

## How to Spiderweb bun cover with Spider on a ribbon



*Materials:*  
(2) Medium weight cut away or tear away stabilizer  
(4) 4 1/2" x 5" black marine vinyl  
(1) 1/8" white satin ribbon (approximately 4-6" )  
(1) hair stick  
Painters tape

**Step 1:** Hey, guess what step 1 is? If you guessed "hoop a piece of stabilizer" YOU WIN!

**Step 2: Run Color Stop 1** the die line for vinyl and ribbon placement.

**Step 3:** Using the TEE-NINE-EST piece of tape possible, tape one end INSIDE the spider body, with the rest of the ribbon coming out his butt, clearing both rear legs. Secure upper ribbon in place.

**Step 4:** Float one piece of marine vinyl on top of your hoop.



**Step 5: Run color stops 2, 3, 4**

**Step 6:** Tape your second piece of marine vinyl securely on the back of the hoop

**Step 7: Run color stop 5**


**Step 8: "fussy cut"** (this is just to get all the excess vinyl out of the way) around the spider being sure **NOT TO CUT OFF THE RIBBON!!!**



**Step 9:** CAREFULLY cut along the outside of all legs until you get to the spider butt.



**Step 10:** When you get to the rear legs, pull the ribbon to one side and carefully cut out the far side leg stopping short of where the ribbon is attached.



**Step 11:** Now pull the ribbon to the cut side and carefully cut out the other leg stopping short of where the ribbon is attached.



**Step 12:** Fold the back vinyl, stabilizer, and ribbon DOWN across the back of the spider and carefully trim ONLY the front vinyl across the ribbon attachment area



**Step 13:** Fold the ribbon to the FRONT of the spider and carefully trim the stabilizer and back vinyl across the ribbon attachment area.



HEY! You have a spider on a ribbon! Ready for the rest of this?

Awesome Sauce!


**Time for PART II of the pattern.**



**Step 1:** Hey, guess what step 1 is? If you guessed "hoop a piece of stabilizer" YOU WIN! (Whoa! Déjà vu)



**Step 2:** Run Color Stop 1 the die line for ribbon and vinyl placement (seriously, didn't I JUST say this?)



**Step 3:** Using the TEE-NINE-EST piece of tape possible, tape the spider ribbon, right-side up, INSIDE the die line at the single stitch mark, allowing the spider to dangle outside the oval. This is where you guesstimate how much dangle you want in your spider. I went with 5" for me. Tape the spider body to the edge of the hoop OUT OF THE STITCH PATH.



**Step 4:** Float one piece of marine vinyl on top of your hoop.



**Step 5:** run Color Stop 2



**Step 6:** Tape your second piece of marine vinyl securely on the back of the hoop



**Step 7:** run Color Stop 3



**Step 8:** "fussy cut" (this is just to get all the excess vinyl out of the way) around the spider being sure **NOT TO CUT OFF THE RIBBON!!!**




**Step 9:** Carefully trim cut about 1/8" away from the tack line **CAREFUL NOT TO CUT THE SPIDER RIBBON!**



**Step 10:** When you get to the spider ribbon, fold the back vinyl, stabilizer, and ribbon DOWN across the back of the oval and carefully trim ONLY the front vinyl across the ribbon attachment area





**Step 13:** Fold the ribbon to the FRONT of the oval **and carefully** trim the stabilizer and back vinyl across the ribbon attachment area.



**Step 11:** Punch holes through BOTH of the eyelet satin stitches being careful NOT to snip the satin stitching.



**Step 12:** Pass hair stick through both eyelet holes and ...



**BRAVO!!!!** You did it!
