a 6-6 guard/forward, started the Govs' final 10 games more for his defensive presence.

In fact, the combined scoring average (8.1 ppg) of APSU's other six returnees—Henning, sophomore center Josh Lewis, sophomore guard Gerrell Webster, junior forward Igor Macura, senior guard Kevin Easley and

sophomore center/forward Morton Szmiedowicz), isn't even half of what Stapleton compiled a year ago.

In other words, a rebuilding job is at hand for head coach Dave Loos and the Governors. Not only is Hassell gone, but graduating senior frontcourters Joe Williams (13.9 ppg, 8.0 rpg) and Theanthony Haymon (10.1 ppg, 5.8 rpg) have taken their respective games overseas. In addition, sophomore guard Matt Jakeway (7.1 ppg), chose to transfer to be closer to home.

But the APSU staff believes, despite the key losses, the Governors will be more than competitive with the expected improve-



ment of the returnees.

"I think there are two guys, who have shown the ability to score and that's Adrian Henning and Gerrell Webster," Loos said. "When you look at the way we play and who needs to do something, Josh Lewis is someone who I think is capable also."

But Loos is the first to know the Govs recruiting class of 6-7, 215-pound Sean Prather and 6-8 240-pound Bobbye Hill, both junior college transfers plus freshmen Fred Marshall, a 6-6 forward; Anthony Davis, a 6-2 guard, and Levi Carmichael, a 6-0 guard, must provide an immediate lift.

"I think, assuming our returning guys can do what I think they can do, our success will be determined by how our new people do, Loos said. "If our new people can't play, we have a problem because we have no depth. We have fewer experienced people this year so it would put even more pressure on the experienced people."

Stapleton, already a 100-point scorer who will climb toward the top of APSU's all-time scoring list, obviously provides the Govs something to build around. One thing for sure, the Govs could be an extremely athletic club, albeit an inexperienced one, at times. And the Govs certainly cannot be counted on for the offensive production of a year ago. The Governors will look in the other direction—defense.

"When you lose the scoring ability we had, you can't just say your are going to replace it...You are not," Loos said. "We have to improve in other areas, primarily defense and rebounding.

"Commitment is the key ingredient. We have guys big enough, strong enough, quick enough. We spent much more time in our individual workouts on defensive fundamentals and techniques. We have spent a significant amount of time on repetition. I think we need to be better fundamentally, be more committed, box out better than we have in the past."

POINT GUARD

Stapleton will be the Govs' only senior and again will be backed up by 6-0 sophomore Webster (1.5 ppg), who should be more comfortable in his second year to allow Stapleton to switch over to the two-guard when the situation arises.

Levi Carmichael, a 6-0 freshman, also could see time at the point if he adjusts to the college game.

"Gerrell has come back with a very positive approach. He learned this level takes a little different approach—just like Prather, Marshall

and Davis will learn.

“If Carmichael can acclimate himself to the athleticism at this level, he can play—he has a terrific approach to this game. He know how to get other people involved in the game and can run a team.”

TWOGUARD

The two-guard spot literally is wide open. Senior Kevin Easley has awaited a long time for a chance at the position. If he can develop a consistency with both his jump shot and his floor, that opportunity will come.

Then there is sophomore Rhet Wierzba, who is hoping a year's

experience will help him better develop his perimeter game.

Also in the picture could be guard Anthony Davis, the California transfer whose eligibility is in question because of a SAT certification snafu.

If he is not available, the development of Webster and Carmichael becomes even more important as it would allow Stapleton to slip over to the two spot. And Henning, who moved into the starting role at the

position late last season, could even provide minutes there.

SMALL FORWARD

The versatile Henning (3.6 ppg, 2.3 rpg) is being counted heavily on up front, perhaps at both the small and power forward, despite his lithe stature. He should get the first look as Hassell's replacement.

“The thing I like about Adrian is he is not afraid,” Loos said. “We want him to play with a purpose and make good decisions, but you don't want to ruin his attitude because he is not afraid. He is going to do things, try things and initiate things. He is aggressive out there. He is fearless.”

Also challenging will be 6-7 junior Igor Macura (0.8 ppg, 1.2 rpg), who has enjoyed a strong preseason after a struggling sophomore season. As a freshman, he impressed the Govs staff when he stepped in for two starts at the small forward position when Hassell was out.

“I think Igor would say last season was a disappointment for him,”

Loos said. “But in the preseason, he has been impressive. He has played like a seasoned guy...like a guy who is saying ‘I have two years of experience and now it is time for me to step up and be an important part of this team.’”

The other candidate is the talented 6-6 freshman, Fred Marshall, who was MVP of the Georgia North-South All-Star game last summer.

POWER FORWARD

Newcomer Sean Prather could be the key player at the power forward slot. He brings tremendous strength and athleticism to the position.

“Sean is one of those guys who has ability but also needs to learn what it takes to play at this level,” Loos said. “Like Gerrell Webster, Josh Lewis and Adrian Henning last year, he will have to learn the approach it takes at the Division I level.”

There's also 6-10 sophomore Morten Szmiedowicz, who struggled adapting to the college game a year ago and saw limited playing time.

That's why Loos is looking to both Henning and Macura for help at the four spot.

“I see the key people being Adrian and Igor,” Loos said. “They are going to have to play the wing and the four-spot until Prather or Szmiedowicz or others prove they can play or can't play at this level.”

CENTER

Sophomore Josh Lewis got off to a tremendous start a year ago in the Top of the World Classic, grabbing numerous rebounds and being a defensive presence with his shot-blocking presence.

However, the 6-7 long-armed frontcourt player could not maintain that playing level, even though he did lead or was co-leader in blocked shots eight times during the year. After a committed off-season, Lewis (1.3 ppg, 1.9 rpg, 82.6 FG%) appears ready to step as a major contributor and possible starter.


“I think he recognizes this year what we need from him—that it is different from last year—very different,” Loos said. “One of the first things we said to him after the season was over was that you have to realize we are going to need you to play on the offensive end and you




Forward Igor Macura is one of two returning Josh Lewis led the Governors in blocked shots eight times as freshman,



Dave Loos, the Governors head basketball coach is in his sixth year as Austin Peay's athletics director. Loos was named to the post in May 1997 and took over the duties July 1 of that same year.

The dual role is almost unheard of in this day of college athletics. He is in his 13th season as Austin Peay's head basketball coach.

His double duties aptly point out the respect Loos earned both on and off campus. His common-sense approach to athletics director's duties have been with the same diligence that have been so representative of his APSU basketball tenure.

That has resulted in Austin Peay winning the Ohio Valley Conference tournament and gaining an NCAA tourney berth in 1996; APSU capturing a 1997 league co-championship—the first since 1977—and Loos being named OVC Coach of the Year in 1990-91 and 1996-1997—the first APSU coach in history to twice earn that honor.

Loos not only has elevated APSU's program to the pinnacle of OVC prominence, but has done it as well with the dignity and class so reflective of the reputation he built as an athlete and as a high school/college coach.

He is only the second APSU coach to lead the Govs to an OVC regular-season co-championship and NCAA Division I tournament berth. His APSU teams have advanced to at least the OVC tourney semifinals in six of the last eight years. That has sustained his reputation of elevating his club's play during February-March, where the Govs own a .650 winning percentage over the last eight seasons.

The Govs have owned a .500 record or better OVC record in each of the of the last nine seasons are second only to Murray State in winning percentage during that span.

As a result, Loos achieved one of his program's goals--the Governors reclaiming their spot among the OVC elite and annually competing for the title.

Loos became Austin Peay's 11th head men's

basketball coach on July 14, 1990. The likeable 55-year-old has proven to be a "perfect fit" for the APSU program.

In his initial season, not only did his Govs produce a winning (15-14) season after a previous 10-19 campaign, they displayed an exciting style as well.

The Govs struggled record-wise (11-17 and 7-20) the next two seasons as Loos was reinventing the soul of the program. The young 1993-94 team began 0-7 but finished strongly at 11-16. Picked to finish eighth in preseason polls, the Govs battled for the title much of the season, finally settling for third.

Since then APSU has developed a rich tradition of excellence.

In 1994-95, the Governors finished the regular-season at 12-15 but pulled two upsets in the Ohio Valley Conference tournament before falling to Murray State when star forward Bubba Wells suffered a leg injury that later turned out to be a surgery-necessitating right leg stress fracture.

In 1995-96, the Governors again peaked late. In February, the Govs fashioned an 8-2 record, including six straight victories. APSU entered the NCAA tourney with a four-game win streak before losing to Georgia Tech.

A year later, the Governors finished 17-14 overall—with All-America forward Wells missing the season's first 12 games—but won six of their final eight games, including a four-game winning streak that helped clinch a regular-season OVC co-championship.

In 1997-98, the Govs, despite a rebuilding season, ended the season with a surprising 17-11 record and a fourth-place OVC finish.

In 1998-99, the young Govs finished in a third-place OVC tie, although the 11-16 mark ended the string of winning seasons at three.

A year later, the Govs ended 18-11. The 18 wins represented the most regular-season wins by the Govs since 1976-77.

APSU topped that record a year later with a 22-10 record—the Govs' first 20-win mark

since 1986-87 and the most regular-season wins (20) by a APSU team since 1976-77.

It was a 14-18 mark in 2001-02 as the Governors possessed only one senior.

Entering his 13th Govs' coaching season, Loos has earned three "Coach of the Year" citations, two from his fellow OVC coaches and

both on and off the court and represented the University with great class.

In addition, Loos has earned respect from peers for his coaching ability and the manner he directs the program, resulting in his first-season OVC coaching honor. He was only the third APSU coach to earn such an award, the first to be recognized in his first Govs' season.

Loos came to APSU after four seasons as Memphis State's top assistant. He joined Larry Finch in 1986 and helped direct his alma mater to an 85-43 record, including two NCAA tourney appearances and a Metro Conference tourney title during his tenure.

Prior to joining Memphis State, Loos enjoyed four successful head-coaching seasons at Christian Brothers College in Memphis. He took over that program in 1982-83, and after an initial 16-14 season, recorded three straight 20-win cam-

paigns. In 1985, CBC captured its first Volunteer State Athletic Conference championship, the VSAC tourney title and second place in the National Catholic Tournament.

For his efforts, he earned VSAC, NAIA District 24 and NAIA Area V Coach of the Year honors. He also was named the National Catholic Tournament Outstanding Coach.

Loos' move to CBC came after spending eight seasons as head coach at his prep alma mater, Mehlville High School in St. Louis. Taking over a program that previously had endured 11 straight losing seasons, Loos led his team to five winning campaigns, including a state tourney berth. He left the school as its winningest coach.

The Missouri native played both basketball and baseball during his college days at Memphis State, where he was inducted into their Athletic Hall of Fame in September. Loos was the starting point guard for the 1968-69 Tigers, leading the team in minutes played. He also was an all-conference shortstop for the baseball Tigers baseball team.

Upon completing his eligibility, he remained at Memphis State as an assistant in 1970. Following his graduation (1970), he officially began his coaching career as an assistant basketball and head baseball coach at CBC.

Loos is involved in many charitable events, including the NABC (National Association of Basketball Coaches) Coaches vs. Cancer Three-Point Attack.

He and his wife, Phyllis, have four children, David, Todd, Brad, the former Gov who is now a graduate assistant at Central Missouri, and Nicole, age 20, a junior at Austin Peay and member of the school's dance team. He and Phyllis have one grandchild William Daniel Loos, age one, son of David and Pam Loos.


one from the Tennessee State Sportswriters Association. He was their 1995-96 "College Coach of the Year."

Tony Collins begins his 14th season as a Governors assistant, his 13th under Dave Loos.

When Loos was named head coach in July 1990, he elected to retain Collins from the previous coaching staff. Loos was impressed with Collins' energy, his recruiting contacts and, in particular, his strong relationship with the players.





Scott Combs was elevated to full-time assistant status with the APSU basketball program in August.

After serving as a reserve guard and forward as a junior, Combs ended up being the Govs starting post player as a senior.





What is life without Trenton Hassell going to be like?

"It's not a welcome thought for sure...And it's not just the loss of Trenton...We lost our entire frontline (Hassell, Joe Williams and Theanthony Haymon). That is a pretty sobering thought."

Whether consciously or subconsciously, Nick Stapleton deferred to Trenton Hassell...but he can no longer do that?

"It's his team in a number of different ways. I think everyone is aware of his ability to score. But we are expecting much more from him than just scoring. He has to be our prime leader and I think he is willing to take on that responsibility."

While rebuilding the frontline and Stapleton the key returnee, do you see a change from your "inside-out" offensive philosophy?

"We played inside-out (the last two years) but the fact of the matter is that Nick and Trenton had the green light if they had a good shot. In Nick's case that will certainly continue. ...If you look at our statistics the last few years, we have been up there among the national leaders in field goal percentage. That says something about our shot selection and we want to continue that but want Nick to use his ability. He has had that approval before and he will have it again this year."

With nearly 70 percent of your offense gone and Stapleton perhaps facing stacked defenses, where do you see additional offense coming?

"I think there are two guys who have shown the ability to score—Adrian Henning and Gerrell Webster. When you look at the way we play and who needs to do something, Josh Lewis is someone who I think is capable...And I think you have to look at Igor (Macura)—he has come back playing really well. He is playing a like a seasoned player."

With the exodus of the entire frontcourt, what are your thoughts about the "new" group?

"The one thing I can say about the frontline this year that it is totally unproven. I like some of the things that I have seen in our preseason workouts but they are untested and we are going to have to wait and see. Our new guys—(Sean) Prather, Bobby Hill and (Fred) Marshall—have been successful at other levels but haven't been successful at this level yet. It's a learning process for them, and for Anthony Davis, about what it takes to be successful at this level...and assuming our returning guys can do what I think they can, our success will be determined by how our new people do."

What have you seen from these guys you really like?

"They seem to get along well together. You have to love Bobby Hill. He has ter-

rific size and presence—he just needs to learn how to use it more to his advantage...I love good attitudes and Bobby Hill has one of those. Levi Carmichael is another I compare attitude-wise to Bobby. If he can adjust to the athleticism at this level, he can play—he has a terrific approach to this game. He know how to get other people involved in the game and can run a team. Prather Marshall and Davis all have ability. They can do some things that you can't teach. They need to learn playing at this level is different from the level that they have come from. You have a five and one in two really important positions with great attitudes and then you have three guys in between with great athletic ability. If we can harness that and teach them how to play on this level, we have a chance."

As a coach, do you think you will have to be more patient with this group because they new and in some case young?

"No, I think we will have to bear down on them to be honest. They have to learn how to play this game—how hard you have to play this game at his level. We will have to be very demanding of this group. This is something we have tried to instill in them from day one."

This program has won 40 games over the last two years and have enjoyed winning seasons in five of the past six years, is the Gobs current edition prepared to carry on that tradition?

"They have to understand they haven't earned that. Other people have earned that. Whether they continue that or not will be decided on their work habits and their commitment. It all boils down to how our new people fit in--whether they can play or not."

What returnees have impressed you in the preseason?


"I am really impressed with Josh Lewis and his work habits during the off-season. He was totally committed—he personifies a person who is committed in the off-season....In the preseason, Igor has impressed—I think he would tell you that last season was a disappointment for him. He is taking the approach that is it now time him to step up and be an important part of this team...Gerrell Webster has come back with a very positive approach. He learned it takes a little different approach and intensity at this level--just like Prather, Marshall and Davis will learn. Gerrell has come back with a different attitude about all of this. He has come back with a very positive approach...I also think (Rhet) Wierzba has come back a different player. Even though he didn't shoot it well last year, he is a guy who can be important to us with his shooting ability. He is another guy with a terrific attitude. We are going to need that perimeter guy who can spot up."

Where do you see this team in the OVC?

"There are too many unanswered question to even speculate on how we do. In the middle of December I will have a better

In 2001-02, all too often it came down to how Nick Stapleton went, how Austin Peay went. Unfortunately, even as spectacular as Stapleton was, he couldn't prevent the young Govs, who started three sophomores and a freshman with Stapleton, from incurring only their second losing season in the past seven years—a 14-18 mark punctuated by a pre-Christmas scheduled ranked at the time the fourth most difficult in the country.

In fact, the Governors opened the season against nationally ranked Oklahoma State and also played Providence, Ball State, Dayton and Memphis before settling into the Ohio Valley Conference season.

If the schedule wasn't enough problems, the Govs' bench was depleted by dismissals and defections, forcing a young Govs team to become even younger. Also, after finishing the previous two seasons as one of the nation's top shooting teams, the Govs found .500 shooting nights a rarity. And that spilled over to the free-throw line where the Govs sat at the bottom of the league.

But somehow the Govs found a way to achieve a .500 league record, largely because of Stapleton's tremendous play (see above) and the steady development of a quartet of youngsters. Adrian Henning, after a woeful first month, was moved inside to the strong forward spot and averaged 12 points and 6.2 rebounds per game during league play.

Center Josh Lewis limped into the Christmas break running on fumes. But during league play he became revitalized. He not only was one of the league's best shot blockers, he averaged 7.6 rebounds and 7.8 points, despite playing an average of just 28 minutes per game, largely due to foul problems (five disqualifications in OVC, eight overall).

Then there was guard Rhet Wierzba. Recruited to be a long-range shooting specialist, the sophomore guard became the Govs best perimeter defender and a solid all-round player in addition to assuming a floor leadership role.

The Govs finally turned to an athletic freshman for the other starting role. Anthony Davis, despite standing just 6-2, moved in as a starting forward. He averaged 13.5 points in OVC play (11.2 ppg overall) to take some of the pressure off Stapleton.

When the lineup finally came together, the Govs played their season's best basketball and managed a fourth-place OVC finish and a first-round tourney host spot.

That resulted in a showdown with Tennessee-Martin, with APSU holding off the Skyhawks, 72-69.

The Govs advanced to Louisville for the tourney semifinals to face OVC regular-season champ Tennessee Tech. Behind Stapleton's 36 points, the Govs stayed in the contest until the game's final minutes with the season ending in an 86-77 defeat.

Stapleton, a first-team All-OVC selection, was the only non-championship game performer to be named to the OVC all-tourney team.

Following the season, he was invited to Phoenix Suns summer camp and later signed to play in Israel.





DUNN CENTER/DAVE AARON ARENA

The Winfield Dunn Center became home of the Governors and Lady Govs indoor athletics in 1975 after ground was broken for the \$5.3 million, 9,000-seat structure in February 1973.

The 132,000 square-foot complex, officially named the Winfield Dunn Health and Physical Education Building and Convocation Complex in honor of Governor Dunn, is a dominating edifice with 78 feet separating the top of the building from its maplewood playing surface. The Dunn Center replaced the Memorial Gymnasium, affectionately called "The Little Red Barn," which served as the Governors homecourt from 1952 until the Dec. 1, 1975 tip-off.

On Jan. 16, 1988, the basketball arena was named Dave Aaron Arena in honor of the school's former athletics director, football coach and all-time winningest basketball coach.

Several improvements and modifications have taken place in recent years, including the addition of new scoreboards. Also, the floor lighting has been replaced to allow fans to better see Lady Govs and Governors events and also accommodate photography needs.

An elevator was installed more than two years ago to better accommodate the handicapped.

The Dunn Center is home of Governors basketball and Lady Govs volleyball and basketball. It also serves



as a multipurpose practice facility for track, baseball and softball indoor workouts.

The Dunn Center also houses the University's training facility where trainers Chuck Kimmel, Joni Johnson and Karen Lovell administer treatment and rehabilitate injured athletes. It also is home to the athletic department's academic services and coordinator Dt. Johnnie Smith, located on the west upper level.

Austin Peay athletics also work out in the weight room, conveniently located in the Dunn Center's lower level south end. They also have access to air-conditioned dressing rooms.

Entering the facility's front lobby, visitors are impressed by the Hall of Fame area, honoring APSU's greatest former athletes, administrators and supporters.

APSU's athletic offices are located in the Dunn Center with the exception of tennis, which is located in the Governors Tennis Center, and rifle, which is located in the ROTC Armory. Both facilities are in close proximity to the Dunn Center. Also the Governors baseball offices were supposed to be moved closer to Raymond C. Hand Park, in the former home of the student newspaper, The All-State.





CENTURY GAMES

With the return of the 45-second clock and the three-point shot in the past decade, 100-point games have been on the upswing in college basketball.

For Austin Peay, in fact, the cycle took a definite swing with four 100-point games in 1986-87, the Govs winning three of them; five in 1987-88, APSU winning just one, and six in 1988-89, the Govs winning five.

With a change of coaches, also involved a style change during 1990-91. Dave Loos' team played in six 100-point games. The Govs scored the most single-game points in Dunn Center history with a 122-96 win against Milligan. APSU and Morehead State set a Dunn Center mark for combined points scored (237) in the Govs' 124-113 double-overtime loss. Morehead also set an arena mark for most points scored by the opposition.

In 1991-92, the Govs participated in five 100-point games. The two wins came back to back, a 102-100 decision against Morehead State and 103-97 verdict against SEC foe Mississippi State. In total, the Govs have played in 26 games in which at least one team scored 100 points, including last season's 106-83 win against Lee and a

107-100 double overtime loss to Eastern Illinois.

Over the years, the Govs have been involved in 119 games where at least one team scored 100 points, with 12 of those both clubs scoring 100 or more. Austin Peay has won 58 of the century games. Of the 12 which both teams scored 100 or more, the Govs are 5-7. The Dunn Center/Dave Aaron Arena has held 33 100-point contests, with APSU holding a 29-4 edge.

Only one century-mark game occurred while Austin Peay was a junior college, and Freed-Hardeman won that one, 104-30, during the 1934-35 season. An opponent of the 100-point mark was David Aaron (1946-62), who purposely passed up scoring opportunities to avoid his team hitting the century figure and causing opposition possible embarrassment. The long-time successful coach was forced into the situation during the 1958-59 season when Harry Gallatin made his college coaching debut for Southern Illinois. The Govs won the game 106-100 in Memorial Gymnasium ("Little Red Barn").
